THE PROGRESS OF ROSSLAND

A Toronto Man Says the Place Has Developed Marvelously.

Coke for the Smelters Will Soon Be Much Cheaper Than Now—Trail Smelter Has Work on Hand—Great Development of the Virginia—Victory-Triumph Works.

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Nearly 20,000 tons of ore are awaiting treatment at the Trail smelter.

Canadian stocks showed little activity to-
day, but the list manifested an upward ten-
dency. On the local exchange Toronto
Bank sold up over 4 points to 24 1/2, and
174 was bid for Merchants' Bank. West-
ern Assurance exchanged hands at 13 1/2,
Toronto Electric Light at 13 1/2. C.P.R. was
steady. Bell Telephone was bid up to 18 1/2,
with 185 asked. War Eagle cleared hands
at 284 and closed at 282 1/2 bid.

On the Montreal Board C.P.R. sold as
high as 8 1/2, and closed at 8 1/2. Cable
brought 182, closing at 181 1/2, 1/4 points
above yesterday's close. Montreal Railway
showed further strength, selling at 27 1/2
to 27 3/4 divided. Bell Telephone was bid
up to 27 1/2 and 182 1/2, and War Eagle
sold at 282 1/2.

Despite professional efforts to bear Wall
street stocks small gains were reported at
the close in some parts of the list. Sugar
advanced 2 points, Tobacco 1/2. Northwest
Metropolitan Traction, National Lead,
1 Pullman, B.R.T. 1/4. Omaha lost 1
point.

HOMELESS GIRL TIRED OF LIFE.

Found Struggling in a Doorway by
Police - New York Incident.

New York, July 23.-After wandering
for many hours in the streets, afraid to
appeal to the police, afraid of the men
who passed her with insolent, staring
looks; afraid she would become like the
bold, impudent women she met alone at
midnight, a young girl took poison this
morning in front of the vacant house at
No. 261 Greenwich-street.

She is now at the Hudson-street hos-
pital, dying. She is not over 18, with
pretty blue eyes and black hair, and
with the shrinking modesty of a young
girl who has been little in the world.
She gave the name of Viola Russell,
but that, the police say, is an assumed
name. She said she lived at No. 208
West 33rd-street, but no person of that
name has ever been there.

Asked why she took the poison, she
answered: "I had no place to go. I
was afraid I would be forced to lead a
life like that of the horrible women I
saw."

Police-men Roache, Pheny and Lock-
hart, trailing her, found her at 208
Greenwich-street just after midnight.
They observed her timid bearing and
how she was being followed by a man
in a striped shirt waist, white duck skirt,
and dainty white sailor hat-and won-
dered why she was alone in a neighbor-
hood evidently strange to her.

STRAFFORD CITY BUILDING.

The Taxpayers Vote \$30,000 for the

New Municipal Structure to Re-

place the One Burned.

Stratford, Ont., July 29.—A bylaw to raise

the sum of \$30,000 for the purpose of erect-

ing new municipal buildings in place of

those burned last November, was carried

to-day by a majority of 95. The plans ac-

cepted for the new buildings are those of

George W. King, architect, of Toronto, and

the lowest tender for the erection of the

same was that of E. A. Causey and John L.

Youngs of this city, amounting to \$27,751.

A bylaw to raise \$21,000 for the purpose of

reconstruction of the building according to

plans prepared by Alex. Hepburn of this

city was voted on at the same time and

defeated by a majority of 51. The lowest

tender for this scheme was \$20,038. This

means that Stratford will have an entirely

new building for municipal purposes, and

the plans indicate a handsome building, a

modern structure in every respect, and one

that will be a credit to the city.
