#### **BIG BREMEN TOWED IN**

Oil Boat Lucingen Rescues the Disabled Liner.

Broke Her Port Shaft Early Friday Morning and Engine Room Staff Worked Like Heroes For 24 Hours But Unsuccessfully, When It Was Decided to Ask For Tow - Took

Hallfax, Sept. 20.—The big North German Lloyd steamer Bremen was owed in yesterday by the oil tank

steamer Lucingen.
The Bremen, which is a steamer of The Bremen, which is a steamer of 12,000 tons, had 300 passengers on board. She has been under tow since Saturday, through the breaking of her port shaft early Friday morning. As soon as the break occurred, the broken section slipped backward, and in some way, at present unknown, fouled the starboard propeller.

For 24 hours the engine room staff worked like heroes but in your If

For 24 hours the engine room staff worked like heroes, but in vain. It was then decided to ask for a tow, and the Lucingen, from Shields to Phindelphia, sighted the disabled greyhound a few hours later and took her in tow.

It took five hours to get a hawser ready, and four hours to ship it. Then, to make matters worse, one section of a 12-inch manila rope parted when the strain was put on, and the work had to be done over.

At 5 o'clock the tow started, but the Lucingen, which is but a third of the size of the Bremen, could not do bet-ter than four knots, and they did not

ter than four knots, and they did not get in until yesterday afternoon. The distance the tow came was 250 miles. A steamer of the same line will be ordered from Baltimore to take the passengers, but it has not yet been decided whether the vessel will repair here or in New York.

The question of salvage will be settled in England.

Nelson, B. C., Sept. 20.—The Tariff Commissioners visited the Trail Smelter and Rossland mines yesterday afternoon and evening. In the morning petitions were heard from A. C. Galt, lawyer for the Gooderham mines; Smith and Curtis, mine owners; James Cronin, manager of Centre Star and War Eagle; R. W. Grigor, and J. S. Deschamps, lumberman. These asked for a duty on lead and lead products, also on rough lumber, endorsing the petition of Nelson; the removal of duty on flourspar; the removal of the duty on steel rails, when used for mining purposes; the removal of the duty on raw materials from which explosives are made; the reduction of duty by 50 per cent. on explosives and candles, and the alteration of the tariff schedule on mining machinery to protect mine owners from poorly made Canadian machinery.

The mine owners complained that 3 cents duty on dynamite caused each ton of ore extracted to cost 64 cents for dynamite alone, More than 75 per cent. of candles used in British Columbia are imported on 15 per cent. advalorem duty.

The reports say that revolutions have been started in Antioquia and Santander.

### TELEPHONE TALKS.

#### TO TELEPHONE USERS AND THE GENERAL PUBLIC,-

Before we close our review of Telephone conditions in Europe we wish to add a few general statements which will tend to a fuller comprehension of the situation.

In England owing to the number of long distance lines, no one is allowed to hold a conversation of more than six minutes duration. This is a harrassing condition which would rob the long distance telephone of a great deal of its usefulness and would not be submitted to by the business men of this country.

In Great Britain telephone subscribers are required to make a deposit in advance to guarantee payment of long distance tolls. When the deposit is exhausted it must be renewed before further service will be given.

Calling for long distance connections is entirely by number and the full charge is exacted whether the party wanted is obtained or not. If the number asked for is in use locally at the moment, an enquiry charged is enforced.

In Canada, a particular individual can be asked for and if the party is not obtained there is no charge.

The conclusion of the expert testimony before the Special Committee was that Government operation of the telephone in European countries has been a blight on development, has maintained rates higher by far than the rates charged in Canada; and generally resulted in poor service. The limited license system adopetd in Great Britain has restricted growth, for the reason that capitalists would not invest in a Company whose right to do business expires within a few years. It was stated in evidence that \$15,000,000 to \$20, 000,000 additional capital per annum might have been employed profitably in the extension of the telephone business in Great Britain for years past, but capital could not be obtained in view of the expiring Government license.

The Government itself, apparently will not provide the capital to increase long distance facilities, although there is, admittedly, a great deficiency of lines to meet the demands of the public. There can be only one of three conclusionseither the Government is purposely driving the business to the telegraph service, or it will not invest more capital in an unprofitable business, or it is indifferent to the requirements of the public.

Judging by the results of the Government operation in France and elsewhere, matters in Great Britain will be worse instead of better when the whole telephone service of the country is taken over by the Post Office Department. This seems to be the view of the Chairman of Edinburgh Municipal Telephone Committee, who in his evidence before the Special Committee expressed his concern at the prospect of the Government taking over the telephone exchange service throughout the country, as it meant increase of rates He might have added, prospective inefficiency.

St. Augusting is the oldest town in the United States, but the oldest hotel in the country, contrary to what one would expect, is not in the east at all, but as far west as Arizona, being situated in Phenix of that state.

#### TREASURE IN **OUR RIVER?**

#### Correspondence of Capt Baker Shows Presence of More Gunboats in River

Tradition Hath it One of These Con tains Treasure-Interesting Documents Reveal Life of the Pioneer Days

Interest in the historic period of Western Ontario was revived a short time ago by the report that an American by the name of Eurton was making an attempt to deport a gunboat at present lying on the Arnold farm up the river.

Patriotism demanded that his at tempt to obtain this relic of bygone days, for exhibition on the other side of the border, be frustrated.

The incident called forth many reminiscences of the pioneer, historymaking days of this section - when the first settlers followed the Indian trails into this part of the country and, blazing a clearing, erected their log cabins.

Capt. Baker, great grandfather of J. W. and R. O. Knight, was a resident of this section of the country in those strenuous days. Baker was a master shipbuilder and from 1789 to 1812 he had his neadquarters at Detroit, then a British naval and military post. His duties consisted of military post. His duties consisted of overseeing the construction of boats and the erection of boats and the erection of other military structures, such as forts and stockades. His papers, mow in the possession of the gentlemen mentioned, form very interesting reading and cast interesting side-lights on the history of those brave days.

teresting reading and east interesting side-lights on the history of those brave days.

Among them is a letter ordering him to construct six gunboats. As the subsequent correspondence shows, he did this, and, doubtless, the gunboat raised a short time ago by the Chatham Historical Society, and on exhibition on the-perk for some time, was one of these, as well as the one around which the present conflict is raging. It would also tend to show that there are others in the river, yet to be discovered.

In fact, those living near the river in the vicinity of Kent Eridge emphatically assert that the rior bars told them tales of the ratical of the Eritish up the Thames during the war of 1812, in which mention was made of the sinking of nearly the whole Eritish flotilla in the river. They were sunken at intervals during the ratreat whenever the pursuit of the Kentucky riflemen became too hot. There is a persistent legend to the effect that a large amount of money, the pay for the troops, was coone of these crafts and went to the bottom with it when sanken near Kent Bridge. As far as can be learnone of these crafts and went to the bottom with it when sunken near Kent Bridge. As far as can be learned, no attempt was ever made to recover the treasure, and it may still be reposing on the river bottom covered with coze and slime, ready for the first one adventurous enough to seek it. This much is certain—that there are several other gunboats in the river which if raised, would there are several other gunboats in the river which, if raised, would prove rich in historic interest and might also prove valuable finds. Capt, Baker's correspondence is all Capt. Baker's correspondence is all in the highly formal and settled style in vogue in those days. His reply to the command to build the gunboats

is in the following terms :-Detroit, Oct. 9th, 1771. "This day His Excellency presented to me a letter commanding me to build six gunboats on the River Thames. Your Honor will be so good as to let me know how I shall proceed in this difficulty I think must

"1st. If there is two parties, "ist. If there is two parties, one cutting timber in the woods and the other to work on the boats, I should not be able to attend to advantage in carrying put the work. If Your Excellency will be so good as to let me have the carpenter out of the ship-yards I shall be able to carry on the work with zeal. ork with zeal.



Interesting 'side-lights indeed are these concerning the early days of this district. (The settlers lived in an atmosphere of romance and danger, sturdily flaying the stepping stones to the splendid present—a heritage now by blood.

Capt. Baker, who played such a prominent part in this early history, afterwards took up his residence here and died in New York, where he is buried in Trinity Church. Other correspondence of his pertaining to Chatham will be published at an early date.



### DISCUSSION OF PEACE

Czar is to Call Second Conference At the Hague.

President Roosevelt Thinks Summon For the Second Time Should Come From St. Petersburg-The Project For the Fermation of a Russian Cabinet to Be Examined by Solsky

St. Petersburg, Sept. 19.—Emperor Nicholas yesterday again appeared before the world as a promoter of universal peace. No sooner is the Russo-Japanese war over and even before the peace treaty has been ratified, than His Majesty issues invitations to a

second peace conference at The Hague.
That the Emperor has done so was learned yesterday from a source which leaves no shadow of doubt as to its

authenticity.

It is officially announced that "the Russian Government proposes to address the foreign powers with a view to the holding of a second peace conference at The Hague," but it is known that negotiations preceding this announcement that the Government proposed to address the powers were controlled into expecially with the Unit. entered into especially with the Unit-ed States, and were conducted with the greatest secrecy, there being not the slightest inkling that Russia con-

templated anything of the kind. The announcement created the greatest surprise here, and that Russia should plan a second conference despite the sieps already taken by Prespective New Alex Description spite the sieps already taken by President Roosevelt, was also heard with amazement, although it is said here that President Roosevelt is of the option that the first step in this direction should be taken by the Emperor of Russia, on whose initiative the first conference was held. conference was held.

The Cabinet Project.

The project for the formation of a Cabinet which Emperor Nicholas has ordered the Solsky commission to exmine contemplates the formation of a amine, contempates the formation of a body to be called the Council of Min-isters, which would be under the presi-dency of a premier. The latter, with the Minis ers of War, Marine, and Foreign Affairs, and the court officials, would have the sole right of reporting to the Emperor. The Ministers would be appointed on the nomination of the Premier, and no administrative meas-

isters, sanctioned by the Emperor. Poland's Representation. The Solsky commission has elaborated the conditions governing the re resentation of the people of Poland in presentation of the people of rollind in the Na.ional Assembly. The voters will be divided into three classes, the first to be composed of landed proper-ty proprietors, the second of members of Cantons owning from three to twen-

#### ANOTHER CRISIS.

France and Germany Are Not Yet Broken Off-Both Sides Anxious.

Paris, Sept. 20.-Another crisis has arisen in the negotiations between France and Germany relative to the Moroccan conference. This has result-Moroccan conference. This has resulted in a suspension of the meetings between Dr. Rosen, the new German Minister to Morocco, and M. Revoil, former Governor of Algiers, the special plenipotentiaries of Germany and France. Their last meeting occurred three days ago, and there is no present sign of the resumption of their conferences. Dr. Rosen in the meantime is seeking instructions from Berlin, but the extended delay begins to excite apprehension in official quarexcite apprehension in official quar-ters that Germany will not yield upon points which France considers to be essential.

Both sides show anxiety, and the strain promises to affect the bourse seriously. However, the Foreign Office continues to view the situation as susceptible of adjustment, and specifical

ceptible of adjustment, and specifically denies the alarmist report in a French newspaper that the German demands include the port of Mogador, upon the Atlantic coast of Morocco. The following official statement was made yesterday on the subject:

"The question of the cession of the port of Mogador does not enter into the negotiations in any form, for the obvious reason that Germany and France in their exchange of notes have specifically agreed to maintain the integrity of Moroccan territory. Therefore, it is impossible to nego-Therefore, it is impossible to neg tiate upon the cession of Mogador or any other part of Moroccan territory."


