owing in the wake of the English institu a strict code of rules to govern the eligibility of candidates for athletic teams. Yale will adopt the following code, which does not differ materially from Harvard's:

1. No professional athlete, nor any man who has ever received any pecuniary profit by reason of his connection with athletics, shall take part in any contest of any Yale team.

team who is not a candidate for a degree in a course requiring at least two years' resi-dence and attendance upon not less than eight hours of recitations or lectures per

3. No man shall be eligible for a Yale team who, if not a freshman in the academic or scientific departments, has not been in attendance one full year at the university.

4. No man who has been dropped from his class shall be eligible for a Yale team until a full calendar year from the time of his being dropped until he has been admitted to the class from which he was dropped.

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
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
