HE SHOULD WORRY

30,000 MEN, WOMEN AND CHILDREN MERRY MIX-UP PROTEST AGAINST CONVICTIONS

Demonstration of Labor Is Greatest Manitoba Capital Has Ever Experienced-Similar Gatherings Are Being Held in Other Western Places - Five International Unions Train Schedules in East Are Refuse To Join Processi on.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Winnipeg, May 1.-May Day dawned bright, warm and clear today, with the greatest activity manifested in union labor circles. Winnipeg today won its name as the one-big-union city, for while five international unions refused to participate in the protest parade, there was a lineup in the parade of 25,000 men, which with women and children, brought the total in the parade close to Winnipeg, no doubt, will lead in the dominion-wide labor protest against the conviction of the eight strike leaders. The local demonstration will conclude with a dance in aid of the Workers' Defence Fund. In the evening in nearly all the large western towns similar protest demonstrations have been arranged.

The Winnipeg parade overshadows any other procession ever held in the city, officials of defence committee, which has charge of the arrangements, stated today. The parade started at 10 o'clock this morning.

ONTARIO ON OLD TIME

Toronto, May 1 .- By the, Canadian

Toronto, May 1.—By the, Canadian Press.—Commencing tomorrow morning at 2 a.m., when some cities will adopt daylight saving locally, the average Canadian citizen will be presented with a new exercise for his mental faculties, in trying to figure out where he is at in the general mixup of standard, local and railway schedule time "by the clock."

The cities of Montreal and Quebec—in fact nearly all of Quebec Province—will advance the clock, and thereby conform with the time in the neighboring state of New York. The Maritime Provinces, as a whole, will not adopt daylight saving. Ontario, generally speaking, will also stick to Old Sol's dictum in the matter of time, although the cities of Toronto, Ottawa, Kitchener, Sarnia and Niagara Falls have decided locally to turn forward their clocks. All others will remain on standard time.

The train schedules in Eastern Canada are 2 mass of double clock puzzles, as the resuit of local time clianges. Many changes are being made to meet changed conditions, and officials will do their best to solve the difficulties. The members of the House of Commons and Senate sitting at Ottawa, and the members of the Farmer-Labor Legislature of Ontario at Toronto, while admittedly opposed to daylight saving, find themselves compelled to work by it, on account of local conditions. In Western Canada, except where the "west meets east," in a business and commercial sense, the confusion will not be apparent, as the large part of the western provinces will stay by standard time. Architect For Board of Educa tion Admits Absence of Fire Walls in Building With 15,000 Superficial Square Feet Constitutes "a Serious Menace."

Unqualified description of the Collegiate Institute, having 15,000 superficial square feet of floor space without any dividing firewalls, as a fire-trap by Fire Chief John Aitken, and careful questioning of L. E. Carrothers architect for the board of education, by Provincial Fire Marshal E. P. The investigation was adjourned without fixing any day for its reopening, but it is quite probable that further evidence may yet be taken.

Secretary McElheran of the board of education was the first witness called, but his evidence dealt chiefly with the insurance of the building. J. H. Cameron, science teacher, explained that it was the physics laboratory where the fire appeared to have originated, and stated that no combustible or other chemicals were kept in this laboratory. 





To interest the men of Canada in this congress and to strive to foster brotherlike feeling between England, Canada and the United States, Brig.-Gen. Davey, Commissioner William Ward of the World Brotherhood Federation. Sir Richard Winfrey, M.P.. ex-secretary to the board of agriculture, London, England, and other distinguished brotherhood leaders have arrived from the old country and will speak in various churches throughout the Dominion.

Ine of the most active services rendered by the brotherhood movement is that of providing relief to the warstricken countries of Europe. For some time France and Belgium received the greater part of this help, but for the past two years the war orphans of Serbia have been taken care of. A home in England was founded and a number of children cared for there. Recently it has been decided to institute educational farms in Serbia itself and this great work has already begun.

An extensive program of organization is being conducted in Canada at the present time. The aim is to have a brotherhood in each local church and federate these for wider issues. This movement gives promise of being a great influence in mobilizing the manhood of the nations for promoting the spirit of brotherhood throughout the world.

Another query which Sir George took considerable time to answer came from William Duff. Mr. Duff did not want any reduction in the vote for extending Canada's trade in foreign lands. He any reduction in the vote for extending Canada's trade in foreign lands. He noted that instead of the \$150,000 as voted last year, it had been cut to \$130,000. Sir George agreed that this was indeed the wrong time to be too economical on trade expension and intimated that there was another vote in the estimates which would cover Mr. Duff's point. It was the Government's intention, he intimated, to be fairly generous in the matter, for they realized the importance of getting into new fields and re-establishing Canadian trade in countries from which they had been barred because of the war.

LONDON, April 30.—Agitation by the Khalifa extremists is increasing in violence, says a dispatch to the London Times from Simila, dated last Wednesday. Delhi is the focus of the movement, and during the last few days speeches of marked disloyalty have been delivered there. Some disquieting reports also have been received from the Singh region in the extreme western part of British India. Shaukrat Ali and other leaders are advocating the migration of Indian Moslems to Afghanistan and Asia Minor.
