



#### WHAT THE EMPIRE GAVE.

LONDON, Aug. 21. (Reuter despatch.)-The report of the War Cabinet from 1918 states that the strength of the regular army reserve and Territorial forces on the fourth of August, 1914, was 733,514. England has since recruited 4.006.158 men, with the other enlistments in the United Kingdom and Canada. The total white enlistments in the whole Empire were 7,130,280. The figures of enlistment for races other than white, including over 1,250,000 from India, were 1,524,187, giving a grand total for all the races of the Empire of 8,654,467. In addition to these Chinese and other labor units were raised for service in Salonika, Egypt and Mesopotamia.

ADVOCATE AGAIN MISQUOTES MR

Editor Daily News: Dear Sir,-The Advocate on Wednesday contained the following as its chief headline: "Road Boards Safeguards Against Confederation, said A. B. Morine." On the fourth collumn of the same number of the Advocate, the following appears:- "Morine said in 1915: 'The Local Affairs Act is Newfoundland's greatest safeguard against Confederation." It will not surprise you, nor the sophisticated public, probably, when I say that both statements are absolute falsehoods.

On Friday, April 16th, 1915, in the House of Assembly, I said: "Mr. Chairman, I am of the opinion that no further attempt to proceed with this Bill (The Local Affairs Act) ought to be made during the present session. .

The law relating to the Government of local affairs is most extensive and difficult, and will have to be dealt with most thoroughly, to have the effect desired. . . The time has arrived when these matters should be fully and comprehensively dealt with. . . This elective system, if carried out on politically imparial lines. ought to bring in very much better

returns for the money spent. . . I would expect great benefit to accrue to this Colony from local incorporation. . . . If we had country, town or village councils, the natural adaptability of the people to public

affairs would show itself. . . . The greatest safeguard that you who disbelive in confederation can have against it is Municipal Incorporation. . . . It is better that an effort

should be made for something large and tangible than for something small and unsatisfactory. . . . The cure is local incorporation all round the country."

On the same occasion Mr. Coaker said: "The plan, as suggested by Mr. Morine, is, in my opinion, a very good one, and I am sure would eliminate many of the difficulties which confront the Government to-day."

Mr. Jennings said: "I hope some effort will be made to deal with this matter (Road Boards) pending the consideration of the more elaborate Act to meet those other considerations which Mr. Morine has referred to."

At a later date Mr. Halfyard said: "I think there is a great deal in what has been said by Mr. Morine, that each locality should be given control of the Public Health, Road Money, Marine Works, and other local matters like

It does not appear in the local Hansard Report of the Proceedings of the Assembly in 1915, but it is a fact, nevertheless, that I refused to be a member of the Committee of the whole House on the Local Affairs Bill, upon the ground that the proposals then before the House would prove to be unsatisfactory, and when the report of the Committee of the Whole was tabled, I said that I considered the measure so incomplete that I would take no part in putting it through the

My proposal was that the whole Colony should be incorporated in districts, or townships, or towns, or villages, according to the circumstances of each locality, and that the powers of incorporate bodies should be extensive and complete; and, as the context of my speech will show, my reference to Confederation, as connected with the subject, was that, by complete incorporation, the care of local affairs being thrown upon local bodies the expense would largely be provided for by direct taxation, instead of out of the Customs revenue, and a selfsupporting country would not need to adopt Confederation for financial reasons alone. This measure of general municipal incorporation, which I suggested, is a very different matter from the Road Board expedient which constitutes what is now called in highsounding words, "The Local Affairs

my speech, which goes to the very root of the difficulty that has arisen, when I say that "the elective system, if carried out on politically impartial lines, ought to bring very much better returns for the money spent". It has not been carried out on such impartial lines. Coaker's notorious circular made the election of Road Boards a purely party question. I have before me at this minute a report of a case in which certain Union Council members were the only persons present at a meeting called to elect a Road Board, and thy elected themselves. In a letter just to hand I find the following reference to a person. whose name I cannot give:-"He is a good reliable man; he was Chairman of the Road Board until two years ago. when the Union men got orders to vote in a Union Road Board. Had we known it at the time of the meeting. they would never have got there, as we are in the majority." This is only one of hundreds of intances of the same kind.

As I have said before, I now repeat that elective Road Boards where Coakerism prevails are a delusion and a snare, being nothing more or less than the expression of Boss Coaker's rule. 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
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
