OTTAWA, May 14. - Sir John Macdonald leoked out upon the Senate from be-hind the Speaker's acreen when it met today. A rare sight was seen of an audience in the Senate Chamber. A couple of scores of members of the Commons were present, some elergymen of Ottawa and a sprinkling of general citizens. Ex-tra seats were brought in on the floor of

Mr. O'Donohue spoke for about an hour, commencing by moving the follow-

ing resolution:
"That an address be presented to the Governor-General praying that his Excellency will cause to be laid before this House the patent of appointment er a copy thereof of John O'Donehue to the Privy Council; a copy of the letters of the Right Hon. Sir John Macdonald to their lordships, certain bishops of the Province of Ontario, and all other letters and papers, and a copy of all orders in Council in reference to said appointment or the cancellation thereof.'

His subject was the treatment of Irish Catholics in Ontario by the two political parties and the treatment of himself by Sir John Macdonald in 1882. In 1878 the Irish Catholics voted against Mr. Mackenzie for revenge and partly because of the National Policy. He himself supported the Conservatives up to the time when the general elections of June 20 were coming on. He then proceeded to reveal the proceedings of the Chestnut Park compact, by which the Irish Catho-lic vote of Ontario was sold to Sir John Macdonald. He was offered a seat in the Cabinet and accepted. This was in May, 1882. Shortly after Sir John wrote him a letter offering him a seat in the Senate. He did not understand this change in the Premier's intention. Then fellowed considerable correspondence be-tween him and Sir John. On the 23rd of May in reply to his letter, Sir John

wired him:
"I will write on the 25th of May." Mr. O'Donchue wrote to Sir John: "Your letter received. Does change mean that no one from Ontario shall re-present the Irish Catholics in the Cab-

net? If so, their protest will be

Then Sir John came to Toronto, invited him, Smith, Boyle and Shields to meet then signified his full adherence to the then agained his full adherence to the arrangement he had made with O'Donohue, and actually presented the patents of appointments signed and executed by the Marquis of Lorne. Everything was done and perfected. In return these Irish Catholics undertook to do their utmost to return Sir John to power. They desired to communi ate with their bishops, and Sir John wrote the following tter to the bishops of the Roman Cath lie Church :

TORONTO, June 5. - My Dear Lord, -Mr. O'Donohue will tell you of the tempest that has been raised here in Toronto, will do so so in the Senate. Mr. Smith is to make way for Mr. O'Donohue when the time is opportune. Those two gen-tlemen are acting in perfect accord, and it is desirable I should explain this to your lordships. It must, however, be kept a profound secret for the present. "John A. Macdonald."

That arrangement had been broken by Sir John Macdonald by reason of the pressure of the Orangemen against O'Donohue, and Smith, having been appointed to the Cabinet by favor of the Orangemen, he represented them and not the Irish Catholics. The Orangemen had said to Sir John, "We will take Smith but we won't accept O'Donohue-he's too Irish." 

Their Threats all Bunkum-Landlords Ad vised to Stay in the Country and, Like Other People, Make the Best of It.

A London cablegram says: During the debate in the House of Commons, on Thursday night a lively speech was unade by Mr. Jordan, the Nationalist member for West Clare, Mr. Jordan, who is a prominent member of the Methodists church, lives at Euniskillen, in the Town Hall of which hang the banners taken at the battle of the Boyne, and where, nearly two hundred years ago, occurred the famous battle. The members would not be elected on any question as to separation, but Irish issues, and the provisions as to the two orders would afford ample security. It was said," the speaker continued, "that the Protestant people would have to leave Ireland, but they might go further and fare werse. Why should the landlords leave the country if their incomes were diminished by half? They would not find any country so cheap as Ireland te live in—(laughter)—and they would atill have their demesnes, but all the talk about leaving Ireland was nonsense. If even an outrageous Orangeman was asked whether he was getting ready to go he answered with a twinkle in his eye 'Not yet.'" (Laughter.) The people had no notion of going, and the more they assured those Orangemen in the North of Ireland of their safety the greater noise they kicked up. He did not believe that they had any fear for their lives, their liberties or their property. As to their raligion, property was a very large part of it. They prayed

their lives, their liberties or their property. As to their religion, property was a very large part of it. They prayed alternately to Providence and to the noble Lord Randolph Churchill, the member for Paddington. (Laughter.) Ome could not tell whether they put their trust in God, or in the great Tory party, or in powder and ball, because they used the phrases indiscriminately. (Laughter.) Protestant ladies and the farmers' wives said they had no fear, and why should the stalwart majors and military men pretend to be more apprehensive?

ANGER, NOT FEAR.

The truth was that it was passion and not fear which actuated them. Those people had been pampered all their liver. They had enjoyed ascendency and monopolized place and power, and they did not wish now to be put on an equality with the other people. The loyal minority, as they were called, were enraged becaused they would have to go into competitive examination with their competitive examination with their Roman Cathelic countrymen and get only their fair share of anything that was going. (A laugh.) If, however, the Bill became a law he was satisfied that they would be quite prepared, from the greatest to the least among them, to make the best of it.






