Halifax meat dealers have raised the price of their best cuts of beef, owing to the advance in prices of the western beef in which many of the local meat dealers are large importers. The Herald states that three carloads of western beef are received in that city every week for the local dealers, costing \$2000 a car, so that \$6000 that should go into the pockets of the Nova Scotia farmers now goes to western provinces.

HOW TO FIND THE COMET

Those who know something about the position of the more important heavenly bodies will be able to locate it by the positions of the Great Square of Pegasus and the star Venus. Domestic Tobacco. While some tobacco is produced in almost every state, less than 1 per cent of this country's crop is grown west of the Mississippi.

Sonambulism. Blind persons are more apt to be sonambulists than dark folk, and in cold climates there is more sonambulism than in warm ones. In certain Greenland villages the bed doors are locked from without by a watchman in order that those within may not come forth in their sleep and may be frozen to death.

Byron's Swimming Post. At Lisbon Byron performed a more heroic feat than swimming the Hellespont. That was when he swam across the Tugus from Old Lisbon to Helen castle.

What "Port Your Helm" Means. In this country the helm is put to the port side of the ship (or left hand side looking forward) at the order, "Port your helm." The rudder, of course, goes to starboard, and the ship's head moves to starboard. This is the rule of most nations, but in Sweden the reverse is the rule.

Horses. A good authority on horses says that the gray will live the longest and that the roans come next in order. Blacks seldom live to be over twenty, and cremes rarely live more than ten or fifteen years.

Hall of Fame. The Hall of Fame For Great Americans is the name of a building on University Heights, in New York city, in which are inscribed the names of famous American men and women. Nominations for the honor are made by the public and submitted to a committee of 100 eminent citizens. In the case of men fifty-one votes are required and in the case of women forty-seven. The first bathing took place in October, 1900.

Alligator and Crocodile. The alligator never leaves fresh water, while the crocodile often goes to sea and in the West Indies has sometimes been found many miles from land, heading directly for an island, possibly out of sight.

Pen and Paper. "Tape" whether of rags or of wood pulp, still takes its name from the papyrus. A "book" is the bunch, the wooden rod on which our forefathers cut their runic letters. And a "pencil" is still by derivation "peneclivus," a little tail, having been originally the name of the Roman painter's brush.

Lost Precious Metals. The loss from wear and tear and shipwreck of precious metals has been estimated at two tons of gold and a hundred tons of silver yearly.

Breadcrumbs. To make breadcrumbs quickly cut the soft part from a stale loaf, put it into a clean muslin bag, tie the bag at the top and gently rub it with the hands for a few minutes. The crumbs will then be fine enough for anything.

Domestic Fowl. The domestic fowl is not mentioned in the Old Testament.

The Norway Oath. Probably the most curious European oath is administered in Norway. The witness raises his thumb, his forefinger and his middle finger. These signify the Trinity, while the larger of the uplifted fingers is supposed to represent the soul of the witness and the smaller to indicate his body.

Modern Inks. Modern inks date back from 1768 at which time researches of Dr. Lewis and Libencourt in the chemistry of ink began.
