London, Nov. 21 .- The German fleet, as specified in the terms of the armistice with Germany, was surrendered today to the

This announcement was made officially by the admiralty this afternoon. The statement reads: "The main German fleet surrendered at 9:30 o'clock this morning.'





SOLDIER IS SLAIN BY BANDITS, WHO ARE BEING HUNTED

Saskatchewan Farm a Network of Trenches.

LEADER REPORTED TAKEN

Dynamite Will Be Used Today to Take Others Dead or Alive.

Charles Horstiey, a soldier of the base hunting the Gervais bandits ho murdered James McCray at Steep reek, was shot from a bush by the endits today as he was attempting enter a dugout covered by a brush, he body has been brought to this

It is reported that Gervais, the bandit leader, is captured, but the other two bandits are still besieged in an underground tunnel.

The case is the outcome of the murder of James McKay, jun., of this city, a sheriff's officer, whose body, along with his car, was thrown down a 60-foot embankment into the Saskatchewan River at Steep Creek. The place is 40 miles east of here near the Lacolle Falls power dam. The crime was committed last Friday afternoon when Mr. McKay went to make a selure under instructions from the sheriff at the farm of a man known as "Doctor" Gervais.

Quebec Draft Evaders.

McKay was shot from an entrenched dugout by two men who are believed to be draft evaders and who are said to have come to Steep Creek district from Montreal about the time the military service act was put in force.

Discovery of the crime was made yesterday when Sergt. Kistruck of the previncial police was sent out to make a search for Mr. McKay, whose absence since last Friday had caused some anxiety at his home, and at the sheriff's office. Sergt. Kistruck found a system of trenches which had evidently been constructed for the purpose of defence and represented what might be found on a modern battle ground. There were a number of dugouts which command strategic points in the locality, and it was from one of these that Mr. McKay was shot.

Neighborhood Terrorized.

Investigation in the neighborhood disclosed the fact that the people of Steep Creek have been living in terror of, three men, one of whom is alleged to be "Doctor" Gervais, who came to this district some time ago, and with whom the two men, who are alleged to have committed the crime, lived. It is said the doctor was absent at the time and that the shooting was done by the other two.

A posse of police and soldiers was dispatched to the scene of the crime by Inspector O'Sullivan of the provincial police. They are fully armed, and have instructions to take the men dead or alive.

The police assumption is that the men are still in some of the subterranean refuges which they had laboriously constructed all over the place, and dynamite will be tried tomorrow. In the meantime police and soldier guards will keep watch throughout the right in the hope that the outlaws will not escape.



The number who declined to accept Government assistance was over 6,000, or about 7 per cent. The remainder gave indefinite answers.

A further surprising fact was revealed, that approximately 5,000 of the 105,000 announced their willingness to 105,000 announced their willingness to work for wages to gain experience. The number who declined to work for wages was over 42,000, but this is easily accounted for by the fact that 61,000 have had three years experience or more.

\$13,000,000 Available.

In reference to the distribution of these men, it is noted that 72 per cent wish to take up land in the province from which they enlisted. Another question the men were asked to answer is how much money they expected to

question the men were asked to answer is how much money they expected to have at their disposal on their return to Canada. Only 38,000 men answered this question with a sum of money; over 66,000 either stating that they had no money or not answering the question. Nevertheless, it was revealed that these 38,000 men would have an aggregate of over \$13,000,000 at their disposal after the war. This would make an average of over \$13,000,000 at their disposal after the war. This would make an average for the 38,000 of approximately \$350, or an average for the 105,000 of \$130. These amounts are almost entirely exclusive of deferred pay, and as the cards were signed early in 1917, prior to the voting of three months' pay to every man on his discharge, another \$100 per man can be added, making a total of over \$24,000,000.

Men Are Forced to March Homeward Without Nourishment.

LONDON, Nov. 20 .- (British Wireless LONDON, Nov. 20.—(British Wireless Service).—In any question of provisioning Germany the Government will be obliged to take into account the condition under which British prisoners in Germany are being released, unless the cruel treatment which such prisoners are receiving is discontinued, the German Government was warned in a wireless message today.

The message sent by the British Government reads: mment reads: "Information reaches His Majesty's Government of a shocking lack of organ ization in the release of British prisoners in German territory, and of their return march on foot, miserably clothed, without food or transport and with no escort or guides, to the Allied lines, with the result of lamentable suffering and heavy mortality.

"His Majesty's Government cannot tolerate continuation of this cruel treatment, and must insist on adequate arrangement being made, in all the above respects, by the German authorities, with whom the responsibility lies. ties, with whom the responsibility lies. Otherwise we shall be compelled to take this into account in any question of revictualling Germany or satisfying the requirements of the German population. What You Ought to Consider When Selecting Clothing

By DR. LEONARD KEENE HIRSHBERG. A. B., M. A., M. D., (Jo hns Hopkins University.)



Thick or heavy garments enervate garments enervate individual as well as make him oversensitive to changes of temperature. A skin too tenderly protected, too much petted, coddled or spolled by thick clothing becomes less capable of resisting swift, sudden or extreme changes from heat and coid. Too heavy fabrics or too many layers of clothing are an invitation to influenza, pneumonia and coughs. Clothing should be just a little less than is needed to make you feel warm or to hamper the movements of your legs and arms.

"Chill" Sometimes Good

"Chill" Sometimes Good. A slight chilly feeling when you first A slight chilly feeling when you first open a window or step into the open sunlight is preferable to an excess of warmth. The latter means that there is too much hot blood on the surface of the skin, due to an excess of clothing. This hot blood makes you feel warm and your flesh secure, yet it is constantly changing, and is being chilled by the colder air as it gradually penetrates thick overcoats and thick underwear.

On the contrary, if you have just a moderate thickness of garments, and the skin is lightly chilled at once, it indicates that the skin has shrunken to squeeze out much of the blood from its

A pale, tense skin in the cold means that very little of it will be lowered in temperature to be carried to the nose, throat and lungs. These structures will not be congested with frigid, chilled blood.

Leather hunting jackets and aviators coats lined with wool or fur are desirably warm under peculiar conditions of weather severity. When these are worn, however, on average cold days they breed trouble. The skin becomes too sensitive and too full-blooded. Rubber coats and rubber shoes are dangerous for the same reason. It is preferable to harden and inure yourself to severe exposure than to resort to such covering.





NEW MEETING

DECISION TO SEND

W. Brennan, representative of the Cigarmakers' Union, declared that it was an insult to organized labor to be asked to join after the Chamber of Commerce had elected officers, and such ones as A. E. Silverwood and Sir Adam Beck. "Organized labor would be railroaded from the start," he said.

Wanted Delegate.

Frank McKay, representative of the International Typographical Union, thought that it would be worth while having a representative on the Chamber of Commerce, even if he did not carry much weight. Pte. Fred Young also thought a member should be elected, but Charles Thomson objected, declaring that the Chamber of Commerce would get control from the start.

PRUDENT LEADERSHIP NECESSARY TO PILOT THE DOMINION THROUGH THE PERIOD OF RECONSTRUCTION

Other Ontario Editors Voice Views on Canada's Peace Outlook-One Warns Against Danger of Government's Fear of Big Interests.

Further views on the reconstruction period as it will affect Western Canada, have reached The Advertiser from Western Ontario editors. They continue to evidence a feeling of optimism.

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 20.—In our opinion the post-war problems of Western Ontario, so far as this district is concerned, are less complex and serious than they are likely to be in industrial centres. We can find no reasonable ground for a pessimistic view of the outlook, since it is probable that for some considerable time to come the demand for agricultural products of all kinds will be maintained at high prices.

Don't Move Hastily.

Dominion policies must inevitably be conditioned by the policies of the great Allied nations as these will be shaped after the conclusion of peace. It would not, therefore, be prudent to commit Canada to any definite line of action until the elements necessary to a correct judgment are available. More generally Canada should respond to the release of the democratic world spirit by removing whatever tends to separate the community, providing equality of opportunity, educationally and otherwise, and securing that merit and talent shall be recognized. There should be more of real national sentiment and less of racial, religious and partisan prejudice.

To prophesy unbroken

should be ment and less of racial, ment and less of racial, partisan prejudice.

Outlook Favorable.

To prophesy unbroken prosperity cannot be justified, since reactions and recessions must be expected during the period of readjustment. Canada, however, should feel these less severely than countries more advanced in their industrial and commercial development. To our mind the outlook the Dominion never was more EDITOR, TIMES-JOURNAL.

CUT INFLATED VALUES. GODERICH, Nov. 20 .- The role GODERICH, Nov. 20.—The role of prophecy is not lightly to be assumed, but it looks as if Canada were in for a period of sharp readjustment attended with more or less difficulty. Values which have been inflated by the war will have to come into line with natural conditions and this process will mean distress to some classes of people and relief to others.
