COLOR BLINDNESS.

Capadian Navigator, after a Test Chicago is Convinced.

People have been slow in coming to believe that celer blindness is common. but that such is the case is being proved every now and then in the examinations of pilots in Chicago. A singular fact, too, is that some afflicted in that way haven't the remotest suspicion themselves of their short-comings. A case in point came up yesterday before Dr. Miller, surgeon of the United States marine hospital at this port. The examinations were held at the office of the marine hospital in the custom house building J. Blossitor a navigator of nineteen years' service, had applied to the Local Government Inspector for license as a pilot, citing his experience and proving his competency. When it came to the color blind question, however, the Inspector turned the applicant over to Dr. Miller for examination. The latter was held yesterday afternoon at three o'clock. 

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


