

Two Girls Arrested.

On Suspicion of Being Implicated in Killing of Macedonian.

TORONTO, April 21.—One man and two girls, who are believed to have knowledge of events which led up to the murder and burial of Ramoden Hassan, the man whose body was exhumed from the cellar of the house at 159 Wolseley Street last Saturday were arrested by the police last night. Genboy Irish, owner of the house where the tragedy occurred, is being held as a material witness, while Evelyn Casqunett of Gould Street and Cecil la Casqunett of King Street East, were arrested by Detective Serreants Mulholland and Levitt in Ahmid Adosey's restaurant, corner of King and Widmer Streets.

The two girls, who are aged 19 and 20, respectively are cousins. It is stated that they were overheard in the restaurant discussing the murder and making statements as to the manner in which it was committed. The girls are alleged to have made the statement that the wound found on Hassan's cheek was caused by an axe, and that the body had been carried to the cellar in a blanket.

They deny any knowledge of the rime, however, and claim that they were merely discussing the probable reapons used and the means by which the body had been moved.

The Secretary, Nfld Board of Trade, St. John's, Newfoundland Dear Sir,-I am in receipt of your favor of March 24th, including list of imports by Montreal boats 1919, and note that the second trip of the "Canadian Adventurer" to St. John's last season is listed from Montreal, while the trip was from Charlottetown, and

ped from this port. With reference to a regular line of steamers from Montreal, Maritime Ports and St. John's, carrying freight and passengers, the service which will be carried on this present season does not include Montreal as a port of call, the service being from Charlottetown to St. John's, via Sydney, and direct from St. John's to Charlottetown. In this way it will be possible for Newfoundland exporters to route shipments via Charlottetown and get a quicker service to points in Eastern Canada with the exception of the South Coast of Nova Scotia, than would be possible by any other route It will also mean that shipments for Newfoundland coming from any point west of Moncton, New Brunswick, by rail, can be routed via this port, and so save the long tie-up which usually occurs at North Sydney, as the steamer will load all freight offering at Charlottetown and then proceed North Sydney or Sydney to complete

This Board of Trade will appreciate it if you will call the attention of your members to these facts, and assure of all creeds of the Empire in you that anything possible will be done at Charlottetown to expedite shipments, both imports and exports.

Dear Sir,-In your issue of yesterday you published a statement on the authority of one, conversant with the facts wherein it is stated that 300,000 quintals of old fish are in the country to-day. In that statement it is claimed that three harbors in Bay de Verde District hold 30,000 quintals, Port Union and Bonavista 20,000 quintals, South Shore 20,000 Placentia Bay 25,-000, Green Bay 70,000, St. John's 75,-000 and the West Coast 50,000.

I venture to assert that the figures quoted are about double the quantity. The West Coast and Placentia Bay do not hold 40,000 qtls. St. John's does not hold over 60,000 qtls. Port Union has not 1,000 qtls. Green Bay does not hold 20,000 qtls.; nor are then 20,000 qtls. in Bay de Verde.



her regretted that part of the speech of Hon. Mr. Bishop was inaudible to him. He challenged the statement that only one section of the speech was debated. He assumed that the House was a deliberative body and not a body for slinging straws. He requested Hon. Mr. Bishop to procure the statement as made by Sir John Crosbie. The merchants are not supplying as heretofore and this is due to mistrust engendered by the throwing overboard of the law of supply and demand and substituting arbitary prices.

Hon. Mr. Winter in opening his renarks did not agree with all Hon. Mr. Bishop had said re Sir John Crobie's speech. In reviewing the meetings at the Board of Trade Rooms, he said: These meetings were held continuously for three days and the situation debated fully." His understanding of Sir John's speech was that if he sold 60 out of 100 thousand otls, of codfish. he could afford to sell the balance at cost. The Government had made one mistake when making the Regulations, as they should have invited all the trade to participate in the deliberations. It was unfortunate that it did ot do so, and this he thought was e cause of much resentment.

Hon. Mr. Grieve explaining the loss of between 2 and 3 million dollars due in a great measure to the Regulations said, that a fair estimate of the loss on fish already in the foreign markets would be about \$5 per qtl. which would on the 300,000 qtls. there amount to a million and a half of dollars and the loss on what is still in the country would make up the balance.

The debate on the Speech from the Throne was then concluded. The address in reply passed and will be forwarded to His Excellency.

The Danger of Paper Currency.

The financial conditions of to-day are remarkably similar to those of a century ago, although they are now on a vastly greater scale. During the Napoleonic war Pitt was forced to pass legislation which substituted an inconvertible paper currency for one which was based on actual cash. This step was doubtless as necessary as the similar enactments made in 1914. But in both cases the effect was to make the nominal value greater than the real, and as the Government was enabled to issue an unlimited number of notes, the currency was considerably depreciated. The natural results were a rise in the market price of gold, a loss on foreign exchanges and a very general rise in prices. The nation was lulled into a false prosperity, and in the early years of the nine teenth century there was much opposition to any alteration of the debased currency. Francis Horner, a scientific economist, was instrumental in securing the appointment of a Committee, which reported in favour of cash payments being resumed, but their recommendations were vetoed by the House of Commons at the instigation of Vansittart, whose later record as Chancellor of the Exchequer was the reverse of brilliant. It was ont till some years later that a reformed currency was achieved by the sagacity of Sir Robert Peel, who re-established on May 1, 1821, a single uniform metallic standard. The leading financial authorities of to-day are also recognising the importance of a gradual reduction in the issue of Treasury notes, and a need for a return to the sounder methods which prevailed before the war.

United States' Cheap Victory.

On Sunday, May 1, 1898, the navy of the United States won, without any loss of life to themselves a battle against the Spaniards off Manila, a fortified City, which had been since 1571 the capital of the possessions of Spain in the Phillipine Islands, in the Malay Archipelago. The islands thus became a colony of the United States, with an area of 121,395 sq. miles, whose inhabitants numbered 6,987,686, and of whom only 647,740 are wild and uncivilised. The Spanish squadron, commanded by Admiral Montojo, consisted of eleven ships, and the Spaniards showed great courage; none of them surrendered, but their vessels were inefficient, and their defenders were also in other respects. Many Spanish ships were destroyed while others ran ashore to escape capture. The American fleet, commanded by Commodore Dewey, consisted of only nine ships, and while 400 Spaniards were killed, and 600 others wounded, not a single Ameri-can lost his life, nor was even wound-

LADY ASTOR CLAIMS M.P.'s CHAIR.

He told the Speaker that long correspondence had been ex-changed between himself and Lady stor about the seat.


He afterwards told me he did not propose publishing the correspondence, but wanted it known that he had offered to permit Lady Astor to speak from the seat whenever she desired.

Asked her side of the story, Lady Astor said:



At the City Hall.

The regular weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held on Thursday. The Mayor presided and there were present Councillors Ayre, Mullaly and Martin.

After the opening business of the meeting, it was ordered that in the case of owners of new cars, who wanted registration during the past month, the following should be their obligation—Dating from the 1st of March last owners of new motor cars, shall be allowed to pay one fourth of the annual Tax, and shall be liable for the full annual Tax on June 1st. Arising cut of this, it is proposed for next year, that registration for cars shall be on the 1st of April instead of on 1st of June.

The Eastern Trust Co. made application for the street line of Rossiter's lane. Referred to the City Engineer.

The matter of the claims for sewerage construction and repairs, agsinst Robinson and Co., Ltd., and Dr. Rendell, it was ordered, that without prejudice half the cost be accented.

W. W. Blackall, for the Engineering School, asked for a service pipe for the next six or seven months. It will be given, provided an iron pipe is put down at his expense for the summer months only, with the clear understanding there is to be no waste.

A letter was read from the Public Works Department in connection with the removal of ashes from the various public buildings. It was shown on inquiry that quite an accumulation of ashes had taken place at some of these institutions. It was also discovered that \$15.00 per annum for the romoval of ashes is too little. The charge, henceforth, will be \$35.00. The Dept. will be treated with on this basis as soon as they have removed the accumulation.

A. W. O'Rielly applied for repairs to be done to the breastwork near his residence Water Street West. Decided to ask him for original lease and title deeds of ground, and the Solicitor to look up the question of grants in these cases.
