

Well may the peaceful cultivator of the soil exclaim to each other of the belligerents, "Nec sine te nec cum te possum vivere." 'They are lucky who are eaten last, and the very smallest misfortune is to be plundered and to pay double revenues as long as the contest lasts. This has been their fate from time immemorial.
