III. ACROSS THE PRAIRIES.

Brandon, on the Assiniboine, is a city of about five thousand five hundred population, and is rapidly growing. It has an altitude of 1,150 feet, and is beautifully situated on an activity rising from the Assiniboine. It is lighted by electricity, and has waterworks and sewerage in course of construction.

About four miles from the city is the celebrated Sanderson farm. This farm is owned and cultivated by Mr. J. W. Sanderson, and contains about 1,500 acres.

At the train rolls westward the cypress hills rise up on the left, like some sand-dunes against the horizon. Farther west the hills assume a different appearance. They are now thrown up by some violent process. Then again they assume the form of some many forts built by human hands.

Mr. Daly, M. P., the clever representative of the Selkirk division of Manitoba, in the House of Commons, resides at Brandon. He is a lawyer with a good practice here, and was also M. P. for York-Elton in Ontario.

The train advances the mountains seem quite near and appear to plan, their heads right across the way and under impossible. The railway crosses the river, and the train enters the "gap" between two walls of high earth.

At Brandon the Rocky Mountain Park and the celebrated Hot Springs. This park is a beautiful reservation, twenty-six miles long and five miles wide.

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LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

A fire alarm was sent in shortly after eleven o'clock, Thursday forenoon.

The bridge in connection with the bridge tunnel have been discontinued for the season, owing to the unfavorable weather.

At Montreal last Wednesday, Thursday, April 27, fell off the roof of his building which was a distance of 25 feet, and was killed.

Charles Murray, has been sent up to the Supreme Court for trial, on the charge of consulting a birth of a child and secretly disposing of the dead body.

The body of John Dunlop, who was drowned off Boston some weeks ago, was recovered Sunday, having been washed ashore by the waves.

The subject of the Commercial Post Office is being rebuilt. Mr. J. C. Utter, stone mason and marble worker of that town, is the contractor.

Over night last week, while Thomas Whitman was making repairs on the line of the Western Union Telegraph Co., about six miles from Canoe, he fell from the pole and was instantly killed. He belonged to Bayfield, Guysborough county, was 25 years old, and was the only son of a widowed mother.
