Another advantage would be that the farmer would be enabled to commence operations several days earlier in the spring; when every day so gained is worth two or three a few weeks later. Anothervery important branch of study would be a scientific knowledge of breeding, for no man can be a thoroughly successful breeder without some experience oughtis subject. Your Directors carnestly hope that the future management of this valuable institution may reflect most highly to the cause of agriculture, towards which the County of Wellington has already contributed so much.
