Imperator, at Southampton, Visited by Officials Before Leaving on Maiden Voyage -Docks Must Be Made Bigger to Accommodate Ships Yet to Be Built.

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., June 12 .-On her maiden voyage to New York the 50,000 ton steamship Imperator, the largest vessel in service, called here today. Her captain, Hans Reiser, was extremely cautious in manoeuvring the mammoth craft. Instead of ringing her to the line's docks he anchored her off Ryde, Isle of Wight, and took on passengers from tenders ust as was done in the roadstead off Hamburg, the ship being too big for the docks there.

Her enormous size would have shown to greater advantage lying at dock, but even in the wide waterway her immense bulk and hardly graceful proportions were profoundly impres-

Only one hour aboard was allowed to visitors, the time being wholly inadequate to see even a tenth of the vessel's features. The Hon. A. McCarlisle, the designer

Mayor Bowyer of Southampton, a pliot by calling, and a brother of the pilot in charge of the Imperator, went aboard in his official robes and wearin the chain of his office. He was accompanied by other civic officials, including the mace bearer.

Striking Ball Room. It was generally agreed that the Imperator's most striking feature is the ball room, with a cantilever roof, obviating the use of pillars. Ordinarily this would be the music saloon. It is upholstered in delicate rose and pan-

eled with tapestry. Neither of the two self-contained flats was let this voyage. During the busy season \$5000 is charged for each, total accommodation being provided for ten persons, including servants. During the slack season the charge

will be \$3500.

Another feature is the special machinery driven by electric motors, which enables one man to lower a lifeboot fully loaded from the top of the deck. The Imperator is the first vessel to be fitted with this new device.

There is a full complement of passengers, almost three thousand, including the steerage. There is no star passenger of world-wide celebrity. Most of those in the cabins are Germans. SAY THAT JUDGE MISLED THE JURY

That the prisoner was not given the benefit of a doubt, that the verdict was contrary to the evidence and that the sentence itself was passed in a spirit of petulance, resentment and prejudice, constitute some of the bases for the appeal. It is also maintained that Judge Morgan exceeded his powers in including a perjury charge and that the calling of the complainant to the box after the jury verdict was in, but before sentence was passed was entirely contrary to legal practice.

By special leave of the court the motion will appear in the appellate court and a new trial will be asked.



Chicken livers are used in the place of Strasburg goose liver or calf's liver. It may be baked in a loaf and made very ornamental. It is the richest dish in the American cuisine.

Prepare the liver by chopping, seasoning and putting thru a sieve and then mixing with the panada or thick base.

The seasoning to be added is butter, salt, pepper and a little nutmeg. One pound of calf's liver will need the yolk of two eggs, a fourth of a pound of butter and a half a cup of panada.

Pass mixture again thru sieve and put in a mold: place in a panel.

This dish may be served hot, with brown sauce, but is best very cold with decorations of aspic jelly en masque, or cut in forms as with real pate de foie gras, and used with salad.

de foie gras, and used with salad.

False terrapin is made with meat from calf's head well cooked. Make the panada with browned butter and flour so it will be very dark. Serve very hot with more sauce than forcemeat. Another way to serve this very rich forcemeat is to press it into cutlet or small ring molds while hot. Unmold when cold and egg and crumb and fry in deep fat.

One form of forcemeat is called salpicon; for this the meat is cooked before it is chopped. Calf's brains, oysters, sweetbreads and lobsters are all used and mushrooms are usually added.

The heavy cream sauce is made very rich and the finished dish is used in shells, frontage cups, croustades and for vol-au-vent. Always bear

meats by light sauces.

Forcemeat timbales are made in cylinder molds with hollow centres. These molds are made for this especial purpose and are useful for other forms of molding. When cold these forms are unmolded and the quenelles filled with salpicon or other fillings.

Recipe for beef forcemeat: Half pound beef tenderloin, fourth of pound of calf's brains, fourth cup of cooked ham, fourth cup chopped spinach, three egg yolks, seasoning; mix with enough panada to moisten. When cold and firm cut in squares and poach for garnishes.

For veal forcemeat: Fry three tablespoons of onion in three tablespoons of butter without browning either, put in the chopped veal and seasoning. Add a cup of broth and four egg yolks. Reduce carefully when heavy enough to shape, mold and when cold cut in triangles, bread and fry.

Chicken forcemeat: Half a pound of light or dark chicken meat chopped and pressed as directed. Half a pound of veal udder—udder is the fat that lies about the kernel of veal. It should be tied in a cloth and cooked in hot broth, or water, well salted. When cooked, chop and put thru a sieve with the chicken or meat, four egg yolks and a cup of heavy velvet white sauce. Mix and put thru the sieve once more.

Chicken forcemeat is a dainty suitable for lining cases, bottoms of dishes that are to be inverted, and for borders.

Whipped cream forcemeat is used only on white meats and for especially dainty occasions—ladies' luncheons, for instance. Make a fine forcemeat and add heavy whipped cream as it is passed thru the sieve for the last time. Use for a garnish.





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

Without a word of command being spoken, the largest elephant in each of the three groups in the three rings, walk rapidly forward, steps astride the prostrate trainer, stretches its hind legs behind him and then lowers its huge bulk until it is resting upon that, which would be in a human being, his elbows. The trainers are viring, his elbows. The trainers are viring covered by the monstrous bulk of the tons of elephant flesh above him. It seems almost inconceivable these men are not flattened into pancakes, but the length of the forearms safe—the elephant's weight is increased by four additional elephants in each group placing their bodies upon the recumbent beast.

Yet another marvelous illustration of the almost human intelligence of the elephant is found in the elephant same, also trained by Prof. Mooney.

Surgical research has proved that operations in the thoracic cavity can be performed as easily as in the abdomen. according to Dr. Alexis Carrel of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research in New York.

In the course of a lecture today at the Beaujon Hospital in Paris. the Nobel prize-winner declared that experiments on animals had demonstrated the heart to be an organ of very great resistance and that it does not suffer harm if the circulation is interrupted for five or even ten minutes.







SYNOPSIS OF DOMINION LAND
REGULATIONS.

A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A nomesteader may live within nine miles of his comestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fitty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. 


