The recent returns showing the growth of the French population in the Maritime province for the past ten years gives as the increase 33,364. In Kings it has increased from 10 to 272. In regard to this the Truro News says:—

"There is not a man in Nova Scotia who reads these figures will believe them.

Look at our own county of Colchester, for instance. Who believes that our French population has increased from 43 in 1891 to 532 in 1901? No one; and if the rest of the census, bearing upon French fellow-subjects growth, is as more reliable than what we have here before us, then the record is valueless.

To show the absurdity of the census taking, look at the county of Lunenburg: one solitary priest, male or female we know not, yet the breed is so prolific that in ten years one man or woman, by some way different from the "good old way" has grown to 2,065 persons? A gain of 2,065 per cent. to every decade staggers even the most credulous.

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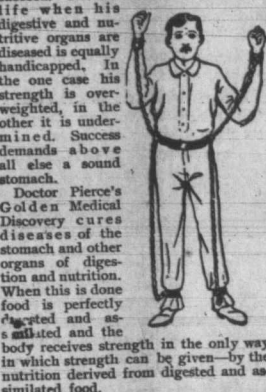

The epidemic of small pox has now been entirely stamped out of the town and authorities who have a knowledge of the disease in other towns and cities, compliment this town very highly over the effectual preventive measures taken.

A great many who are making frequent visits to town state how pleased they were in again being able to trade in town and they never knew how much the privilege meant to them until they were cut off from the town for fear of small-pox, and were obliged to go elsewhere.

KING'S CO. ARMY WORMS

It seems really too bad, that our distinguished delegation of army contractors, inspectors and testers of supplies and medical comforts, who left town bright and early on Monday last for Halifax, to look after the interests of the 3rd Canadian Contingent for South Africa and see that all the supplies purchased—from their friends—were carefully checked, and thoughtfully put on board the transports, should be referred to by the Halifax Herald as the "Kings County Army worms."

SOUTH AFRICA

The blockhouse scheme of Lord Kitchener seems to be bringing good results. With the blockhouses constructed between Greylingstad, on the Natal and Johannesburg Railway and Bruggruit, on the Delagoa Bay line, he has both a force enclosed in an area of 10,000 square miles, with, roughly speaking, a hundred miles of protected railways forming the northside, a hundred miles of blockhouses the west side, a hundred miles of railway the south side, and the Lwazi land border the east side.

Over this restricted country British columns are now moving and on the 12th Lord Kitchener was enabled to report the capture of practically the whole Bethel commando by Gen. Bruce Hamilton. Seven Boers were killed and 131 taken prisoners. As in the case of the capture of the laager at Oshoek, Hamilton surprised the commando after a night march.

A despatch from Lord Kitchener dated from Belfast, about half way between Pretoria and the frontier of Portuguese East Africa, received here today, announces that Commandant Kritzingler has been captured, badly wounded, by Gen. French. Kritzingler was trying to break the blockhouse cordon at Hanover Road.

THE BORDEN MONUMENT

A fac simile of the monument erected in South Africa over the grave of Major Harold Borden by his fellow-men, has just been completed by Sanford and Sons monument builders. This will be erected in the family plot at Canning in the near future. It is highly polished on two sides, while the remainder is in the rough. It consists of three sections, the base, pedestal and a cross. The face and back of the mound are polished and on the front is the following inscription:

Harold Lotthrop Borden,
Born May 23, 1876 at Canning
Died July 16, 1900, in South Africa.
He gave his life for his country.

The inscription on the opposite side is as follows:

In memory of
Major Harold Lotthrop Borden,
1st Battalion Canadian M. R.
Only son of Hon. F. W. Borden,
Minister of Militia, Canada,

Aged 24
Killed in action at Riet Vlei, 16th July, 1900, having been mentioned well in despatches

On the base is inscribed the following: This stone is a fac simile of the one at the grave at Riet Vlei, near Pretoria, South Africa, upon which appears the above inscription.

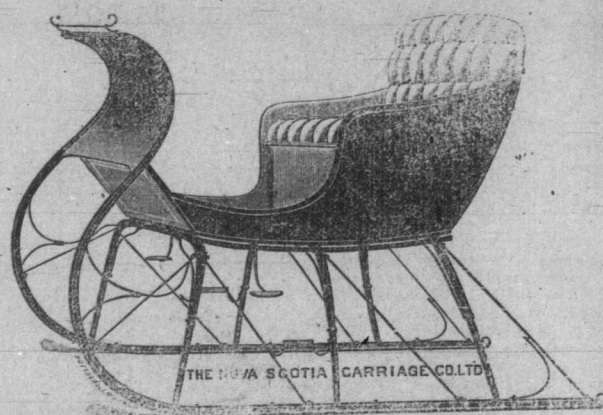
