TONS OF BOMBS DROPED ON CITIES BACK OF THE LINE

Long Distance Fliers Pass Over Mainz and Karlsruhe and Also Drop Explosives on Aerodromes.

With the American Army on the Lorraine Front, Sept. 16.—British airplanes which are co-operating with American squadrons on this front flew far back of the enemy lines today and bombed airdromes at several places. Some of the long-distance flyers passed over Karlsruhe and Mainz, dropping five and a half tons of explosives.

Eleven tons of bombs were dropped on the airdromes at Longuyon, Boulay, Marhenge and Bohm.

Washington, Sept. 16 .- The United States, as was fully expected, has unconditionally, rejected Germany's peace feeler. In doing so the government has spoken for all the co-belligerents. Almost immediately after receiving the Austrian Government's note from the minister from Sweden, Mr. Ekengren, Secretary Lansing tonight issued his formal statement.

Lansing's statement was given out within half an hour after he had received the Austrian proposal. 





The occasion for Phidippides' great stunt was as foliolows: The Persians had invaded Greece, intending to occupy the country, and the Greeks naturally resented such a project. A little band of patriotic Greeks opposed the Persians, under Darius, on the plain of Marathon. To use a vulgar but expressive phrase, the Greeks "licked the tar" out of the Persians.

When the Greeks sought to send the news of their victory to Athens they found that the telegraph wires had been cut, and the telegraph wires had been shorting for it but somebody to hoof it to Athens and carry the tidings to the newspapers, so that they could get out an extra and relieve the anxiety prevailing in that thriving city.

Phidippides, an Athenian lad who had won several medals as a long-distance runner, volunteered for the job, and set a record that has never since been equalled. He covered the 36 miles and reached Athens with just breath enough to blurt out that the Persians had got it in the well-known neck, and then fell dead in his tracks. Such was the origin of the Marathon race. 



Official announcement of the oll output by Rockwood Oll & Gas for last week totaled 1547 barrels and indications are clear the production during September will establish a new high record by running above 6000 barrels. With shipping facilities vastly improved, Manager H. F. Slater believes he will easily be able to maintain this ratio of monthly production and corresponding increases be recorded as additional wells are brought in.
