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Another Conflict Imminent.

Vaudeville D'Annunzio Declares War on Italy--Will Use Captured British Steamer as Transport--House of Lords Dealing With Home Rule Bill--Ireland's Casualty Statistics--Hon. R. A. Squires Gives Another Interview.

D'ANNUNZIO DECLARES WAR.
LONDON, Dec. 1. Gabriel D'Annunzio, in command of the insurgents at Fiume, has declared war on Italy, according to a Milan despatch to the London Times. State of war will begin Friday.

D'ANNUNZIO HOLDS STEAMER.
TRIESTE, Dec. 1. The British steamer Narenta, which was captured yesterday by D'Annunzio, at Ardiil, near Pola, has been ordered to be taken to Fiume. The steamer which is loaded with flour and fodder, will be put into service by D'Annunzio for conveyance of troops and ammunition to the island of Veglia.

HOME RULE BILL IN LORDS.
LONDON, Dec. 1. There appeared to be a prospect to-day that the Irish Home Rule Bill would go through the committee stage in the House of Lords without serious amendment. The Lords to-day rejected Lord Middleton's amendment, which would have had the effect of creating one Parliament for Southern Ireland and leaving the six Ulster counties under the Imperial Parliament. The Government resisted the amendment on the ground that it struck at the whole framework of the bill and the amendment was defeated.

THE IRISH TRAGEDY.
LONDON, Dec. 1. Persons to the number of 673 have been killed or wounded in Ireland up to November twenty-seventh of the present year by anti-government elements according to a statement issued to-day by the Home Office. The deaths do not include twenty persons killed in Londonderry and sixty in Belfast during the summer rioting, nor fifteen cadets killed in the Kilmichael ambush on Sunday night. The statement says that 151 policemen have been killed and 230 wounded. Civilians to the number of 41 have been killed and 100 wounded, sixty-seven courthouses have been destroyed and five hundred police barracks have been destroyed and one hundred and fifty damaged.

CONTINUE SEARCHES.
LONDON, Dec. 1. Operatives of Scotland Yard who are dealing with the Sinn Fein organization in London, continued to-day active searching of residences and business houses in various parts of the city. Searches were carried on mostly in the southwest portion of the city, which is largely a residential district for the middle classes.

BRITAIN ON TOP.
LONDON, Dec. 1. Earl Derby, retiring British ambassador to France, speaking at Liverpool said, "Don't make any mistake, Great Britain is bang at the top of the tree abroad."

BANK ROBBERY IN LONDON, ONT.
LONDON, Ont., Dec. 1. London experienced its first bank robbery when armed and masked bandits held up the South London branch of the Merchants Bank this afternoon. The thieves secured seven hundred dollars and made their escape in high-powered motor car.

MONTREAL, Dec. 1. H. R. A. Squires, Premier of Newfoundland, interviewed here to-day stated that while in England in relation to the Labrador-Quebec boundary dispute, he took opportunity of visiting Italy with a view to promoting fish trade between that country and Newfoundland. In England, too, he discussed transportation problems with Sir George Foster and Hon. Dr. Reid, Minister of Railways for Canada. He also took up immigration questions with agencies in London. Squires is due back in St. John's next Monday.

THE DAILY TOLL.
CORK, Dec. 1. It is reported this afternoon that two men were shot dead and four arrested in Macroom District. Macroom is in a state of siege and no traffic is allowed except for food distribution.

WILL FORCE RETAILERS TO REDUCE.
NEW YORK, Dec. 1. A campaign to compel the retailers to reduce food prices, is about to be instituted by the State Department of markets, says the Deputy Commissioner, Mrs. Louis Weizsäcker, declaring that retailers have not cut prices commensurate with the drop in the wholesale trade.

ROW OVER HOHENZOLLERN PROPERTY.
BERLIN, Dec. 1. There were disorderly scenes in the Cabinet when a motion was introduced to transfer the property of the Hohenzollerns to the state, making provision for an income for members of the former reigning family.

A \$25,000 FIRE.
NEW YORK, Dec. 1. A fire which destroyed a motion picture study in the heart of the theatrical district, threw Times Square into confusion at one o'clock this afternoon. The damage is estimated at twenty-five thousand dollars.

DRAFTING REPLY TO WILSON.
GENEVA, Dec. 1. A letter to President Wilson, accepting his offer to act as mediator in the Armenian situation, was being drafted by the Council this morning.

DEBATES NEWSPRINT MANUFACTURERS.
TORONTO, Dec. 1. At a sitting of the Tariff Commission under Sir Henry Drayton here this afternoon, W. F. MacLean, M.P., publisher of the World, made an attack on the newsprint manufacturers, who, he said, were operating under the protection of the Canadian tariff and selling their product to the United States. Four Liberal candidates in Vancouver appear at this hour to be leading, with Conservative candidates holding a strong vote. In Victoria, three Liberals and one Conservative are leading and Dr. Ross, Conservative, is elected in Nelson.

BUILDING COLLAPSED.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.
 A nine story apartment building, at Broadway and fifty-second street, collapsed late yesterday afternoon, burying seven people beneath the wreckage. At least one person is believed to have been killed, and three injured in the wreckage, which covered the sidewalk in places to a depth of six feet.

GOVT. DEFEATED IN LORDS.

LONDON, Dec. 2.
 The government sustained defeat in the House of Lords last night, when an amendment to the Irish Home Rule Bill, submitted by Baron Oranmore and Brown, providing for the establishment of a Senate in Southern Ireland was carried against the Government by a vote of one hundred and twenty to thirty-six. The explained object of the amendment is to safeguard minority of Southern Unionists.

All Is Not Coal That Is Black.

It now transpires that the coal boring operations of the Government being carried on in the Grand Lake areas has, like everything else that they have undertaken, gone contrary wise. The seam of coal discovered at a depth of some 450 ft. and which the Advocate announced was a wonderful discovery which would supply millions of tons of coal, has now, we learn, been one of the worst in the whole area, showing about 32% ash. The seam itself is not nearly up to expectations. It is said that the Government intends to develop this area upon the return of Mr. Pitt next spring, the operations being conducted on a Royalty basis. The reports of all the Geologists and mining men show that coal in commercial quantities can be mined at St. Georges. Why the Government fell down on the proposal to develop this property would make interesting reading. The public are anxious to know if there has been a nigger in the woodpile.

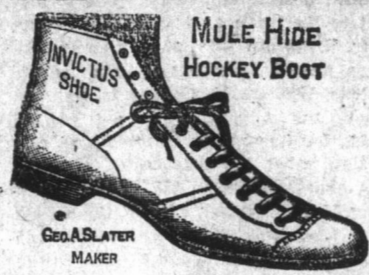

Side Talks by Ruth Cameron

THE THROW-THROW-IN-THE-WASTE-BASKET GESTURE.

Do you read reports, and catalogues, and booklets, and things of that sort? I don't suppose there is one of us to whose desk or breakfast table, the postman does not bring things of this nature from day to day. Your insurance company sends you its annual statement and information about some new policy; the various charities to which you subscribe send you descriptions of their activities and statements of the way their money (and yours) is being spent; interesting booklets describing processes of manufacture or the uses of some product, reach you from various quarters, your bookstore sends you a monthly chat upon books and authors.

Now what do you do with all these? Do you pitch them headlong into the waste basket because you feel that they are forms of advertising, and turn to your magazine to read the latest love or adventure story? Or do you take the trouble to glance through them and see what of information and interest they have to offer?

We Like Better to Hear About People Who Don't Exist.

Sometimes, when you stop to think of it, it really is surprising how absorbed we can get in the make-up stories about people who never existed and things that never happened to them, and how little interest comparatively we take in things that do happen, and people who do really exist.

The Mind Needs Some Dry Food. And even when they are dry, what if the mind needs some dry food, doesn't it? That's why many of us get mental weak digestion because

we eat nothing but the predigested and liquid foods of the easiest kind of reading. One of the best informed, most interesting men I know, gets a great deal of his wide background because he reads not just magazines but all kinds and sorts of things. He will often volunteer helpful information because he saw it in a catalogue or a booklet or a report.

The Irish Imbrogllo.

Efforts to find a way out of the Irish imbrogllo, with its daily toll of murder and reprisal, are still being made by the members of the so-called Irish Peace Conference, and the counsellors of the Government are legion. If they are not more or less mutually destructive, they are at best visionary and inconsistent. They range from Lord Gray of Falldon through Lord Morley to Mr. Asquith. Lord Gray proposes that Great Britain should retire from Ireland at the end of two years, leaving the Irish to govern themselves; Lord Morley, of course, convinced that the trouble is due to the refusal of the Government to withdraw the army and police forces; whilst Mr. Asquith makes absolute surrender to Sinn Fein in the name of Dominion Home Rule. In trenchant terms Sir West Ridgeway replies to these varied advocates, and shows how hopeless all these counsels are. Lord Gray would give Ireland what the extremists want, subject to safeguards, which, says Sir West Ridgeway, "would in the eyes of the Irish people emasculate Dominion rule." Mr. Asquith would be prepared to hand over the Army and Navy to the local Government. All ignore Ulster. The Government have a definite scheme by which they stand, as Mr. Lloyd George once again made clear by his speeches in Wales, unless some alternative plan can be devised that shall not leave Great Britain at the mercy of Sinn Fein. Dominion Home Rule in the full sense is impossible, for the same reason that the Americans imposed limitations on Cuba. Mr. Cox, the democratic candidate for the Pres-

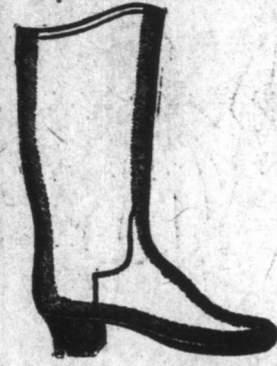

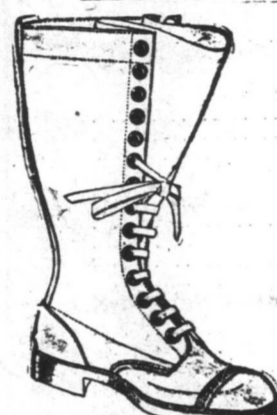

Not a Religious Issue.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—It is deeply to be regretted that many of our people in Newfoundland still cling to the delusion that the Irish difficulty is a religious issue at bottom, and it reflects little credit upon our educational development; but it is a fact, none the less, and one which must be faced. All the facts of history disprove this contention, and it is further disproved by conditions existing in Ireland to-day.

Those who were fortunate enough to hear Mr. Lindsay Crawford last week must have had this illusion dispelled, if they entertained it. He devoted himself especially to the religious aspect of the question, and applied all his profound knowledge of history and his intimate personal acquaintance with present-day Irish conditions to demonstrating that the issue was fundamentally economic and political, but not religious. From one of Mr. Crawford's origin and training such a statement carries a weight far greater than anything we could say, and we do not propose to advance an argument on the point, but for the benefit of those who did not have the opportunity of hearing Mr. Crawford we shall give the names of a few out of the thousands of the reformed faith who have been whole-hearted workers in the Irish national cause.

We shall first quote a couple of opinions. Mr. Francis Hackett, a Protestant Irishman, now associate editor of the 'New Republic' of New York, has this to say of the religious element in the Ulster difficulty: "In the North of Ireland the religious situation is kept alive by employers anxious to prevent the unionizing of labor. Every sermon is a political harangue. . . . The whole fight of Sir Edward Carson and his followers is to keep the religious issue alive." And, just to show that even British statesmen do not always believe in these misrepresentations, here is an excerpt from an interview with Sir Auckland Geddes in the 'New York World' of March 22nd last: "Sir Auckland Geddes declared that he had never taken the position that the Irish question was a religious one, but that on the contrary, he viewed it as a purely political issue."

If the Irish national movement were in any sense a Catholic movement we might expect to find the line of creed everywhere sharply drawn on the issue. This is far from being the case. A fairly large and very influential section of the Roman Catholics of England, typified by the Earl of Denbigh and the late Duke of Norfolk, has always been implacably hostile to Irish aspirations. On the other hand, from the days of Lucas and Molyneux to the present day, Protestants have played an honorable and prominent part in the national movement.

The first rally that awoke the Irish nation from the fifty years' coma which had followed the capitulation of Limerick, was sounded by two Protestants—William Molyneux and Jonathan Swift. Lucas carried on the fight until Flood and Grattan appeared on the scene. These in conjunction with Charlemont of Volunteer fame, Hussey Burgh, Ponsonby, Hutchinson, Lord Moira and many more, conducted and won the fight for legislative independence which was achieved in 1782. Up to this time the national movement was solely in the hands of Protestants. The newer faith and its adherents played as large a part in the formation of the United Irishmen, whose founder, Theobald Wolfe Tone, was of its communion. Of its leaders, the Rev. William Jackson, Lord Edward Fitzgerald, Oliver Bond, Bartholomew Teeling, Matthew Tone, William Orr, Thomas Addis Emmet, Thomas Russell, Henry Joy MacCracken—who led the fighting in Antrim—the brothers Sheares, Robert Emmet, Napper Tandy, Hamilton Rowan, Henry Monroe, Anthony Perry, Samuel Neilson, Dr. MacNevin and Arthur O'Connor were Protestant. This was the first republican movement in Ireland.

The second was the Young Ireland movement which culminated in 1848. Ours heads only Duffy and Meagher were Catholics. Davis—the inspiration of the whole party—Smith O'Brien—its actual leader in the field; John Mitchell and John Martin were all Protestants. The Constitutionalist Home Rule movement was founded by an Ulster Protestant, Isaac Butt, and continued by John Shaw and Charles Stewart Parnell, of the same faith. A few of its more prominent supporters of that faith were J. G. Biggar, Dr. Tanner, J. G. Swift-MacNeill and later Stephen Gwynn, Arthur Lynch and R. Hazleton. In the Cabinet of the present Dail Eireann are Ernest Blythe, Robert Barton and the Countess Markievicz.

If we leave political leaders for the moment we shall find the same testimony in other walks of life. Rev. Francis Morgan, Dean, D.D., M.A., Trinity College, Dublin, forty years a clergyman of the Church of Ireland, has both spoken and written in support of the Nationalist cause. So has Rev. J. A. H. Irwin, D.D., Presbyterian Minister of Killead, near Belfast, who recently completed a tour of Canada and the United States in which he advocated Ireland's right to self-determination. In the United States there exists a powerful organization known as the Protestant Friends of Ireland, of which an Episcopalian minister, Rev. James G. Mythen, D.D., is organizing secretary. Among its members are Rt. Rev. Frederick E. J. Lloyd, formerly Episcopal Bishop of Oregon, Rev. John Washington, D.D., Rev. Owen R. Lovelock, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and Rev. Norman Thomas, a Presbyterian minister, Professor Arthur Upham Pope and Mr. Lindsay Crawford, who was here last week, are amongst the lay members of its executive.

We could go on indefinitely citing the names of prominent Protestants who have definitely aligned themselves with Irish national aspirations, but we feel that enough has been said to prove to any reasoning man the emptiness of the contention that the issue here is a religious one. To show the spirit of the Ireland of to-day on this issue we shall close with a quotation from Mr. de Valera's address to a meeting of the Protestant Friends of Ireland, as reported in the 'New York Times': "If Sir Edward Carson announced a desire to head the Irish people in their fight for independence, the whole Irish people would get behind him, or any other Irishman no matter what his faith."

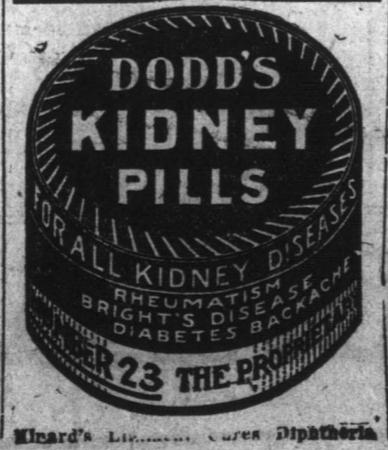

New Grave for Highland Mary.

The ashes of Burns' Highland Mary were re-interred in Greenock cemetery, on November 13. Mary Campbell, the Highland girl whom the poet loved, was buried in Greenock old West Kirk burying ground, but the old church is being removed, and the burying ground taken in as part of large extensions which the well-known firm of Harland & Wolff are making to their shipyard on the lower reaches of the Clyde. The love of Burns for Highland Mary was the deepest emotion in the poet's life. She inspired his sweetest and saddest song, "To Mary in Heaven." Mary Campbell was born at Campbellton in Argyshire. Burns met her when she was a dairymaid in the service of Colonel Montgomery of Collisford, Ayrshire. They fell deeply in love with each other and became engaged to be married. It was arranged that Mary should return to her home to prepare for the union, but before parting they met on the banks of the Ayr and solemnly plighted their troth. Standing on either side of the little stream and holding a Bible between them, they exchanged vows of eternal fidelity. Mary presented the poet with her Bible and he gave his in exchange. The lovers never met again. Mary after spending some time at home, paid a visit to her uncle, Peter Macpherson, ship carpenter, in Greenock. There, while nursing her brother, she contracted a fever and died in October, 1786. Admirers of the poet erected a monument over her grave in the old burying ground in 1842, and this monument has also been removed to the new grave in Greenock cemetery.

Bishops and Palaces.
No sooner has the Bishop of Lichfield announced his decision to leave his Palace than the Bishop of Durham is reported to be on the lookout for a smaller residence than Auckland Castle. Our Bishops are only doing though for different reasons, what Bishop Fraser did when he was appointed to Manchester half a century ago. He absolutely refused to go into the Diocese if it meant living in a palace. The authorities said that a palace was essential, but as the bishop was determined they gave way.

The same thing happened to Dr. Gore when he refused to live in Hartlebury Castle, but he won, too, and lived in an ordinary house in Worcester. At Birmingham he lived in a plain house—Bishop's Croft, that is, Bishop's small holding. And it is a remarkable commentary on the life of these two Bishops who stood for simplicity that they are the only two Bishops whose statues stand in the streets of the great cities of England—Fraser in Manchester and Gore in Birmingham—London Morning Post.

India Greet the King-Emperor.

On December 2, 1911, King George V, landed from the "Medina," at Bombay, as the western sun bathed the beautiful harbour in a softened radiance amid such surroundings as were worthy of the first coming of a great monarch. His great white launch swept through the British fleet amid the thunder of one hundred and one guns; and at the stroke of four o'clock the King-Emperor set foot on his Indian Empire and walked with the Queen Empress to the canopied dais where stood the golden thrones of pure Indian design facing an amphitheatre filled with His Majesty's loyal subjects of the east and west sitting with expectant faces and dressed in costumes of every hue; while the lofty buildings beyond were crowded by Parsees, Hindoos and Mahomedans. Their Majesties were presented with a loyal address of welcome by the Corporation of Bombay, to which the King replied in a brief speech. After this their Majesties drove through the city, receiving a splendid welcome from vast crowds of all castes and creeds. The procession, which was purely military and most imposing, and was a mile long—loud cheering, Apollo Bunder, amid the flourish of the culminating of an ovation from the occupants of the amphitheatre. Their Majesties then embarked on a Royal barge and returned to the "Medina" at sunset amid the white haze of saluting guns.

Poultry Show Opens.

The Newfoundland Poultry Association's Eighth Annual Show was officially opened at 8 o'clock last night. The exhibition was opened by a short address from the President, Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, C.M.G., who gave the gathering present a synopsis of the work of the Association during the past few years of its existence. Referring to the year 1920 he announced that some 3,000 eggs for hatching were distributed over the Island, besides a large number of pure bred birds for breeding stock. One of their efforts also was to pioneer the organization of a sister Association at Wabana, Bell Island, who held their first show in October which was a complete success. This Association had now in the St. John's show at the C. L. B. Armoury, birds competing successfully—in fact they have won the Arthur Hiscock Silver Cup for Pekin Ducks, besides winning several prizes in Brown Leghorns and Black Minorcas. They also show six breeding pens of Rhode Island Reds, White Plymouth Rock and Barr's Plymouth Rocks, which will furnish the hatching eggs for Bell Island in 1921. President LeMessurier then asked His Excellency the Governor to formally open the Show which he did in a very happy speech and said it gave him a great deal of pleasure to do so. There was a big attendance of visitors during the day including Sir Joseph and Lady Outerbridge, Hon. Dr. Campbell, Minister of Agriculture and Mines; Secretary A. J. Bayly, Lady Bowring, Hon. M. G. Winter, Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Reid, Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Reid, Mr. and Mrs. Angus Reid, Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Job, F. W. Ayre, Esq., Mr. and Mrs. C. Ayre, Mayor and Mrs. Goelling and others including Mr. and Mrs. Angus McDonald, Secretary J. T. Lawton, Mr. and Mrs. Morey and Mr. Petrie of the Bell Island Poultry Association. The Judge, Mr. Edison C. Griffin of Port Williams, King's County, N.S., who came here specially for the purpose of making the awards through the courtesy of Professor J. P. Landry, gave general satisfaction. He returns home to-day having had a pleasant visit to Newfoundland and speaks encouragingly of the Exhibition. There is a fine show of pets for the children consisting of Guinea pigs by J. A. McDonald of Brasill's Field, Rabbits of all colors by Mr. W. R. Butler and Belgian Hares and Flemish Giants. The exhibits of flowers are certainly magnificent. The Valley Nurseries, Ltd., have a neat show of beautiful blooms—Crysanthemums artistically shown, and have carried off the Association Cup and Blue Ribbon for the best exhibit. Second place has been awarded to R. G. Reid, Esq., of Avalon for his splendid show of Priculas, Fuchsias, Ferns, Hydrangeas, Abutilons, Chrysanthemums and Calla Lilies, who wins the Red Ribbon. Third place is won by Mr. J. McNeil for his fine show of Carnations, Chrysanthemums, Narcissus, Roman Hyacinths, Tulips and Sweet Peas. It was won on points for artistic display, bloom, arrangement of colours and effect. In the latter professional skill largely entered. The White Ribbon of the Association goes to Mr. McNeil. A big feature was the screen foot-roaster of Messrs. Harvey & Co., advertising Bone meal and Fish Meal, and we congratulate Mr. C. Noonan and Mr. William White on their booth, whose product is all sold out for 1920. The Model Poultry House erected by Mr. W. R. Butler, Nid's Poultry King, is an attraction. Occupying the Poultry mansion are ten buff orpington pullets and ten Rhode Island Reds, with all their various appliances and feeds and which are enjoying the benefit of an electric lighted house. Another feature was the fine lot of guinea fowl—quite curiosities shown by Mr. Geoffrey Goodridge, son of Lt.-Col. Goodridge, commanding the C.L.B. Cadets and which are prize winners. The prize list is not completed but our columns will have the official judges report for to-morrow. That there is an increasing interest in raising pure bred poultry can easily be seen by a visit to the Poultry Men's Show at the C.L.B. Armoury which will be open from 10 a.m. to 10.30 p.m. to-day and Friday. The prizes will be presented on Friday night at 9 o'clock by Lady Harris. Another feature of the show is the exhibition of brown shelled eggs from hens owned by Mr. W. R. Butler who wins first prize for hen's eggs whilst Mr. G. R. Williams wins first prize on White Shelled Eggs laid from his White Leghorn Pullets only hatched last May.

Child Seriously Hurt.

A seven-year-old girl named Porter was run over by a horse on Pleasant Street, and was badly injured. It was later discovered that a party named Wholan riding along the street on horseback knocked the child down and passed on without making enquiries probably being unaware of the accident. The youngster was picked up by a passer by and taken to her parents' home where she was attended by Doctor Roberts. One of her wrists was found to be broken and she was badly bruised about the legs and body. Doctor Roberts ordered the little one to the hospital where she was taken later in the afternoon in the ambulance.

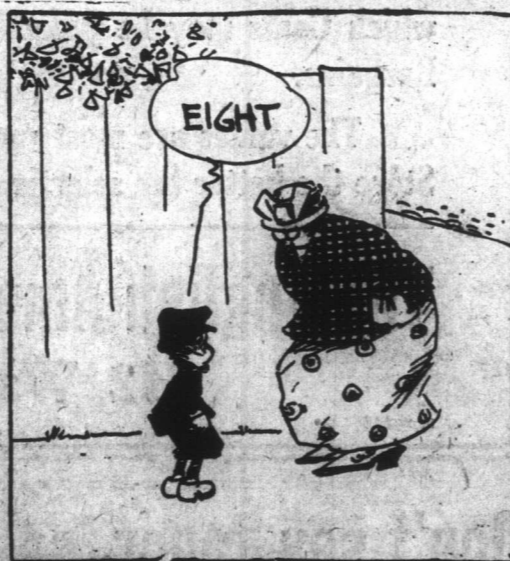
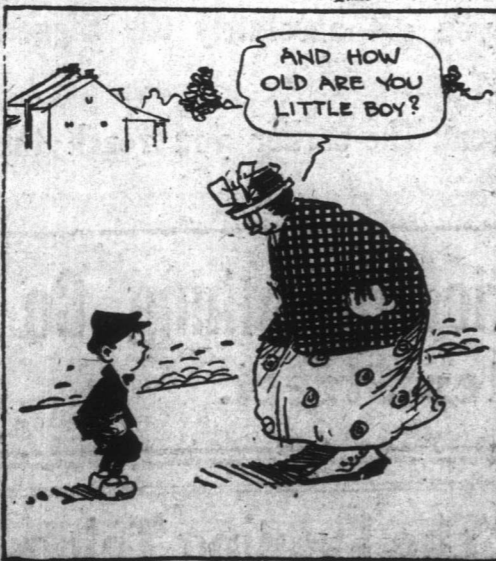

Middle Classes Form Unions.

Middle class trade-unionism in England has suddenly startled the public by the boldest and the most daring ultimatum to employers that has ever been pronounced by clerical labor. A veritable army of men and women who claim to be the most oppressed and the hardest-driven and under-paid class of workers have come out openly in favor of supporting the Insurance Clerks' Trade Union, now engaged in a strike to test their right to join unions. All other brain-workers' unions, known in London as "The Black-coated and Pen-pushers' Guilds," have declared war on their employers for recent dismissals of those adhering to unionism, and they will call a general strike, if necessary, to vindicate the right of brain workers to combine for mutual protection. Besides exchange and bank clerks, shipping clerks, accountants and lawyers' clerks and secretaries and railway clerks, there is also a legion of State employees. In fact, the entire civil service is a part of the "Black-coated" movement. Not only are the employers and State officials surprised at the outburst from this army usually labeled "The faithful," but organized labor itself is gaping in wonderment at such a display of independence among a class of workers which they had always considered in the words of one of their leaders, a gang of renegade slaves. Professional workers, who are in the process of achieving great results in their efforts, are watching the black-coats—their next-of-kin—in their present demonstration with intense interest and a good deal of solicitude.

Imprisoned in Coffins.

The most terrible prison in the world is Urga, Mongolia. It consists of a triple stockade enclosing a number of underground dungeons which are pitch dark and almost devoid of ventilation. But this is not all. The wretched prisoners condemned to inhabit them are shut up separately in heavy, iron-clamped chests, in shape resembling coffins. There is a small hole in the side of each, just big enough for the poor wretch inside to thrust out his head or his manacled hands. They see daylight for but a few minutes daily, when their food is thrust into their box-prisons through the hole. They can not lie down flat, they can not sit, for they are not only manacled but chained to the coffins. The majority are in for life sentences, and no prisoner is ever allowed out of his box under any circumstances, except when he is to be executed or, as happens very rarely, to be set free.

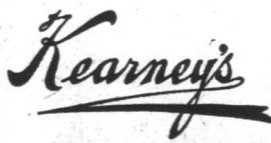
