





On Tuesday we republished an article from the New York Fishing Gazette of June 22nd. This article also appeared in the Gloucester Times. In it appeared a number of definite and positive statements, among which were the following:—

(1) The Booth Fisheries Co. ne-gotiated with Sir Edward Morris, Premier of Newfoundland.
(2) Contracts have been drawn up with the Colonial Government for concessions, subject to examination by

the Company.

(3) This examination has begun. The Newfoundland Government has never sold an ounce of bait or ice to foreigners, and the satisfactory terms of the contract made with the Booth Fisheries Co. give that company the exclusive concessions for fifteen years for these vital mater-

In an editorial the Gazette says: "The trade has been deeply interested in reports circulated for several weeks of a concession to the Booth Fisheries Co. by the Newfoundland Government through Premier Morris. This has been confirmed." Moreover the Gazette stated that the concessions are "the first of the kind ever granted in Newfoundland."
