Sixth Annual Report of the Miramichi Hospital.

Chairman's Report -

In submitting their report for the year ending April 30th, 1922, the Trustee Board have much pleasure in stating that Miramichi Hospital has completed another very successful year.

A review of the activities of the Hospital during the past twelve months reveals steady and consistent progress in all departments. The number of Patients treated, as stated in the Superintendent's report, is 500, showing an increase of 62 over the preceding year and an increase of 321 over the number recorded in 1917, the first year of the Hospital's existence.

The Treasurer has submitted a statement which shows the Hospital to be in a splendid financial position. Notwithstanding the fact that the number of patients shows an increase over the preceding year, the receipts from patients show a decrease of \$1469.67. Th has been offset to some extent by decreased expenditure, but the Hospital has been enriched during the year by a magnificent endow ment which has been left to us as one more gift from the late honore Founder, Mr. Ernest Hutchison, the interest on which is to be applie towards the cost of maintenance of the institution. We have all received notification of a very generous Bequest to the Hospital b the late Mrs. E.B. Eddy, the interests on which, she has directed, also to be used towards maintenance expenses. It is with a ver deep sense of gratitude that the Board in this manner acknowledge these gifts, which shall remain as a memorial through the years

It was the expressed aim and wish of the late Mr. Hutchiso that the doors of the Hospital should be open to all persons desiring treatment regardless of their ability to meet the cost, and while th Board have always endeavored to carry out the Meas of the Founder these generous endowments will make it possible to maintain the policy to a greater extent than ever.

We desire once more to voice our appreciation of the work which has been accomplished by the Hospital Aid and the wonderful a sistance which they have rendered in the maintenance of the Hos pital. Some idea of what they have done will be realized when w state that the Newcastle Aid have spent \$1580.43, and the Auxiliarie \$733.26 in Hospital equipment and supplies during their past fisca year. They have also donated a prize of \$50.00 to be given to the Nurse graduating from Miramichi Hospital who takes the Provincia Examinations, or in the event of more than one Nurse competing the prize is to be divided: \$30.00 to the Nurse making the highes mark, and \$20.00 to the next highest. For this splendid co-operation and assistance we tender our very hearty appreciation.

Acting in conjunction with the Hospital Aid, who have made goodly contribution towards its cost, the Board have had placed up on the side wall of the vestibule of the Hospital a bronze tablet memory of the late Mr. Hutchison. The Tablet bears the following

The Superintendent's report will show that the training school has been actively carried on during the year and that three Nurses have graduated: Miss Groat, Miss Cliff, and Miss Rogers. Arrangements are now pending whereby it is hoped to afford greater facilities to the Student Nurses and improve the school. To all those who have assisted in the past by giving instruction or otherwise we ex-

We regret that financial and industrial conditions in the County have prevented us from making any substantial progress with the Nurses' Home project. The need for such a building is generally admitted and grows more urgent every day. The Poard consulted an Architect who has submitted tentative plans but we have hesitated about committing ourselves to any definite action until there is some prospect of the necessary funds. We have on hand, as stated in the Treasurer's Report, \$4087.27, and we are hoping during the summer to begin a County-wide drive should conditions justify it. In the successful furtherance of this project, we earnestly ask the sympathetic support and co-operation of all.

The Board desires to express its appreciation to all who have contributed to the good results attained during the year's work. To Miss Keyes, to whose unsparing efforts much of the success is due, we take this opportunity of recording our appreciation. To the Nursing Staff for loyal service rendered during the year, and to the Medical Staff for their co-operation, the Board expresses thanks.





JUST HOW LONG IS A DAY? Every One Knows What It is Scientifically, but Really It Depends on Circumstances.

Scientifically, of course, a day is 24 hours long, but it is the popular cus-tom to separate this period into the two parts of "day" and "night," and when one says "all day," only the daylight hours are meant, and this mean ing may be further qualified and limited to a specific number of hours; if a person is hired to work "a day" he exlegal number of hours, a very necessary arrangement in order that endless con-tentions and misunderstandings be avoided, since the length of a daylight day varies widely. Actually, modern understanding is that one shall work so many hours, not so many days.

At London, England, the longest day-

light day has 16½ hours, while at Stockholm, Sweden, it is 18½ hours in length. At Petrograd, Russia, the longest day is 19 hours, and the shortest five, while at Wardbury, Norway, the longest day lasts from May 21 to Spitzbergen the longest day is 31/4 onths

In the United States the duration of the longest day depends upon the locality, but that of Kansas City, a little less than 15 hours, 4s about an average longest day for the whole

Legally "a day" may be 24 hours or almost any shorter period, depending upon specific statutes, custom and common understanding. If one engages a hotel room for "a day" he is entitled to its use, unless there is a specific understanding to the contrary, for 24 hours continuously, but a horse hired for "a day" could not be retained for more than 12 hours and, unless otherwise agreed, that 12 hours would run between sunrise and sunset, and it would be necessary to surrender the animal at sunset, no matter when it was taken out.

For general purposes, the law divides the 24-hour period into equal parts as "day" and "night," and assumes that Grade IV.—Theresa Sherrard, it during the daylight hours and at some reasonable and convenient time "once each day" in order to make re pairs, for instance, it could do so a any hour of the 24.

It is thus clear that it is no more possible to answer specifically the question, How long is a day? than the classical query, How large is a piece of chalk?—Kansas City Star.

Considerable speculation has arisn over the authorship of he book 'Pomp and Power' just published, the writer dealing with matters of igh policy and persons having the andling of them in a style showing is intimate acquaintance with both The author of the book is a warn friend of France, and whlie unhesitatingly criticizing Premier Lloyd George, fully recognizes his achievements and abilities.

Revelations in the book concerning the fall of the Asquith ministry are particularly interesting. The writer says: "It was difficult to see how except by Lloyd George himself tak ing a personal risk which he was always disposed to do. He wanted rebellion from within which would oust H. T. Asquith and carry him to Downing St. In many respects the them to a conclusion was Lord Beav erbrook (then Max Aitxen) but it is doubtful whether he conceived the original idea. The probability seems to be that it originated with others and it was while casting around for some one to influence Bonar Law that they disclosed the project to Aitken."
