## REPORT

—OF—

## The Session of Knox Church, Ottawa,

*Presented at the Annual Meeting of the  
Congregation, held Jan'y. 10, 1889.*

---

In the past history of the Congregation, there has been no year more signally marked by tokens of the Divine favor and manifestations of God's saving grace and power, than the one just closed. More especially was His loving presence revealed to us in the gracious and wide-spread Revival with which He was pleased to visit our city during the months of January and February. Through the Union Services which were held during these months, the hearts of God's people were greatly revived, and many were led to give themselves to the Lord Jesus Christ.

Among the young people, both in our own and sister congregations in the city, this work was especially marked. It seemed as if the time predicted by the prophet had come to us, concerning which the Lord said, "I will pour water upon him that is thirsty, and floods upon the dry ground. I will pour My Spirit upon thy seed, and My blessing upon thine offspring." Surely there is good cause for thankfulness, and to bless God for the gracious work which He did for us through the instrumentality of His devoted servant, the Rev. Mr. Meikle.

When the last report was presented, the fever, to which reference was made, was still prevalent; but the Lord heard our prayers and realized our hopes, by healing all that were sick, among whom was our beloved pastor.

Of those whom God was pleased to call away from us during the year, was Mr. Donald Kennedy, whose removal from the world is referred to in the Records of our Session in the following terms:

"With humble submission to the Divine will the Session records the death of Mr. Donald Kennedy, who departed this life on Saturday, the 18th day of February, 1888, in the 83rd year of his age, and would

give expression to their high appreciation of his long continued and faithful services to this Congregation, of which he was an Elder at its organization in 1844.

"In connection with the formation of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, consequent on the disruption of the Established Church of Scotland, he took an active and prominent part, not only with regard to Knox Church, but to other Congregations throughout the Ottawa valley.

"In his home many of the early ministers found a hospitable welcome, and with them he performed many an arduous journey in organizing and encouraging the new and struggling Congregations.

"In the organization and promotion of the Bible Society, Temperance Societies, and other kindred institutions, he took a prominent part, and was a life long supporter.

"With several others he withdrew from this Congregation to form Bank Street Church, and of it he was a prominent Elder for many years, when he withdrew from it, to connect himself again with Knox Church, of which he remained a consistent member until his death.

"On account of increasing age and bodily infirmities he was compelled to withdraw from the more active engagements of life; but the Congregation and every good cause retained to the last his warmest sympathies and liberal support.

"Mr. Kennedy was a man of more than ordinary intelligence and of deep religious convictions, and these, with his strong and abiding faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, made him a power for good among his fellow-men.

"While we mourn his departure, we sorrow not as those who have no hope, for we know that in heaven he has a better and more enduring substance, and through his long life and devotion to Christ and the good of men, though dead he yet speaketh.

"May the Lord raise up many amongst us to be equally faithful in promoting the Kingdom of God, which he loved and for which he laboured.

"The Session desire also to express their deep sympathy with the widow and family of our departed brother, and pray that God may sustain and comfort them."

Besides this honoured servant of the Lord, two other members in full communion, Miss Jessie Shearer and Mr. Alexander Cumming, have entered into their rest, passing away in the month of July within a few days of each other. Though young in years, and just entering the threshold of active life, their work on earth was done, and in humble joyous confidence they departed to be with Christ which is far better. Other families connected with the Congregation have also been visited by bereavements, and to all these bereaved ones, and to all who are in

affliction, the Session tender their heartfelt sympathy, and pray that the God of all grace may comfort and uphold them.

According to the last Report the number on the Communion Roll was 273. During the year 163 have been added—34 by certificate and 129 on profession of their faith. There have been removed from the Roll 27—by death 3, and by certificate 24, leaving the number on the Roll 409, and showing a net gain of 136.

There have been 24 baptisms ; of adults 10, and of infants 14.

The financial condition of the Congregation will be submitted to you in the Report of the Temporal Committee.

The Sabbath School and Bible Class have been regularly maintained during the year. A full report of these important branches of Congregational work will be laid before you.

As an outgrowth of the revival, a "Young People's Society of Christian Endeavour" was organized early in the year, and its meetings have been largely attended. A statement of its aims and a report of its work will be laid before you.

To the ladies who have so faithfully distributed the "Record," and collected your contributions to the Schemes of the Church, the thanks of the Congregation are due. The Session is constrained to repeat the "regret" expressed last year, "that there are many members whose names do not appear on the collector's lists," and earnestly call attention to this fact, with the hope of improvement.

The Weekly Prayer Meetings have been fairly well attended throughout the year.

During the time that our brethren of the Congregational Church were engaged in erecting their new edifice, we had the pleasure of having them with us at these meetings, joining in praise and prayer at the Throne of Grace. We owe the pastor, Rev. Mr. Wood, a deep debt of gratitude for the kind and valuable services rendered to us, as a Congregation, in our time of need, when the *supply* secured for the pulpit, during our pastor's vacation, was laid aside by sickness.

# FORTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

—OF THE—

## Temporal Committee of Knox Church,

OTTAWA.

In presenting for your consideration and adoption the Forty-fourth Annual Report of the Temporal Committee, we desire with sincere and grateful hearts to praise and magnify the name of our God for all, that, during the past year, we have heard, and seen, and felt of the effects of His wondrous grace and undeserved love. But we wish to trace our Heavenly Father's guiding hand in the measure of financial success which has attended our efforts, as well as in what we have seen and felt of His goodness throughout the memorable revival services carried on during the first three months of the past year.

By the following comparative statement of the receipts of 1887 and 1888, you will be able to see what financial progress has been made during 1888 :

From an examination of this comparative statement of the receipts of 1887 and of 1888, we are able to draw the following encouraging conclusions :

(1.) From the constant sources of our revenue, namely, Weekly Contributions, Ordinary Collections, Missionary Collections, Thanks-

giving Offering, and Ladies' Association, we received in 1888 \$694.51 more than in 1887.

(2.) Not only are the receipts greater from these sources taken as a whole, but also from each of them there is an increase, with the exception of the Thanksgiving Offering, which falls below that of 1887 by the amount of \$89.26.

(3.) The total receipts of 1888 exceed those of 1887 by the sum of \$479.25; but in the total receipts for 1888 as given above, there is included the sum of \$713.16, collected for the Organ Fund.

(4.) It is also worthy of note that the amount received in 1888 for Ordinary Collections, is the largest which has ever been received from that source in the history of the Congregation.

Taking this financial exhibit all in all, it affords just cause for congratulation for the past, and confident assurance of success for the future.

The members of the Temporal Committee desire specially to thank the members and adherents of the Congregation for the promptness with which all the amounts due were placed in the hands of the Treasurer, by the 31st of December last.

With God's blessing resting upon us, with His hand guiding us, and His Spirit instructing us, we can with confidence undertake all our congregational work for the year 1889.

Never in the past were the hearts of our teachers made so glad. Their work must always be one of sowing, but not often do they enjoy such visions of God's working in the hearts of the young as our teachers witnessed during the past year.

sheaves, the teachers know that the ground-work was laid by their sowing beside all waters, and by their prayerful nurturing of the seed. To Him let us give all the glory. The extent to which our school has been blessed may be seen by a reference to the report from the Session.

The attendance has been on the whole very regular, the average amounting to 138.

Maggie Stalker and Fred Scott were present during every Sabbath of the year, and Eva Stalker, Charles Atchison and Alfred Laflace missed only one Sabbath.

Edna Bigham and Jennie McArthur are entitled to Mr. Blackburn's prize for accurate Scripture recitation. The portion selected this year for committing to memory was the whole of the Epistle to the Ephesians.

Rev. Mr. Farries' prizes for repeating correctly all the questions in the Shorter Catechism, were won by John Robertson, Wardrope Alexander and Wm. Alexander.

Mr. Robinson's prizes, to be given to such members of the Infant Class as should repeat correctly the Golden Texts of the lessons for six months, were won by Geo. E. Bingham, Sydney I. McMorran, and Agnes Renwick. Mary Thomson, Hilda J. Christie, Fred McFarlane, and Lawrence Christie, repeated the Golden Texts of the lessons for three months.

For the fifth year Miss Masson's class has won the Superintendent's prize for regular attendance. The class reached the high average of 96 3-7 p. c.

Lizzie Stalker and Edna Bigham are entitled to receive Mr. Mutchmor's prize for introducing new scholars.

From the Treasurer's Statement it will be seen that our total collections are larger than ever before, and so also are our Missionary Contributions.

The Congregation willingly responded to our appeal for a contribution to increase our library, and gave us the very modest sum of \$28.00. This amount has been invested in books of such a character as we believe is much needed in our library.

As a fruit of the great religious awakening of the past year, the teachers have uninterruptedly kept up a short prayer meeting for about fifteen minutes before the school session, when that was held in the morning, and for the same time after the school session, when held in the afternoon.

We have enjoyed such blessed experiences during these short seasons of fellowship and communion at a throne of grace, that we will not soon abandon this precious means of grace.

**Young People's Society of Christian Endeavour.**

REPORT AND STATEMENT AS TO THE NATURE  
AND OPERATIONS OF THE SOCIETY.

On behalf of the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavour of Knox Church, we have much pleasure in respectfully submitting a report of the operations of this Society, and a statement as to the nature of the work maintained and proposed by it.

At the close of the Evangelistic Meetings of last winter, it was thought desirable to establish a meeting for the younger members of the Church, which would be of a distinctly religious character, and for the carrying on of which they would be themselves responsible. A Society of Christian Endeavour was accordingly formed, and has been maintained with a gratifying measure of success, and with good prospects of increasing power and usefulness.

The name of the Society emphasizes three essential points which should be recognized and given practical effect to by the Church: 1. That the work of the Church is Christian work. 2. That aggressive effort for the advancement of God's kingdom and the good of souls is the duty of those who profess to be the followers of Christ, and 3. That there is a part in work of this nature for the young people of the Church.

In the past a vast amount of the energy of young Christians in many churches has been improperly absorbed in maintaining musical and literary societies and other secular agencies,—good enough in their way, but of no value in building up the kingdom of God. This Society is intended to take the place of these things; and the large attendance at the weekly meetings, and the interest manifested, sufficiently indicate that agencies of the kind alluded to are not necessary in order to attract and hold the young people of a Church. It may be mentioned that not a few belonging to other churches where such meetings as ours are not maintained, have expressed an intention of meeting with us. The Society of Christian Endeavour in all its plans and operations works on spiritual lines, and aims at the advancement of God's kingdom amongst the young people of the Church.

It has been a serious mistake to allow the impression to arise that the young people who have accepted Christ as their Saviour should wait until they have grown old or middle-aged before taking part in prayer and testimony in the services of God's house. The fact is that the longer young believers delay open confession of their Master, the more difficult the duty becomes, and the less likely they are to fulfil it. If they are to avoid adding in later years to the already too large number of those who are always silent in the prayer meetings of the Church,

they must be early taught that the Lord looks for and has a right to expect them to recognize His goodness and mercy in the way the Psalmist describes when he says: "What shall I render unto the Lord for all His benefits toward me? I will take the cup of salvation and call upon the name of the Lord. I will pay my vows unto the Lord now in the presence of all His people. \* \* \* I will offer to Thee the sacrifice of thanksgiving, and will call upon the name of the Lord. I will pay my vows unto the Lord now in the presence of all His people."

The founder of the Society of Christian Endeavour says: "Say what you will about the beauty of quiet, unobserved Christian lives; wax poetic about the sweetness of the hidden violet, it is nevertheless true, it always has been and always will be true, that the most beautiful as well as the most useful Christian lives are those which most frequently express in some way their devotion to their Saviour. If the devotion is in the heart it will naturally find expression; as naturally as the sun will shine, or the violet will exhale its fragrance: and it is well to furnish some channel through which this allegiance to Christ may be frequently expressed. Such a channel is furnished by the prayer meetings of the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavour."

To get the young Christians in Knox Church accustomed to audible participation in worship, is one of the main objects of this Society; and the measure of success which has attended the effort in this direction has been encouraging. Though the multiplication of meetings is undesirable when avoidable, a little reflection will serve to convince those who think one week-day meeting for all the Church sufficient, that the younger people are much more likely to participate actively in the exercises when in a meeting which they may consider their own, than they would in the regular prayer meeting of the Church. Every believer attending the young people's prayer meeting is expected to take part in it, even if it be only by reading a verse of Scripture. Several of the Society have voluntarily pledged themselves to do so, and it is hoped that all will soon realize it to be not only a duty, but a privilege and pleasure to contribute in some manner to the interest and profit of the proceedings. The following is the form of pledge adopted:

"Trusting in Christ as my Saviour, and believing that it is my duty to confess Him before others, and to engage in His service, I hereby promise to attend every meeting of this Society unless unavoidably detained, and to take some part therein; and I also promise to do what I can, by word and by life, to extend the kingdom of my Lord and Saviour."

The Society not only aims at securing verbal expression of allegiance to Christ, but seeks to promote His cause and kingdom by practical effort in directions open to it. The Sunday School and Bible

Class engage its attention, and the endeavour is made to increase the attendance, and to co-operate with the Superintendent and officers of the school in promoting its best interests. The Sunday School Committee hope to render useful service in this direction. A number of large gospel texts have been placed on the walls of the lecture-room, and the effort will be made to improve as much as possible the appearance of the room. It is felt that to make the place more attractive will contribute to the efficiency of the school, and also of the other meetings. This Society will gladly co-operate in any movement which the Church may make to improve the general appearance of the basement, to carpet the whole, and to replace the present benches by light, comfortable and attractive-looking seats.

The Sunday night service in the Presbyterian Church at Eddyville has been regularly maintained by the Society since November, and will be continued until other arrangements can be made by the Presbytery. It is hoped that it may shortly be found possible to undertake a weekly service in some other outlying district.

As a Society we have not yet accomplished all that could be desired; but the short experience we have had has sufficed to show how valuable an agency in accomplishing its work is furnished the Church by an organization of this nature, and how calculated its methods of work are to develop the younger members of the Church in Christian service. Testimony and work are essential for Christian growth and usefulness; and this Society affords opportunity for both. In becoming members of it, the young men and young women of the Church who are believers indicate that they have recognized the Lord's claim upon them, and upon all they have and are, and that they are prepared to respond to His call to take up the cross and follow Him.

Whilst we claim that our Society by virtue of its character and methods is well adapted to serve the purpose for which it exists, and that it is entitled to the sympathy and co-operation of the members of this Church, we recognize the fact that however perfect this or any part of the machinery of the Church may be, the kingdom of our Lord will not be advanced, nor will His glory be conserved, unless we humbly rely upon His power, and obtain His blessing; and we therefore ask that earnest believing prayer may continually be offered for an outpouring of God's Spirit in our meetings, so that the youthful followers of Christ may be led to ever-increasing devotion to Him, and that all our young people may be won to the service of so loving and gracious a Saviour.
