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





Cargo Ship on Fire. BLAZE DISCOVERED IN HOLD OF

S.S. CANADIAN GUNNER. S.S. Canadian Gunner which arrived in port on Friday with a general cargo was discovered to be on fire Saturday evening. The ship had hauled to the dock premises to land a rudder for S.S. Canadian Seigneur, when, at 4 p.m., smoke was noticed issuing from No. 2 hold, the bunker hatch and from the ventilators. The firemen were called to the scene, and in the meantime a stream was forced into the compartment where the blaze was supposed to be. After about two hours work it was decided to berth the ship at the Furness Withy pier, where the burning cargo could be discharged. After tying up to the Furness wharf, a large number of 'longshoremen were put to work removing cargo, and a couple of streams connected up from Water Street. The seat of fire appeared in the cross bunker, where there was some 60 tons of coal, and a large quantity of hay. In No. 2 hold besides a large quantity of flour and oats, there were several hundred bundles of hay. The 'longshoremen worked in relays removing the burning cargo, the work proceeding without interruption, although very difficult owing to the smoke and steam. Some of the burning bundles of hay were dumped overboard and a large quantity which was only damaged by water was landed and piled in the Furness yard. The firemen have a very diffcult task, as it is the desire of the managers of the ship that the hold be not flooded, in the hope of saving the cargo in the other parts of the ship. Inspector General Hutchings is directing the work, and yesterday made four or five visits to the scene. How the fire originated is not known as everything appeared all right when the ship arrived in port on Friday. It is thought that the blaze will be under control this evenng. Passing onward toward Europe it is augmented in vol-ime by a part of the north equatorial urrent that sweeps along outside the West Indian Islands and the Bahamas, and while this current is slow in movement in comparison to the gulf stream itself, it doubtless carries a much greater number of heat units to help varm up northern Europe.

"The Gulf stream, or rather the ombined flow mentioned above, livides as it meets the resistance of astern continent, one branch lowing south along the African coast, while the other proceeds northward into the Arctic toward Spitzbergen and Franz Joseph Land.

"It is difficult for the mind to grasp the immensity of this great ocean river. The straits of Florida at its narrowest point is about 40 miles wide, and observations here numbered between 3000 and 4000, surface and subsurface. A calculation of the average volume of water passing in one hour gives the enormous sum of 90,000,-000,000 tons. If this one single hour's flow of water could be evaporated, the remaining salts would require many world to carry it.

Easter Island Vanishes.

Easter Island, tiny land of mystery far out in the southeast Pacific, has sunk into the sea with its few hundred Kanaka inhabitants, as a result of the recent earthquake off Chile, according ing the earthquake.

The little dot in the South Seas, an island with an area of only 55 square miles and of volcanic origin, did not answer repeated radio calls immedlately after the earthquake. Because of the fact that the island originally thrown up in lava formation from out the sea, it is feared it retreated back into the water whence it came, and by the same agency. On the other hand, chicks natched when there is no moon are often more weakly and do not make such strong and vigorous fowls, nor re they such good egglavers.

Nicholas Elected Successor to Czar

The Supreme Council of Russian Monarchists, representing all that is left of the movement in favor of the return to the Czardom in Russia, has just completed a five-day secret session in Paris, during which Grand Duke Nicholas, former Commander-in-Chief of the Russian army, was elected successor to the Throne of the late Czar Nicholas. It was also decided immediately to remove the headquarters of the Russian Monarchists' organization from Berlin to Paris. Sixty prominent Russians, including Grand Dukes Cyril, Nicholas, Dimitri and Alexander, attended the meeting, coming from all parts of Europe for the purpose. The council was held sooner than expected because of the recent announcement by Grand Duke Cyril that he was the logical heir to the Romanoff Throne. Cyril and Dimitri were considered for the honor by the Council, but Nicholas received 55 of the 60 votes. Alexander Trepoff, who was once Premier under the old regime, was elected President of the

Irishmen Want the s.s. Rosalind

"Stone of Destiny." JACOB'S PILLOW USED IN CORONA-TION OF ALL RRITISH KINGS.

Dublin, Nov. 6 .- Among many aniques now in England which Irishman say should be restored to Ireland by virtue of her new status, is the 'Stone of Destiny" in Westminster Abbey, upon which every English king Edward I. was crowned. While since Edward I. was crowned. While Irish antiquarians are not unanimous point, one school holds that this stone is the original "Lia Fail" from the hill of Tara, the ancient seat

of the Irish kings. According to one English tradition the stone was carried to Ireland from Bethel as "Jacob's Pillow," upon which Jacob slept when he dreamed. In Ireland it became the pillow of St. Columba at Iono, was removed to Scone, Scotland, by Kenneth II. in the ninth century, and then to Westminster by Edward I.

Some antiquarians dispute this however, alleging that the stone was brought to Ireland by Tuathe do Denann and his colony from Germany, and subsequently placed upon the hill of Tara. The stone was supposed to have supernatural powers, making a creaking noise when a legitimate king was being crowned, but maintaining a stony silence when a usurper sat up-

The Irish high kings who sat upon during the Tuathe de Denann colony, came to Ireland about 1896 B.C.; and the stone, according to this legend, remained till the fifth century A.D., and when Fergus Macero, then the high king left Tara on a conquering expedition he bore the stone away to Scone for his coronation Edward is said to have taken it away in the thirteenth century. HAS NOT RECOVERED FROM LAST CONFLAGRATION.

Smyrna burned and the world was startled.

Constantinople is partly burnedbut the world has forgotten about it. 'Traces of the fires that swept Baltimore and Chicago have been obliterated; but not so with disastrous blazes that charred whole sections of the Turkish city which just now is very much a centre of world attention," says a bulletin from the Washington headquarters of the National Geographic Society, based on a communication from Salita Solane.

"The devastating fires that have been working toward the destruction of Constantinople caused the city to be built anew every 50 years, until a law was passed prohibiting the construction of wooden houses on the site of burned ones; in fact, it was provided that no houses at all should be built until the city governmen planned new streets.

"Nothing has been done about

planning, however, and the result is that one-fourth of Stamboul-more than 22,000 houses, burned during the past 12 years-still lies in ashes. Scutari, too, has vast ruined sections So has Peru, on a much smaller scale, When a fire starts in Stamboul it nearly always assumes frightful proportions. In the fire of 1908, 1500 buildings were destroyed; in that of 1911, 2463 houses; the following day an entire Jewish quarter burned; in 1912 an immense area between Sancta Sophia and the Marmora was consumed. The fire of June, 1918, burned 8000 buildings, clearing a space from the Golden Hern through the centre of the city. These fires are enormously destructive because of the narrow streets, wooden houses and volunteer firemen who go to answer


