

RELIGION IN POLITICS.

DISSEMINATION A BURNING QUESTION IN ENGLAND.

The radicals bring Mr. Gladstone to declare himself against a State Church in Scotland and the Bible Society.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The Irish question has for the moment given way to the religious question in British politics.

Mr. Chamberlain has been permitted to go on arranging the campaign and nominating candidates in Ireland pretty much as he pleases.

England and Scotland are set by the ears over the question of disestablishing the church. The controversy has become exceedingly bitter.

Everybody in Great Britain has become deeply interested in the question.

Unless Mr. Gladstone can succeed in demolishing the advantage which the Tories at present have in the religious issue, it will be difficult, if not impossible, for him to secure a majority large enough in the next parliament to permit of his return to power.

The time has come to sever the relations between the church and the state.

Disestablishment has remained too long from making this contest, and we now stand upon a precipice.

There is a great deal of anxiety to know what attitude Mr. Gladstone will assume on this question.

What King Theobald Will Consent to—China's Wishes and Promises.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The Burmese envoy to Paris has informed Premier Salisbury that King Theobald has consented to permit the Burmese representative to reside at Mandalay with a small guard.

The Burmese representative has been received with an escort of British troops.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—During a discussion on the foreign budget in the Austrian delegation to-day Count Kaloky reiterated that the status quo ante must be restored in Roumelia.

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EDITOR STEAD GUILTY.

THE ARMSTRONG ABDUCTION CASE ENDED.

Mrs. Jarrett Also Convicted and General South and Mr. Jacques Acquitted—In vindication of the Friends of the Prisoners.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The trial of Mr. Stead and the other defendants in the Armstrong abduction case was resumed to-day before Justice Lopes.

The judge in his charge to the jury urged that they should bring in a verdict according to the law and not allow their personal sympathies to influence their decision.

Mr. Stead, Justice Lopes said, filled the Pall Mall Gazette with flimsy, disgusting articles of an obscene nature, the publication of which were not connected with the present charge.

DECREASE IN SMALLPOX DEATHS LAST WEEK.

MONTEREAL, Nov. 7.—The official returns at the health office this morning show that there were 23 deaths in this city from smallpox yesterday, 10 in Cote St. Louis, 2 in St. Jean Baptiste, 4 in Ste. Cenege and 1 in St. Henri.

The health officer reported yesterday that the number of smallpox cases during the week was 94, an increase of 13 over the previous week.

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SHALL LOUIS RIEL HANG?

NO COMMISSION YET APPOINTED AT OTTAWA.

What the Orangemen of the Capital Say—The Law to Take its Course in the Case of the Indians—The French Members of the Cabinet.

WINNIPEG, Man., Nov. 7.—Dr. Jukes of Regina denies any knowledge of his being appointed one of Riel's medical commission.

It is stated by one of the highest authorities that no such commission has been appointed.

The ex-rebel chief says he will not make any speech or statement on the day of execution.

OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—Jas. Clark, district master Ottawa Orangemen, discussing Riel's case says: "The proposal to appoint a medical commission is wrong, and if adopted by the government as soon as parliament opens a commission should be named to examine the members of the cabinet to ascertain if they are in favor of the execution."

W. H. Lewis, county secretary, says: "No commission to talk about letting Riel go. He should be made to pay the penalty of his crime."

Lewis attributes the cause of the rebellion in the Northwest to the fact of Orangemen pouring into the province and making it an Orange province.

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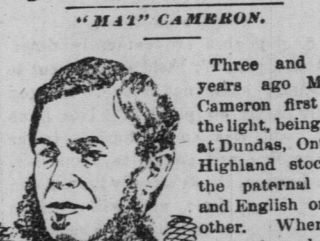
