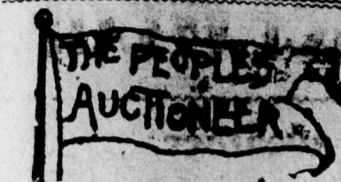

Cruel? Of course it was. But surely, like the voracious snake, the shark has long put himself beyond the pale of human mercy. Soft hearted as he usually is, the sailor man has a long memory. The shark has followed for weeks in the shadow of his ship and has watched each man of the crew with greedy, malevolent eye. There is a heavy debt against all the shark tribe for many a lost mariner, and when the chance comes to settle old scores the sailor pays it to the full. Besides, the thing has the sanction of immemorial custom. It was some old Phoenician, trading out of Tyre to the far Casastorides, who probably first put the trick in practice.—Wide World Magazine.

Those Bait Concessions.

On Tuesday we republished an article from the New York Fishing Gazette of June 22nd. This article also appeared in the Gloucester Times. In it appeared a number of definite and positive statements, among which were the following:

- (1) The Booth Fisheries Co. negotiated with Sir Edward Morris, Premier of Newfoundland.
- (2) Contracts have been drawn up with the Colonial Government for concessions, subject to examination by the Company.
- (3) This examination has begun.
- (4) The Newfoundland Government has never sold an ounce of bait or ice to foreigners, and the satisfactory terms of the contract made with the Booth Fisheries Co. give that company the exclusive concessions for fifteen years for these vital materials.

In an editorial the Gazette says: "The trade has been deeply interested in reports circulated for several weeks of a concession to the Booth Fisheries Co. by the Newfoundland Government through Premier Morris. This has been confirmed." Moreover the Gazette stated that the concessions are "the first of the kind ever granted in Newfoundland."

We commented on the article and pointed out that it was high time that the exact terms of this agreement should be published, as Newfoundland ought to know where she was in matters vitally affecting her staple industry.

On Thursday the Daily News published an explanation, the points of which were:

- (1) The Agreement is not concluded between the Booth Company and the Government.
- (2) When it is it will be submitted to the Legislature.
- (3) Negotiations are going on between the Company and the Government.
- (4) The Company is investigating our fishery resources.
- (5) There is no change in the bait policy.

The same afternoon the Evening Chronicle offered an explanation, which was to the effect:

- (1) No concessions have been granted by the Morris Government to the Booth Co.
- (2) That Company is negotiating with Trefethen & Lord to take over their concessions of two years ago, on practically the same lines.

These words which we have printed in black type imply a variation in the Trefethen & Lord contract, con-

LONDON, July 4.
 In one of the preliminary heats for the Grand Challenge Cup at Henley Regatta, the Sydney Rowing Club of New South Wales, beat the Argonaut Club of Toronto, by a length and a quarter.

HONG KONG, July 4.
 The attempted assassination of the governor of Hong Kong is regarded as possessing some political significance. The would-be murderer was formerly hospital-dispenser in this city. He said that he regretted having missed his aim, as he wanted to kill the governor, because the Colonial government of Hong Kong had stopped the circulation of Chinese copper coins in British territory. He interpreted this action as directed against China.

Patrick Clarke the Victim.

When it became known yesterday that the victim of the railway accident was Mr. Patrick Clarke, the well known grocer of New Gower St., the people of the whole city who knew and respected him were shocked. The deceased left here by Tuesday evening's train with Mrs. Kennedy, of Job Street, and David Dempsey, and fished at Placentia all Wednesday, securing full baskets. At 5 a.m. yesterday Messrs. Clarke and Kennedy joined the express at Placentia Junction, Dempsey staying behind to enjoy another day's fishing. Kennedy had read the morning paper and handed it to Clarke. They were in the first class car, which was the third car from the rear, and soon after Kennedy missed Clarke when out near Manuels, and telling Conductor Lush a search was made through the train, but the man could not be found. It was then believed that he had got off the train at Kelligrews and missed his passage. The ill-fated man's basket of trout was brought along and handed to his nephew who is looking after his store. It is believed that being drowsy for want of sleep, after reading the paper, he sat on the rail of the car the platform when he lurched and fell between the cars and was killed instantly. The wheels and portions of the trucks of the after cars which went over the body were rendered with blood. Mary Craig, daughter of Mr. Geo. Craig, of Kelligrews, who was out in the field with her mother, witnessed the accident and drew her mother's attention to it. She was sent by her mother to investigate, was horrified at the sight which met her gaze and ran screaming for help down to the station. Mr. John Long and several others ran up the track and after viewing the mutilated remains a few seconds, covered them over with canvas. When the train rounded the curve the sudden jolt, it is thought, it threw the man off his seat and down between the cars. One hand was found twenty yards from the body, which had been dragged some distance under the trucks; a severed leg was also found on the beach near. His clothing was torn in ribbons and his head crushed terribly. By an accommodation train at 3 p.m. yesterday Sut. Grimes with Dr. Mitchell, Undertaker Martin and Constable went to the scene, and the remains, enclosed in a casket, were brought here by the shore train last night and taken to the family residence, Springdale Street. The deceased was a single man, aged 42, and leaves a sister and brother, to whom the Telegram extends sincerest sympathy.

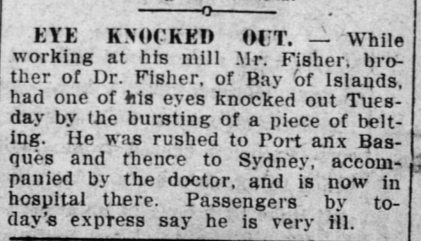

Ordination at St. George's.

The 29th of June is already thus inscribed; but the 29th of June, 1912, shall in future be so marked by the people of St. George's, for on that day in the Cathedral, Andrew Nolan, of St. John's, was elevated to the sacred office of the priesthood by His Lordship Rt. Rev. M. F. Power. This is the first time that the Sacrament

of Holy Orders has been administered here. The ordination took place during the celebration of Pontifical Mass, and was a most impressive ceremony. Assisting within the Sanctuary were the Very Rev. Monsignor Sears, the Very Rev. Dean O'Rourke, Revs. Frs. Brown and Adams, with the Rev. J. M. Joy as master of ceremonies. The church was crowded to its utmost capacity, many having come from nearby towns, and several friends and relatives of the young aspirant had arrived from St. John's to be present at the ordination. I can not withhold a word of praise for those in charge of the seating of the congregation and for the system and courtesy with which strangers were ushered to seats within the sacred edifice.

With the hour came from the vestry His Lordship the Bishop, wearing the purple, which shows the dignity and responsibility which has been laid upon him as a leader of those who work for the Master. A little acolyte served as train-bearer. After came the Very Rev. and Rev. Clergy and the altar boys. His Lordship was vested at the throne by the assisting clergy—then the sacred ceremonies began. Shortly after came from the vestry the young Deacon, clad in an alb of spotless white and bearing a lighted candle in his hand. Just outside the altar rail knelt his father, with the officiator of the St. George's and the President of the Bay of Islands Star of the Sea Association in regalia.

During the celebration of the Holy Sacrifice and the conferring of the priestly dignity, the thoughts of many in the congregation must have turned to that young man, who, going out forever from his family, setting aside all ties of kindred, casting no back-

ward glance at the allurements and pleasures of the world, began from now to climb the narrow path to take up the arduous self-denying life of a priest, together with the vows of chastity and obedience; and when we think of the pride of men and their wilfulness, obedience of these two seems scarcely to merit the lesser reward.

The lighted candle was taken from his hand by a priest and he prostrated himself in prayer at the foot of the altar during the chanting of the Litany by the choir and the clergy; then arising, he knelt before the Bishop during the laying on of hands; the Bishop first, then each priest in turn laying both hands on his head, after which the Bishop said the solemn prayers of Consecration, and the priests vested him in the priestly vestments. After was sung the hymn Veni Creator. Then His Lordship Bishop Power, sitting at the centre of the high altar, anointed the young clergyman's hands and placed in them

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the chalice with the wine and water and the paten with the bread, saying: "Receive the power to offer sacrifice to God and celebrate Mass as well for the living as for the dead in the name of the Lord."

Deum was then intoned by the Bishop and sung by the choir.

The acolytes, the clergy and the Bishop filed out; the church slowly emptied itself of the worshipping throng; the ceremony was over; the Sacrament had been administered; the 29th of June, 1912, had been made forever memorable in the annals of the first time the words which perform the most wonderful mystery and miracle of our faith. The Bishop gave him Communion under both kinds, and after the Communion Rev. J. M. Joy, ascending the altar, delivered a powerful and eloquent sermon from Is. 21: 8—"I am upon the watch tower of the Lord standing continually by day, and I am upon my word standing whole nights." The preacher spoke of the sacredness and exalted dignity of the priesthood; of his institution by Christ, of the power to administer Sacraments, and to offer Sacrifice. He spoke of the professional and of the miracle wrought there, through the priest; by the power of the Holy Ghost. He then addressed the newly ordained in glowing and fervid language, exhorting him to be steadfast and brave in the arduous work in which he was henceforth to engage. He pointed out that from to-day he had no part in the pleasures or vanities of the world, its honors or its wealth; that he had chosen Christ as his portion and inheritance, and had severed family ties and cast loose the sweet bonds of friendship to devote himself wholly to the service of the Lord.

American, Canadian and local vessels did well on herring and the first caplin baiting, but the dogfish have greatly impeded them of late.

Many people are ill of colds. Owing to the cold weather crops are backward. A new lighthouse tower is being erected at Western Bay Point.


