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LEGISLATION?

From The Montreal Star. The issue which Mr. Hardy has raised is nothing less than this;

whether the executive may use a servile majority of the Legislature to usurp the functions of the courts in a case in which it has a great and direct interest. The new Legislature has an undoubted right to amend any of the laws passed by its predecessors and to say what the law shall be, but it is for the courts and the courts alone to interpret the law as it stands. For the Legislature to step in while cases are actually pending before the courts and to presume to dictate to the courts how they shall interpret in these cases a law which admittedly was a law before that legislature existed is an outrage upon the constitution and a caricature upon British justice.

* * * * To attempt to tinker a law to suit the interests of one of the parties to a suit actually pending is so flagrantly unjust that it is difficult to conceive of any Legislature in the British Empire being guilty of such a thing. Should the bill be passed it will be the duty of the Governor-General-in-Council to disallow it, and his Excellency's advisers will incur a share in a grave responsibility if they fail to recommend this step. Under the new Dominion Franchise Act retroactive legislation by the Provincial Legislature may affect the seats of members of the Dominion Parliament. Not this particular Act, it is true, but if this Act is allowed to become law it will form a dangerous precedent. A member of the Federal Parliament elected on the Ontario voters' list might be deprived of his seat by an Act of the Ontario Legislature declaring some of the people who voted for him disqualified. Should Mr. Hardy's bill be passed, and sanctioned, and escape disallowance we hope the Ontario judges will see their way to ignore it as having no application to cases arising out of elections held before it was passed. If Mr. Hardy had any confidence that his reading of the law is the correct one ha would be content to leave the interpretation to the courts and not call a special meeting of the Legislature to vssist in giving judgment in cases to which most of its members are parties.
