DEATH AND DESTRUCTION IN PATH OF TORNADO

Philadelphia and District Suffer Severely—Factories Wrecked, Buildings Unroofed and Cupola of Church Blown Off—Storm Put Pennsylvania Line From New York Completely Out of Business.

PHILADELPHIA, March 27.—A severe electrical storm accompanied by a high wind, which at times blew with cyclonic force, swept over the northern section of this city shortly after 6 o'clock to-night, leaving destruction and death in its wake.

Buildings were demolished, houses unroofed, and the New York division of the Pennsylvania Railway was placed out of commission temporarily by the demolition of its tower at Holmesburg, cutting off all telegraphic communication. New York trains are being routed via the Trenton cut-off, which branch of the Pennsylvania Company was not in the path of the high winds.

Several factories destroyed. In the manufacturing section of Germantown, the most severely damaged, several factories were destroyed. Trolley wires were blown down and roofs of houses hurried to the centre of the streets.

Had no widespread. PITTSBURG, March 27.—A windstorm throughout northern Ohio, a number of persons and a large amount of property were destroyed.

MONROEVILLE, Pa., March 27.—Two men were killed and 20 persons injured by a tornado which swept through this part of the state yesterday evening.

An informant by local authorities charges him with embezzlement and receiving money by false pretenses in the sum of \$500,000.

Ten members of the city council showed that they were not afraid of taking a setting in their efforts to save the city when they tramped through the mud and slush to the city wharf at John-st. in a pouring rain, to make the trip to the scene of trouble with the water supply.

Work at Long Pond. It was a few minutes after 11 o'clock when the crowd with everything but their arbor dampened, climbed over the railing of the steamer John Hanlan, which Admiral Lawrence Soeman graced with his presence on the occasion.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE BY REFERENDUM.

Last Thursday the senate of the State of Illinois approved a bill proposing to apply the principle of local option to woman suffrage. Any city, municipality or county may pass on its adoption of a referendum, and if a majority so decides, women will have all the electoral rights that men have, and on exactly the same qualification.

TAXATION IN GERMAN CITIES.

Altho German cities, owing to their peculiar electoral systems, are ruled by the capitalists class, it is the rich taxpayers who pay the bills. This, says Mr. Frederic C. Home, to whose article in the April Scribner's Magazine The World referred last week, is another anomaly which distinguishes the German city. No attempt has been made by Germany to shift the burden of taxation on to the backs of the poor, at least not to anything like the same extent as in other countries.

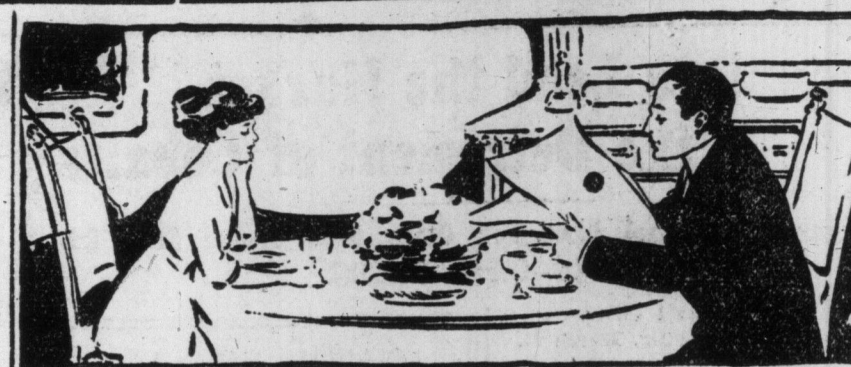
