



## LUNDY TO PROBE **PACKING INDUSTRY**

## Attorney - General Instructs K.C. to Investigate All Mergers and Flotations.

Hon. W. E. Raney, attorney-general, is investigating the packing industry, and has issued instructions to J. S. Lun-dy, K.C., to enquire into the entire Cana-dian packing situation, and to make a full and complete report on the com-binations of the packing houses and plants of Ontarlo, which are, or have been, affiliated to American houses. The attorney-general's probe should go

The attorney-general's probe should go much farther than the recent enquiry by the board of commerce, which dealt sole-ly with the selling end of the packing business, and did not investigate as 40 whether or not there were combinations, or whether a combine existed at present. Neither were the profits of the plants themselves investigated. The last packing house controlled in Toronto recently changed into American hands when Sir Joseph Flavelle sold out his interests in the William Davies Co.-to E. C. Fox and the American associates, John and James Agar of Chicago. Various Mergers. The flotation advertisement which ap-peared in yesterday's papers showed that the Davies people had gross sales for the year ending March 31, 1919, of some \$68,-000,000. The profits for the same period made by the company, while entirely a Canadian concern, are shown to be \$1,-218,902, after all interest, taxes and de-preciation for the year had been allowed. This merger with a Chicago plant fol-lowed closely on the increasing of the capital of the Swift Canadian Company from \$1,500,000 to \$5,000,000, the absorp-tion of the Matthews-Blackweil plant with three branches in Canada by the Allied Packers Inc., and the working ar-rangements recently made with Chicago interests by the Harris Abattoir and Gunns Limited. It is said that every Canadian pack-ing plant is controlled by Chicago, with the Union Stock Yards as the key of the situation, which, it is claimed, is the property of Swifts of Chicago. If the investigation shows that this state of affairs exists, the attorney-gen-eral and members of Premier Drury's cabhnet will, it is understood, receive favorably the suggestion that the pro-vince should take over the stock yards at once and operate them for the bene-fit of the farmers and the Canadian packing industry. It is expected that Mr. Lundy will have his report ready for the attorney-general early in the new year. INQUEST ADJOURNED.
