



**Household Notes.**

Ammonia and water will remove red ink stains.

One cake of compressed yeast is equal to a cupful of liquid yeast.

Borax wet with peroxide of hydrogen will often remove black ink stains.

Nickel may be kept bright by being rubbed with wool saturated in ammonia.

Sweet pickles chopped and spread between sliced bread make appetizing sandwiches.

All lard to fry fritters and doughnuts must be sizzling hot before putting in the batter.

A few shreds of candied orange peel will give a delicious flavor to a bread pudding.

A few drops of lemon juice added to eggs when they are being scrambled improves the dish.

Black lead mixed with vinegar will be found to give a specially good polish to the kitchen stove.

Alcohol and whiting make a good silver polish, excellent also for polishing plate glass mirrors.

A large round bottle will serve very well as a rolling pin and is more hygienic than the wooden pin.

A clean flour sack spread on the table of camphor will remove stains from mirrors or window glasses.

There is nothing better to use under carpets than old newspapers, as moths do not like printer's ink.

A weak solution of turpentine poured down the water-pipes once a week will drive the water bugs away.

A good vegetable greaser can be made from a tin nail cover by drilling many holes through it with a nail.

Blood stains can generally be removed by soaking in cold water and salt. Follow with soap and water.

If cornmeal mush does not brown nicely when it is fried try brushing over each slice with white of an egg.

To remove a fresh milkweed stain wet in strong soap, cover with a paste of salt and soap, and put in the rain.

It is wiser both for economy and comfort to wear alternately two pairs of shoes, instead of one pair every day.

Raw eggs rubbed into the hair and scalp before washing are excellent, and tend to prevent the hair from turning gray.

Rub over new tinware with lard and thoroughly heat it in the oven before using, and thus protect it from rusting.

Dipping the tips of the fingers in warm olive oil every night is the best method for keeping the nails in good condition.

**5674—LADIES' DRESSING SACQUE WITH BODY AND SLEEVE IN ONE.**



The sleeves and body portions are cut in one and the neck edge may be finished high with a small shaped collar, provided in the pattern, or cut out in square Dutch neck as illustrated. Dimity, lawn, batiste, silk or Winsco with finish of lace, edging or braid as may suit the material. The sleeve may be finished with a cuff in bishop style or with ruffle. ## Insuring the Coronation

### Lloyds are Betting Five to One That the Coronation Will Not Be Put Off.

A postponement of the Coronation would mean a heavy loss to many manufacturers and shopkeepers. Already innumerable warehouses, particularly City warehouses, are filling up with goods a great part of which would become practically valueless if the Coronation did not take place on the appointed date. But it is possible to insure against such calamities, and this peculiar sort of insurance is, underwriters say, being taken advantage of this year more than ever.

They are asking a twenty per cent. premium, so that for every twenty pounds handed over now to the underwriters at Lloyd's a hundred will be recovered if the Coronation is put off.

Most people know that King Edward was heavily insured by tradespeople and commercial men. Even before the public learned how grave his last illness was the insurance premium had jumped to thirty per cent. When he died, over a third of a million changed hands. Not only Lloyd's, but some fifty insurance companies were interested, though there are a few firms which refuse this sort of business.

But the insurance people were not so heavily hit as one might suppose, for most of the policies on King Edward's life had been taken out when he was very young, as was the Duke of Cornwall—largely by tenants of the Duchy with copyhold leases, or leases that expire when the person named in them dies. So that the insurance firms had already received more in premiums than they had to pay out.

It is for a similar reason that the young Prince of Wales, being Duke of Cornwall, is already heavily insured in the districts forming the Duchy.

But neither King Edward nor King George, nor the young Prince of Wales has ever had so much money hanging on his life as had Queen Victoria. This sort of insurance was unheard of till her accession, but she looked so delicate that it soon became popular. The insurance companies demanded—as they have always done since in the case of Royalties—a premium about half as large again as an ordinary case, owing to the fact that they could not, of course, have

## About Bomb Carts.

The news that the municipality of Berlin has ordered three new bomb carts to be built serves as a reminder how rapid has been the spread of anarchism of late.

Those carts are used by the police to convey stray bombs from the streets to places of safety, and the first one was constructed in Paris no longer than 1892, when during a regular epidemic of bomb-throwing no fewer than six policemen were blown to pieces by an infernal machine which they were carrying.

Now every capital in Europe possesses at least one, that belonging to London being kept at the Magazine in Hyde Park. It is a small hand-cart, painted red, and is drawn by two men. The last time it was used was in connection with the Sydney Street affair, when it was brought out in order to take away certain metal cylinders found in the ruins of the house occupied by the anarchists, and which were at first supposed to be bombs.

Bomb carts are somewhat expensive things to build. They are constructed of specially tempered steel, and the springs are of the best and very finely balanced. The bomb is not carried inside the cart itself, but underneath, in a sort of swinging box-like receptacle, with very strong sides and top, but a light bottom. This is so that the force of the explosion may be directed downwards into the ground should one occur prematurely.

## THE COST OF SPORT.

### "The People" on the Cold Storage Agreement.

In the February issue of The People, which we have just received, there is an interesting article on the Cold Storage Agreement. It is an able and dispassionate examination of the matter and we subjoin the major portion of it:—

"The concessions are large: let us look at the contemplated advantages. First, the export of so much fresh and manufactured cod fish to the United States that the quantity available for our foreign markets would be so lessened that supply to them would barely meet the demand, the result being that prices would be maintained. Second, the supply of cold storage fish to our fishermen enabling them to catch more fish. Thirdly, the exploiting of fish and fish products not now turned to any economic value. Now if we were sure or had even a reasonable expectation that these results would follow, without any contrary influence or bad effect in other directions, we think it might be granted that the agreement was a good one and should go through; but then we do not think such results can follow, and we further believe that even if they did the disadvantages to the fish business of the country would be greater than the advantages. For first consider the difficulties in the way of getting large quantities of perfectly fresh codfish into the cold storage plant. It would have to be taken from the boats practically as it came out of the water. How is that to be managed over large stretches of coast? But assuming that this difficulty is surmounted, is there any assurance of a market being found for it? We understand that the Eastern markets are now well supplied with fresh

cod; will there be room there for chilled cod, or will the Middle States, now supplied with fine fresh water fish from the great lakes and somewhat with salt water fish from the Pacific open their mouths for cold storage cod. We think not. We believe that it is futile to expect any large quantity of chilled cod to find market in the United States notwithstanding the fact there are over ninety millions of people there. The quantity taken by them will not affect the marketable supply of salt cod. Indeed we will go further and say that the company owning the plants will not try to ship fresh fish chilled to any extent but will use what they take or obtain almost exclusively for boneless fish, shredded fish and fish meal. In his case they will relieve our markets somewhat but it will be by giving foreigners a preference of government guarantee and free facilities not allowed our own people, and further with the competition of Canada we question whether an great quantity of our fish can be marketed in the States chilled or salted. In a word we think the conditions forbid any hope that the bulk of salt cod available for our foreign markets will be materially lessened by this agreement.

Second, as to bait supply. We do not think that practical fishermen believe that five depots of bait on 3,000 miles of coast can be of any service worth while. Fresh bait is generally available where the fishermen are fishing and as everyone knows fresh bait is much preferred to frozen bait; besides fishermen will not pay for bait if they can catch it and when it is plenty they see no occasion for paying to put it in a bait house. There is lots of experience to prove this all over the country. What became of all the ice houses for bait under Hoyle's Government. They died for want of use. We don't think it worth while to run the risk of having to pay \$2,000 a year for a few bait houses.

Third, the exploiting of new fish business, marketing caplin, making glue and guano is most desirable, and is quite worthy of Government encouragement given to such small ventures should be open to our own people as well as outsiders and it might be considered whether we may not even pay too large a price for

such advantages. There is one outstanding objection to the whole agreement which demands most serious consideration and that is that the agreement may become a menace to the success of our fishery, that by the supply of frozen fish to the Americans, shipped to the United States and distributed from there to the fishing vessels we may increase their catch to our disadvantage every way. We know how the Reciprocity Treaty of 1854 had the effect of lessening our export of codfish to the United States instead of increasing it. We don't want now to give facilities which may have the same effect. It is our opinion, buttressed by the views of well-informed fishermen and others that it would be no loss to the Colony if the Agreement were never finalized."

### The Bait Question

MON. J. HARVEY ASKS QUESTION.

In the Legislative Council yesterday Mr. Harvey gave notice that he would ask the leader of the Government if the Government had information corroborating a statement published in the Halifax Herald that the sch. Ronald G. Smith had arrived at Lunenburg, and was baiting certain schooners with herrings taken at Bay of Islands; (2) if frozen herrings brought by sch. Juanita were being used for bait purposes; and (3) if the masters of those two vessels, and one a Canadian registered schooner, had signed bonds undertaking that their cargoes were for food purposes only.

### Tried to Drown Himself

Michael Bowdridge, of Bambrick St. attempted to drown himself this morning. He went down on Horwood's wharf, having said to his sister, with whom he lives, that he would "put an end to it all." She followed him and calling the assistance of some men who were standing about, they caught him on the end of the wharf and brought him back to his home. His face is broken out with erysipelas and he is acting like a crazy man. His friends applied to the Hospital and to the Lunatic Asylum for admission, but were refused. He is in a pitiable state and should be looked after by the authorities.

### REID'S BOATS.

The Argyle arrived at Placentia at 5.30 p.m. yesterday and will sail to-day on the Red Island route.

The Gloucester left Grand Bank at 8.35 a.m. to-day going west.

The Bruce is broken in two on the rocks at Puerto Neuvo and is a total wreck.

The Gloucester has been ordered to go to Port aux Basques to take up the Bruce's route on Monday next.

The Dundee will go to Port aux Basques direct on Monday to take up the Gloucester's route.

### Latest About the Bruce

Mr. H. D. Reid, Vice-President of the R. N. Co., received another message from his agent at Louisburg this morning saying:

"Water smooth near the wreck. Position of the Bruce is bad. Mr. McAlpine, Wreck Commissioner and Valuator, went to the wreck. Nothing done in recovering wreck material yet. Glad to hear that A. D. Brown is coming. Leaving for wreck at 8 a.m. Will report fully on return."

Mr. Reid also received a cablegram from his brother, Mr. W. D. Reid, President of the R. N. Co., who is at present in New York. He regretted deeply the loss of the favourite steamer Bruce. He advised his brother to put the Gloucester on the route as quickly as possible and to spare no efforts in trying to recover the balance of the mails from the wreck. Mr. W. D. Reid expressed deep regret at the loss of the two passengers, which he said he felt more keenly than the loss of the ship, which could be replaced. The two men lost their lives in the attempt to save others, and were helping to get a boat out of the davit when they fell overboard and were drowned. All the second class passengers, especially the fishermen going to Vancouver with Mr. M. F. Carroll, did noble work in helping to save the rest of the passengers. The Reid Mtd. Co. are deeply grieved over the loss of the two passengers, destroying as it does the good record of having never lost a passenger or a member of the crews of their steamers since the service of the R. N. Co. was undertaken, some 15 years ago. It is believed Mr. W. D. Reid, now in New York, will lose no time in placing an order for another up to date boat to replace the s.s. Bruce. As the steamer was not insured the loss will be about \$200,000 to the company.

### Talks With Great Men.

Flashes of the intimate conversation of great personalities are given in "Notes From the Life of an Ordinary Mortal," by Mr. A. G. C. Liddell, C. B., assistant secretary in the Lord Chancellor's Department. All his life Mr. Liddell has enjoyed a close acquaintance with famous folk. The result is a book overflowing with anecdote and glimpses of character. Mr. Liddell's father was the eighth and youngest son of the second Lord Ravensworth. The author of the book was born in 1846, and was called to the Bar in 1871. Under date March 17, 1906, Mr. Liddell recounts a conversation between Mr. Balfour and Mr. Chamberlain.

Talking to Arthur Balfour about speeches, Mr. Chamberlain said that all the best speeches must be prepared, but that he had advised his son to use rather less preparation than he himself had been in the habit of doing. Many of the best orators got their speeches by heart. Balfour said that no speeches were worth reading, not even those of Demosthenes, for no one could make a speech as good as an essay.

There is another criticism by Mr. Balfour worth quoting:—

"Comparing Mr. Winston Churchill with his father, A. B. said that the son had a sterner ambition. Lord Randolph rode looser to his anchors; he could have been drawn aside by racing or any other pursuit he might have fancied.

Lord Kitchener's "Platitudes." In 1902 Mr. Liddell had a chat with Lord Kitchener, who he says put Balfour first as a general but thought De Wet "merely a cute and active small farmer." They discussed the "South African" war. "He (Lord Kitchener) went on to say how he hated the task which was so unsatisfactory, because with all the trouble and anxiety you never felt sure that your combinations, even if successful, would lead to any general result, and so the end never seemed to be nearer. . . . He is a bad sleeper and wants but little. Four hours suffices him." Here is a pen picture of Lord Kitchener in 1902:

Large party at West. Lord Kitchener the lion. He has a curious face, something of the build and something of the man of intellect, a long upper lip and huge moustache, which makes his strong chin look quite small. His face lightens up strongly when he smiles as is often the case with big men. He did not talk much unless questioned, when the answer generally from a stock of platitudes about the

war which he seemed to keep for fashionable consumption.

There is a story of Tenyson and Mrs. Cameron, vouches for by the poet himself, while at tea with Mr. Liddell. "Mrs. Cameron came one day about 10 p.m. to insist on the poet being vaccinated and followed him up to the smoking-room, where he had retreated and locked himself in. She hammered at the door, calling out: 'Alfred you are a coward.' Alfred reiterated: 'Woman, go away! I will be vaccinated to-morrow.' He kept his promise, but being done from a gouty baby had eczema in his leg for two years."

Mr. Gladstone as Cabinet Maker. There are several references to Mr. Gladstone. "He could only remember being kept awake by worry on two occasions. The first time was when he had to form his first Ministry, and his mind was kept on the stretch by thinking if A— was put in such a place how would B— take it, or how would C— get on with C— and so on. At last he got up, lit a candle went to his writing-table and put down all possible combinations on paper, which eased his mind and he went to sleep. The second occasion was once when he had nearly cut through the trunk of a large chestnut tree, but left the tree standing in order that Lord Napier of Magdalen, who was to come next day, might be present at the fall. The tree was tied up with ropes. . . . In the middle of the night the wind changed and a gale got up, which caused him to lie awake expecting every moment to hear the crash of the tree falling on the house. However, it never did fall, though he did not go to sleep till midnight."—Daily Mail.



# Bruce Total Wreck.

## Two of the Passengers Drowned.

The Reill Mtd. Co. received another message last evening saying that the S. S. Bruce had struck at 4 a.m. on Friday on Puerto Neva Point, near Main a Dieu, in a blinding snow storm with N.W. wind. There were no particulars as to how the crew landed whether in boats or from the wreck direct. Out of the 153 passengers and crew that boarded her at Port aux Basques, when an accounting took place on shore 151 responded. A message from the Purser, Mr. Mitchell, gave the names of the missing men. It was as follows:—

"Ashore at Main a Dieu; passengers all landed safely except two second class, Pike, of St. Lawrence, and Shea, of Carbonear, both of whom are drowned. The ship is broken in two, the chief mate and chief officer standing by."

Mr. Spracklin, the R. N. Co. agent, also sent another message last evening from Louisburg saying:—

"About 110 passengers brought over by steamer Louisburg, and the rest by carriage reached here. Two passengers drowned, most of the baggage saved; all the mails lost; Bruce a total wreck. The captain and a few of the crew of the Bruce and the tug Douglas are standing by the wreck."

A message from Mr. J. R. McIsaac, Louisburg, at 7.30 last evening said:—

"Passengers landed at Louisburg at 4 this evening; the captain of our steamer reports Pike, of St. Lawrence, and Shea, of Carbonear, missing; vessel in exposed position, full of water fore and aft; probably will break up in heavy sea."

A message to the Postmaster General said that:—

"Nine bags and two baskets of mail were taken from the water."

As there were 22 bags of mail matter on the ship there are 13 lost.

The two men who are said to be drowned were engaged by Mr. M. F. Carroll to go to the Whale-Fishing Plant in British Columbia.

# Surmises About Wreck of the Bruce.

## Special to Evening Telegram.

LOUISBURG, To-Day. The Bruce is a total loss. A message to Louisburg says the steamer is starting in the centre and that an effort was made to recover some mail bags by the officer, who succeeded in securing a number of sacks of mail, but was obliged to desist. The captain has refused to make a statement (for the press, presumably) as to the cause of the wreck. There are many surmises as to the cause of the accident, and among them that the steamer was 10 miles out of her course, that the steamer had been making water some hours before she ran on the rocks, and it is thought that the captain had made for Port Nova to beach the steamer safely, if possible, before she sank.

# Diaz May Take the Field in Person.

## Special to Evening Telegram.

WASHINGTON, March 24. In a final effort to crush sedition and prevent the necessity for American intervention, President Diaz may take the field in person, at the head of the Mexican army, if his health permits. This report was received here to-day from Mexico City. Accompanying it is a statement from the Mexican President that the revolt would be effectually crushed in a short time. Although Diaz is infirm from age, his dominant spirit still glows strong. He believes that the moral effect of his presence in the field would be as great as the presence of any army. The Maderos faction has set May 4th as the date when the insurgent forces will march into Mexico capital.

Rumors that Wall Street interests are backing the revolutionists are not credited. Meanwhile the situation in Chihuahua has received a grave element in the proclamation by General Maderos that he would give no quarter in future to officials of the Government.

Two men drowned from Bruce in voluntarily getting boats out. Davits were too stiff to swing, and whilst men were shoving boat over forcibly, sea struck steamer, causing the boat to project over side. Many men were overbalanced by the sudden lurch, but they caught various things. Five went overboard, two drowned; one of my crowd, Wm. Pike, St. Lawrence, the other Shea, of Brigus or Carbonear, going to Boston. The remainder of my men wish me to wire to let friends know they are all right. Everybody is praising the good and willing manner they worked in getting out boats, rowing passengers ashore, and sticking to their work until all passengers were safely landed. All are leaving for Sydney at seven and thence at eleven-thirty for Vancouver. M. F. CARROLL.

# In the Assembly

Under the provisions of the amended Bill the Customs are empowered after a fair lapse of time to take the material to the oil stores at consignee's expense, if he doesn't remove it within the time required by law. Heretofore only four gallons of rascione were allowed to be kept in store. Now it is the intention to provide that it be placed in an iron tank and stored underground in the country.

The Revenue Bill passed its second reading and will go through Committee Monday.

Hon. Colonial Secretary laid on the table a statement of telegraph expenditures which Mr. Roberts asked for a few days ago.

He also informed Mr. Earle, in answer to his question given recently, that some telegraph poles supplied during last year by Jesse Winsor were not up to the requirements demanded by tender for same and were rejected. Later it was found that the poles could be used to some advantage and they were bought at a reduction on recommendation of the C. L. M. G.

About 4.30 p.m. Messrs. A. J. Harvey & Co. received the following from the Belleventure:

"Bellaventure, Wednesday evening.—No improvement; Eagle in our company, no seals; reports Bloodhound 20,000.

"(Sgd.) JOB KNEE."

At 5.45 p.m. Bowring Bros. received this message from Capt. A. Keen of the Florizel:

"Friday, 2 p.m.—Spoke to Ranger, hails for 12,000; reports Erik, 10,000; Diana, 9,000; Neptune, 6,500; Bloodhound supposed 20,000. Sorry rest of your ships clean. Seals in small patches. About 170,000 out.

"(Sgd.) A. KEAN."

This news shows that the wooden ships have been having a look in and is more encouraging than what has come to hand for the past few days. The wooden ships during the past few days have done good work amongst the small patches reported by the Florizel, and the Bloodhound has been especially fortunate in securing 5,000 more than reported for at first, or in all 20,000. Many of the discerning ones in the city believe she will be the first ship to arrive this spring. The ships, especially the larger and newer boats, are now searching for the "other" big patch known to be in existence and called the southern patch. The Beothic has been very fortunate and now tops the list with 28,000 seals on board. Some 40,000 more seals than at first reported have been taken within the past few days, of which the wooden fleet captured over 30,000. The Eagle, Aurora and Algernon seem to be the unfortunate ones, having evidently gone too far north and missed the patch. The fares reported to date are:

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

### The Temperance Crisis

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Mr. Editor,—With a minority vote signing the Temperance Petition one could see that its fate was a doubtful issue. Now that a majority vote seems self-evident and positive, there can be no room for doubt. Even those members who did not promise their support to such a large and influential vote, as had already signed, deliberately stated that they were in the hands of their constituents, and if that support was given which signified a majority of voters then their course of action was clear. Consequently we may look for the measure becoming law, and not some side issue—not the shifting of responsibility—not the further playing with the matter by postponement or anything else. There is a self-evident lesson for the churches to learn, if they would count in such matters as the present. Limited action and effort are very good in the signing of Temperance petitions, and in uniform action by attending in force when the measure is up for discussion in the House of Assembly. But it should not end there. Let me say to the clergymen of this city that it should rather begin there. Carry the same united action into the churches for the support of those who support Temperance Legislation. For those who support it, not those who profess to, and even speak thereof, but evade the issue. "Truth will out." There is a judgment day for every man who seeks suffrage at the hands of an electorate. Too long the churches have been ridiculed for not counting at the polls. That day must never come again, for on moral questions let every Representative know that he is being weighed in the balance, and a subterfuge and something else as good as the petition cannot satisfy those who have striven so much to help the drunkard and those who suffer with him. Then will the churches cease to be a negligible quantity with its tremendous moral force but become a power to be reckoned with and that time is now overdue and the present is opportunity.

### Port de Grave Notes.

During the past two months seals and birds have been very plentiful in Conception Bay, and our fishermen at Port-de-Grave have not been behind but have secured their share. The carcasses of the seals sell at seven cents per pound, and some of the men have earned as high as \$5 in one day on the carcasses alone! They keep the "pel" until they get a chance to freight it to St. John's or Harbour Grace.

The sealing news from the front is exciting the usual keen interest among the fishermen; and now that the flic weather has set in, many are the heated arguments that may be heard around the streets. Some contend that the steamers are at present too far north, and the main patch would be found farther south. Others give it as their opinion that the main patch is the one from which the steamers are now taking the seals.

Coal is very scarce in most places around the Bay, there being none to buy at Bay Roberts, Clarke's Beach, Port-de-Grave, Cupids or Brigus. Last week coal had to be brought by train from St. John's to supply the schools here.

### Hints to Householders.

(From the Medical Magazine, Feb. No.)

**Medical Approval of Gas for Heating and Lighting—Important Tests at the Welsham Infirmary.**

The tests were conducted under the superintendence of Dr. F. S. Toogood, Medical Superintendent of the Infirmary, with the following objects:

1. To compare, hygienically, the relative values of the open fire and the gas radiator as warming agents.
2. To ascertain if, and to what extent, the quality of the atmosphere of a room is affected by incandescent gas burners and lamps.
3. To ascertain the hygienic value of the gas fire.

The general conclusions arrived at from the results of the experiments are as follows:

- (1) That in both large and small apartments which have normal means of ventilation, gas consumed in modern incandescent gas burners can be used for lighting without any detriment to health, being found, in fact, to assist ventilation by the increased circulation of the air.
- (2) That a gas fire, properly constructed and fixed, not only does not vitiate the air, but is a valuable adjunct to the ventilation of the room. Its advantages in the sick-room—in respect of its reliability, avoidance of noise, freedom from dust-producing propensities, and saving of both work and anxiety—are obvious to every professional man and woman.


