





ERMANS OUTFITTING WAR YACHTS IN AMERICA.

WASHINGTON, To-Day. British agents are investigating th operations of certain yachts which they suspect had been prepared or were being outfitted for use against ships carrying oil from Mexico for the British navy. Information has been gathered from Norfolk, Pensacola and from the Gulf of California. 
