Importance of Securing Vigorous Potato Seed Stock.

Experiment conducted at the Dom inion Experimental Station, Kent ville, N. S., with eight lots of Gerne Chili potatoes secured from different growers in 1915 show a variation in vield from 36 bushels to 240 bushels per acre, or a difference of 2 4 bushels per acre in yield when grown under uniform conditions. Sed from these eight lots planted in 1916 yielded from 68 bushels to 212 bushels per acre a difference of 144 bushels per acre a difference of 144 bushels per acre. The respective positions of the different lots were changed very little in the second year, but the lowest yielding ones increased somewhat and the highest yield was not so great.
