





CHANGE LIGHT HOUSE SYSTEM

Service of Keepers Along the Cape Breton Coast May be Dispensed With

The Marine Department has under consideration the installation of a gas lighting system in all light houses on this coast which will do away with the expenses of keeping lighthouse tenders at salary the year around. This system is already in use in one lighthouse in Sydney harbor and has proven itself entirely satisfactory.
