#### Local and Other Items.

Mr. John Cox is again going on his night patrol.

The rice crop of China is reported abundant.

The notorious Laura Fair has been acquitted of the murder of Col. Crittenden.

The Turkish Government has ordered a large number of rifled guns in the United States.

The stringency in the money market is felt as far east as Halifax. Failures are occurring in consequence, while trade is much depressed in Quebec.

Daily Globe and Mail delivered at customers' houses at 13 cents a week, two weeks for 25 cents at Anderson's bookstore.

Two brakemen were killed on Monday on the Grand Trunk Railroad, one near Iroquois, and the other near Bowmanville. Both occurrences were purely accidental.

A telegram from Rome states that the Pope came out of the precincts of the Vatican on Monday for the first time since the occupation of Rome by the Italian Government.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN WATERDOWN.—On Sunday morning, at 2 o'clock, a fire broke out in Mr. Hiram Broadbent's woollen factory here, which in a short time was all destroyed. Loss, about \$6,000; insurance, about \$9,000.

ARM LOST IN A SAW-MILL.—An accident occurred on Monday morning at the saw-mill of Messrs. Allridge, Waterdown, by which a man named John Ripson lost his arm. It was amputated by Drs. Skinner and Henwood, and he is now doing as well as can be expected.

Extensive damage has been done to vessels of all kinds by the fearful gale which prevailed on Sunday and Monday. The area affected includes all the lakes. The injury done to vessels, the loss of cargoes, and the destruction of timber rafts will entail serious loss on the insurance companies and on private owners.

A demonstration was made in Hyde Park, London, on Monday of railroad employes to the number of 5,000, and resolutions adopted advocating a system of emigration to the United States, as the best means of improving the condition of the workmen.

THE BABY SHOW.—The Show at Markham is being held this week. For the baby show, for which the entries close tomorrow, there are now 27 entries of singles, and one of twins, and three sets of triplets are expected from Scarborough and Toronto.

#### POLICE COURT.

Michael Kelly was arrested and charged with vagrancy. One month in jail at hard labor.

Mary Ann Craiklen and family, indigents, were brought up, but dismissed and sent out of town.

They recently had a hallstom in the Province of Adrianople, which had two thousand sheep, thirty cows, and ten horses, besides causing great injury to the crops and window glass.

### The Wanzer Sewing Machine.

(From the Hamilton Spectator.)

It will be noticed that the Wanzer Sewing Machine Company have not exhibited their machines at the Provincial or Central Exhibitions, or indeed at any of the autumn fairs this year. The reason for this is that the manufacturers actually have not had time to prepare machines for exhibition. They are now working their large establishments to the full extent of its capacity—working at night and day—and yet they cannot fill orders as fast as they come in. They are now putting in a large amount of new machinery, but at present, although they are finishing from one thousand to twelve hundred every week, they cannot supply the demand which flows in upon them from all quarters of the world.

There is not a machine made which is so widely diffused as the Wanzer Sewing Machine. The fur-dressed bellies of St. Petersburg, and the less favored daces of Norway and of Siberia use it; it finds its way into the sacred privacy of Turkish, Egyptian and Persian harems; the almond-eyed beauties of China and Japan join their beautiful silks by its busy needle, even the dusky dames of Africa have learned the secret of its wonderful necromancy; proud senoras of Castile and Lusitania set its light machine in motion, and their daughters in Cuba and Mexico, Peru and Brazil grow enthusiastic over its busy hum—while in France, Germany and Britain, it is amongst the most common of household articles.

The manufactory of the Wanzer Machine is situated on the corner of King and Catharine streets, Hamilton; is about 100 by 150 feet, and four stories in height. On the ground floor are the general office, the private office and the time-keeper's office. Adjoining these are the repairing room and the packing room, whence all orders are shipped. In the back part of the building, on the same floor, are the engine and boiler rooms. A new machine has just been put in, manufactured by Nathan, Benham & Co., of Hartford, Conn., and having Woodruff & Beach's variable cut-off attached. It is of a hundred horse-power and weighs about fifteen tons. The boiler supplies power for this engine and heat for the whole building. The fuel used is coal tar, which is blown into the furnace by a jet of steam, the latter mingling with the tar and aiding combustion.

When the machinery now being introduced is all in, the manufactory will be capable of turning out nearly two thousand machines a week; and even this great capacity will doubtless soon be fully tested, since orders are now coming in at the rate of fifteen hundred a week. As we have indicated, the machines go to all parts of the civilized world, and to many parts that are not civilized. We were shown two orders received on the day of our visit—one from Constantinople the other from Paris. The Wanzer Sewing Machine is daily growing in favor, especially in the Canadian market; but in foreign countries it has not yet superseded the Little Wanzer, the fame of which has gone out to the very ends of the earth.

Mr. Wanzer now superintends the operations of the establishment. It is to his tireless exertions that the Wanzer Sewing Machine owes its enviable position, and we have no doubt he will make it a much greater favorite than it now is before he relaxes his exertions.

### The Governor-General at Niagara Falls.

CLIFTON, Sept. 30.  
To-day, at half-past 12 o'clock, His Excellency the Governor-General drove down from the Government House, Toronto, to the Great Western station at the foot of Yonge street, accompanied by the Countess Dufferin, Lieut.-Governor Howland, Sir C. Hastings Doyle, Col. Fletcher, Lady Harriet Fletcher, Captain Curtis, A. D. C., and Lieut. Conlon, A. D. C. His Excellency was accompanied by the Very Rev. Vicar-General Jamot, met his Excellency at the station, and accompanied him to the falls. The Governor-General bade adieu to Mr. Howland, Capt. Curtis and Mr. McMaster, and took his seat in the car. The train consisted of an engine, two baggage cars, a Wagner car, and the Directors' car. His Excellency took his seat in the saloon of the Director's car. Mr. W. K. Muir, General Superintendent of the G. W. R., met His Excellency at the station, and accompanied him to the falls. The special train which had been provided by the Great Western Railway Company left the Yonge street station, amid the cheers of those assembled, at a quarter to one. No stoppage was made until Hamilton was reached at a quarter past two, when His Excellency was met by Mr. Thos. Brassey, M. P., for Hastings, England, by Mrs. Brassey and party, and by Mr. James Young, M. P. for South Waterloo. During the stay at Hamilton a hot lunch, provided by the Great Western Railway Company, and catered by Mr. Thorpe of Hamilton, was put on board, and it was served up as soon as the train left the station. Hamilton was left about twenty minutes to three, and the train then proceeded straight to Suspension Bridge, the only stoppage being one of a few minutes near Thorpe to allow a three-masted schooner to pass through the lock of the Welland canal. Shortly before four o'clock the train steamed into Suspension Bridge station, where the vice-regal party were met by Col. Barnett, of the 4th Battalion, and Mr. Leggett, Collector of Customs. Three carriages from the Clifton House were in waiting, and their Excellencies and suite were immediately conveyed to that hotel.

They paid a flying visit to the Falls, but will see them more at leisure when they recover from the fatigue of travel. Pere Hyacinthe's example seems likely to be followed by a large number of French priests, who, it is said, intend publicly to renounce their vows of celibacy. The publicity of the renunciation seems to be their chief novelty, for according to one of the clerical papers, the average number of priests marrying is from 30 to 80 a year. It is probable, however, that the priests will have some difficulty in finding ladies to espouse them, as in a celibate suit tried some years ago it was held that a priest's marriage is null and void, or in the words of the decree that "marriage with the church precludes civil marriage."

### THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

(From the Hamilton Spectator.)

#### TROUBLE IN THE OIL REGIONS.

#### A CRISIS IN JAPAN.

Stanley Engaged to Lecture.

Titusville, Pa., Sept. 30.—The oil regions are again at fever heat, every where intense feeling prevails over a movement to suspend the production of oil. From some localities it is reported that violence had been resorted to in carrying out the measure. Well rigs have been burned, engines destroyed by sledge hammers and oil tanks tapped. Some are still strongly holding out against it, but it is thought they will yield, and further violence will be avoided. The effect of this movement is already apparent in the advance of the prices and more action in the market.

Cleveland, O., Sept. 30.—The workmen engaged in clearing away the debris at the lunatic asylum found two bodies. Two others are still missing.

New Haven, Conn., Sept. 30.—A fire broken in Mickerson's lumber yard as id planting mill in Bridgeport to-night, as id before it could be stayed burned to buildings and \$15,000 worth of property.

New York, Oct. 1.—Stanley has closed an engagement with Frederick Rullman, of this city, to deliver one hundred lectures in America for fifty thousand dollars, beginning in November at Steinway Hall.

A Washington despatch reports the reception of Japan advice that a crisis has arrived in public affairs and probably a triumph of the old Japanese party over the reformers, and the end, for the present, of the spread of western civilization in the Empire.

#### Presentation at Everton.

On the evening of Friday, the 27th ult., the Singing Class in connection with the Canada Presbyterian Church, Everton, met at the residence of Mr. Hill, where they were hospitably entertained by Mrs. and Mrs. Hill. After ample justice had been done to all the rich dainties so abundantly provided by the worthy landlady, the class embraced the opportunity of presenting their faithful teacher, Mr. Gunn, on the eve of his departure for College, with a beautiful present in the shape of a writing desk, dressing-case, case and album. Miss Wheeler, in behalf of the Class, read a very appropriate address, to which Mr. Gunn made a feeling and suitable reply. After which Miss Wheeler ably presided at the melodeon, accompanied by Miss Hepburn, who sang a few choice pieces in her own free and happy style. As the "wee sma' hours" advanced the company dismissed by singing, "Shall all meet again;" all feeling highly pleased with the evening's entertainment.

#### Loss of Valuable Emigrants.

From the St. Catharines Times.  
There were a few days ago on a visit to their co-religionists in the County of Waterloo, two gentlemen from a colony in Russia. They belong to the Mennonite religious persuasion, and represent from fifty to sixty thousand people, many of them very wealthy, who purpose colonizing in some portion of America. They do this on account of religious persecutions which are becoming entirely intolerable in the country ruled by the Czar. These two men are sent out by their people to look up a good place to settle in. They have been all through the Western States and took copious notes of the character of the soil and climate, as well as the inducements held out by the different localities. So far as these travellers are concerned, we understand that their own preferences are for Minnesota as they are mostly accustomed to a Northern climate.

Now our object in referring to these men is to show the utter incompetency and inefficiency of our Dominion Immigration Bureau. Had our Government taken the trouble to look after the interests of the whole country instead of spending their time in the vain endeavor to secure the re-election of themselves and their demoralized followers, they might possibly have induced these fifty thousand honest and thrifty immigrants to settle in some of the fertile and inviting portions of the great North-West. So far as we can learn of the relative merits of Minnesota and the Red River Territory, the advantage seems entirely in favor of the latter, but we suppose our baker's dozen at Ottawa has never heard of the intention of a whole Russian colony coming to America. For the sake of getting such a colony, it would be immensely to the advantage of the Dominion not only to make them a free grant, but even hold out other inducements. From conversations with these men we are satisfied that had they got up to our new Province and surrounding territory, they would have selected that in preference to Minnesota, and thus in consequence of being afflicted with a set of sleeping nobodies as rulers, we miss such an excellent chance of getting a colony of the best settlers the world affords. If any of our readers have their doubts as to the superiority of the Mennonites, known in Canada as Pennsylvania Dutch, let them visit the settlements of these people in the counties of Waterloo, Lincoln and York, or any part of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, or other States where they are to be found, and see for themselves. We must say that we are extremely sorry that with all the money that is spent in sending men of the Moylan stamp, to the old colony to bring one dressmaker to Canada, we have to use a whole colony with any amount of wealth, industry, and four times as many people as the whole Province of Manitoba contains, and moreover exactly adapted for our Northern climate, slip through our fingers and go to enrich the neighboring Republic. But it is all owing because the States have wide-awake men to look after their interests, while we have a lot of sleepy dough-heads, who think of nothing but salary, power and patronage.



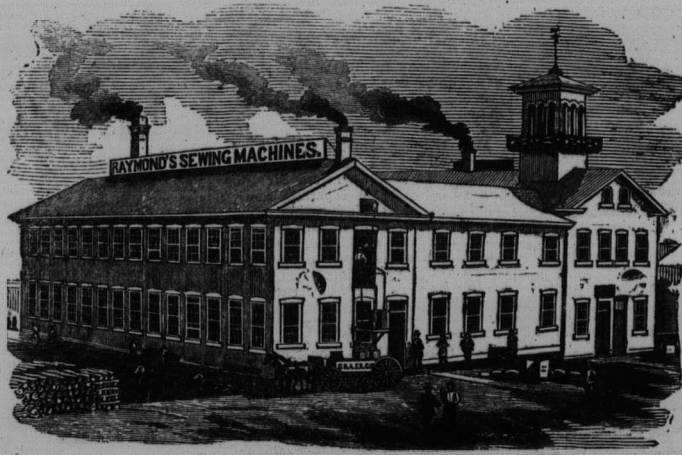

**The Lieut.-Governor.**  
We understand that the Town Council, in conjunction with the Agricultural Society, have almost completed their arrangements for the reception and entertainment of Lieut.-Governor Howland when he visits Guelph and the Central Exhibition on Thursday. He will come by the mid-day train from Toronto, and on his arrival the Corporation will present him with an address. It is very probable that the County Council will also embrace the opportunity of presenting him with an address. He will be entertained at lunch in the Council Chamber, and after that will proceed to the Exhibition Grounds, where the Agricultural Society will present him with an address, after which he will inspect the stock and articles exhibited.

The different committees to whom are entrusted the duty of making the arrangements, are actively at work, and will have everything in readiness by Thursday. Mr. W. J. Little has been engaged to provide the lunch, and in his undertaking it, we have a guarantee that it will be got up in first class style.

The Rev. Mr. King, as agent of the Elgin Association, will make his explanation in a few days, without being marred by Ministerial journals. It will also be shown that Hon. Mr. McKellar has had no official connection with that Association, and the charges made, with a view to his political injury, will be proved foundationless.

**LIGHT BREAKING IS.**—The *Journal de Quebec*, in commenting on affairs in Manitoba, says that it is especially at present, and for days to come, that, by his exile, his long privation, his watchings and fights to avoid the ball or knife of assassin, Mr. Riel will understand how wanting in foresight was the policy that decreed the death of Scott. It was murder in fact, and the fellow like Cain, is become a fugitive and a vagabond.

The *Thorold Mercury* says:—It is rumored that some of the leading Conservatives in this county, being afraid to run a local man against a Reform candidate, tried to prevail on Mr. Howland, of Toronto, to accept the nomination of the Convention. We scarcely credit the statement, that the Conservative party in Wexford has been weakened to the extent of looking to Toronto for a representative.

The last rail on the Intercolonial Railway, which will unite the Railway System of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, was laid on the 20th of September. A car will pass over the line on the 3th of October, and the connecting link between Amherst and Truro will be formally opened for traffic about the 21st of October.

**THE ADJUTANT-GENERAL.**—The *Ottawa Times* is glad to hear of the safe arrival of the Adjutant-General at the Rocky Mountain House on the 6th inst., and to find that he and his son had travelled so far upon their journey across the continent without any misadventure. Colonel Ross took a more southerly course than that pursued by Mr. Fleming, in order to get some buffalo shooting, and intended to cross the Mountains by the Vermillion Pass.

Mr. FRASER has again received the unanimous vote of the Reform Convention of South Grenville called for purpose of selecting a Candidate for the Local House. A Conservative Convention for the same purpose was called on the 24th inst., when James Cairns unanimously received the nomination.

The rumor that Lord Hatherly has resigned the Chancellorship of Great Britain is confirmed. Sir Roundell Palmer will probably be his successor. It will be remembered that this eminent lawyer and statesman was spoken of in connection with the office when the Gladstone Government was formed; but being opposed to the disestablishment of the Irish Church, a measure that the Government was organized to carry, he could not consistently aid in the formation of the Cabinet. His late services as counsel on behalf of the British Government before the Court of Arbitration at Geneva have brought him into greater prominence than ever. He is one of the most thorough-paced but at the same time most reasonable champions of Church Establishment in the British House of Commons.

**The Guelph Central Exhibition.**

**THE FIRST DAY.**

**BUSY SCENES ON THE GROUNDS.**

**Splendid Turn-out of Stock.**

**Fine Show in the Palace.**

**TUESDAY MORNING.**

There is every promise of propitious weather, and to-day there is on every hand signs of the utmost bustle and activity. The cattle, sheep and pig pens are all well filled. The horse boxes are all let, and accommodation has had to be provided elsewhere for future applicants. There is likely to be a splendid display of implements, fully occupying the large space between the palace and the sheep and pig pens.

Inside the palace things are assuming something like order and arrangement, but it is a pity that exhibitors will persist in delaying to the very last minute, what they intend to exhibit, as a very great deal of extra labor is thereby entailed on the various officials. Still, the transformation since yesterday afternoon is wonderful, and by noon to-day the visitor will have realized somewhat of the beauty, taste and magnitude of this portion of the exhibition.

The show of Field Roots, &c., surpasses the anticipations of the most sanguine, considering the difficulties of the season, and the number of dairy produce exhibited is already very creditable.

The number of visitors this morning is large, and when the noon trains arrive we may doubtless look for a very considerable influx of strangers. As we write exhibitors keep pouring in.

**THE BUILDINGS.**

As a brief description of the locality of the different departments of the Exhibition may prove useful to strangers and others visiting the show, we propose to say a few words regarding each.

On entering the main building we find the centre of the octagon devoted to the display of musical instruments, and turning to the right it will be observed that in the East Wing are to be shown the various classes of butter, cheese, &c., whilst ranged round the outer sides of this wing are machinery, tools and castings, &c. The north wing is devoted to Fine Arts, sewing machines, &c.; the west wing to fruit and flowers; the south wing to carriages, sewing machines, paper, printing, &c. The galleries will this year be appropriated exclusively to the ladies, who will thus have every opportunity of displaying to advantage the various specimens of their handiwork. Coming out to the grounds by the main entrance we come to the poultry house, which has been enlarged to double its former size. Leaving it, we come upon the cattle sheds which have been greatly extended both temporarily and permanently to meet the increased demands of exhibitors; this range of buildings is carried out to the verge of the Society's grounds, and presents a long vista of sheds, most of which have had a great improvement effected on them this year, in the shape of a three foot veranda, which is a great protection from rain and wind. After leaving the cattle sheds we come in a westerly direction to the sheep and pig pens, which are situated in the middle of the grounds, and to the north of the main building, a very fine new shed has been erected this year to the north of the former pens for the accommodation of sheep, and on a plan which it is to be regretted was not followed in the erection of the original ones. So much for the benefits of experience. To the east of the sheep pens is the building for grain, &c., whilst on the west side of the pig pens is the building for roots, &c. Between these buildings and the Palace, implements, mowers, reapers, &c. will be displayed, and pursuing our way, still westerly, we come on a long range of boxes where are comfortably housed the splendid specimens of horse flesh with which the sightseers are to be gratified whilst promenaading round the spacious horse ring which lies in convenient contiguity.

In giving a detailed description of the Exhibition, we commence with the

**CATTLE.**

**DURHAMS.**—The first few stalls are occupied by the cattle of Mr. W. B. Telfer, of Pilkington, who exhibits an imported Durham bull (red) of the famous Sittiton stock, Aberdeenshire; a dark red yearling bull, bred by exhibitor; a dark roan bull calf, bred by do.; 2 cows, one a dark red (imported), and the other a light roan. Mr. James McQueen, Pilkington, exhibits a dark red bull calf, which took the first prize at the Centre Riding Show. Messrs. Watt & Sons, Nichol, exhibit a red and white yearling Durham bull; a three year old grade cow, which was first in her class at Hamilton (indeed never has been beaten wherever shown); an aged grade light roan cow; a two year old grade heifer, and a yearling do, both dark red; also a thorough-bred red and white heifer calf, and a dark red grade do. Mr. Peter Crawley, Puslinch, exhibits an aged light roan thorough-bred bull, cow, and pure white bull calf. Messrs. John Snell & Sons, Edmonton, exhibit the 2 year old dard roan bull British Champion, the second prize bull at Hamilton; the yearling dark red bull Chancellor, first prize at Hamilton; both these bulls stood at the top of the Breeders and Importers Herd prizes at Hamilton; three bull calves; Royal Buttery, first prize, and Gold-dust, third in their class at Hamilton; 2 heifer calves, roan, and red, respectively; a light roan yearling heifer, second prize at Hamilton; a yearling do. dark red, first prize do. do. do. (\$1,000 in gold was refused by the proprietors for this heifer to go to Illinois); the famous prize taker, Clara Barton, wherever exhibited, the first prize 3 year old cow at Hamilton; and two 2 year old heifers, dark red, and red and white; a splendid herd, as may be judged from the fact that they secured for their owners both the herd prizes at Hamilton. Mr. Geo. Miller, of Markham, exhibits a dark red, with white spots, bull; a dark red two

year old bull, first prize in a year old class at Hamilton; a dark red 4 year old cow, second prize at Hamilton; 3 year old cow, second do at do.; 1 do.; one 2 bear old dark red cow, and 2 yearling heifers, one dark and the other red and white. Mr. John Miller, Pickering, exhibits a 2 year old dark roan heifer, first prize at Hamilton, and a yearling do. red and white. Messrs. J. & B. Hunter, Pilkington, turn out as usual a very fine herd, amongst which we may particularly prize a 2 year old light roan bull, imported in 1871 from Aberdeenshire, and descended from pure South blood; a 4 yr old light roan, the Queen of Sunnyside, third prize at Hamilton; a 2 yr old imported heifer of Sittiton's, Aberdeenshire, famous but, tierly tribe; two 2 yr old red heifers, bred by exhibitors; the imported yearling, Manitowish Booth heifer, bought at E. T. Pallist, where twenty-one of the same family averaged 2347 lbs. sig. Messrs. Hunter likewise exhibit head of grades, one 4 yr old cow, two 2 yr olds, 2 yearling heifers, and 1 heifer calf. Mr. Arthur Hogge, Thornham Cottage, Guelph Township, exhibits a 2 yr old red and white heifer, and a roan heifer calf; also a dark red heifer calf. Mr. T. McCollough, Eramosa, shows a cow and two heifer calves, one red, and the other red and white. Mr. Henlock Young, Guelph Township, exhibits a herd of 12 grades, consisting of 5 aged cows, two 3 yr old cows, one 2 yr old heifer, and 2 heifer calves, all thorough-bred aged Durham bull. Mr. Richard Pallister, Guelph Township, exhibits 1 grade cow and heifer calf. Mr. Wm. Armstrong, Eramosa, exhibits 3 grade cows, and a heifer calf. Mr. J. S. Armstrong, Eramosa, exhibits two 3 year old grade cows, and a yearling heifer; also 2 imported cows, one a 4 yr old dark red, from Uppermill stock, Aberdeenshire, and the other a red, from Sittiton, in the same County, and a dark red yearling heifer. Mr. David King, Puslinch Plains, exhibits a 3 yr old Durham bull, 1 Mr. James Anderson, Puslinch, exhibits the bull Darling Duke. Mr. George Hood exhibits an aged Hereford bull, do bull calf, do cow, and do yearling heifer, do fat steer. Mr. J. S. Armstrong, Eramosa, exhibits in fat cattle 5 head, two 4 yr olds and three 3 yr olds, which as usual do infinite credit to their feeder, Joseph Hodson, and are in themselves magnificent specimens of fat cattle. Mr. Wm. Hood, Guelph Township, exhibits 20 head of Galloways, including two 3 year old bulls, one 2 yr old do, 1 yearling 2 yr old bull calves; 5 cows, four 2 yr old heifers, 2 yearling, and 2 heifer calves; also a yoke of working oxen. Mr. Thomas McCrae, Guelph Township, exhibits 12 head of Galloways, consisting of a selection of bulls, cows and heifers, but in the absence of the herdman, we were unable to particularize them as to ages. Mr. R. C. McCollum, Campbell's Cross, Co. of Peel, exhibits 1 yearling Devoua bull, which took first prize at Hamilton. Mr. George Rudd, Puslinch, exhibits 12 head of Devons, consisting of one aged bull, 3 aged cows, 1 three yr old cow, 2 two yr old heifers, 1 yearling, and 2 heifer calves. Messrs. J. and W. Kay, Guelph Township, exhibit a fine four yr old fat heifer. Mr. James Cowan, Guelph Township, exhibits a thorough-bred bull calf, and a splendid fat cow. Mr. George Elliott, Guelph Township, exhibits a fat heifer. Mr. John Hassan, Guelph Township, exhibits a grade cow and do heifer calf. Mr. Joseph Parkinson, Eramosa, exhibits a red 2 yr old Durham bull, a very limited display in this section for the year. Mr. Lazarus Parkinson, we regret to find, is not an exhibitor of cattle at all.

**SHEEP.**  
Mr. F. W. Stone exhibits about 30 head of Cotswolds, and 25 head of South Downs. Of the former herd Mr. Stone shows 1 aged ram, 1 shearing ram, 3 pair of ewe lambs, and 2 pair of fat ewes; in Southdowns, 3 aged rams, 3 shearing rams, 2 ram lambs, 3 pair of aged ewes, 3 pair shearing ewes, and 2 pair of ewe lambs; Mr. Wm. Miller, Pickering, shows 4 ewe lambs (totalled) 6 yearling ewes, do., 2 yearling rams, 1, 2 year old ram, and a ram lamb, and a pair of aged ewes. Mr. John Miller, Brougham exhibits 5, 2 shear Cotswold rams, one of which is an imported ram in 1871, the other 4 are bred from imported stock on both sides; 2 imported shearing rams, one of which was first prize taker in his class at Hamilton, and 2 other rams bred by exhibitor; 1 ram lamb, 2 imported aged ewes, 7 shearing imported ewes, which were 1st 2nd and 3rd prize winners at the Royal Agricultural Show of England, at Cardiff this year, also at the Gloucester Show 1872; also 1st, 2nd and 3rd prize winners at Hamilton; 4 ewe lambs, 1st prize at Gloucester, England; also 1st and 2nd at Hamilton; Messrs. John Snell & Sons, Edmonton, exhibit 1 aged Cotswold ram, that took the first prize at Hamilton, and stood at the head of the Prince of Wales prize at the same show, making the fourth time these enterprising importers and breeders have carried off the distinguished honor in succession; 2 imported shearing rams, one of which is the 3rd prize winner at Hamilton; 6 imported shearing rams, which were imported in 1872, 4 aged imported ewes, which took 1st and 2nd prizes at Hamilton and belonging to the Prince of Wales pen, and 6 ewe lambs; in Leicester, these gentlemen also exhibit 3 shearing rams, 3 ram lambs, one of which took the 2nd prize at Hamilton, 1 pair shearing ewes, 1 pair of ewe lambs. Evans, Puslinch, exhibit 3 Leicester ram lambs, and 3 ewe lambs. Mr. W. Evans, Puslinch, exhibits 1 cotswold ram lamb and 1 pair of ewe cotswold lambs. Mr. Evan Macdonald, Guelph, exhibits 2 cotswold ram lambs, 2 shearing ewes, and 2 fat shearing ewes. Mr. Adam Oliver, Avonham, P. O., Perth Co., exhibits 1 two shear Leicester ram, 5 ram lambs, 2 aged ewes, 2 shearing do., and 6 ewe lambs. Many of these sheep were prize takers in their respective classes at Hamilton, and carried off the prize for the best pen of Leicesters at the same show, and we should think that ere this Exhibition closes, they will have heaped further honors on their proprietor, who sold a ram lamb when in Hamilton for \$100. "Hell Gate"—Anybody who has travelled by steamer from New York to Boston and other places north on the Atlantic seaboard, has to pass through "Hell Gate," a name given to a dangerous part of the Sound a few miles out of New York harbor. A New York City contemporary remarks:—"Hell Gate" is now being undermined with a view to its final removal. Quietly, but surely, the drill is at work day by day, far under the rocky gate, and gradually preparation is being made for a grand explosion. It will be a gun for the nation. And if the entire nation does not hear the report, if successful, will feel its influence in increased facilities for navigation. It is hoped the magazine will be ready to be fired next fourth of July morning, and the great sub-marine gun will form part of the exercises in the celebration of that day. It is almost a pity that it cannot be postponed till 1876, so as to aid in the great centennial jubilee in contemplation. But perhaps before then greater guns will be prepared. The mighty western mountains may be ready to give the grand signal of freedom's triumph before them. So let this gun be touched off, whenever ready; the "mighty Yankee nation" can prepare a greater one to honor its grand centennial birth-day. At any rate, every-body will desire the success of the experiment to undermine "Hell Gate," and pray that every little imp of darkness may be blown to the shades of darkness.

A letter from Japan states that the Government has just published three decrees, which are understood to be the precursors of other innovations so impatiently awaited by foreigners. The first is that the library of the ex-Tycoon, composed of 190,000 volumes, is open to the public without distinction of race or nationality. The second requires natives who have foreigners in their service to pay the wages in Japanese money and not in Mexican dollars, which would be a loss to the employer. The third authorizes the priests—1, to select what food they please for their nourishment; 2, to marry; 3, to dress themselves as they like.

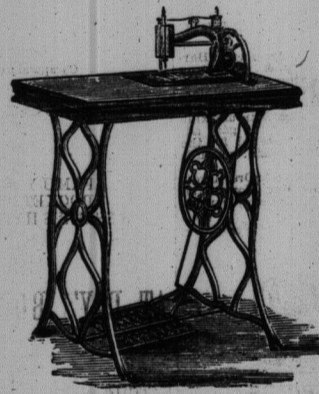

### Flax-Raising in Canada.

There is a considerable quantity of flax grown throughout western Ontario each year. Since the closing of the two chief flax manufactories a few years ago, one of which was located at Streetsville and the other at Preston, many persons have been led to believe that very little flax was now grown amongst us. But this is not correct. The writer recently passed through a considerable part of the western country, and was surprised to see such a large number of fields of flax, most of which were pulled and ready to be housed. This was particularly the case in the counties of Waterloo and Perth, in which there are quite a number of scutching mills, the owners of which generally supply the seed to farmers, and in some cases allowing the latter so much for the use and preparation of the land, doing the seeding and pulling themselves. Most of our flax at present finds a market in the United States, and the demand is said of late years to have been very good. Judging by the appearance of the fields, the crop of this year has been a good one, and we trust prices may be such as to return good profits to those engaged in this important branch of industry. The value of our exports of flax for the year ending 30th June, 1871, is set down at \$112,778 in the Trade and Navigation returns, and the value of the flax seed exported at \$53,685. Most of the flax was shipped by "land carriage," but most of the seed in "foreign vessels." Nearly all the shipments, however, were made from the Province of Ontario, and found a market, as we have already remarked, in the United States. Of the foregoing amount, the Province furnished \$102,977 of flax and \$52,588 of seed—being within \$10,649 of the total amount of our exports.—*Monetary Times.*

### Too Anxious by Half.

Our Tory exchanges, great and small, appeared to be desperately exercised concerning the fate of the Ontario Government. All sorts of wild theories are indulged in, and the anxiety they manifest concerning the probable action of the retiring Premier, and other members of the Cabinet, is truly touching. This Solicitude is entirely unavailing for. Unfortunately for the Tories the Ontario Government will be reconstructed without the slightest regard to the advice or suggestion of the troubled organs of the party. The Reform party is quite capable of regulating its own household, which in view of the present state of affairs is more than our apparently anxious Tory friends can boast of. If they have not already given up the unseaworthy party ship in despair, let them turn their attention to the demoralization that exist among their own leaders. With Sir John in one of his incapable moods again, Sir Francis retired in disgust, Sir George unable through serious illness to attend to State affairs, and Howe in his dotage, they have enough to do in casting about for their successors to claim their precious time in meddling with what does not concern them.—*London Advertiser.*

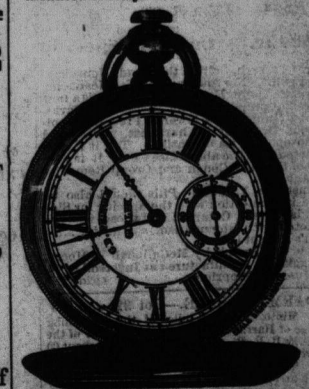


