

OF THE

SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL,

To the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

"In every Christian congregation which derives help from the Society, an annual Sermon should be preached on the work of the Society, and a collection should be made in its aid. We should indeed thankfully receive, if it were offered, a token of sympathy in Missionary work from every member of the Church in your Diocese; but we have no doubt that our claim will be acknowledged, at least by those congregations which are assisted by the Society."

NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842.

Its objects are:

1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying missionaries to strug-

gling congregations.

2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of churches and parsonages, to aid struggling congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.

3. A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the clergy, 4. A Pension Fund for aged and infirm clergy.

5. To provide bibles, prayer books, and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

6. To receive and transmit contributions towards the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, or towards missions to the

heathen in foreign lands.
Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the clergy, the Church Wardens, and others elected by the Society.

(b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land and

the Investment Committees.

2. By the Clergy Trust Committee, which manages (a) the Episcopal Endowment Fund; (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the clergy reserves, and (c) the endowment funds of the several missions and congregations.

3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and

by the Synod.

This Board pays all the missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of the Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the congregations served by the missionaries, (d) a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund.

All letters referring to the assessment or contributions of congregations should be addressed to the Rev. A. A. Von Illand, the Secretary, or to Mr. Edwin Jones, the Treasurer

of the Diocesan Board.

All other letters and contributions should be addressed to the Rev. M. M. Fothergill, the Secretary, or to Mr. George Veasey, the Treasurer of the Church Society.

The Central Board in presenting their thirty-eighth Ainnual Report desires to express their great thankfulness to Almighty God, that notwithstanding the long continued financial depression it has pleased Him to keep alive in the minds of our members the duty resting upon them of aiding the Church Society, which has done so much for the spread of the Gospel in our land, so that, our deficiency in receipts during the past year is less than might have been expected.

The many objects in connection with the various Missions upon which the General Fund is expended continue to present strong claims for assistance.

Your Board desires to draw attention to one object in particular—Outfits for Clergy in entering upon the work of their ministery. Many of the Clergy retain a vivid and painful recollection of the burden of debt which overshadowed their first years in charge of a mission, arising out of the unavoidable outlay incurred in providing a horse with summer and winter vehicles, robes, harness, &c., &c.

The aid which the General Fund, if generously supported by Churchmen in the Diocese, could extend in grants for outfits to all Clergymen when entering upon their work could not fail to be of the greatest value, not only to the individual Clergymen, but also through their freedom of anxiety to the people whom they serve.

MISSION FUND.

(Devoted to the payment of the Stipends of Missionaries in conjunction with the Annual grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, assessments from Rural Missions, and a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund administered by the Diocesan Board.)

This fund is in an excellent condition, and the By-law under which it is managed evidently now meets with the full approbation of the Clergy.

The following clergymen have, according to the provisions of the By-law, made the required number of subscriptions and are therefore paid-up members, viz:—Revds. Smith, Merrick, Lyster, Ker, Professor Roe, Von Iffland, Kemp, King, sr., Burrage, Woolryche, Vial, Fothergill and Housman.

The following are in course of completing their payments, viz:—Revds Ball, Hepburn, Roy, Richardson, Dinzey, Chambers, Rawson, Washer, Brock, Boydell, Riopel, Boyle, Thompson, Sykes, jr., Parkin, Debbage, Alnatt, Richmond, Chapman, Foster, Jenkins, Blaylock, Harding, Thorneloe, Stevens, Wurtele and Dr. Lobley.

Twenty-two clergymen of the Diocese are non-subscribers, of these however, four are absent on leave, six are bachelors and ten ineligible, thus leaving only two who are likely at the present time to become participants in the fund.

Another claim has been added to the list in consequence of the death of the late Reverend R. Short.

PENSION FUND.

(For aged and retired Clergymen.)

There has been an increase in the receipts for this fund of \$148.50, being an increase of \$172.50, in the city of Quebec, but a decrease in the Country Parishes of \$24.

ALGOMA DIOCESAN FUND.

It is gratifying to notice that this purely Canadian missionary effort is gaining ground in the affections of the people.

The regular quota to the Episcopal fund has been duly forwarded, together with \$422.38.

For missionary labour in the Diocese, your Board desires to draw the attention of the Clergy and Laity to the following resolution:

"That the Central Board do declare their readiness to receive and apply as the Donors direct, gifts and subscriptions for the Diocese of Algoma."

At the present time considerable sums are sent direct from various missions to the Shingwauk and Wawanosh Homes, and are unaccounted for in the Society's statement of aid to Algoma.

THE MOUNTAIN ENDOWMENT FUND.

The Central Board have to announce that they have effected a sale of the "Bardfield" property, forming part of the "Mountain Endowment Fund," on terms which are considered by the members of the Board and by those whose counsel they have sought, to be as advantageous as the circumstances would admit of.

They considered this course preferable to retaining the property in their hands any longer, as in the first place no tenant could be found, and in the second, the cost of keeping the property in order was increasing every year, apart from the cost of insurance, taxes, &c.

SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL.

The interest taken in Algoma has militated against subscriptions and donations to the Venerable Society; the amount forwarded, though slightly in excess of last year (\$66), is yet far short of what your Board would wish to see remitted to that noble Society which has done and is still doing so much for the Diocese; there is one pleasing feature in this year's operations, that whereas last year the amount given came from a few places, and principally from Parishes not in immediate connection with the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, this year nearly all the Society's stations have responded to the call for help, and the Clergy have not been remiss in forwarding the required reports.

OBITUARY.

It has pleased God to remove from amongst us one of the Senior Missionaries of the Diocese, the Rev. R. Short. Mr. Short was sent out from England to labour for the cause of Christ in the year 1825, and was always esteemed very highly in the various Missions in which he laboured; for some years past he has been unable to take Parochial

A very gratifying feature of this statement, as compared with that which appears in the Report for 1878, is that the assessments received during the past year amount to \$1,171.70 more than during the year previous. As no change has been made in the assessments, this clearly argues greater punctuality of payment on the part of the different Missions, and a laudable desire on the part of the Church Wardens generally to uphold the honour of the congregations they represent. It also affords evidence that

notwithstanding the objections which, from time to time, have been made to certain necessary details of the system adopted by your Board for the better conduct of the interests committed to its charge. The Diocesan Board is steadily gaining the approval of churchmen in the Diocese, and may soon count upon the ready and willing co-operation of every Clergyman, Warden and congregation connected with it.

The comparatively large balance on hand of \$728 is due to the revenue of the capital of the Mission Fund, otherwise called Sustentation Fund, which is now appropriated to Missionary purposes in accordance with the terms of the Canon and By-law.

The payments for Stipends have been only a trifle in excess of the same item for 1878—there having been on the whole the same number of Missionaries labouring in the Diocese.

The revenue of your Board from the Mission Fund is \$60 less than the amount contributed the preceding year, showing a reduction of over \$900 in the last two years. The returning wave of prosperity has evidently not yet reached us. As the stagnation in trade which has so long oppressed the country gives place to the stir and animation of commercial enterprise, so, no doubt, the current year will not pass away without showing a large increase in the contributions to the Mission Fund.

As some mis-apprehension may exist as to the actual success of the Missionary work of the Diocese under the administration of the Diocesan Board, and in order to correct certain inferences which have been drawn from isolated passages in former Reports, and which have been held to indicate—from the "tone of complaint" said to pervade them—failure in carrying on that work, it may be of use to call to mind a few facts recorded in those reports.

he actual inder the order to wn from ave been said to may be reports. The Report for 1863 gives a list of 32 missions, and a total promised assessment of \$4,965.83.

This list includes the Missions of Compton, Lennoxville, Melbourne, Levis, New Liverpool, Nicolet and Montmorenci—none of which now receive aid from the Board.

The promised assessment of these Missions amounted to \$1,320, leaving the assessment on those Missions which are still aided by the Board, \$3,645.83.

The amount now payable by the same Mission approaches \$7,000, or nearly double.

In addition to these Missions—25 in number—five new Missions have been opened, with a resident Clergyman in each, paying an aggregate assessment of \$1,070, making a total assessment of over \$8,000 in 1879, as compared with \$3,645 in 1863.

When we consider the circumstances of this Diocese, the impediments to progress in material well being which it presents, and the want of increase in its English speaking population, the facts stated above not only amply refute the reproach of acknowledged failure in conducting the Missionary work under the charge of the Diocesan Board, but also present the strongest reasons for gratitude to Almighty God, who has vouchsafed so large a measure of success to its labours.

The absence of self-felicitation as a feature in the Reports of your Board may have given some colour to the misapprehension referred to above, but your Board has always deemed its duty best carried out by a simple account, from year to year, of the actual condition of the work entrusted to it.

The changes which have taken place in the Diocese during the past year are as follows:—

The Rev. J. B. Debbage was appointed to the Mission of Stoneham and Lake Beauport; the Rev. R. Colston succeeding him at Portneuf.

The Rev. F. Webster has taken charge of the Mission of Labrador.

The Rev. R. Harvey having been called to take work in the Diocese of Ontario—to which he belonged—in accordance with a stipulation agreed upon when permitted by his Bishop to take duty in this Diocese, was obliged to resign the Mission of Shigawake.

The Rev. E. A. W. King resigned the Mission of Rivière du Loup in order to accept the charge of the parish of Levis.

The Mission of Valcartier has also been vacant since September last.

For a detailed account of the work of the Church in the Missions aided by your Board, reference is respectfully requested to the individual Reports of the Clergy herewith submitted to the Society.

Nothing will be found in those Reports to modify, but on the contrary much to confirm, the conviction expressed last year that upon the whole, real sound progress is being made.

But while this is the case, it should be added that there are Missions in the Diocese which require sub-division if the work is to make more decided progress, besides many places lying out of the range of any resident Missionary, for which it would be desirable to provide the ministrations of the Church.

The Reports of the Clergy furnish the most reliable evidence of the internal condition of Missions, and indicate the gradual growth and expansion of the Church in the District. From these we learn what is being done to promote the material as well as spiritual well being of the Church, and it will be satisfactory to the members of this Association to hear that the Reports for this year are in all respects of a cheerful and hopeful character: they tell us

of the faithful administrations of the offices of the Church: of increased congregations: of their growing devotional aspect: of added numbers to the Holy Eucharist: of Sunday Schools full and well provided for.

Financially, the Church of the District appears never to retrograde in the sum total of her pecuniary contributions, notwithstanding the inevitable fluctuations which may occur from time to time in the country's prosperity.

When we consider the efforts which are annually put forth for the erection of Churches and Parsonages, for repairs and additions to those edifices, for the supply of necessary adjuncts to the due and comely performance of Divine worship; and when we witness in addition to these efforts to supply local wants, a spirit of interest manifested in the Foreign Mission work of the Church, we may in some measure look upon these united efforts as a tangible evidence of the advance also in spiritual growth of those who thus evince their interest in holy things.

The characteristic progress of our Missions generally may be illustrated by a reference to a meeting held in Sherbrooke by Archdeacon Mountain in 1830.

In the absence of that well organized system which has since marked the parish work of this city, the status of the Church is thus referred to in the Archdeacon's report:

"After Divine service the heads of families were requested to remain to consider some means for putting in better train the temporal affairs of the Church, all whose affairs indeed upon this spot wear an aspect disheartening to those who love her. The languishing condition of religion is intimated by the external face of things—the building out of repair and becoming unfit for service in severe weather; no collection established nor any revenue raised whatever for the support of the Church; no Church Wardens appointed; the Parish register missing; the singing of the congregation faint or none; the burying ground exposed without fence to protect the graves of believers from being trodden by cattle or upheaved by swine."

Such is Archdeacon Mountain's account of Sherbrooke in 1830.

May we not exclaim, without boasting, God has retrieved His Church from this sad condition, and lifted her up from lying in the dust. The sum raised this year in the city of Sherbrooke for all Church purposes amounts to \$4,428.81.

And may we not be prepared by this statement to anticipate for all our Missions a corresponding share of God's blessing, if the outward means are only faithfully used—systematically and well ordered.

Of the channels which have been opened for the distribution of special offerings we may mention two—the S. P. G. and the Diocese of Algoma. To the first of these the Canadian Church owes, under God, her existence, and it is meet that she should annually acknowledge her debt of gratitude by a thank offering from every Parish or Mission in this District, which still continues a pensioner upon her bounty. The Missions generally have responded to this claim.

The Diocese of Algoma (as the first Missionary effort of the Canadian Church) has a special claim upon the Missionary zeal of churchmen. The District of St. Francis, next to the District of Quebec, is regarded as the most important District in the Diocese. In that light alone the Missionary Diocese of Algoma should not be forgotten, but a higher motive than that of emulation should actuate our Missions in contributing to provide our countrymen with the means of grace as well as towards the evangelization of the heathen.

The Missionary field was entered upon in faith, but "faith without works is dead."

The Saint Francis District Association cannot close its Report without placing on record the renewed expression of its affectionate and devoted attachment to its Bishop, and its earnest prayer that a few months spent in freedom from anxious occupation will enable him to resume with his wonted vigour the active duties of his office.

Without entering upon a digest of the Reports of the Clergy, it is thought desirable to place before the members of this Association a comparative statement of money raised in the Missions during the year 1879.

ACTON.

The Rev. L. C. Wurtele reports:-

That he has extended his ministrations over a much larger field in the face of serious discouragements, which he hopes may prove as beneficial to his own spiritual life as they are disheartening.

Heretofore his labors I ave been confined to the two congregations of Acton and Upton, now he holds a service once a fortnight at Roxton Falls, and once a fortnight at Darby. The former is 6 miles, and the latter 12 miles from his home.

The Missionary does not shrink from the large amount of additional labor which this involves, but he feels keenly the discouragements which present themselves from three different directions. The first connects itself with the stationary character of the Protestant population in his Mission. It is scattered over a wide surface, it receives no

accessions and it is very poor. The second arises out of the difficult and painful effort which, under such circumstances, attends the raising of the money necessary to pay the amount promised by the people towards the Clergyman's salary. This has been recently increased from \$200 to \$250; and must be paid punctually into the Treasury of the Board of Missions, under pain of forfeiting the ministrations of the Church. Then, too, the interest of the debt upon the Parsonage, \$72 per annum, presents its claim to a share of the people's efforts, and adds to the Clergyman's anxiety. The third discouragement arises out of a diminished income. Each of the Missions are within the Diocese of Montreal, whose finances have required that \$50, should be taken off from their share of Mr. Wurtele's modest income of \$700 per annum.

Notwithstanding these discouragements, Mr. Wurtele speaks hopefully of the spiritual progress of the people—their reverence in God's House, and their attention to the

Church's service and the Preacher's instruction.

The Church Services have been regularly held, and during the summer, at the Pont Rouge, as heretofore. The attendance has been better than during any former year of my incumbency. BROMPTON AND WINDSOR.

The Rev. C. B. Washer reports:—

I am glad to be able to report that the general aspect of things in this Mission is favorable. The work has been going on, and my appointments I have been enabled to keep without interruption. The results are not many nor great, but we can write the word growth, and that is encouraging.

Of Brompton I can speak with some thankfulness. The labors of the past few years are bearing fruit. Our comely Gothic church is the scene of bright services, and a regular congregation. The communicants continue to increase, and the average attendance at Holy Communion is good, though I want to see it larger. The Sunday school is flourishing, as might be expected from the faithfulness and diligence of my fellow laborers in this work. God's provision of church privileges is treated with indifference by some persons in this division; but the church is advancing, and herein we rejoice.

Windsor Mills.—Here, too, the work has been regularly carried on. The migratory habits of the population are unfavorable to progress in religious matters, yet there are signs of life. The communicants are few; new communicants have been added, but removals and withdrawals reduce the number from time to time. My friend and neighbor, the Rev. I. M. Thompson, kindly came here and delivered some stirring addresses last July, for the revival of those religiously disposed, and the conversion of the indifferent. I have no doubt that if the church goes on persistently and thoroughly with the work, good results will be seen ere long.

I am glad to record that by the help of kind friends, in addition to contributions from members of this congregation, the last instalment of the mortgage on the church has been paid, and that now there is no debt in either division of the mission.

The chancel has been carpeted and otherwise rendered more suitable in appearance. The seats have been refitted and made ecclesiastical in form. A block of Ohio sandstone is being shaped into a font; when this is creeted, holy baptism can be performed in a decent fashion. My great

Last January the young people of the place held their first bazaar in a large store kindly lent for the purpose. The room was nicely decorated and seated by the young men, and the combined attractions of music, readings, a fancy sale and "Christmas Tree" added to the laudable wish to aid in a good work, brought together a large assembly. The sum of \$150 was raised by the entertainment. All were delighted at our success, especially the young people themselves, to whose praise-worthy efforts it was principally due.

Since then Messrs. Robin & Co., have kindly given us \$150, as well as a donation of pine boards; and an absent friend has generously sent us \$68.

We have thus been enabled to pay off the debt with which we commenced the year, and we are therefore in a position to claim the grant of \$100 kindly promised to us

by the Church Society.

I may add that the people, though unable this year to contribute money, have supplied a quantity of boards, and have shown their usual willingness to assist in the work. We are now preparing for another bazaar to be held next month, and I think we have every prospect of success.

The daily and Sunday Schools have been in operation

during the year as usual, and with fair results.

It would be impossible to keep our daily schools constantly open in this poor and sparsely settled place but for the generous aid of the Church and Col. Church Societies, and we owe a debt of gratitude to both. The services of the Church have been held with regularity and the attendance has been held with regularity and the

dance has been about equal to that of last year.

A pleasing incident occurred in October on the occasion of my third daughter leaving for Quebec. She had to the best of her ability, though in a very imperfect manner, played the harmonium in Church for two years. So, a deputation from the congregation waited upon her on the eve of her departure, and presented her with a purse of \$29 as a token of gratitude and good will. This kindness so characteristic of an affectionate people, was entirely unexpected and really touched us all very deeply.

At Percé nothing of importance has occurred during the year. The Church music has greatly improved of late, and is now extremely creditable to a country Church and to so

small a congregation.

COATICOOK.

The Rev. John Foster reports:-

I have nothing very unusual to report concerning the Church-work in this Mission during the current year.

The work is carried on much in the same way as it has

been for many years past.

Sunday services have been regularly kept up in the two Churches of the Mission, two at St. Stephen's and one at Christ Church. Services have also been held on the Holy Days, and twice a week during Lent.

The attendance at St. Stephen's Church has been improving of late, owing to the fact that a few families have returned to the Village, in the hope of finding employment in the Cotton Factory, which it is expected will be in operation next May. We also hope to have a Beet-root Sugar Factory in operation in the Autumn of 1880. These industries, it is confidently hoped, will restore this Village to something like its former prosperity.

On the first of July last, the ladies of St. Stephen's Church held a sale of fancy and useful articles, which were offered at fair prices, and from which was realized the sum of \$91. A large portion of the sum has been expended in the purchase of Sunday School books, which the S. P. C. K. kindly gave us at half the catalogue price, and paid all the charges as far as Quebec. The balance of the amount will be expended in the purchase of Parish Library books as soon as possible.

The debt on the Parsonage is being gradually reduced, by means of Concerts and Tableaux, which the young people of my congregation get up every winter. I heartily wish there was no necessity for these things; but, at present, I

see no other way of raising the necessary funds.

St. Stephen's Church has been neatly tinted during the past summer, the expense of the work being generously borne by Capt. Vaughan, United States Consul at Coaticools

The Church School is still in a flourishing condition under the direction of Miss Young, who is now in her second year with us. She gives universal satisfaction to the parents and guardians of the children. The Rev. M. Fothergill who lately examined the pupils, expressed himself highly pleased with the School in every respect.

I have this year to chronicle more than the usual number of deaths amongst my people, and, of the number, I cannot refrain from alluding, in affectionate terms, to the late Horace Cutting, P. M., who was a most exemplary and zealous member of the Church, and by far the largest subscriber to its funds. He was deservedly held in the very highest esteem by the whole community here, and his loss as a member of the Church will long be felt in this Mission.

DANVILLE, KINGSEY-SIDING AND TROUTPROOK,

The Rev. H. J. Petry reports:-

The duties in connection with these three large and growing Missions have been regularly discharged since writing my last report. On no one Sunday have I been absent from my work; alone and unassisted I have endeayoured, with some measure of success I trust, to further the cause of Christ among the people committed to my charge. The roads last winter forbade much travelling, consequently I had heavy arrears of domiciliary visiting to make up. This department of my work commenced about the 15th of May and continued for six months, during which period I covered not less than two thousand five hundred miles of ground, paying over four hundred and eighty visits among parishioners scattered over an area of four hundred square miles. The work is altogether beyond the capacity of a Missionary single-handed. There is a pressing need for a division of labour.

From the second Sunday after Epiphany to Quinquagesima the services were suspended at Troutbrook by order of the Diocesan Board. The people had failed to keep their promises with regard to the assessment, and had therefore to suffer the penalty.

The services at Kingsey Siding are held at the School House every Friday, at half-past six p.m.; a class of instruction meeting three quarters of an hour previously.

The people of this neighborhood are appreciating the ministrations of the Church. At a general meeting recently held, it was resolved to contribute four thousand feet of lumber to fence in the land (two acres and a half) donated for a burying ground, Church and Parsonage. It was also further resolved to erect a commodious horse shed, haul all the necessary stone and grade the ground. E. P. Hannaford, Esq., G. T. R., has kindly given us a lot of splendid quarried stone, at present on the railway embankment, a short distance from Kingsey Siding.

During this winter I intend soliciting subscriptions, by circular, for our little Mission Church; if six hundred

dollars can be raised we shall be satisfied.

We hope to have confirmations when the Bishop returns. There are about thirty candidates, many of these live long distances from the Church, and have to be visited at their own homes; this, of course, involves a great deal of extra labor and much expenditure of time: it is, however, a department of work in which I take a special interest, and to which I devote a large portion of my strength. A class of instruction in the principles and teaching of the Church is held each Sunday before the Troutbrook and Danville congregations, and with the most desirable results. The numbers attending these Churches are unabated, and when it is remembered, in the case of Danville especially, that the majority of the people have to drive from one to six miles, (there being barely half a dozen Church families within the Corporation limits of the village) when it is further remembered that the Congregationalists, Methodists, Presbyterians and Advents have each their places of worship, each claiming their quota from the small Protestant population of Shipton, it is gratifying to record how firmly and steadily the Church not only holds her own, but seems to be quietly gaining ground.

I cannot conclude this report without testifying to the kind and cordial relations which subsist between myself and the people committed to my charge; no squabbling or unpleasantness of any kind has interrupted a harmony of over fourteen years standing. What I think of the moral and spiritual condition of my people generally, would be a breach of trust to commit to a public report. I take care to keep the Bishop fully informed on this and other points of confidential importance, receiving his wise counsel and

We shall be even with the work shortly.

At St. Paul's Church, L'Avenir, special services were held once a week, during Lent and in Holy Week, I am obliged to confess—though it is with the hope that it may never occur again—that on two occasions during the season, through exceptional circumstances, I was myself absent, and this caused the services to be interrupted. But for this, we should have had, I am confident, an excellent report to make of this part of our work; for, as it was, the congregations generally were good for week-night services, and; on several occasions, especially in Holy Week, were such as would have been called good for Sunday. I can testify, too, that the worshippers were devout and attentive, and there were not wanting evidences that the season was observed, also, with some zeal and care, in the private life; which is, perhaps, a still greater cause for thankfulness.

In Upper Durham, Cottage Missions took the place of services in the Church. Before beginning this work, we had a gathering of the people at the l'arsonage on the Feast of the Epiphany, which served as a kind of opening or dedication of the house for God's service. The whole Mission was invited to this; but, owing to the bad state of the roads, only those living near were able to attend, though we had, notwithstanding a gathering of over sixty. We began with a short service suitable to the occasion and the season, in which two addresses were delivered, one being from the Rector of Melbourne, to whom we are much indebted for coming to help us in spite of snow-drifts. After the service, an hour or so was spent in social intercourse before separating. The whole was very pleasant, and, I think, effective.

From that time onward, until the roads broke up at Easter, the Cottage Missions were held regularly once a week, but, instead of going from house to house as formerly, we met on each occasion at the Parsonage. The attendance, generally speaking, was good, and we hope that the work was not without some good results; but stormy weather often interrupted our gathering, and to some extent acted as a damper.

In South Durham, also, special services were tried during Lent, but they were not very successful; some, however, which were held in Advent were pretty well attended. The congregations at this Station have, during the summer months, been good, and the attendance, generally, is I think steadily improving; the Sunday School, also, for a while es were held I am obliged may never the season, vself absent, ed. It is with considerable regret, that I find the amount we have given to outside objects to be much smaller this year than last; though the total raised by the Mission is larger. To account for the falling off we must, of course, remember the amount given towards the Parsonage, the debt upon which we are trying hard to remove. But, though this may be offered as an explanation, it cannot be put forward as, in any degree, a sufficient excuse; for if the principles of it be admitted, human infirmity and want of faith might, at any time, in the effort to provide for local needs, override the direct commandments of God. May He keep us from "Losing our life in trying to save it."

The rest of my work, so far as it is not of a private nature, may be characterized as "Routine," the good results of of which, if such there be, can only be seen, "after many days."

In regard, however, to temporalities, it may be noticed, that in Upper Durham, commodious outbuildings for the Parsonage have been begun, and will soon, we hope, be finished; also that seven acres of land were bought by the congregation and added to the Glebe, which now contains nineteen acres. In L'Avenir, also, they have done a good work, by adding about 40 feet to the Church shed.

I beg in conclusion, on behalf of the Mission, to acknowledge thankfully the receipt of the generous grant of \$100, made by your Society last Winter, which has greatly assisted us to reduce the debt on the Parsonage.

DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Rev. F. J. B. Allnatt reports:-

As there is no other Church within the limits of this parish besides our own and that of the Roman Catholics, my flock may be said to include in some sense all non-Romanists residing in the district. These comprise some 46 entire families and 9 families belonging partially to us, partially to the Romanists, besides 14 individuals not included in any of the families; in all 293 individuals.

DIVINE SERVICE.—Number of Services in the Parish Church, 180, or very nearly, viz: 2 every Sunday, 1 every Friday, besides Seasons and chief Holy Days.

HOLY COMMUNION.—On first and third Sundays in each month, also on Christmas Day, Sunday after Christmas, Epiphany, Easter Day, Sunday after Easter, Assension Day, Whitsun Day, Trinity Sunday, Harvest Festival.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND CLASSES.—Sanday morning, Class conducted by Rector, Sunday afternoon, cottage lecture or Class, conducted by Rector at two places but alternate Sundays, 6 miles and 4 miles distant. Same hour, Sunday School conducted by Mrs. Allnatt in the village, and by a young lady in a private house across the river. Week-day class for little children held by Miss Gill.

The Congregation is scattered, and so thinly, and at such distances apart, that the Parish Church forms the only

nucleus or gathering place for an assembly.

GASPÉ BASIN.

The Revd. John P. Richmond reports:-

In presenting the annual report of the state of this Mission, I have to regret the increasing depression in the temporal prosperity of the people. The great drawback in Gasp 3 is that the people have to subsist on the product of the summer labor; for when winter sets in there is little for the people to do except hunting, and in this there is no profit over and above the supply of meat the people thus obtain for their families.

St. Paul's Church.—I have again to record the removal of two families from this portion of the Mission. Mr. J. J. Loundes, for some years Church Warden, has removed to Sandy Beach, and another family has removed to Ottawa. The late Rev. R. Short, for many years living here in retirement, died last summer; he was the oldest elergyman in the Diocese of Quebec, and had, in years gone by, endured a great deal of hardship on the Gaspé coast, having

had charge for some years of Cape Cove, Percé and Malbaie, when the hardships of travel were greater than they are now. The new Church is completed all on internal fittings and painting; the undertaking has been great for a small and reduced congregation, and I consider the people worthy of commendation for not wearying in the good work. To the late Church Warden we are this year indebted for the painting of the roof, at an expenditure of over fifty dollars. To the S. P. C. K. for a liberal grant towards the completion of the building, and to Mr. Hamon, Mr. Collas and others for the proceeds of a concert, and to the Misses Carters and others our thanks are due in anticipation for another concert for the same object.

I append the Church Warden's financial statement.

St. James' Church.—This congregation has felt the local depression in demand for labor, and an arrangement became necessary for its relief. A meeting between H. S. Scott, Esq., representing the Diocesan Board, and this congregation, was held last summer for this purpose.

The Mission of Peninsula and Little Gaspé was, on December 1st, added to the Gaspé Basin Mission. The people seem eager to have the services of the Church and to be willing to do what they can; they are for the most part poor. My first visit came at a bad time of the year, and to reach Peninsula, only three or four miles from my house, I was obliged to travel over fifteen miles round the head of the North-West Arm, and on returning the journey occupied four hours and a half. There will be times in the year when it will be almost impossible to get to the Peninsula side of the Bay, but I hope these will be few. During the month of December I held service three times at Peninsula and once at Little Gaspé.

The Rev. A. J. Balfour reports:-

I have little to report this year beyond the ordinary round of duties incident to missionary work. Divine Service has been held each Lord's Day at St. James' Church, Hatley. St. John's Church, Waterville, at the Village of Massawippi. and (during the summer) at what is known as the "Old Church," Hatley. This last mentioned is the original Church edifice erected in this part of the Townships by the late Bishop Stewart, and, for many reasons unhappily, abandoned when fifty years ago the village Church was built. The people in its vicinity and direction adhered to the building and have since been ministered to therein by dissenting ministers of all shades of belief, but now for many years almost exclusively by the "Adventists." Thus have hundreds become members of the Adventist Society; a Communion entertaining but little sympathy towards the Church. I hope nevertheless to be able to resume both my Sunday Service and Sunday School here next spring, when I trust, they will prove more acceptable and more profitable. The attendance at the first three stations named has been as large as in previous years. Thanks to kind lady helpers, Sunday Schools have been maintained in connection with St. James' and St. John's, there also, I have held many weekday services. Thave certainly endeavoured not to be unremindful of the great importance of regular and systematic visiting, as offering an opportunity for cultivating that personal acquaintance and sympathy with one's people so essential to a pastor's usefulness. My Parish Register presents a smaller record than usual, viz:—Baptisms 11, 3 adults: Burials 10.

The Rev. P. Roe reports:-

The attendance at the services of my four Stations has been very good during the past year, and there has been a steady increase in the number of communicants, some few of the young members having become regular partakers of that Holy Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. The Sunday Schools have been well attended. I am much indebted to Miss Austin and Miss Caroline McVitty, for their assistance as teachers at Campbell's Sunday School, they have faithfully performed their duty, and nearly doubled the number of scholars during the past summer. Mr. George Murray has managed the School at Lysander Falls, and was very regular and punctual in his attendance.

In July, I was joined by my wife and family, after a separation of 23 years, they removed from our old home in St. Thomas, and we are now settled down in our little Parsonage. My family prove to be a great help to me in Mrs. Roe has taken charge of the Bible class of my work. girls in Stephens' Church, and during the winter months holds a Bible class on Wednesdays in the Parsonage. My

daughters render me valuable aid in the Choir.

We have added 3 rooms and a summer kitchen to the Parsonage, which was quite too small for a family. We have also sunk a well in the rock, 20 feet, and have succeeded in obtaining good water. This, including a pump, cost \$42.

The cost of the addition to the Parsonage, well, fence, &c., will be about \$250. A grant was made from the Church Society to the Mission of \$100, towards this work. Messrs. King Brothers, of Lyster Mills, have taken a lively interest in the progress and completion of the work, and have promised me a donation of a portion of the material, lumber, shingles, bricks, &c. It has been very gratifying to find a steady increase in the number of those who attend bivine Worship, and to observe the warm and hearty manner in which they engage in the responses and singing.

May the Lord Himself give His blessing to all the means of grace, and raise up a people among us, to bless and praise His Holy name, and to hand down His truth to the gene-

I think we are approaching the age of highways here, and I trust also there is an advance in the way that leadeth to eternal life. At Upper Ireland the congregation, assisted by a grant of \$100 from the Church Society, have been able to finish and furnish the interior of the chancel and gallery of the Church. There are now seats for 200 worshippers, and comfortable ones too. The Ladies' Association has continued working throughout the year, and rendered not only valuable aid in a social point of view, but also assisted materially pecuniarily. Parish and Sunday Schools have been kept open with usual Lower Ireland and Adderley have been regular in their payments to the Diocesan Board. The former has increased largely the amount for Church Society. Both have perhaps shown all the zeal that could be reasonably expected from the limited attention that can be shown them in so large a Parish or District.

I only hope the day will soon come when an increase of laborers will gather the fields ready for harvest as far as

good sion, I vening idance part of the Mission since my appointment, and some have died, and a few have intermarried with dissenters and have left the Church, so our congregations here are not as large as they used to be. Even, although we have gained some additional Church families to help to make up our losses. We have a Sunday School here, under the superintendence of Mr. George Bayne—our worthy Lay Delegate—he is assisted by two ladies of the congregation, and I give occasional instructions, catechising, &c. There are on the books about thirty scholars, about equally divided as to sex, with an average attendance of about twenty.

St. Mark's.—Service is held in this Church on Sundays, morning and afternoon, alternately, except on my Sundays at Broughton, which occur once in six weeks, then service has to be dropped, as I cannot serve both places on the same day. The congregation here is, on the whole, a little larger than at St. James' Church, and there are a much larger number of Church people here. But too many make a practice of staying at home—the excuse is—distance, bad roads—sometimes bad weather—and, in some instances, the want of clothes good enough. But, I fear the great want is the will. We have also a small Sunday School here, in charge of Mr. Wm. McVitty, assisted by the sons of Mr. Duffett, Church Warden; there are about thirty scholars on the books, and an average attendance of about twenty. I catechise occasionally.

St. Luke's Church, Broughton.—I take morning service here once in six weeks; congregation about sixty (or seventy in the summer season)—about one-fourth of the congregation—are Presbyterians, who attend Church when they have no Minisier of their own, which very seldom occurs on the Sunday that I am there.

Harvey Hill Mines.—I take services here on my return from Broughton, as it is situated about midway between Leeds and Broughton. There used to be a good congregation here when the Mines were in operation, but as the works are shut down, there are only two families left, with a few settlers round. The congregation now does not number over 20—all told; \$20 used to be given by this congregation towards making up the Leeds Assessment—but as these people have many of them left, that or the greater part of it is lost.

Beattie's.—I hold Sunday afternoon services during the summer season, when I take the morning at St. Mark's, which involves about 25 miles travel on that day; attendance, good; about one-half Church people, the rest Presbyterians. I take a monthly service here on week days, in the winter the attendance not as good as the Sunday attendance in summer.

Frizzells.--This is a Station about five miles from St. Mark's Church, and about twelve miles from the Parsonage. I hold service there usually about once a month on week days, when I have a congregation of about thirty, mostly

Church people.

There are also three or four other places, where I hold occasional week day service; but they may be called special, as I take them, very rarely. When I happen to be staying all night in the locality on my visitation rounds. In the performance of these services, I have travelled over two thousand miles during the year and that often over roads which make it anything but a journey of pleasure. I have lost a little time also, from personal and family sickness.

Financial.—The subscriptions to the Church Society are smaller this year than on previous years—cause, hard times. Pork and Butter cheap. More than the whole amount of the assessment was lost by the farmers this year, by selling their butter a month too early, and too many begin to economise—at the Church-door. The Church Wardens will have hard work to make it all up (i.e. the assessments.) Extra giving is almost out of the question. However, we have collected by subscriptions and offertory about fifty-six dollars, which will have to do duty for this year, and we must hope for better times.

MAGOG AND GEORGEVILLE.

The Rev. J. Hepburn reports:—

I believe I can conscientiously report progress in this Mission during the past year. The statistics appended to the report speak for themselves. The sum total is a very creditable one, and though it be larger than one can expect year by year, (seeing that it was raised for special purposes) yet it is fair to the Mission to say it was freely given, and so may be adduced as proof of the interest taken in the Church, by her members,

The vices have been regularly held throughout the Mission. Cance I failed to appear in Georgeville on a Sunday evening, having been warned by the doctor of the place, lest I should provoke a threatened illness. This tried me not a little, seeing it was the first time since my ordination that I was obliged to forego an appointment through indisposition. The attendance at Church has, on the whole, been regular and good. In this respect with the members proper, little fault can be found; and it is pleasing and encouraging to notice, on the part of outsiders, a disposition to come in and join with us. In the past there was a strong prejudice, which seems to be breaking down rapidly. May it soon disappear.

Last year I called attention to two new services I had opened in School houses under favorable circumstances. They have been continued and have been attended with good results as far as I can judge; the attendance is steady and increasing. I have baptized a number of children and two adults, and others are preparing. One marked improvement is in reverential posture in prayer and in quiet and eager attention to reading and teaching.

In addition to these I began a third, eight months ago, in an opposite direction, and only four miles from Magog. As in the former case, I did this in answer to a request from the people of the district; this has been an easier duty than the others on account of several present being accustomed to the mode of worship years ago. There are also several members of the Methodist body who have come regularly and have thrown themselves heartily into the worship.

In Advent season I began a course of lectures on baptism, which I delivered in all parts of the Mission. This I did

in order that the mind of the Church might be known, and the reason given for its belief. In the two centres of work the attendance was usually small, but in outside places great numbers were gathered together to hear. I shrank from the controversial parts, believing that as a rule little good is done by strife, but yet made plain allusions to our distinctive truths in connection with the deeper truths of the subject. I do not now regret that I undertook this duty in some respects unpleasant, for it seems as if it had tavorably impressed many.

The Sunday schools have been faithfully attended to in both parts of the Mission; the one serious difficulty met by the teachers is irregularity, for this the parents must be in a great measure blamed; if they only realized how hard it made the duty of teaching they would lend assistance.

In both villages, the ladies organized a Sewing Society which brought in great gain to the Church; without their assistance it would have been impossible to carry on the improvements of the Churches as extensively as they have been.

At the Xmas tree in Georgeville the Incumbent was greatly surprised by the ladies presenting him with a very beautiful South Sea seal cap and other lesser gifts.

At Magog an equal surprise awaited the organist, Miss Henrietta Sweeney, in the shape of a gold watch. This, all the congregation felt, she fairly earned by her devotion to her duties in Church.

A very favorable opportunity was given to me this summer to take a holiday. Health did not demand it, but many of my friends urged me, and the Bishop warmly advocated it, so that I went. During my absence the work was kept up by Mr. Richard Hewton, (student of Lennox-ville) who gave great satisfaction to the people and to myself. To lighten his burden I closed all the School house services but one.

There was one great objection to my leaving, and that was that important work was to be done to both Churches. Though I have little taste or skill in this, yet I did strongly desire to witness its progress.

Georgeville Church was thoroughly plastered, tinted and painted, and all are satisfied that it is well done. The repairs were met by the Ladies' Society, whose Bazaar was most successful, surpassing the expectations of the most hopeful.

Since my Priesthood I have celebrated the Holy Communion regularly once a month at Malbaie, and at the Corner of the Beach. I have noted with delight the increasing number of Communicants and their reverent worship.

My Sunday School has, I am glad to say, been a success this year. I have had a regular attendance of fifty children, holding it in the afternoon it suited better those children living at a distance from the Church. I wish to thank Mr. John LeGros, my late Church Warden, who was also a teacher in our Sunday School, for his kindness in acting as superintendent on those Sundays when I was absent doing duty at the Corner of the Beach; also, Miss Varden and Miss Gadd for kindly taking classes, and regularly attending them.

My Sunday Services at Malbaie, both at morning and evening have been extremely well attended, our Church at times being quite full, the singing and responding being very good and hearty. I am glad to say I have been able to hold my regular services at the Corner of the Beach on the days appointed at morning and afternoon, returning to Malbaie for Evening Service. There is growing I am rejoiced to see here, a greater reverence for the due observance of the Sunday, and an air of seriousness passing over many who once took but little heed.

Last winter a few Ladies and Gentlemen of Point St. Peter, members of my Congregation, got up a very successful Concert, and after paying expenses handed me a balance of \$64.11, to be applied to our Church work. I have to thank Adolphus Collas, Esq., who was the leading spirit in this good work, and on whose shoulders it mainly rested for success, also Messrs. J. & G. P. Fauvel, Esqrs., who zealously seconded it, and all those who so kindly helped us

Our thanks are due to kind friends in Quebec and Levis for the gift of a large box of useful and fancy articles for a Bazaar we intend holding on the 15th of January in behalf of our new Organ, which I hope will be placed in the Church early next summer. I have to thank also my Church Warden, W. Le B. Fanvel, Esq., for the gift of a sleigh.

St. Peter's Day falling this year on a Sunday, prevented us augmenting our Endowment Fund, though I hope next year to be able to do so, it is the intention to give the proceeds of the sale of fish caught on that day to that Fund.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

The Rev. J. Chambers reports:--

During the winter the work has been carried on as usual, visiting my people on the different Islands which have been connected with ice. The winter set in milder than usual, and the ice was not so safe as it generally is in the early part of our winter. However, with one or two exceptions I have escaped trouble in my journeys.

Schools.—Last fall the Council of Public Instruction permitted us to form Dissentient Schools and to have but one schoolmaster, who should be under the joint control of two or more Boards of Trustees and to move from Island to Island at their discretion. Everything was arranged according to law, and the Schoolmaster commenced operations at Grosse Isle, where he remained until February, teaching the children at that place. By the order of the Trustees he was then sent to Grindstone Island where he will remain until June.

In the early part of the winter and during the time the Schoolmaster was teaching at Grosse Isle, I undertook to teach the children at Grindstone Island, adopting the same method of teaching as that used by me during the three previous winters; this has secured to the Grindstone children a lengthy period of instruction. Every morning I open the School with short morning prayer and the reading and explaining of one of the Psalms of the day, this occupies about a quarter of an hour, and although not a long time. vet a time of sowing the good seed in the hearts of the young. Through the kindness of H. S. Scott, Esq., Quebec. we received a number of books and slates, thus giving us a good start, for had it not been for the aid thus given we should have been placed in a difficult position, owing to the lateness of the season when the Schools were formed, and the impossibility of procuring anything here after the navigation is closed.

Eatry Island.—I visited Entry Island late last fall and could not possibly repeat the visit until late in March, at which time a bridge of ice formed and connected it with Amherst. The people here are all Protestants and are always glad of my visits, shewing this not only by word, but by the willingness to attend Divine Service, and their attention and apparent devotion. I am sincerely thankful to state that when I was on the Island last fall, a Temperance Society was started, and through the perseverance of Mr. James Cassidy, (the worthy light-house keeper.) seventeen members have enrolled their names as total abstainers from

the intoxicating poison.

Amherst Island —Amherst Island has been visited as regularly as possible during the winter, but upon this Island there are but four Protestant families and some of these so far from the Church that anything like bad weather prevents their appearance. However, I have visited the families here and make it a practice to catechise the children.

Grindstone Island.—As the Parsonage is on Grindstone Island, the people here have the advantage; for more Services are held here than on any other Island.

During the last two months I have had Daily Evening Service at 5 o'clock, and I intend (D. V.) continuing it as long as possible, i. c. so long as people will attend; so far a very fair attendance has been given. Preaching a sermon to the people every evening cannot do them any harm. During the winter I have had weekly readings,

Grosse Isle.—I have visited Grosse Isle as often as possible. We were not able to use the Church for Divine Service as the building is not finished owing to the lack of funds, and unless something unforeseen occurs I am afraid we shall be as far off having a Church as ever. The people are not numerous enough nor are they rich enough to procure the necessary means, and although the Seal fishery was excellent on some of the Islands, yet here at Grosse Isle it was an entire failure, and so, many were not able to subscribe, which, if any Seals had been taken they willingly would have done.

The people here are thoroughly true to Church principles, and I firmly believe that if we could procure (§200) two hundred dollars to complete the building, much good might be done, because, then the children might be assembled regularly on the Lord's Day for Sunday School, and also the Services themselves would be more enjoyed and greater attention given than at present can be, when over one hundred persons are assembled in a small house rendering the atmosphere perfectly oppressive and attention impossible.

I have had one or two severe handlings in my journeys. On one occasion I was travelling alone to Grosse Isle and had well nigh finished the journey when suddenly I found the ice yielding and soon the horse was through the ice. I immediately sprang out of the sleigh and succeeded in untackling the horse, but in doing so broke through myself. All my attempts to get the horse out proved fruitless, and I should without doubt have lost my horse had not assistance quickly arrived; however, the only hurt I received was a good soaking and badly frozen in one finger.

On another occasion I had left Amherst Island on my return to Grindstone Island and had not been on the ice long before a heavy storm set in. For a time the wind blew very fiercely and the drift and falling snow prevented me making any progress. I made for the land as quickly as possible and by following along the coast I succeeded in getting on the land again at the West point of Amherst, and after six hours of such experience arrived at the residence of Mr. Savage, one of my Congregation, who with his kind wife soon made me forget the roughness of the journey by the kindness they shewed me.

Library.—Ever since I have been stationed here my great desire has been to procure such a number of reliable books as should keep the people reading in their own homes during their spare hours of winter, and by persevering I have at last about ninety volumes which will form a good nucleus for a Mission lending library; these books have been well used during the winter, and I trust have filled not only time but their minds with profitable employment.

NEW CARLISLE AND PASPEBIAC.

The Rev. Thos. Blaylock reports:-

The ordinary work of the Church has been kept up in both Missions and some extension made.

In the Mission of Paspebiac there has been no increase in the average attendance at Public Worship, but a slight increase in the number of Communicants.

The most marked improvement is in the Sunday School work. Under the superintendence of Mr. W. Bisson the school at St. Peter's Church has nearly doubled its numbers, but we greatly need good instructive books and a library, a want which I hope to see supplied as soon as the Parsonage debt is paid off. A new Sunday School, two miles from the Church has been started in this Mission, and about twenty-five children gathered in, who before had little definite religious instruction. We had a Christmas tree in which both Schools joined and spent a very pleasant evening.

At New Carlisle the attendance at the Services has increased steadily during the past year. There is not, however, a corresponding increase of Communicants. Here also the Sunday School has increased 100 per cent during the year and the teachers are diligent and worthy of all praise.

The financial affairs of this Mission, I am sorry to say, remain in statu quo, far from satisfactory; owing in some

ry to say, g in some degree to the fact that times are here harder, and money scarcer than ever. No farm produce, or in fact any thing else that the people raise can be sold for cash. The winter work of making shingles for export to the West Indies was also stopped, the market being overstocked. Those who do not know the place can form no idea of the difficulty of raising money for Church purposes. More money was subscribed for the assessment out less paid in than last year. There are also more arrears of pew rent and the Offertory is also less. Some improvements have, however, been made. The Parsonage has been surrounded by a gallery and the Barn new roofed, the walls shingled and painted at a cost of about \$125.

A Bazaar got up by both Missions has netted, as near as I can now state, \$330, which goes toward paying off the

debt still due on the Parsonage.

Since the vacancy at Shigawake and Port Daniel, I have made several visits to that Mission, Preached three times at Port Daniel, twice at Shigawake and L'Anse an Gaseon, administered the Holy Communion three times to the sick, attended three Burials, performed the Marriage cermony three times and Baptized two infants.

I give the following extracts from register - Marriages 12, Baptisms 40, Burials 15.

RIVIÈRE-DU-LOUP (EN BAS.)

The Rev. Ernest A. Willoughly King reports:-

Period-Advent 1878, to Sept. 20, 1879.

Services—In morning at Church on Sundays and chief Festivals. In School-house at R. R. Station, a children's service and Sunday-School at 3 o'clock, and evening Prayer at 7. At "Le Portage," about 6 miles distant, an afternoon service on 5 or 6 Sundays. On Thursday evening at the Station always, and in Church on other week-days, frequently during the summer, with several Sunday afternoon services in Church, mainly through the kind help of the Rev. H. Kittson, M.A. Some Missionary services at Chicoutimi, Grand Bay, Ste. Flavie, Rimouski, Trois Pistoles and St. Thomas, where also the sacraments were administered and the sick visited, as occasion permitted.

Some help in this connection was kindly rendered by the

Rev. A. Boultbee and others.

The number of members at head-quarters, (R.-du-L.) has been slightly modified by recent railway changes, but there are still 22 families of Church people, besides some individual members and adherents.

Ten persons were confirmed, and one adult baptized last January, by the Bishop. The Holy Communion was administered twice a month during the summer, when the congregation is always largely increased by the visitors.

Contributions during only about 93 months for all Church purposes, were \$566.07. Collections were duly made through the offertory for the various funds of the Church Society, for Bishop's College and other objects.

The nucleus of a Parsonage-fund, came from a very successful entertainment, most kindly promoted and carried out by Mrs. Frederick Montizambert, Mrs. Rosser Dean, and other friends of the Church at Cacouna. Here I would also mention a donation of \$10 from Rev. Philip Dumoulin, and \$5 from Miss Holmes.

The interior of the Church is in good condition. The roof was tarred in the Spring. Two sides of the Church-yard have received new fencing, and the rest is in good repair. The graves have been marked out, and the grounds put in better order. The assessment is paid in advance up to the end of the year.

An annual rental of \$75 for a Parsonage, was voted at the Easter Vestry-Meeting, and \$91 are in hand for a new

building.

The insurance upon the Church is paid for 3 years, from July last. Materials have been provided for 2 new surplices and stoles. Promises to the amount of about \$100 were made towards the Parsonage fund and advance of assessment, which I trust will be still available.

The Registers, Vestry-books and Parochial lists were written up and handed over to the Wardens before Sept. 21. when the Parish became vacant by my appointment to the Rectory of Levis. Previous to quitting the Mission, I was presented with a very pleasing and warm-hearted address, and a valuable and useful piece of plate. That the incumbency of the Parish is still unaroidably vacant, is a very great cause of regret to me, as it is also. I know, to the people themselves. Let us, therefore, pray God to supply this vacancy ere long, and in the best possible manner.

As my connection with the Diocesan Board now ceases, by reason of appointment to a self-supporting Parish, I desire to embrace this opportunity of gratefully acknowledging the kind, prompt, and business-like attentions, and the great consideration which have ever characterised the relations of the Board with the Missions that have been successively under my charge.

SANDY BEACH.

The Rev. M. Kerr reports:-

In sending a statement of the condition and progress of this Mission, I am painfully aware of the impossibility of bringing forward anything to invest the report with attraction in the eyes of strangers. To those, however, by whose fostering care it owes its existence and continuance; even dry statistics are not wholly devoid of interest; "the simple annals" of the life of religion, amid the lowly sons of toil, are perused with some attention and sympathy. A year has passed since the state of Sandy Beach Mission has claimed your notice; a year marked —as so many others have been—with mercy and grace from Our Father's hand; for, though the last approaching Winter filled me with gloomy forebodings of distress and privation, in anticipation of its advent; yet these were not realised to the extent that I dreaded, by its actual presence. It found us poor and anxious; but we were not suffered to want; all our more urgent necessities were supplied, and even the assessment due to the Board, which I greatly feared could not be met, was, at last, paid in full, and we were enabled to commence the New Year, (1879,) free from pecuniary difficulty. I will not then again give way to dark fears, though the prospect be still clouded, but shall have "the morrow to take care of the things of itself."

Financially, our position is no worse—on the whole—than it was this time last year. The fisheries—our staple industry—though scarcely an average in value, have been moderately productive. Our harvests, notwithstanding the long-continued wet and cold, have been abundant, though

from the small extent of land under cultivation, the supply from that source is only an aid to the maintenance of the people, not their staff and support. Did they depend more upon the land and less upon the sea, it were better for them, and to that they must, ultimately, be brought. Our " Endowment Fund " has had nothing added to it, save its yearly interest; even from that source, it is now, however, making sensible increase, and, in time, it will doubtless answer the expectations of the generous contributors. find it difficult to speak positively of our spiritual progress; that is only manifest to the Eye of the Omniscient; but I humbly hope that we are making some advance, "increasing in the knowledge of God." The means of grace have been regularly afforded and regularly aftended, and we must hope that the Word and sacraments are not, cannot be, administered utterly in rain. Constant attendance and devout demeanor in the House of God, and the faithful discharge of duty in the world, are the only indices that show us something of the inward life, and here these are not want-But the *day* will fully declare it.

Since I returned from the meeting of Synod. I have tried to fill the accustomed round of duty as my ability served. But shortly after the Board enjoined me to resume my services at Peninsula, I was laid by for a season with an attack of crysipelas, and was so weakened by it, as to be unable to resume those services, and am still too feeble to attend there or at Little Gaspé. I hope that this is but a passing indisposition, and that my strength will soon return. In the mean time, I am most happy to find that an arrangement has been made with the Rev. Mr. Richmond, of Gaspé Basin, to supply my lack of service.

SHIGAWAKE AND PORT DANIEL.

The Rev. Dr. Roe reports:

By request of the Bishop's Commissary and the Diocesan Board, I gave my Christmas vacation to the vacant Mission of Shigawake. This Mission is familiar ground to me, as I have spent 3 of my summer vacations in charge of it.

The Mission lies along the Baie des Chalenrs, from the Little Nouvelle River on the West, to the Grand Pabos Rivers on the East; a distance of about 30 miles of coast line. It is made up of 3 settlements, those of Shigawake, Port Daniel and L'Anse-au-Gascon. There are 3 Churches, all in good repair, and a good Parsonage not in good repair. and a Glebe of 33 acres of good land. The Parsonage has not been occupied, with the exception of a brief interval for 7 years. The people are now taking measures for its repair. They are both able and willing to repair it; and very well able, as all the Missions on the coast are, and cheerfully willing to pay their assessments. I may here say how pleased I was to find these good people, while left alone without a pastor, of their own accord, the men of Port Daniel getting everything ready to add a chancel to their Church next Spring, those of Shigawake, to shingle their Parsonage, and those of L'Anse-au-Gascon to complete their Church, all without thinking of asking help from abroad. In Shigawake, there are exactly 60 families belonging to the Church, all the Protestants of the place, except 4 families of Presbyterians. In Port Daniel there are about 30 Church families, and many Presbyterians. In L'Anse-au-Gascon, including all the Protestants as far down as Pabos, 19 or 20 Protestant families, all of them, I think, belonging to the Church. To those families, I paid in Shigawake 80 pastoral visits, in Port Daniel, 7, and in L'Anse-au-Gascon, 3. I gave 18 public services, viz.: in Shigawake, 8, Port Doniel, 7, L'Anse-au-Gascon, 3, I administered the Holy Communion twice in each of the larger Churches, and once in L'Anse-au-Gascon, and twice in private. I baptised 10 children. The greatest number friend

8. I of the twice umber of communicants present at one time was, in Shigawake Church, 31; in Port Daniel, 22; and in L'Anse-au-Gascon, 15. There are 3 Sunday Schools in the Mission, two of them large, and in excellent order, and conducted with a simple, earnest persistency, which is worthy of all praise. All these have been carried on now for 3 years and a-half very successfully. It has been a great satisfaction to me to visit these Schools and render such assistance as was in my power on the occasions of my sojourn in the Mission. They have had upwards of 150 children in attendance, with an average of, perhaps, 100. The superintendents are Mr. Wm. Skene, at Shigawake; Mr. Wm. McDonald, at Port Daniel; and Mr. Philip Acteson, at L'Anse-au-Gascon. The Port Daniel Sunday School has received very valuable aid from its beginning, from Miss Gadd, the excellent teacher of the District School; and the Shigawake School is receiving, this Winter, equally valuable aid from their new School teacher, Miss Sutton. I cannot speak too highly of the excellent spirit shown by the teachers of these 3 schools, nor of the good results attained. I have long felt anxious to do something for the young men of these congregations, in the way of forming some sort of religious society to bind them more closely together in resisting evil and in doing good, but hitherto hesitated to move in the matter until there was some certainty of a resident Missionary. Having heard, however, a few days before I left of a new danger likely to assail them, I resolved to make the venture; and on the evening of Monday, the 12th January, was formed a Young Men's Church Guild. Forty-seven of the young men of the place attended the meeting. The discussion of every point was full and free; and the constitution finally adopted was unanimously agreed to. It is to stand for 6 months, and then to be revised. The membership-pledge consists of a promise (1) to say their prayers night and morning, and to encourage as far as they may with propriety, Family Prayers in all their families. (2.) Not to swear, and to discourage in others swearing and wrong talk, at all times. (3.) to abstain from intoxicants. And (4,) to attend the regular (weekly) meetings of the Guild. Thirtythree members enrolled themselves on the spot, and 12 have since joined. I look on this as a very hopeful movement: This was in Shigawake. The Guild is open to the Port Daniel people: but as the young men there have a successful Good Templars' Lodge in operation, it is not likely that many of them will join; besides the distance renders it difficult.

I must not pass over without mention a very successful "Christmas Tree" in Shigawake, on the evening of the Epiphany. For this beautiful Tree, the congregation were mainly indebted to the exertions of Miss Sutton, who has, during the three months of her residence in the place, made herself universally beloved. The joy and delight of all, young and old, in their Christmas Tree, was something to be long remembered. The presents were largely from the people of the place; a valuable purse from some kind friends in Paspebiac; and a good bundle from Mrs. Before leaving, I proposed to the Church Wardens of Shigawake, that they should now take advantage of the vacancy of the Mission to get up a new Diocesan Board subscription-list, to come into use after the next appointment of a Clergyman. There has been no regular subscription-list in the Mission for some 7 years. To this work the Church-Warden and myself devoted two days, and the result was very satisfactory. The young unmarried men of the place are all now, for the first time, subscribing a dollar a year each. This proposal came from themselves. This good example is being also followed in Port Daniel. It is right to say that the Church-Wardens in all 3 congregations are very efficient. All the Diocesan Board assessments of the Mission are now paid up to 31st December, 1879, and the Churches and Parsonage are insured for 3 years in the London and Liverpool. They have, too, an excellent system for the collection of their quarterly subscriptions, set in motion by the Rev. Mr. Harvey. On an appointed Sunday each quarter, each subscriber deposits on the Church-plate his quarterly subscription in an envelope, with his name. The system works well. Mr. Harvey is affectionately remembered throughout the Mission.

Linust not forget to add that the Rev. T. Blaylock held services in each of the 3 Churches, on the first Sundays in November and December, and will continue to do so on the first Sundays in February and the following months, till a resident Clergyman is appointed. Mr. Blaylock's services are much appreciated throughout the Mission. it is not distance

STANSTEAD.

The Rev. Geo. Thorneloe reports:-

Since last year my register shows a record of 1 marriage, 13 baptisms, and 8 burials. The services in the village of Stanstead have been maintained with customary regularity throughout the year. I regret to add that, owing to uncert in health, I have been compelled to neglect my out stations during a considerable portion of that time. For the present winter it is my hope to keep up the usual village services and the out mission work in Beebe Plain.

We are beginning to think and speak of erecting a Church in the latter place, Beebe Plain, where there is already a small body of Church people and abundant material to work upon. It is of course true, as always, that many difficulties stand in the way, but they are not such as to make us despair.

At Christ Church, our chancel has been beautified and made more complete by the addition of a mercorial cross of very elegant design and workmanship, presented to the Church by the sorrowing triends of one of our oldest and most valued communicants, this year removed from our midst.

A very pleasing mark of esteem and good will was tendered to me at the beginning of the year, in the form of a new sleigh and harness. These, in themselves most acceptable and seasonable gifts, were chiefly prized as evidences of the kind feeling entertained towards me by

my people.

The Mission is indebted to Mr. Weatherdon, of Bishop's College, for kind and efficient help during the summer months; and I here record my personal gratitude to that gentleman whose assistance enabled me to enjoy a much needed rest.

A successful Bazaar, held about Christmas time last year, added \$200 to our Parsonage Fund. Other sums have been raised towards the same object in the course of the year. And I am rejoiced to be able to state that a very desirable house, close by the Church, in excellent repair, with one acre of ground attached, has been secured, and is now occupied as a Parsonage. \$1,000 were paid in cash upon the purchase; other \$450 have been subsequently subscribed or collected, and a debt of something over \$1,000 remains yet upon the property. This debt we hope entirely to remove in the course of a few years.

It is but fair that I should acknowledge the hearty and efficient co-operation of our Church Wardens, Messrs. Richardson and Channel; the latter gentleman's warm interest and untiring energy have contributed largely to

what I may call our hopeful financial condition.

As regards spiritual matters—though they are of course first and most important—little can be said in a brief report like this. Spiritual edification cannot easily be estimated by material appliances, nor put down upon paper in words and figures. Suffice it to say that we have cause to look up with thankful hearts to the giver of all good, acknowledging many spiritual as well as temporal mercies. The hand of death has been at work amongst us. We hope the hand of life has not been withheld. I append the usual financial statement.

The Rev. J. B. Debbage reports:—

I was allowed to hold services there for a time, but had to suspend them, because the congregation could not come to an agreement with the Diocesan Board. WEST FRAMPTON AND CRANBOURNE.

The Rev. J. S. Sykes draws attention to an unfortunate error in his report of last year, by which he is made to say that they have in Frampton plenty of age with its crabbedness instead of without its crabbedness. He then proceeds to draw attention to his appeal in last year's report for the sum of \$250 to pay off a debt on the Parsonage, and states that the \$250 has not yet been received. His appeal, he is sorry to say, has been unnoticed for a whole year, arguing little for the oneness of the Church and the care one member should have for another. It would appear also that one member can suffer and the others not suffer with

He asks again for the \$250, not to add to his own comfort by enabling him to finish the building, but simply to free it from debt. He adds, whatever small degree of accommodation and comfort he and his family enjoy are owing to his own toil, and that without neglecting his own proper work. The opportunity has been offered to him of securing labour and materials on credit, but this he absolutely refused, believing it to be dishonest to increase a debt which the Congregation are powerless to pay. The Assessment to the Diocesan Board has been regularly paid, but not without some diniculty.

Mr. Sykes further reports; we have lost one family by removal to Manitoba; and some young men have taken their departure to the States. Death has also claimed five

of our number.

There has been no falling off in the attendance at our Services—we may say the same of our Sunday School, Mr. Dickson, the School-master, kindly assisting me, as he does always in everything connected with the welfare of the children.

The Society is under great obligations to Miss Clara Calway and Miss Martha Bartholomew for the sums collected toward its funds, had it not been for their willing and prompt assistance our list of subscribers would have been small indeed. Miss J. A. Hurley deserves my best thanks for her kindness in undertaking the collection for a Christmas Tree—no light task where people are so scattered.

I must not omit to thank my kind friend J. V. Gale, Esq., of Quebec, for a large bundle of Illustrated Almanaes, enough for me to give one to every family in West Frampton.

At the Parsonage, as usual, we have received many giffs and experienced much kindness during the past year from our people.

The following reports have been received from clergymen not connected with the Diocesan Board:

BISHOP'S COLLEGE.

The Rev. Dr. Lobley, Principal of Bishop's College, reports:—

As the Missionary work of the College carried on under the direction of the Professor of Divinity in various outlying Stations, forms the subject of a separate report by the Rev. Dr. Roe, I have only to lay before this Association a brief record of the religious work that has been attempted during the year, within the College itself.

Since last December, the number of students has increased from 16 resident and 1 non-resident, to 19 resident and 6 non-resident. All of these, in a measure, but the resident students more especially, I regard as placed for the time under my pastoral care. They all partake, in what I cannot but regard as the inestimable privilege of daily morning and evening prayer in the College Chapel; and this privilege we now extend to all who live in the neighbourhood, several of whom highly appreciate and constantly use it. Besides these regular week-day services, we have a Sunday evening service with a sermon, for all members of the College, and the Rector of the College School has a similar service in the afternoon for the members of the School. The Holy Communion is celebrated on alternate Sundays, and on All Saints' Days, at 7 a.m. All these services are musical, and we strive to make them as bright and hearty as possible. The Chapel itself, the enlargement of which begun by Dr. Nicolls, was completed last year, has this year been further beautified by the addition of 4 memorial windows in the Chancel, and by some very fine decorative work of the Rector of the School on the Chancel wall.

We have a Missionary Union in College, founded by the late Principal, with a view of keeping up an interest in Foreign Missions in the hearts of our young men, of which Union all clergy of this Deanery are invited, by the rules, to become Honorary Members. The Union has a special service of its own every Term, and a meeting, at which papers are read by Students and others, and Missionary topics discussed.

The Bishop held a confirmation in our Chapel on Monday, February 24th, when 9 candidates were presented by the Rev. P. C. Read, Rector of the School.

Our offertories since January 1, have amounted to \$85.90, including \$16.50 collected at the Convocation service, June 26th. The following sums are appropriated to the various objects mentioned:—

Besides the sum last mentioned, the Members of the College have contributed, in the form of subscriptions to the Missionary Union, \$21.87, for the maintenance of Missionary work in the Diocese of Madagascar.

Next year, I hope to devote some portion of our offertories to the objects connected with our own Diocese, which are put before us by the Church Society, and I trust that we shall be able to do this, without at all diminishing the aid that we afford to the work of the Church in more distant parts.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE MISSIONS.

The Rev. Dr. Roe reports:-

The College Mission Stations now served from the College are Milby and Capelton, superintended by the Principal; and Ascot Corner, Westbury and Sandhill under the oversight of the Professor of Divinity. Island Brook still remains under the same oversight, and is still served by Mr. Mayo from Cookshire. The Stations of Moulton Hill, Mitchell's and Libby's Mills have been dropped for the present. The two former are within easy walking distance of the Parish Church and Sunday School of Lennoxville; and for Mr. Libby's Mills, Mr. Thorneloe thought it better in his impaired state of health to permit it to lapse for a time. been ordained and gone to their life-work, and have been replaced by Messrs. C. Browne, Richard Hewton and Woods.

Capelton was taken up as a College Mission some years ago, and conducted very successfully by the Rev. Professor Tambs. Owing however to local circumstances, into which it is unnecessary now to enter, Mr. Tambs felt compelled to withdraw in 1876 from the Mission, which has remained closed ever since. It has now been re-opened under favourable auspices, and the charge of it has been kindly undertaken by Principal Lobley, under whom Mr. Robert Browne, B.A., our Senior Divinity Student is working. During the midsummer vacation Mr. Duncan Mackenzie conducted the Services at Sandhill, as he has done frequently before with marked acceptance; and Mr. John Hewton those at Westbury and Ascot Corner. Mr. Rd. Hewton also relieved the Rev. J. Hepburn at Magog, and Mr. Chambers the Rev.

M. M. Fothergill, at Quebec.

The great events of the year, however, in these Missions have been the two "Missions" conducted in them by the Rev. Isaac Thompson, Rector of Melbourne and Richmond, the one in December, 1878 in Westbury, and the other at Sandhill, Eaton, which closed on Wednesday, the 3rd December, instant. The Westbury Mission was continued during ten and that at Sandhill during eleven days, and the effort in both has been the same,—that the hearts of the people in the entire neighbourhood have been moved as the heart of one man,—their interest in the Services growing steadily and deepening from the beginning to the end. The results have been most satisfactory. In Westbury 17 were Confirmed and 18 added to the list of Communicants; and other good and happy results followed, such as deepening of the religious life of old and faithful Communicants of the Church. These few words give but a faint idea of the good effected by the Westbury Mission. The results at Sandhill seem to be, so far as one can judge, even more striking. but perhaps it is too soon to form a calm and true estimate of what has been accomplished. So far, five have been added to the list of Communicants, and 12 adults have been baptized. It is right to say a majority of these did in some sense belong to us or were feeling their way towards us before. This class, of course, is always the first to be moved, but it is also right to say that they have come into our ranks through the influence of the Mission, with a fervency and a conviction which we trust will give them a most serious and lasting impulse for good beyond what they would otherwise have had. The religious carnestness, too, of old members has been quickened in a remarkable manner. But I am far from saying that these are all the results. Seeds have been sown which, I am satisfied will bear fruit, if only we are able to devote to their culture the necessary time and labour. Unfortunately all we can bestow on these Missions from Bishop's College is only a certain amount of Missionary, at the best falling very far short of ordinary parochial work.

COMPTON LADIES COLLEGE.

The Rev. J. Dinzey, Principal, reports:—

At the end of last June, the Compton Ladies' College completed the fifth year of its existence. During those five years more than 200 pupils were admitted within its walls. And though the Principal had many and great difficulties to contend with, he nevertheless was greatly encouraged in his work by the cordial support he received from parents in their expressions of approval at his conduct of the School.

For the present term, which commenced Sept. 10th, the number of pupils amount to thirty-four, i.e. 22 resident and 12 day-scholars, which equals the attendance last year. This number would have been greater this year, but, owing to unforeseen circumstances, several were prevented from attending, after having signified their intention of so doing. There is reason, however, for believing that there will be some eight or ten new entrants after Xmas.

Besides the Principal, who teaches for several hours each day, there is the Lady Principal, who is assisted by four governesses. There is also a teacher of needlework—and this year an addition has been made of a visiting Master, who gives instructions in Drawing, Painting and Botany.

The course of Instruction, which is subject to the supervision of the Bishop of the Diocese, is thorough, and as

advanced as the capacity of pupils will allow.

During the mid-summer Holidays, the interior of the College underwent thorough renovating—papering, painting, &c., &c. So that this year everything in and around the building is all that could be desired for comfort, health and happiness. In the grounds, in addition to the already existing appliances for the health and recreation of pupils, a gymnasium has been fitted up, and a class formed in Calisthenics; and the Skating Rink considerably enlarged.

All that is now required to make the Compton College a perfect success, is an increase in the number of pupils; and surely if, at the end of the first year, the Bishop of the Diocese, speaking from personal knowledge of the School, could bear witness to its excellence—with how much greater force may his Lordship's words on that occasion apply to the School in its present efficient condition. "I can testify that here is the very Institution, of the need of which I have heard so much."

A poor fellow whom I visited on his death-bed, with mind too far gone to receive the Holy Communion, or indeed as I feared to understand my intercession for him, seemed to have a gleam of intelligence granted him, for he turned upon his bed with great exertion and stroked my face while at prayers.

Many of these poor mad people are intelligent enough on some subjects—quite sane in fact—while on others they

are wild.

About forty prayer books with hymns are required for the use of the chapel. I hope some one will kindly help

me to get them.

Lake Beauport.—The Bishop having appointed me to take charge of this Mission for a time, I worked it for six months, during which time the services were conducted with the utmost regularity and were well attended.

I had the happiness of instructing a class twice-a-week and presenting eight candidates for confirmation on 18th

May.

A collection for the Church Society has been made in this Mission by Miss Vial, who conducts a Sunday School, the only Christian gathering under the present unhappy condition of the Mission.

NEW LIVERPOOL.

The Rev. F. A. Smith reports: -

There has been no interruption to our regular work, which continues, on the whole, fairly encouraging. The Church services have been steadily maintained and well attended, considering our small English population. The Sunday School shows some increase in the number of children.

ST. PETER'S CHURCH, SHERBROOKE.

The Rev. I. Brock reports:-

In Advent, 1878, the number of communicants was reported to be 257. During the Church's year, which has just closed, 7 have left, 4 have died, and 5 have been taken off the roll, as having for the time ceased to be communicants. 21 new names have been added during the year to the roll of communicants; so that in Advent, 1879, the number stands at 262. There have been 30 celebrations of the Holy Communion in St. Peter's Church during the year. The usual services on the Lord's Day, other Church Festivals, and Wednesday evenings have been maintained by the Rector and myself; the congregations, except at the week-day evening services, have been generally good.

In February last, our Sunday School Library was reopened, with 370 new books, and in October last our Parochial Lending Library was re-opened with 250 books. Both Libraries have pigeon-hole cases and printed Catalogues.

The Sunday School has 140 names on the roll, with an average attendance of 115. There are 5 classes of boys and 6 of girls, taught by 11 diligent, pains-taking and most regular teachers.

During the past year there have been, according to the register, 45 Baptisms, 6 Marriages, and 30 Burials, in connection with St. Peter's Church.

In the financial summary below, the Collections for the Church Society are made up to Nov. 29, 1879, the other items unless indicated by a date, are taken from the financial statements submitted by the Church-Wardens and myself to our Vestry on last Easter Monday.

FORMS OF BEQUESTS AND DEVISES BY WILL.

I. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.

I give and bequeath to "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, Queen Victoria, chapter 171, the sum (or Shares of Stocks in the Bank of standing in my name in the Books of the said Bank, or of Debentures, describe them briefly,) upon trust to be by the said Church Society applied to and for the uses and purposes of the said Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation and none other.

II. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italics say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Sustentation Fund.

Or,

Towards the support of missionaries and clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund. Chur held of a I and t the sa

For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the United Church of England and Ireland, and the Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of churches according to the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage

houses,—the setting apart of burial grounds and churchyards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

III. A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.

I give and devise unto "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, all and singular, &c., [describe the real estate clearly,] to have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors, for ever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

IV. A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

Same as in No. 3—only instead of the words in Italics insert the specific purposes, as in No. 2.

V. A Devise to the Society of a site for Church, &c.

Same as No. 3, down to the words "for ever"—then go on as follows:—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say: upon the trusts to hold the same forever hereafter as and for the place and site of a Church and church-yard, and burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the places adjacent to the said site and premises within the said Diocese of Quebec, according to the doctrine and discipline of the United Church of England and Ireland, and for no other purposes, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.


