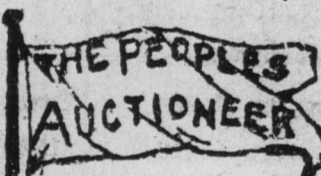

Reviving Old Pleasures.

By RUTH CAMERON.

"Backward, turn backward, oh time, in thy flight. Make me a child again just for to-night."

"The cross-town car will be here at 5.27," said the conductor, or, as he put me down at the little crossroads.

I consulted my watch. Horrors a full half-hour and I hadn't even a scrap of newspaper to read.

And I couldn't take a walk because I had a heavy suit case. Then I caught sight of a fishy shop and crossed over to look in its single window. The chief decoration was a round glass jar filled with pink and white peppermint sticks.

Now, gazing into a crystal ball is supposed to have a strange and powerful effect on the mind. Perhaps the glass jar had a similar psychic influence. Anyhow, as I looked at that round glass jar of peppermint sticks, I suddenly became a child again, with a damp penny clutched in a moist palm, and in an instant I had tugged open the screen door and was standing in front of the low glass case of candy which I knew I should find.

It was like meeting old friends, there they all were. The same candies that had charmed away the pangs of those days when a penny was an event.

The first thing I bought was a cent's worth of all-day suckers, still two-for-a-cent—apparently the high cost of living had not yet affected the low-class cases. Mindful of my old preference, I bought a bright green and a brown one. "What colors did you like best?" Of course, you remember what they are. Hard round balls that will

By midnight the weather was overcast and squally operations suspended it being too dark for boats to see. The fire meanwhile worked the women's steering in the after part of the ship, but we kept this knowledge from passengers who were quiet throughout the rest of the night. The chief engineer, Marconi men, seamen and myself spent the night making small rafts in case of fire which may burn through the deck before daylight. At 5.15 a.m. the first boat arrived. The weather and sea having moderated, boats were enabled to come alongside the ship which enabled passengers to embark quickly. All steamers lying around the ship sent boats, and now we were enabled to load three boats with passengers at once. The passengers left in a very orderly way; there was no panic, but the women broke down crying when help was alongside. All were off the ship by 8 a.m. About 400 passengers were taken off; I searched the ship myself and found no one on board so decided to abandon her, as number three hatch was well afloat by now, so with remainder of the crew embarked on Kronland. Nothing at all has been heard of the two missing boats; passing vessels were asked to keep a look out for them. I wish to express our heartfelt thanks and gratitude to the captain of the ships who stood by, also to officers and crews who came to our assistance, for their bravery and endurance in endeavoring to come alongside the ship; also passengers of the Kronland for their kindness to rescued passengers engineers, and myself, giving us out and doing everything for us. Following are the names of the steamers that came to our assistance: Carmanla, Grosser Kurfarst, La Torrance, Anian, Naraganst, Seydlitz, Minnepolis, Rappahannock; also one other steamer without wireless. The ship was abandoned in lat. 48.30 north, long. 34.57 west.

Story of the Illfated Volturno's Captain.

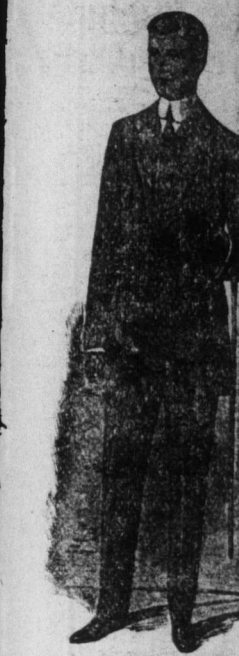

Last night the Liberal Candidates for St. John's West, Messrs. Ellis, Cowan and Scott, held a very successful meeting at the house of Mr. John Holden, on Topsail Road. The big double room where the meeting took place was crowded to its utmost capacity. About a hundred were present, and those not able to gain admission to the room remained outside at the windows to hear the speakers. Mr. Peter Cowan was moved to the chair, being proposed by Mr. Lester, and seconded by Mr. Kistley. Mr. Scott spoke first on the uses and benefits of Model Farms and Agricultural Colleges, also of what should be done in order to encourage and make farming a success. Mr. H. Cowan spoke next, and showed how the money was being squandered by the Government. Government. He showed how it was not wise to enter into such huge investments as the present Government has made in connection with the Branch Railways. Too much money was being paid on railways, and more should be used towards the welfare of the country in regard to the fishery and farming. He also said the reduction of taxes by Morris was merely political. He also put the country more in debt. Mr. Ellis dealt with the peril which was facing the country, brought about by the extravagant and squandering policy of the present Government, and warned all present to give serious consideration to the matter before coming to a decision as to which party they would mark their ballots for on polling day, and to remember that the weal or woe of their country depended greatly upon this act of theirs. He also pointed out that the present Government had, during the past four years, contracted to spend fully two-thirds as much on Branch Railways as was spent on all railway work in this country from its inauguration in 1880 up to 1909, and made plain that unless there was some intervention of such imprudent and reckless spending of public money, the country was sure to follow the independence of our country lost for ever. The meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem, and amidst much cheering and firing of guns, showing that in that portion of the district Bond can't lose.

LONDON, To-day.
The Connaught wedding gifts will be placed on exhibition in St. James' Palace next week; one shining admission will be charged, the proceeds to be devoted to relief of sufferers in the Welsh Colliery disaster.
PORT OF SPAIN, To-day.
Large oil gushers which were recently struck near Asphalt Lake, and which have been producing 30 thousand barrels daily, reported yesterday to be on fire. A great volume of smoke could be seen from the city forty miles distant.
ALBANY, To-day.
Likely the fate of Governor Sulzer will be known by to-night. High Court impeachment adjourned last night with deliberations unfinished, but it was said final proceedings would be taken at open session this afternoon.
HAMBURG, Germany, To-day.
The Hamburg-American Line admits in spite of earlier denials that the boilers of the Imperator have proved unsatisfactory and that complete re-building is necessary in order to reduce excessive coal consumption and increase the speed of the vessel. Builders by their contract are required to compensate the company for compulsory retirement of the vessel from the service and will have to pay approximately \$1,500 every day while she is laid off.
CARDIFF, Wales, To-day.
All hopes of rescuing any more miners entombed in Universal collieries has been virtually abandoned. No official reports have been issued and this has caused much comment. Fire broke out anew in the afternoon and is still raging. There are no further signs of life in the pit. Up to a late hour last night 49 bodies had been recovered while 368 miners are still entombed. Shift which went into mine numbered 927. Engineers have decided to devote efforts to subduing fire as they believe it is useless to persist in the attempt of rescue.
WASHINGTON, To-day.
The administration officials, up to the hour of closing Government departments, were without advice as to reported conference in Mexico City of the entire Diplomatic Corps. This development in the situation, following close upon President Wilson's note declaring that the States was shocked at the lawlessness of General Huerta assuming dictatorship over Mexico, was taken here to mean that the foreign governments might bring pressure to bear in an effort to compose the situation. General Huerta's decree of taking upon himself legislative as well as executive powers swept aside all hope here that the Huerta regime would re-establish constitutional government or be able to cope with increasing vigorous fighting of Constitutionalists. Both President Wilson and Secretary Bryan are considering the possibility of a more aggressive course. Three methods dealing with the situation have been suggested as open to the Washington Government. First, there is the ever recurrent suggestion in official circles of a military and naval demonstration which would serve as a precautionary move in case a forcible policy is later required. For the present, however, the President and his advisors are concentrating upon a solution by the use of peaceful measures. Second, many officials think that a series of strong demands made upon the authorities at Mexico City would force an immediate solution. Third, States could formally announce its absolute termination of relations with Huerta.

"Index" From Piperstock Hill Scores the Tories.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—The date at the bottom of this letter struck me two unteky numbers. Just as the author of the manifesto under my eye struck on the same number that will mark his going into political obscurity. The picture of the R. Hon. Sir E. P. while at first sight is rather flattering, but observed more closely the eyes have a fixed apprehensive stare as of one who sees gloomy forebodings; some who will go out from the past never to return—that one I apprehend will be the whole Morris Party taken as a unit. If not too late I would like to make a few observations on the manifesto before me. The reason assigned for leaving Bonding may be taken down with the healer that Morris assured "he would get his reward hereafter." The principal features of the policy of that Party were:

Reduction of Taxation on tea, sugar, etc. at the last session of the Legislature as a sugar plum to the electorate. Don't ye see?

Branch Railway Extension. That have already drawn after it all the millions that were borrowed on the strength of every second of rail that leaves the water, though only three of the branch railways promised have been completed, while millions more must be borrowed for the other two, and plus the cost of rolling stock, stations, etc.

Old Age Pensions. To all the old chaps throughout the districts that have large families of sons, who, out of gratitude for the goodness of a benign Government to their dear fathers, whom they didn't want to support, will in spite of every consideration and honest manly sentiment vote for the return of the Morris Party. Some of those beneficiaries are under 70 years, too lazy to wash themselves, except when there may be a Government job and a dollar easily earned. Hundreds of these deserving solitary old fishermen have not been considered. They are going to get it the next time. They have no pull just yet. Then will the old women be considered.

Educational Advance. Yes, a mite to help on the starving servants of arduous toil, to keep them from going out of the country, and hanging down the whole school business. Yes, there has been a grant I believe, for building purposes, but note that this outlay must be paid back out of the regular grant to the district, though that grant is unequal to the demand already on it in many cases.

Fishery Development. That was the Cold Storage plants that were going to be established throughout the coast line at vantage points. That was the bargain offered Trethelen and Lord.

Telegraph Lines and Marconi Extension. The Marconi extension just comes in at good time. The Government in its foresight knew about the head fishery coming on, and kept the job till just now out of consideration for the poor fellows that have to lie about in swamps with scarcely a covering, to earn a dollar for themselves and families before the winter. These men will return in a few days with hearts so full of gratitude for this kindness (?!?) that they will be rushing over people to get to the booths on polling day to record their

vote for—Bond, to show that they saw through the hollow sham, and that, like the removal of the tax from sugar, only a sop to catch votes.

Improved Coastal Steam Service. Were those the steamers on the Labrador service into which people, no matter how diseased, were allowed to associate with healthy people and sit at the same table? If that was the kind of improved service it did not seem to have been thought of until a disgusted and indignant travelling public drew the Government's attention to this menace to public health.

Agriculture. Bond shows this up under the heading in his manifesto. He says: "The amount spent or wasted would have placed ten thousand additional acres of land under cultivation at a bonus of 20 dollars an acre to the men that cleared it. Didn't some one get the whole model farm and supply as a job lot?"

Encouraging Mining Matters. I saw by the Telegram a few days ago where some one scores the Government in connection with mines. I'm afraid the hands of some of the Government inner circle got dirty dabbling in that ore business. Enough said.

Dredging Shallow Harbors. We know what that's going to amount to when we cannot get enough of money to make safe those that are already deep enough.

Fog Alarms. Better get some of those blowards of the Government stationed on the headlands to keep their lungs in exercise for election lines by shouting "danger ahead!"

That point Morris tries to make of saving \$400,000 on taxes besides carrying a railway policy is too ridiculous. There are, as everybody should know, only three of the five branches of railway partly finished and about six million dollars have been or agreed to be paid, the actual figures being \$5,839,999.99. This amount was paid in gold and not in bonds as heretofore at a loss to the colony of \$407,211.14. The \$400,000 "early" are saved for a part of this cost, because when the Government proposed to reduce the taxation on tea, sugar, etc., Bond reminded them if they did so, they would not be able to look after the public service—certainly would not have been able to find jobs for so many heaters. Those surpluses and railway interests are put in a way to fool any of the electorate who may read this manifesto.

How was that surplus revenue made up? Was it by increased industries of a permanent nature? Not at all. Those millions of dollars expended on railways went for the time being largely into the pockets of labor. This increased their purchasing power, enlarged the imports and increased the revenue accordingly.

The Point Which Every Voter Should Bear Constantly in Mind is the Tremendous Amount Borrowed in Excess of that Proposed in Morris's Manifesto.

The unbearable burden of further millions to complete the work, that the extra revenues was not raised from a permanent source, and that if Morris gets back to power, after humbugging the people again, default and bankruptcy will be the deplorable consequence. These amounts certified by

Bertram and Harris for public works are not to be taken seriously. What else could have been done with those surpluses just then? Where should they have gone but to help the people who paid it into the Treasury? Dear Morris want a public vote of thanks that he and his associates did not swallow it all up in booze and picnics?

I would ask the fishermen along the coast who have been petitioning for wharves and breakwaters whether they got their share or not, and if they did not, was it not because there was not a majority vote in favour of the Government last time? If the men of those places have not been fed on private scraps, or have their liberty for the drop of rum and the contemptible half dollar, they should bear in mind what should be their duty on polling day. Referring to the foregoing documents as given under the several headings in the Manifesto, Morris wants us to swallow his conclusion "that the present Government has done more for the people in all these respects than any other Government which preceded it."

If We Swallowed That Dose, E. P., we Could Never Digest It.

We admit more money was expended, but you had some extra good fisheries, and the price raised by the purchasing committee of Canadian and Americans, as well as the increased demand in the foreign markets. But we are not going to give you credit for this born to our fishing industry. As above shown the earning power of the people has been abundantly increased and therefore the purchasing power which helped increase the revenue; you lost half a million by paying in gold on all of which we have to pay interest, and were made to earn back again under hard taskmasters paid to drive us, while we lived like wild beasts in the open country under all conditions of weather, and had to purchase supplies at the will of our employers and

Had to Bring Them Miles to Camp on Our Backs.

The sooner railway work were done the better. With regard to Morris's prospectus it is not necessary to say much. It is the same old story. The programme we would like to see carried out, that outlined by Bond, backed up by the fishermen. They will be able to look out for such details as will tend to development along all lines bearing on the fisheries. The item of coal, concerning which we have been so long promised, great things still hangs fire. We have had for a great many years one of the ablest, most industrious, and honest men in the whole service of Britain and her Colonies at a representative meeting of geological experts in Canada a short time ago he was chosen secretary. I believe he told that his fame as a geologist had gone so far and his views on the resources of Newfoundland so highly appreciated he was eagerly sought after by professors of some of the greatest Universities of the world, to

Get His Opinion With Regard to the Coal and Mineral Areas of Newfoundland.

Has he not frequently reported to the Government the coal wealth of this country; has he not given assurances that unquestionable that the coal deposits of vast extent, rich in quality, and easily mined? Yet in the face of all this, and in the face, too, of the fact the cost of coal here is more than necessary article almost prohibitive for our poor people, nothing has been done to make those here who have put in a way to develop these coal areas do so, or to induce foreign capital to seek investment. Perhaps it is that Reid & Co. are not ready to attend to coal, and that Morris & Co. are not pushing matters lest they should put embargo on Reid's schemes when the time is ripe for looking after the coal areas of the country will observe and remember that not only are the opinions and experiences, and official statements based on sound learning, careful observation, a lifetime of service of Government explorer, Mr. James Howley, ignored, completely set aside, deemed unworthy of serious attention, but Morris says in his Manifesto that Professor Dunstare (Dunce, maybe) will come to write a thorough examination of our coal areas, etc." Considering Mr. Howley's qualification, his long experience, his thoroughness in his investigation, the integrity of his character, this is about the most degrading censure ever uttered against any man of like standing in the service of the British Crown.

It is an indignity not alone to Mr. Howley, but to every Newfoundland-lander.

is an insult that should not be condoned. It is equivalent to saying, "we have no man in this country given any amount of time and aid, who is intelligent enough to learn the science of geology, explore our coal areas, and give us statistics on his observations that we can rely on place before enquiring capitalists. Mr. Howley has been ignominiously turned down, and Mr. Dunstan is going to do the work all over again, and some time between this and the final configuration, we will have infallible testimony on the value of our coal and shale areas, so that they will be able to get in a cheap stock—whatever may be left of us—to keep the bunkers going on the other side of the Stix. I suppose Mr. Dunstan will invite our able and venerable Geological Surveyor to show him around; and I expect Messrs. Morrison, Strong & Co. will get job prospecting timber areas in the newly explored country. May we not ask again, "what can come of this?" Verily, "no man is a prophet in his own country." It is not necessary to take up any more points of the Manifesto. The whole conceit is written to catch the unthinking crowd, especially that element that, through bribery and natural degeneracy have lost their manhood. Morris and his crowd are not the men to whom the intelligent progressive people of this country can look up to.

Everybody Knows They Have Made the Most of Their Appointments to Enrich Themselves, while we the hard-headed men of toil,

will have to sweat under the burden that have placed upon us. The fishermen and laborers of this country are the men on whom the future of this country depends. Let them see to it now that they control the legislation of this country. Bond Can't Lose

The Mineral Scandal.

WHAT WILL MORRIS DO!

The Daily News is silent these mornings. We almost expected the Daily News would remain silent about the charges against Morison, Emerson, Castin and F. J. Morris "allowing their names to be on the 1911 prospectus." We also expected that P. T. McGrath would have been the only one who would venture out with such a flimsy red herring sort of an argument as both gave on Monday. McGrath's writings can hardly belittle his reputation. With A. Robinson of the News it is a little bit different. But Mr. Robinson need not run away with the idea that the essence of the charge is that Morison and the gang used their titles merely. That may be a matter of ethics, perhaps! The essence of the charge is: that the prospectus of 1911 named Morison and the gang as Directors having active participation in a scheme whose only object could be to swindle an innocent public—a scheme that was attempted twelve or thirteen years AFTER the the Bay de Verde mine was abandoned by a genuine mining company—abandoned after honorable and profitable Sir Robert Bond had lost their money in it—had lost their money relying upon the reports of an eminent engineer, whose honourable career was blighted by the uncertainties of mining. Morison knows, and for twelve years knew as much about Bay de Verde mines as any man in Newfoundland, probably. He had been interested in Bay de Verde claims in more ways than one.

Yet Morison is named as Counsel in a prospectus that offered 60,000 shares for sale at \$7.50 each (par value, \$10.00) in a scheme that based the value of the property upon a number of outrageously false statements such as there being 200,000 tons of ore on the surface available for shipment.

Was Morison named as Counsel in 1911 because of his position as Minister of Justice who was likely to forget in 1912? Or was it because he had shares in the Company of 1909 which cannot be "forgot"?

Similarly, were Castin, Emerson and F. J. Morris named because they were members of Sir Edward Morris's Government? Or was it because they had shares in the Company?

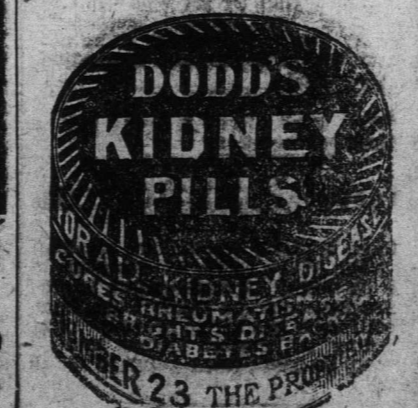
How did their names get there? Directors must hold shares before they can be named as Directors without explanation. How did they get shares? Did they pay for them in cash? Or did they exchange mineral claims for shares? Or did they simply lend their names for shares? Or what did they do?

The scheme was fraudulent enough! The charges are clear enough to any public man aware of mining high offices. They are Sir Edward's Morris's only hope! He is their Leader. He has a right to make them show their eyes clear of the whole fraudulent business! If Sir Edward Morris does not exercise his power as their leader to make them clear themselves, his duty is to call for their suspension until a full enquiry is made. It is his duty to advise His Excellency the Governor to suspend those men until that enquiry is held. If Sir Edward Morris does not do that, he must be written down as a Plutocrat who connives at what is on the face of it, a downright attempt at scheming rascality on the part of members of his own Government.

If their names were improperly used in 1911; if they had no shares or interests in that Company which was formed in South Dakota, it were a very easy business for them to show it. They have not done so. But their spokesmen have impliedly admitted the offence ("if once it be" the Daily News says) in showing that another Company—a bona fide Company—had lost \$30,000 in working the mine. Surely, that proves—if proof were required—how false and fraudulent that Prospectus of 1911 really was. Both the Daily News and the Herald have put both feet in now with a vengeance. They don't intend to deny that the prospectus of 1911 was a most fraudulent piece of business. They don't intend to deny that Morison and the gang were connected with the scheme. Amongst those who were Directors of the Worthington Company of 1898, was Sir J. Randless. Both the Daily News and the Herald mentioned his name. He lost a lot of money in it in 1898. Mr. Thomas J. Freeman who was in London wrote out to St. John's in the beginning of 1911: "I have good people looking into it. At our last meeting I had to produce a regular history. . . . They are meeting Sir J. Randless, the old Director. I fear he will cripple me as one of the old 'shareholders did last fall.'"

If Sir Edward Morris, the Premier, the boasted leader of a Party that is tottering to its fall—if he does not do something to show his men are clean in this thing, then his "ideals of statesmanship" of which he boasts, may have more tiz but very much less consistence than John R. Bennett's mineral waters.

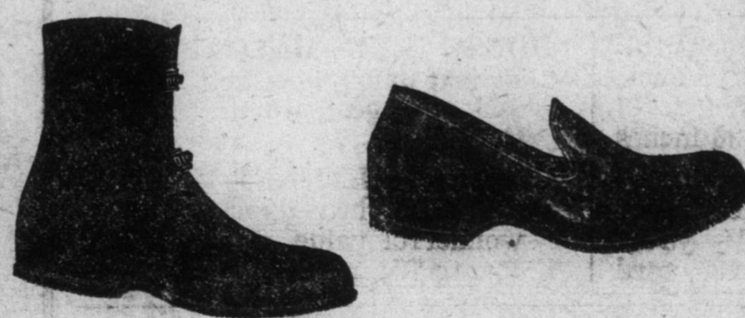
