PRIEST IS NOT DYING OF LEPROSY

FATHER CONRADY OF CANTON, CHINA, IS ONLY SUFFERING FROM NERVOUS EXHAUSTION—RECENT REPORTS ABOUT HIM UNTRUE

The following appeared in the press dispatches last week and we are happy to be able to state that it is not true:

"The Rev. Lambert Louis Conrady is dying of leprosy among the lepers of Canton, China. Even the friends of the priest hardly will appreciate the pathos of this simple announcement, which reached Chicago yesterday."

"I received a letter from Father L. Conrady, the leper missionary, who was reported as infected with leprosy at his leper colony in Canton, China. He just laughs at those who are frightened and recoil from the danger of contracting this disease. He has not the dreaded disease, and he always predicted that he would not die of leprosy. He is simply sick of exhaustion taking care of his leathome patients. Everyone who sought him had been inoculated by curing the wounds of the people, for he is a doctor as well as a priest. The bishop himself predicted his death and thought that he could not live. He enjoys it and feels happy that they are false prophets. He claims that leprosy is not contagious and proves it by his example.—New World.

It is an opinion unfortunately too widespread, that frequent Communion is a practice essentially feminine, and quite unsuited to men. Women with their dainty, sentimental natures, tender hearts, and yearning for the supernatural, find in this sacramental union with their God a consolation and a stay of which it would be cruel and impious to deprive them. In other words, devotion to the Eucharist is a spiritual luxury that should be granted to them but which is not in keeping with their duties of religion. 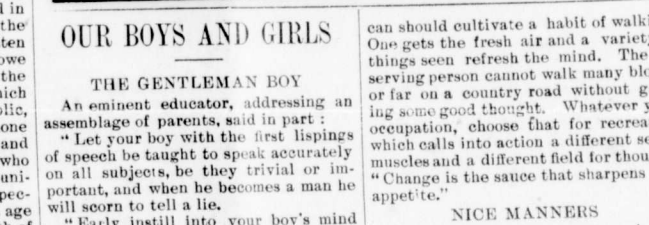

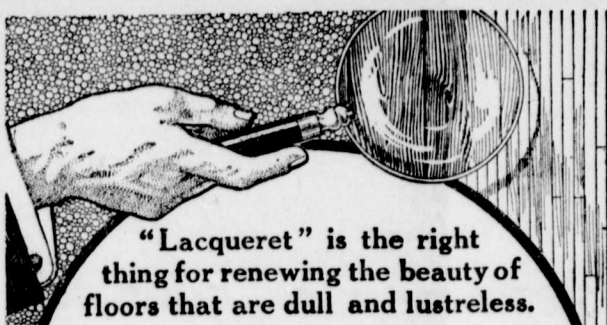
