

REPORT OF COQUALEETZA INDUSTRIAL INSTITUTE.

We have pleasure in presenting to the Conference our report of the work of another year. There is a slight increase in attendance. Our present enrolment is 105. The past year has been one of progress along all lines. In their studies and in their industries there has been very gratifying advance. In their morals and in their spiritual life the improvement has been such as to greatly cheer our hearts, and with profound gratitude to God we feel that our labor has not been in vain. The services of our Annual Camp-meeting at Chilliwack were very helpful. All the social means have been regularly maintained, as well as the Sabbath School and the preaching of the Word. In proof of the industrial progress of the children we can point with pride to the prizes carried off by our pupils at the agricultural exhibitions of Chilliwack and New Westminster in the general competition, not with Indians, but with all classes of competitors. In the provincial exhibition at New Westminster last autumn in competition with four other industrial schools-ali Roman Catholic-in which special prizes were offered, Coqualectza held easily the first place, and won the first prize. Our Methodist Industrial Institute at Chilliwack stands fairly and easily at the head of all the institutes of our province, and we propose to go forward to greater things.

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APPENDIX.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

The New Testament never calls the Christian minister a priest except together with the members of his church; therefore, we claim no peculiar priestly power that does not belong to you. "Ye also as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God by Jesus Christ." Therefore, we urge you, while you rightly claim equal priestly power with us, not to forget your own sacred character-not to neglect your own ministerial duty. Do not yield to the impression that laymen may be less self-denying, less devoted to the work of our Lord than ministers. Every member of the Church is equally bound to the service of the Hoad of the Church. Your mission equally with ours is that of our great Master who came to give men life. What we give depends upon what we have; what we have depends upon what we receive, and what we receive depends upon the depth and the constancy of our communion with God. We affectionately urge you to learn the deep meaning of the words: "Without me ye can do nothing." "As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine, no more can ye except ye abide in me." "He that abideth in me and I in

him, the same bringeth forth much fruit."

That you may receive and convey spiritual strength, make the best possible use of all opportunities of public worship. Be found in the house of prayer with a reverent and worshipful spirit. Listen to God's Word with an understanding heart and an applying conscience. Let your thoughts and conversation be such as become the gospel. Cultivate reverence in spirit and deportment. Let no part of the service be unworthy of God's House and children. Noble music is helpful as an instrument of moral instruction. Its power to convince, persuade, inspire, comfort and make strong is immeasurable. There is, however, a tendency in public worship to degrade this effective instrument of spiritual discipline and growth to the level of an entertainment. Against this dangerous tendency we warn you. It is right and wise that you should put under the direction of your pastor trained persons, who, by discreet and dexterous management of voice and instrument, have the power to lead the congregation in the expression of great truths that are embodied in beautiful, true and rhythmic words which are sanctified by loveliness of sound. But you should no more think of your choir as set apart for your musical pastime than you should think of your minister as ordained and placed in the pulpit for your elocutionary, literary or scientific recreation. In your thought, invest the anthem and the prayer, the sermon and the hymn with equal sacredness, and look to the Holy Ghost for an equal blessing from each. Pray for those who lead the service of song in the House of the Lord as you pray for those who preach the Word, and in the musician no less than the preacher value a pure purpose above fine execution.

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Christianity permits the free use of wholesome, manly pleasures. True religion makes every faculty more sensitive to joy. You have a right to every pleasure that makes you stronger and better. You have a right to nothing that weakens your heart's hold upon God. We cannot give a list of pleasures, defining accurately those which are sinful and those which are innocent; nor a complete set of rules for your guidance in the choice of amusements. God's Word governs by principles, not "My son, give me thine heart." In that requirement is settled every question as to the harm or innocence of every pleasure, for "out of the heart are the issues of life." Do not ask, "Where is the precise text or rule that forbids or allows this or that amusement?" but "What effect will the indulgence have upon my Christian character?" Noprecise command may be violated, yet if your heart's hold upon God is weakened you virtually violate every precept, for as love is the fulfilling of the whole law the want of love is the transgression of it.

Think of sin not as a theory, but as an awful fact-not as a dream, but as a deadly reality to be fought against for our life. Never forget that Jesus Christ came to save men from their sins not in them. In humble dependence upon the Holy Ghost cleanse yourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, and work together with God for the salvation of men. Other things being equal, effort will be effective in exact proportionto its timeliness, therefore use all means to win children and young people to Christ. While we are thankful for the good work accomplished in our Epworth Leagues and Sunday Schools, we remind you that the best Sunday School or Epworth League that ever was organized is no substitute for the home. The school can do no more than teach—the home must: train. No school system, however efficient-no church, however zealous, can supply the lack of care and faithfulness in the family. Neither minister nor teacher can take the place of the father and mother, the living epistles of their lives should the children read the character of Him who is infinite in the majesty and strength of the father, in thetender and in escribable graces of the mother. The first duty of parents is to be the father, the strength—the mother, the sanctification—and boththe chosen tefuge of their children through all weakness, evil and danger of their young lives. Therefore, win the confidence of your children and keep it as the chief treasure committed in trust to you by God. Resigna your high and holy office to no minister—to no teacher. Do not lightly cast away your sceptre and crown.

We feel both gratitude and anxiety as we observe among you the rapid increase of wealth-gratitude to the Giver of every good and perfect gift, and anxiety lest you should not possess your riches but be possessed by them. Men who are accumulating wealth are exposed to great danger, but manifold perils beset their children, who are not surrounded by the safeguards that come from the discipline of toil. On the Pacific coast adrowned eagle and a dead salmon are occasionally washed up by the waves upon the beach. The eagle, fastening on the salmon, finds the fish large and strong, and embarrassed by its riches the rapacious bird is drowned.

As with the eagle, so with men; death comes from clutching. "They that will be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and into many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition." O men of God, flee these things. Recognize, and teach your children to recoges. True

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nize, thoroughly and practically the truth that we are stewards and not proprietors. Value the Giver above all His gifts. Make Him the centre of your spirit and your soul's chief joy.

We do not dictate to you as to the objects among which your wealth should be distributed. The choice must be left to your own prayerful judgment. But we mention as worthy of special liberality the St. James Church and Twentieth Century Funds. The amounts subscribed and already paid by the members of the Montreal Conference and the Trustees of St. James warrant us in believing that this important interest of our common Methodism will be saved if we do our duty. In the Twentieth Century Fund we have the opportunity out of full and grateful hearts of contributing as God has prospered us to the main interests of our Church. Our benevolence should be founded in gratitude. God has greatly blessed us. We owe to Him. To Him we cannot pay, but He permits us to make the return to His cause. Freely ye have received, freely give. Give as if you were placing the gift in the nail-pierced hand.

It is our duty as ministers to teach and enforce by precept and example the principles of Christianity. It is your especial duty to embody these principles in all the business, laws, organizations and customs of society. The New Testament contemplates not only the regeneration of the individual, but also the organization of these individuals in a perfected society which is described in the New Testament as the Kingdom of Heaven or the Kingdom of God. Before individual Christians are united in this perfected organization, many existing wrongs must be rectified--many existing laws and customs of society must be changed. Work for this in the Spirit of our Lord. Remember that no great change for the better can ever be easily accomplished, or quickly; nor by bad men, nor even by good men without much suffering; nor can it be advanced by ignorant, impatient, impulsive, ill-regulated effort. Therefore, in all your attempts to reform society, be governed not by the "spirit of fear; but of power and of love and of a sound mind." Let no poverty, no injustice and oppression sour your spirit or engender thoughts and feelings unworthy of Christian manhood. Do not lose the first and greatest of possessions self-possession.

To men who have business capacity, power to organize industrial armies and make their labor profitable, the tempter comes as he came to Christ with the old promise—power to command instead of power to bless—supremacy instead of love—"the kingdoms of this world and the glory of them." Mansions, costly furniture and cquipages—retinues of servants—luxury—splendor are offered as the rewards of power used selfishly. We beseech you to resist this temptation. Use your great gifts as Christ used His power—to guide, to guard, to heal, to redeem. To the outcast and destitute, to the toilers who need direction, you may be true leaders and kings and as such be reverenced and obeyed, but if you would have this power, you must, like our Lord, employ your gifts not for glory but for use. You must be content like Him to be personally poor that you may prove yourselves the servants of God—"as poor, yet making many rich."

Poor and rich, refined and degraded, moral and vicious, form in the nation one body politic. If one member suffer all the members suffer with it. You cannot give paralysis to one side of the body and have the other

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side go on its way rejoicing. The mar who is insensible to suffering and vice is not only responsible for the sin, but is tainted and dishonored by its foulness. Therefore as you value your country, your Church, your home and your own soul, seek out and wage unrelenting war with every form of oppression, injustice and vice. While much may be done by reforming our laws and by removing temptations, all moral results that are gained by legislation are gained but temporarily. All the legislation in the world will not regenerate the man. Measures must be taken to reach the source of good and evil-the human heart. Short of the new birth we must not stop. Devote your energy and strength to secure the salvation of men. While you rely upon the Holy Spirit and make no compromise with sin, observe the prejudices and tendencies of the community, and work with your pastor in adapting your instruments and methods to its peculiarities. Concentrate your effort upon individuals. Select your man, pray for him, study him, carry him constantly in your mind. Adapt yourself and your methods to his character. In the spirit of Paul and of Jesus Christ become all things to all men that you may by all means save some. Be wise to win souls. You are working under the infallible Teacher and Guide, therefore despair of no sinner. Never let him go until you share the thrill of triumph that is felt by God Himself, for there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner that

May God teach us how to work, how to work together, how to work together with Him, that the living Word may have free course and be glorified until all sin shall cease—until God's Kingdom shall come and His will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Let us lift up the standard of our Lord-not by might, nor by power, but by His Spirit bringing

forth judgment unto victory.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE REPORT.

The Committee submits the following recommendations:

1. That we desire our people to regard the Lord's Day as a divine institution, with Scriptural authority.

2. That, therefore, men have no right, by public vote or legal enactment, to annul the divine law, or to interfere with the observance of the day as divinely appointed for rest and worship.

3. That the attention of our people be frequently directed to the great importance of the observance of the Lord's Day, and, in accordance with the recommendation of the General Conference, that one sermon at least be preached during the Conference year to every congregation, in which shall be set forth the Billical and other grounds for the

sacred observance of the day.

4. That we urge our people to consider that unscrupulous men and corporations are seeking to secure the day for purposes of worldly pleasure and mercenary ends, that enemies of Christianity are particularly assaulting this stronghold of the Christian religion and national wellbeing, determined on its overthrow. In the light of this fact, we earnestly request our people to strengthen their belief, and dir at their practice towards the principle that the Lord's Day is a necessity in order to maintain the highest interests of the individual, of industrial, commer-

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cial, social and political life, and to secure the speedy establishment of the Kingdom of Christ on earth.

5. That the claims of the Lord's Day be carefully presented to our young people in the Epworth League, in the Sunday School, and in the homes.

6. That we suggest to the editors of our periodicals the importance of a continuance of the excellent work they have been doing in educating public opinion on this great question, and that all friends of the Lord's Day use the press as a medium for the dissemination of sound views on the preservation of the Lord's Day.

7. That we express our disapproval of the many forms of Sabbath desecration in domestic, social, and business life. We would respectfully urge our people to avoid the holding of funerals on the Lord's Day, except in cases of extreme necessity; to discountenance social visiting; the performance of any business transaction; the travelling for business or pleasure on the Lord's Day; the keeping open of retail places of business to too late an hour Saturday nights; to use earnestly their influence against all unnecessary Sabbath traffic on railways, street-cars, ateamboats, and all public conveyances; to favor the Saturday half-holiday for employees of all classes, with a view to the better observance of the Lord's Day; to regard with disfavor the use of the bicycle and other private conveyances for the purpose of worldly pleasure-seeking on the Lord's Day; to discontinue the buying and selling of Sunday newspapers; patronizing places of business that open their doors on the Lord's Day; and that we earnestly request our young people to use their influence to secure the incorporation into the rules of bicycle clubs of a resolution discouraging Sunday riding for worldly pleasure to the neglect of public worship.

6. That we recommend to the cordial sympathy and practical support of our people the Lord's Day Alliance, an organization which has accomplished most commendable results in the education of the public mind, and in the legal defence of the Lord's Day against the encroach-

ments of individuals and corporations.

9. That we express our deep regret, and enter our earnest protest against the present unsatisfactory condition of the Lord's Day Act, especially in view of recent interpretations of that Act; and express our concurrence with the action recently taken to submit a test case to the Supreme Court for an authoritative interpretation of the laws, and hope for a favorable decision. In the meantime, and whatever that decision may be, we repeat our demand for legislation in accordance with the divine law, the sentiments of the majority of the citizens of the province, and the physical and moral well-being of the workingmen of the land.

10. That in view of the constant and ever-increasing encroachments on the sanctity of the Lord's Day, and the vital importance of its permanent defence and preservation, we earnestly recommend the people of Methodism to unite in unceasing prayer to God, that statesmen, corporations, governments, and a liberty-loving people be led to realize the essential

relation of the Sabbath law to our future national prosperity.

12. That this report be presented to all the congregations within the

bounds of the Conference on some Sabbath during the year.

13. We record our profound sense of gratitude to God that in London, Eng., and .hroughout the entire kingdom of Great Britain, the voice of

public sentiment and the conscience of the nation was such that the Sunday newspaper was sternly rebuked and that the Daily Mail and Telegraph were compelled to cease their Sabbath issue. We trust that this fact may have a salutary influence, not only in Great Britain, but also in our own Dominion.

TEMPERANCE REPORT.

The past year was a memorable one in the history of temperance and prohibition by reason of the plebiscite, taken on the 29th September and resulting in a substantial majority in favor of the total prohibition of the liquor traffic.

The fact is deplored that, in the single province of Onebec, an adverse vote was recorded, but, while fully realizing the gravity of the situation thus created, we cannot admit it as a sufficient has a sufficie

We do not falter in our deep conviction that the right and only effective remedy for the evils of intemperance is in total national prohibition, and that nothing short of this be accepted as a settlement of the liquor question; that the Methodist Church must continue its uncompromising warfare against the liquor traffic for beverage purposes until it shall be totally abolished.

We would strongly recommend to the Dominion Parliament that it enact a general prohibitory law, to be called into operation in any province or territory by the vote of the electorate. This would be but a small concession to the demand of the people, so emphatically expressed, and should receive the support of every friend of prohibition in Parliament.

Great responsibility rests upon the Christian electors of the Provision, and we would strongly urge upon all Methodist voters that report are of using their influence in the selection of reliable men as addidates for all public positions, and of uniting heartly in their election. It is regretted that in some recent bye-elections this matter has not open made distinctly and unmistakably an issue before the electorate.

Attention is called to the rapid growth of the use of cigarettes, especially among the boys of our towns and cities. We desire to urge upon parents the necessity of being watchful concerning the habits of their children, and to impress upon them the fact that greater responsibility rests upon them than upon either Church or Parliament.

We regrot the necessity of again calling attention to the sale of liquor in our military encampments. The canteen is a prolific cause of drunkenness, rowdyism and dissipation. The volunteers are met with the canteen, and, in many instances, those who have gone into camp pure and temperate have returned accustomed, if not addicted, to the use of intoxicants. We protest against the apparent violation of law in this respect.

We notice with satisfaction the result action of the Orange Grand Lodge of British North America in resolving to withhold in future the

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range Grand in future the privileges of membership from any person engaged in liquor-selling, and would strongly recommend to other fraternal and national societies the adoption of a similar course.

We call the attention of superintendents of Sunday Schools to paragraphs 305 and 306 of the Discipline, regarding the inculcation of temperance principles in the Sunday School, and earnestly recommend that immediate action be taken in harmony therewith.

We gratefully acknowledge the self-denying labors of the W.C.T.U. and of the Dominion Alliance, and wish the members of these organizations

God-speed in their work.

It would appear that paragraph 492 of the Discipline, which provides for holding annually on each circuit and mission a public temperance meeting, with a collection, has not been generally observed. We direct attention to this important matter.

We heartily appreciate the action of the Minister of Justice in introducing much-needed amendments to the Criminal Code, providing for the further protection of young girls, also amending the laws respecting

lotteries and obscene literature.

EPWORTH LEAGUE REPORT.

In a review of the various Conference reports in connection with this very interesting and promising department of the Methodist Church—

The Epworth League—we note the following:

1. There is a small decrease in the number of Societies, chiefly among the Juniors, and we would urge that greater attention be paid to the organization and maintenance of the Junior Societies. A decrease is also reported in League membership, the associate members being largely responsible for the falling off, as in many instances they do not promote. Some attribute decrease to negiect of pastors and older members of the Church, and others say it is owing to a disinclination on the part of young people to share in the active work of the Society. A more earnest effort is recommended in retaining the associate members and encouraging them to "move up." Another reason assigned for decrease is that many who stood by the League in its initial stage have ceased to be members, but on the whole those in affinition are people who both "look up and lift up," and are rendering

2. The Forward Missionary Movement has been very heartily endorsed during the past year, and a substantial increase reported in missionary givings. "Pray, study, give," is considered a good motto for all our young people. A growing interest is manifest in aggressive missionary work, and this is being greatly aided by the systematic organization of districts, and the assuming of the maintenance of men and women in the mission fields. The resultant increase of missionary knowledge, liberality and enterprise is most cheering. League missionary moneys should be paid over to the pastor and forwarded by the disciplinary channels, and we recommend that a column be arranged on circuit schedules for report of Epworth League missionary contributions. Missionary libraries should be found in Leagues wherever possible.

3. We record with pleasure the successful advent of the excellent League paper—The Era. The rapid increase in its circulation, now over

5,000, is the best proof of the appreciation with which it is received. Editor Crews is the recipient of congratulations on all sides.

4. The Reading Course has been a phenomenal success, and should be encouraged by every pastor and president. Form a Circle and try it for

a year.

5. It is strongly urged that Leagues should organize according to constitution (see paragraph 328, sec. 7, sub-sec. 6), so as to give uniformity and completeness to annual returns. This is a point that should not be

overlooked.

6. The Forward Evangelistic Movement opens the door for grand conuests by Methodist young people. Personal piety must be cultivated. It is a necessity to spiritual development, and as an aid to this the Christian Endeavor department of the League should be warmly supported and the pledge often reviewed. Systematic and persistent Bible study should be practised more generally. We would also impress upon our young people their duty as Christian citizens in all matters pertaining to the public good, and concerted action on the temperance and other leading questions of the day.

7. We hope to see the Leaguers take a large and helpful part in raising the Twentieth Century Thanksgiving Fund, and pray that as they make their gifts to the Lord they may be grandly and gloriously blessed.

Statistical information regarding the Epworth League membership, missionary and other contributions, may be found on other pages.

May the Lord bless every League as in this Conference year they endeavor to lift the world to Christ.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

The reports from the various Conferences show a prosperous condition of this department of our work for the year. While a decrease in attendance is reported in some Conferences, this is more than made up in others, and in all there is a strong feeling of hopefulness and ancouragement in the possibilities for the future as guaranteed by the results of the past. The deepening sense of the importance of the Sunday School as the great, if not the greatest, factor in the solution of the problems committed to the Church is emphasized by each committee, and stress is laid upon the following points:

1. The necessity of a stronger grasp of the place and aim of the Sunday School. "Christ in the Church and the child in the midst,"

2. A higher sense of responsibility on the part of the Church for the work of teaching and managing the schools, and of supporting them

liberally, that the best possible facilities be provided.

3. A corresponding responsibility on the part of officers and teachers for the maintenance of the highest spiritual life and faithfulness to the work committed to them, as well as the most studious application possible by aid of teachers' meetings, Normal classes, and in every way, that they may secure the mental and practical equipment which the importance of the work demands.

4. Emphasis is placed upon the need of making anniversary occasions strongly spiritual, and attention is called to the fact that many schools are kept open for only a part of the year, and that, in many preaching

places, schools have not been organized as yet.

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5. Temperance study and work is advised, and the use of the catechism commended. The fact that the catechism is so little used is deplored. Sermons to children are recommended, and the use of our own Sunday School periodicals strongly advocated.

6. The Home Department is reported as increasing in numbers and efficiency, and receives most cordial endorsation in all the Conferences. "Much undone work in the Sunday School field is in this department and it would well repay more earnest effort."

7. Parents and pastors are urged to greater sympathy and accord with the Sunday School, and district officials are asked to give a place to discussion of the work in connection with Financial District Meetings.

8. Here, as elsewhere in the widening fields of church work, the great commission, "Go ye!" is comphasized, and, as always, the only halt that can be admissible is, "Tarry . . . till ye be endued with power from on high,"

MEMORIALS.

Re ANTICOSTI METHODISTS.

The following action was taken by the Montreal Conference: Moved by Rev. T. G. Williams, D.D., seconded by Rev. W. Jackson, D.D., and manimously adopted, That this Conference hereby expresses its regret that our brethren, members of the Methodist Church within the bounds of the Montreal Conference, residing on the Island of Anticosti, have by the veiled expression "natural and fair inference" been accused of one of the most heinous crimes of ancient or modern times, namely, that of luring vessels upon rocky coasts that the wreckers might profit by the loss of the property of others, even though this loss is almost certain to involve the sacrifice of human life. And inasmuch as the awful crime has been indignantly denied, and proof of the alleged crime demanded by the persons accused; and inasmuch as the attempt to reply to the challenge for proof is not only irrelevant, but entirely inconclusive, which served to exhibit openly the weakness and utter groundlessness of the charge made by a Minister of the Crown, on the floor of the House of Commons, we do not hesitate to characterize these accusations against Methodists, and named as members of our Church by the Hon. Israel Tarte, as unjust and untrue, and affirm that a gross insult has been offered our Church by the Minister of Public Works; and further we hold that in view of his failure to prove that the accused have been guilty of this heinous crime, not only against Christianity, but also against the sentiment of all who are not hopelessly sunk in barbarism, the Hon. Israel Tarte is bound to retract his words and apologize for them as publicly as he made his unproven charge against the members of a Church which holds a proud eminence among the law-abiding citizens of our Dominion and upon which Hon. Mr. Tarte has, with such andacity, cast an unprovoked insult. And inasmuch as during the months which have elapsed since he uttered what we consider a base slander, no apology has been offered nor any retraction has been made, we now beg to call the attention of the brethren of our Church throughout the Dominion to the matter, and ask that they join with us in demanding an apology for the gross attack on our beloved Methodism, and to which we here affirm we will not tamely submit, no matter by what spirit it may be prompted, or from what source it may come. And further that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Prime Minister of the Dominion, by the Secretary of this Conference. We also most heartily approve of and endorse the manly course of our ex-President, Dr. Griffith, in what we consider his vindication of the innocence of our brethren against this cowardly attack on the floor of the House of Commons.

This action was communicated to the Ontario Conferences, and by resolution or committee-report was strongly endorsed in each. Further action

by the Montreal Conference was taken as follows:

Moved by the Rev. T. G. Williams, D.D., seconded by Rev. W. I. Shaw, LL.D., and resolved, That this Conference, having listened with pleasure to the report given by our retiring President, the Rev. Dr. Griffith, of the interviews held with the Hon. Mr. Marchand, Premier of Quebec, the Hon. Mr. Duffy and the Hon. Mr. Parent, for the purpose of amicably and justly effecting a settlement of the difficulties existing between the inhabitants of Fox Bay on the Island of Anticosti, and Mr. Menier, desires to express its appreciation of the honorable and courteous manner which has characterized the intercourse of the above named honorable gentlemen with the Rev. Dr. Griffith. We also express the hope that by the continued effort of these gentlemen an equitable solution of the difficulties can be finally reached.

Re MISSIONARY AT ANTICOSTI.

Moved by the Rev. Chas. S. Deeprose, seconded by Rev. C. D. Baldwin, and resolved, That this Conference is delighted to hear of the faithful and successful labors of Bro. A. B. Argue, our missionary on the Island of Anticosti, and that we desire to record our appreciation of his unselfish devotion to the spiritual and temporal interests of our Methodist brethren living on that island, and his entire willingness to return to that field of labor at the request of the President and his brethren of the Quebec District neeting.

Re PRISONERS' AID ASSOCIATION.

The Conferences endorsed these recommendations of the Prisoners' Aid Association:

(a) The indeterminate sentence for first offenders.

(b) Separation of the insane from the criminal classes.

(c) The establishing by County Councils of poorhouses in each County.

(d) Better method of dealing with pauper inebriates.

Re PEACE CONFERENCE.

The Conferences expressed appreciation of the growing desire among nations to avert war, and manifested prayerful hope for the success of the Peace Conference in session at The Hague.

Memorials having local reference in the various Conferences were referred to the Section in each case on Special Resolutions.

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REPORT OF THE TWENTIETH CENTURY FUND COMMITTEE.

We beg leave to report that we regard with reclings of satisfaction a movement which promises to do so much for the advancement of the work of that branch of the Church with which we are identified. We hail with delight a movement which will relieve us, in some degree, from the incubus of local church debts, render much needed aid to our benevolent institutions, strengthen our connexional bonds, disseminate needed information concerning the requirements of our work, and result in a more intelligent sympathy and enthusiasm, a more unselfish corporate spirit, a broader outlook and a larger denominational hope.

We have no doubt the Conferences will enter with loyalty and enthusiasm into a movement which promises to do so much for our Church from sea to sea.

We endorse the action of the General Conference as regards the objects to be aided by the free-will offerings of our people and especially the fact that the will of the individual is allowed to exercise its prerogative, as regards the objects to which the gifts of benevolence may be applied.

Recognizing the necessity for thorough organization as well as efficient oversight and hearty co-operation in order to secure success, we recommend that the ensuing Financial District Meetings make arrangements for a thorough canvass of each circuit in the interests of the Twentieth Century Fund.

We further recommend that in this great connexional movement, no effort be spared to impress upon our people the fact that the effort is special and that any gift to it, at the expense of our recognized obligations, local and connexional, would be a serious mistake. We heartily commend this great movement to the intelligent sympathy and liberality of our people and hope that under the inspiration of God such a thankoffering may be placed at the disposal of the Church as will enable her to accomplish greater things in every sphere of her God-inspired activity in the coming century.

THE STATE OF THE WORK.

The review of our work presents features of encouragement in the substantial growth in membership, a total increase of 1,757 in all; in the loyal support by our people of the material and financial interests of the Church; in the growth of the missionary spirit among the Societies, and in the absence of any great disturbing influences among us as a religious body

But, while there is reason for satisfaction and thankfulness, we feel that at the same time there is much to deplore, and much to cause serious reflection and deep heart-searching. We cannot close our eyes to the fact that the reported increase of members is quite out of proportion to the amount of effort expended in the work of caring for the souls of the people, and we deplore the fact that in two of our older Conferences a decrease is actually reported. It becomes us to give serious thought to the circumstances or conditions that have contributed to these results, and to the best methods of securing better returns for the work done.

It is a serious question whether too much dependence is not placed on special evangelistic services for the in-gathering of souls. No periodic visits of evangelists can take the place of the faithful continued work of

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the pastor. Nor should the work devolve to the extent it now does on the pastor. His efforts should be supplemented by the zealous co-operation of the official members, the local preachers and class-leaders. In many places effective work can be done by the local preachers in preaching and the holding of cottage prayer-meetings.

There is need of more systematic effort to gather the children from the Sabbath Schools into the fold of the Church. The schools should be regarded as essentially the recruiting ground of the Church. Good results will follow the preaching, at stated intervals, of special sermons to the children, and definite invitation should be given the children to unite with the Church. We regret that the study of the catechism is no more diligently followed in our schools. The establishment of catechism classes

and junior leagues should be given every encouragement.

We rejoice to believe that in the mass the young people of Canadian Methodism are loyal to the doctrines and rules of the Church, but we have to regret the evidences, too often apparent, of compliance to the spirit of worldiness, particularly in the participation in those games and amusements that inevitably tend to diminish interest in spiritual things. We would urge upon our people to use their influence to oppose the use of

schools and public buildings for dancing parties.

We advise that greater attention be given to the Sabbath services that they may become seasons of marked spiritual power and impress all that they are for worship and not for entertainment, and would deprecate the introduction of Sunday evening concerts in our churches.

We would urge upon all parents the duty of bringing their children to the morning services and of teaching them due reverence for the House of God, and of training them to support the financial interests of the Church.

We fear that our people are growing lax in family worship, and would earnestly impress upon the heads of families the necessity of maintaining the family altar.

We regret that large numbers of our people habitually neglect the class and prayer meetings. This, we think, accounts very largely for

the want of deep, strong, spiritual life so everywhere manifest.

We deem it timely to call attention to the fact that persons are admitted to membership in our Church without being formally received, and give it as our opinion that to this laxity is in some measure due the want of appreciation of the sacredness of church membership among many of our people.

We note with pleasure that some burdensome church debts have been reduced during the year, while the trustees of other churches are contemplating efforts to relieve themselves of the obligation they bear on behalf of the congregations they represent. Realizing in some measure how largely church debts interfere with connexional funds, and militate against the distinctively spiritual work to which the Church is called, we recommend all our congregations to carry out, so soon as possible, the apostle's injunction, "Owe no man anything."

Finally, we exhort all to more devoutly study the Word of God, to a fuller realization of the importance of family and private prayer, and a more perfect consecration of heart and life to the service of the Master.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEES ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:

1. To increase the interest now shown by our people in home and foreign mission work, we recommend that, as far as practicable, each minister preach, at least quarterly, special missionary sermons, and that our people be urged to give systematically to the cause of missions.

2. In order to secure to our missionaries the prompt payment of their grants, and to avoid needless expenditure in the payment of interest on the part of the General Board, we strongly urge the payment of missionary moneys to the Conference Treasurer as soon as collected.

3. A letter from the Missionary Secretary, suggesting the appointment by several Conferences unitedly of a Superintendent of Missions in all those Conferences, elicited much discussion in these Conferences, but, because of lack of co-operation, and in some cases by misunderstanding, the action suggested has not yet come to completion.

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The total number of students for the year has been sixty-one, an increase of five over last year. At the Annual Convocation on May 2nd four students received the degree of S.T.L. and seven the degree of B.D.

The high spiritual tone of the College has been maintained and the students have manifested commendable zeal in the Missionary work of the Church.

On account of Dr. Patton having left the College staff, it is intended that the students next session shall take their Hebrew at McGill College, as do the students of the other three denominational colleges affiliated

with the University.

The pressure of financial burden is severely felt, but hope is cherished that relief will be given by the Twentieth Century Fund. In the meantime the Board of Governors are doing all in 'r power to make the income and outgo balance each other as nearly sible.

ALMA COLLEGE, ST. THOMAS.

The College is closing its eighteenth year under promising conditions. The enrolment of students shows an increase of nineteen over last year, with a proportionate increase in receipts. The graduating class is large, and represents all departments. A strong religious life has prevailed, and a large number of the students have made profession of faith during the year.

Last fall a department of Domestic Science was opened, and affords

most valuable aid in practical education.

During the year a number of special voluntary contributions were made, and a special effort instituted to pay the floating debt of \$15,000. This has been so far successful that the whole has been covered by pledges, and \$5,000 in cash paid on the debt. The receipts from the school this year will pay running expenses and interest, leaving all payments on the \$15,000 a clear gain in reducing the debt.

Grateful acknowledgment is due to the citizens of St. Thomas of all denominations for their generous response to the appeal for financial aid.

The Board believes that the increase of wealth and of benevolent thought will bring to the College, through benefactions by public-spirited persons, emancipation from the debt still burdening it, and so the College become in reality a free gift to the higher Christian education of young women.

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THE ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE AND ONTARIO CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC, WHITBY.

The Board of Directors take pleasure in presenting to the Conference their twenty-fifth or semi-jubilee report. A review of these years of progress and success inspires feelings of devout gratitude to Almighty God. The College has grown until it is to-day the largest and most commodious institution devoted to the education of wonen in the Dominion of Canada. There has been continued and steady growth, not only in the number and qualification of the teachers, the extent and suitability of school-room furnishings and apparatus, but also in the up-to-date methods of instruction and in the thorough educational work that is accomplished. It is the only ladies' college in Canada that has successfully undertaken the first two years' work with honors of the Provincial University.

The health record for the year has been remarkably good, and the moral and religious atmosphere highly gratifying. There is reason to think that many during the year have been helped in their Christian life, and will go out from the College halls to be a greater power for good in the world.

The Board expresses its thankfulness for the kind co-operation in the past, and commends the College to the Conferences, trusting it may always merit their fullest confidence and most loyal support.

VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

The report of the Board of Regents of Victoria University, presented by the Chancellor, Rev. N. Burwash, S.T.D., gave an encouraging statement of the year's work. The number of students was above the average, and the first year's class in actual attendance was the largest enrolled.

In addition to the graduates in Arts, numbering about thirty, the three classes of Divinity students furnish over forty men this year for the ministry of our Church. Of these, nine offer for foreign missionary work, eighteen are graduates in Arts, and seven graduates (B.D.) in Divinity.

At the examinations in Arts of last year students of Victoria were again successful in carrying off the Governor-General's Gold Medal, with the highest place in Philosophy and English Literature, while others won highest honors in various subjects. The religious life of the College during the year was marked by unusual earnestness and spirituality.

There was improvement also in financial matters. The expenditure had been reduced, and the revenue increased by nearly \$2,000, so that the deficit for the year (\$6,330.40) was substantially less than that of the previous year.

An immediate effort is needed to place the College in a sound financial position by the addition of \$200,000 to the endowment. The hope for this is a generous remembrance of the College on the part of subscribers to the Twentieth Century Fund.

The report of the Principal, Rev. W. P. Dyer, D.D., presented to the Conferences, showed that the attendance had been well maintained during the year. In all 210 students were enrolled—106 boys and 104 girls; of which number 110 were boarders—eighty-four boys and twenty-six girls.

The College is doing thorough work. Each department is in charge of an honor graduate of either Toronto or Victoria University. The class-rooms are provided with equipment for special work in the various departments. It is proposed to institute two nev courses: I. Domestic Science for young ladies; II. A Missionary Course, which will also include the study of the English Bible, and will furnish specially helpful lectures by competent local physicians.

It will be seen that there still remains a debt, unprovided for by reliable subscriptions, of \$14,000. E. D. O'Flynn, Esq., Chairman of the Executive Committee of the College, has promised a donation of \$3,000 towards meeting the entire debt. This will leave a balance of \$11,000 unprovided for. Enlarged campus and better system of lighting are greatly needed. It is estimated that a total of \$15,000 in addition to Mr. O'Flynn's subscription would meet the balance of debt and provide these improvements.

It is earnestly hoped and desired that the friends of the College will remember the institution in the effort soon to be made in connection with the Twentieth Contury Fund.

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
