

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Cheque for Half That Amount Was Received From Federal Government Yesterday, and Money Has Been Apportioned for Different Work in the Province.

\$175,750 OF

The Ontario Government has re ceived dts share of the \$500,000 grant for agriculture, which the Dominion Government decided to divide among the nine provinces at its fast session. It was announced at the parliament buildings yesterday that this province would benefit to the amount of \$175.753 of the federal grant. A cheque for one-half of this sum has been received and the balance wil be payable when Hon. J. S. Duff, minister of agriculture, decides that it is necessary to further promote the work of development thruout the province.

Hon. J. S. Duff has been in conference with Hon. Martin Burrell at Ottawa during the past few days mapping out the work that the provincial government wished to accomplish with the financial assistance from the Dominion Government. In all, 17 branches of the department will benefit by the grant. This grant has no connection what

This grant has no connection what-ever with the work of C. C. James, former deputy-minister of agricul-ture, who was recently appointed to a Dominion post in the department of agriculture. It is explained that this money is merely a preliminary to a permanent scheme that Mr. James is trying to bring about for the government, fixing the amount that each province is to receive each year. The federal grant comes at a very opportune moment to further advance some of the schemes of Hon. Mr. Duff. Mr. Duff

They will be handled almost entirely at the Ontario Agri-cultural College. Prof. Geo. E. Day, head of the department of animal hus-bandry, will leave shortly for England to make the purchases. ### DOCTOR REID AND THE LUMBER DUTY.

For many years such lumber has been admitted from the United States duty free, while by law subject to duty. The statute intended to impose a duty upon lumber which could be used for building purposes without additional work being put upon it in Canada. The Laurier government took upon itself, by interpretation, to override the law, and last year there came into Canada from the United States lumber valued at \$3,496,496, duty free, which by law was subject to a duty of 25 per cent Nor did all this lumber go to the western farmers by any means. Montreal took, \$1,453,539 of it, and Toronto \$851,879 of it.
