## The Hand That Deadens and the Chicago Dead Hog's Preferential Treatment

papers of the country ever make protest that we know of; they all sit mum; and one thing in regard to this country to-day is the lack of spirit in its press. Like the people, their heart has been about broken. There was one newspaper in this province that should have championed the people's rights. But many years ago the men who then directed, and who direct it to-day, started in to help the Grand Trunk to get the Midland system and the old Great Western, and that paper and Sir Oliver Mowat and his government aided and passed the necessary legislation. That consolidation may have been for the benefit of the country or may not have been, but, at all events, it was the fact that these towns never got any assistance from the newspaper in question. Nor will it say a word for them to-day or a word against the Grand Trunk. And there is another paper in Montreal that has drawn a great deal of business and circulation out of this country, and never yet has it said one word against its unfair treatment by the Brydges up to Hays' executives.

The World, however, has referred time and again to it, and it intends to keep on hammering until the situation is changed and until, at least, the Canadian Northern and perhaps the Canadian Pacific get into this country. We are glad to notice that even under the wing of the Canadian Northern a number of men in Oshawa are proposing to build a trolley line on or near the Kingston-road, from Bowmanville thru Oshawa, Whitby, Pickering and then on and into and over the new Canadian Northern tracks to Toronto. We trust this project will go thru. We would like to have seen it a municipal monopoly.

Again, we say to Mr. Hays that local traffic is the backbone of a railway, and the Canadian people along the line of traffic are of greater importance than the dead hogs of Chicago, and that if Mr. Hays will even yet change his methods and come to Toronto at times and come and see the people who live in these Lake Ontario towns and see that they get better service, both as passenger and freight, he will make friends and business for his road and build up these towns. Give them the suburban service. It is better to do that than to Lynch poor devils of strikers at Allandale!

And now we come to the last thing which we wish to say to-day, and that is that The World proposes to keep putting it up to the Ontario Government, the duty of intervening in the interest of these towns, and all the things in Ontario that do not receive decent railway treatment from the big companies that are in this province. Sir James Whitney, who happens to be prime-minister, must, of his own knowledge, know almost better than anybody else of the paralysis that has affected the towns of the St. Lawrence and of Lake Ontario in consequence of the arrogance of the Grand Trunk. He must know that when complaint was made to Sir Wilfrid Laurier of these grievances he declared that anybody with grievances of that kind should "go to Mr. Fox" and Sir James Whitney of the Ontario Legislature. The Ontario Legislature and Ontario Government is supreme in many things and has in its hand the enforcement of all the railway laws of the Dominion. It has also the right of taxation, and can compel justice to every one, even the railway law is made at Ottawa. Our advice to the people of Eastern Ontario is to put it up to Sir James till he moves. The World will help them, and we imagine more good has been done in the last few days than has been done in many years previously by the exposure of the fact that the chief executives of the Grand Trunk and the Canadian Pacific, and of their best motive power, and of their right of way, and of their quick transit are consigned to the Chicago dead hog instead of the ordinary citizen of Ontario.

The above is not pleasant reading, but it is a cold-blooded statement of facts, and when the facts come out the improvement sometimes comes.

We wish you well, Mr. Hays. We wish you well, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy. We also wish you well, Sir James, too. Recall who

wished you to give the Ontario and Timiskaming to the Grand Trunk. Wasn't it a God's-blessing that you did not do it?

But get this into the heads of all of you, oh you magnates, that the trust reposed in you is to give the best possible local service to the people who franchised your roads, not to Chicago dead hogs.

Again we say, we wish you well, gentlemen; we wish you well. And the Mayor of Wexford joins the member for South York in this wish-you-well.

These articles are not yet finished—just commenced. P.S.—The two broken panes in the window of the Donlands station may have been caused by one of the chefs in the day car throwing out a tin that contained mock turtle soup made from a recipe given to Sir Thomas by a Lady of England and confided by him to his chief purveyor. But Mr. Osborne is going to put them in all right. His powers will soon be widened.

P.P.S.—The C. P. R. freight jam still continues. The World heard from several manufacturers and shippers who gave goods and loads to the C. P. R. two weeks ago, and they believe that they are still in the yard! Anyway, the consignees are wiring to know when they may be expected.

The real trouble is this: The C. P. R., as far as Toronto and this part of Ontario is concerned, has been trying to do a two-horse business with a one-horse outfit. As usual, the one-horse outfit falls down under the strain. Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, if he's too busy with monograms for hotel doyleys, should send some one up here to reorganize things, or give some man here authority to do it.

## HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

### ALEX. STUART DEAD

City Treasurer for Thirty-seven Years—Miss Hobson Very Low.

HAMILTON, Aug. 19.—(Special).—There was only one prisoner in the cells to-night. He was Thomas Burrows, and the charges against him were stealing a coat belonging to Robert Jarrett, attempting to hold up J. T. Westcott, and being drunk and disorderly.

The trades and labor council to-night received a request from the cigarmakers' union of Tampa, Florida, for financial aid, owing to the fact that there are about 5000 members of the union on strike.

Miss Dorothy Hobson, who had a very good day to-day, was reported to be very low again to-night. Alex. Stewart, who was city treasurer for 37 years, until his resignation in 1873, died to-day. He was born in Scotland in 1821, and came to Canada, and after residing in Kingston and Toronto, came to work as a cabinet-maker until 1864. He was then appointed tax collector and eight years later became city treasurer.

## OBITUARY.

J. L. Cox.

The death occurred yesterday morning at the Western Hospital of John Lorne Cox, principal of Oakwood Collegiate Institute. Mr. Cox was fifty-five years of age. His early teaching experience was gained as mathematical master of Collingwood Collegiate. Later he succeeded Prof. De Lury as mathematical master of Harbord Collegiate, where he taught with eminent success for twelve years. In 1908, in recognition of his past most valuable services, Mr. Cox was appointed principal of the Northwest High School, his whole teaching career Mr. Cox gained many friends. He was a most careful, industrious and, above all, sympathetic teacher.

## \$1,500,000 FIRE.

ALBION, N.Y., Aug. 19.—A fire which started in the Granite Building to-day resulted in \$1,500,000 loss. The heaviest losers were Landauer Bros., a dry goods firm, and the hardware concern of E. W. Wilcox. The Orleans County National Bank succeeded in saving all its cash and books from the building.

Steamship Arrivals. Allan Line steamer "Corsican" from Liverpool, August 11, with 484 first and second cabin passengers, and 746 third-class passengers, arrived at Quebec five o'clock Thursday afternoon, August 18. Arrived in Montreal Friday afternoon.

S.S. "Ionian" from Glasgow, August 13, with 287 cabin and 174 third-class passengers passed Belle Isle three p.m. Friday, and will arrive at Quebec noon Sunday, Montreal Monday morning.

## RIFLES SPEND BUSY DAY PRACTICE FIELD TACTICS

Gen. Otter Speaks Highly of the Camp—Gen. Cotton a Visitor—A Lot of Running.

QUEBEC, Aug. 19.—(Special).—More hard work was done this morning than on any previous one. The men had to do a lot of running in order to practice the double so that they could do it in unison. Part of the first battalion was split in attacking practice. The men would advance at the double in extended order, lie down for a short time and double again. Later there was a tactical exercise with force galloping. The regiment as a unit was put thru most of the evolutions on the drill book.

In the afternoon there was another tactical exercise. The regiment marched for about two miles in skirmishing order. Then they extended from one point on the shore of the river in semi-circle to another point 2 1/2 miles distant. The idea was an imaginary main body advancing across the river, and the regiment protecting them from possible attack from an imaginary enemy.

Instead of wearing heavy serge coats, trousers and puttees, the men wore their canvas fatigue uniforms. Because of that they did not suffer much from the heat.

Brig.-Gen. Otter is taking a great interest in the corps. Apparently he wants to make sure that the regiment is fit to represent Canada. He has spent the past four afternoons and several mornings here. Gen. Otter highly complimented the pioneers by saying this was the cleanest and neatest camp he had ever seen.

Brig.-General Cotton of Toronto was a visitor here to-day. He came attired in civilian clothes and carried his camera. A party of eighteen members of the Australian Mounted Cadets, who are circling the globe at their own expense, were in camp to-day. All are wearing their uniforms. Their ages range between 18 and 20.

The band was invited by the City of Quebec to play on the Terrace. They have done a lot of practicing since arrival. A concert was held last night and regimental talent provided a good time.

Men misbehaving themselves are not given much consideration. One was sent home to-day.

Bridge Plant Extended. The Hamilton Bridge Works Co. announced this morning that it had purchased 10 acres of land in the manufacturers' annex for an open air stock yard. A ten-ton travelling crane will be built and switches from the G. N. R. and T. H. and B. run in. The plant will cost \$100,000, and if the company's business warrants it, an extension of the west end plant will be built there.

## BOY DROWNED

Ten-Year-Old Lad Loses Life While Bathing.

CORNWALL, Aug. 19.—(Special).—While bathing in the Cornwall canal this afternoon the 10-year-old son of G. Dayton was drowned above lock 18. He was pulled in the water with several other young lads, and swam to the pier of the O. & N.Y. bridge with the help of a plank. He lost the plank and sank before assistance could reach him.

## EATEN BY WILD DOGS

Terrible Fate of Child on Labrador Coast.

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 19.—(Special).—The officers and crew of the steam yacht Surf, which was in North Sydney on Wednesday, and was lately cruising on the Labrador coast, report that the dogs in that country have become very dangerous. Some of them are very voracious.

Dr. Munson of the Surf tells of a case where a little child was eaten alive by dogs before any assistance could be given to the child.

The cause of the dogs being so cross is said to be on account of lack of food on the coast.

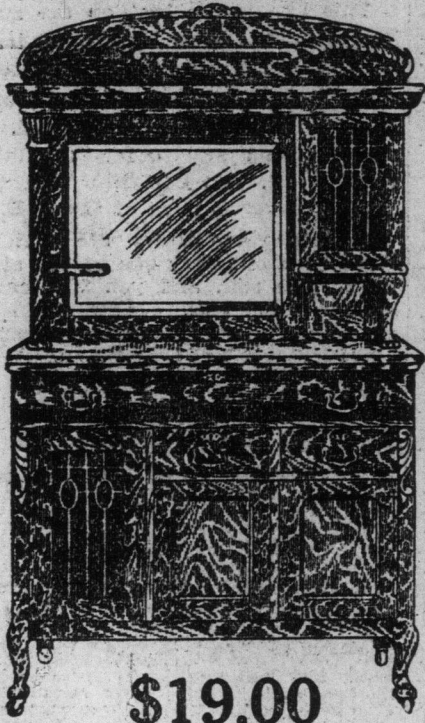

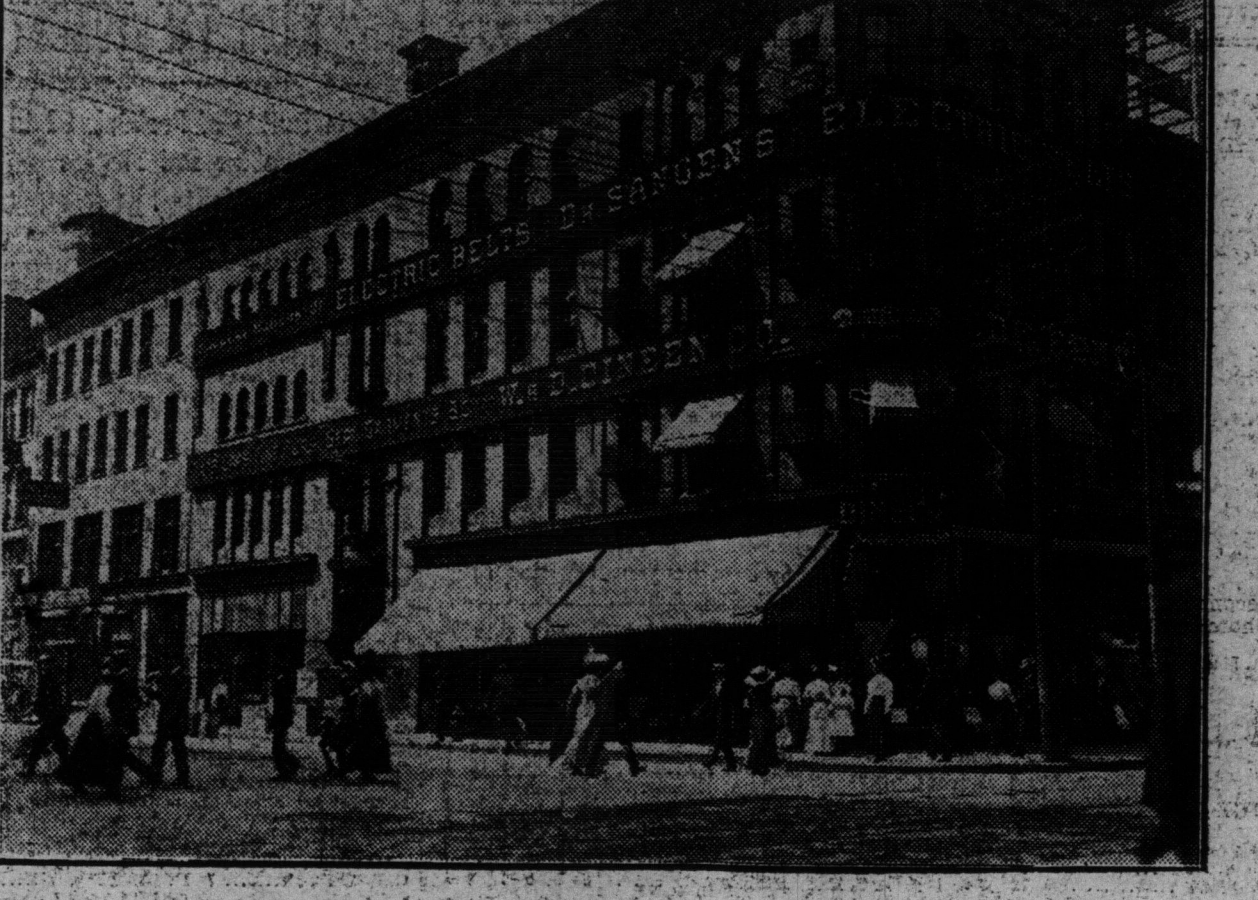

### B. C. INSURANCE REPORT.

Necessity of Provincial Regulation is Emphasized.

VICTORIA, B.C., Aug. 19.—(Special.)—The final report of the insurance commission, of which R. S. Lennie of Nelson is chairman, was laid before the executive council to-day. The digest of the evidence, the summary says, indicates the importance of regulation of fire insurance business throughout the province, and the necessity for local legislation on the subject, and uniformity, as far as possible, in the business.

The rapid growth of commerce, with the tremendous development in the different sections of the province leading to the springing up of many towns with their constantly increasing population, rendered it necessary that the whole of the people, should be to some extent under government supervision and control.

The many instances cited of bogus companies, or underwriters doing business, show it is necessary from the standpoint of the people as a whole.

### LIST IS GAINING AN UNDERTONE.

The setback which was administered to speculation in local securities yesterday had a further influence in to-day's operations in the market. This, however, was chiefly in curtailing dealings, as no recessions in prices were mentioning developed. On the other hand, further strength was shown in some issues, which rose above their recent high levels. The check administered to the market has served to prevent undue speculation, and to-day's purchases were mainly for investors. This is the best thing that can possibly happen for the market's future, and, although prices may not advance rapidly, the list is gaining an undertone which will give an account of itself when things are more propitious for buoyancy than they are at the present time.

## Sentiment More Conservative Wall St. Sags of Its Own Weight

### New York Market Drifts Along Quietly, But Tone is Generally Reactionary—Domestic Stocks a Little Changed.

Friday Evening, Aug. 19.

To-day was not one of bullish exuberance at the Toronto Stock Exchange. There was no great change in sentiment, and the demand for securities was lessened because of a further reaction on Wall-street. A bear party of minor proportions and a floor trading element act as an obstacle to the market's upward movement, and the effect of these two factors was sufficient to hold prices from rising. The market showed no definite tendency, tho in the main small declines were made by such active stocks as Sao Paulo, Rio, Twin City, Mackay and Toronto Rails. On the other side strength was exhibited by Maple Leaf, the preferred shares advancing a point. Porto Rico was also well bought, and rose 3/4 of a point. A waiting attitude was adopted by most of those interested in the market, as they were not confident of the outlook. There was no news favorable or unfavorable to prices, and the governing influence was undoubtedly the Wall-street situation. Transactions were of a very meagre character, and most of them were devoid of speculation. Bank shares and others of the less active stocks were dull at previous quotations.

said: The market to-day was not an active affair, but the early tendency was toward lower levels, reflecting the altered attitude of the professional element, who were less disposed to favor the long side, owing to the sharp reaction of Thursday. At the same time there was no marked weakness, the decline running to about a point for the standard issues like Union Pacific, where readings was under way, the bears not pressing matters. The market closed with a rally in which most of the losses of the day were recovered. We look for quieter trading and would buy only on good setbacks for moderate profits.

**Bradstreet's Trade Review.**  
Bradstreet reports to-day's market to be quiet. The movement of general lines of merchandise continues of fair volume, although trade has still much of a holiday nature. A fairly good amount of trade for dry-goods noted, while business for fall orders of moderate proportions. News from the west is rather more reassuring and expectations are that a good fall business will be done with that part of the country. The eastern harvest is now near the finish and, generally speaking, the year has been a good one for the farming community. Deliveries of produce continue good. In some instances collections are reported to show slight improvement, but in the majority of cases they are still slow. Labor continues to be well employed and most factories are busy. Boot and shoe men are a little slack and the demand for leather is reported quiet. Money shows a slightly easier tendency.

Toronto reports say a good steady tone is noted in general trade there. The selling business is done with better lines is of good proportion, and retailers generally would seem to be in a good position with not too heavy stocks on hand. Business for fall winter business is concerning ordering for Eastern Canada and some parts of the west has been good. Some dealers, however, are showing a tendency to wait until they have a better idea of what their requirements are likely to be. Latest reports of the western harvest say late rains did much good in certain districts. Fall business in Ontario promises to be of good volume. Crops of nearly all kinds have turned out well, the chief exception being the grain crops. Receipts of produce are large and prices hold steady. Collections are about as reported last week.

Wholesale reports say both wholesale and retail trade have kept very nicely during the past week. In fact, in some lines there have been some signs of increased business. The selling business in general is better than was expected, having received much credit from the west of the past fortnight or so. Should this prove to be the case it is likely general business will feel the effect within the next week or two.

Vancouver and Victoria reports say all lines of trade report a good movement and prospects for the future common. The plan of marking up prices is becoming too expensive without outside participation. In view of bad underlying conditions, more than usual and many banking interests find prevailing levels sufficiently attractive to sell. The bull party has been endeavoring to advance United States Steel common in a substantial way, but the undertaking met with a rather severe check yesterday, in the shape of heavy selling orders from those in control—Town Topics.

**Smelters Annual Report.**  
Annual report American Smelters just published shows net decrease of \$258,000; earnings \$508,000 more than seven per cent. on both stocks. Surplus after depreciation, \$461,600, was \$1,546,399.  
Smelters balance sheet shows all liabilities \$2,652,000; cash and demand loans \$1,624,000; materials and metals on hand \$19,250,000. In addition company has over \$2,000,000 in investments, and does not count \$17,750,000 common stock of American Smelters Securities, which earned 3.7 per cent. on \$30,000,000 common last year.  
The balance is equal to 1.09 per cent. on common stock against 7.7 per cent. last year.

**ON WALL STREET.**  
Erickson Perkins & Co. had the following: Stocks displayed considerable weakness to-day, but no more than weakness in view of the extent of the rise between August 1st and 17th, amounting to 14 in U. P. and Reading, and 1 1/2 in Steel. The setback of yesterday and to-day is a wholesome one and may go further. But much of the afternoon selling came from traders, and when they did not bring out many offerings, prices rallied to the last half hour. Those willing to trade for quick turns probably had a chance to buy to advantage, assuming that prominent interests still have many stocks to sell they will probably bid them up again, affording a basis for traders to take profits. We see nothing but a trading market in sight for the time being.
