ROOSEVELT WINS HIS RACE IN A WALK JUDGE PARKER NEVER HAD A CHANCE

Republicans Carry Every Doubtful State Except Maryland, While the Democrats Get a Solid South—Parker Did Not Equal Bryan's Record—New York State Goes Republican, While the Usual Democratic Majority in the City is Cut Down Greatly—La Follette Wins in Wisconsin.

New York, Nov. 8.—The Republican national ticket has been elected by a vote in the electoral college that will exceed that of 1892 given to McKinley in 1900. The result of to-day's balloting was astounding even to the most sanguine of the Republican managers. Considered as they were of success, they were not prepared for the astounding figures which followed the closing of the polls—bringing into the Republican column not only all those States they had claimed as safe for their candidates, but with the possible exception of Maryland, every State classed as doubtful.

Democratic successes are confined to Maryland, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Texas, Arkansas, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, New Hampshire, Nevada (probably Repub.), North Dakota, and Nebraska. Unofficial returns indicate that he has lost some of those whom the Nebraska candidate held for his party. Official figures from some of the northwest states may slightly change the totals, but based on the returns available at a late hour to-night the electoral vote stands as follows:

NO THIRD TERM.

Washington, Nov. 8.—President Roosevelt to-night, after the election returns clearly indicated the result, issued the following statement: "I am deeply sensible of the honor done me by the American people in thus expressing their confidence in what I have done and have tried to do. I appreciate to the full the solemn responsibility this confidence imposes upon me, and I shall do all that in my power lies not to forfeit. On March 4 next I shall have served three and a half years, and this constitutes my first term. The wise custom which limits the president to two terms regards the substance and not the form. Under no circumstances will I be a candidate for or accept another nomination."

MR. STRATTON IS HONORED BY PREMIER AND AIDES

Presented With Cabinet of Silver—Mr. Ross Regrets the Coming Retirement.

As a pleasant interlude in political campaigning Hon. J. R. Stratton will be able to look back on Nov. 8, 1904. The occasion was a little dinner given by him in the Parliament Buildings last night. Besides the provincial secretary and Mr. Stratton there were present the premier, Mrs. O'Sullivan, superintendent of Mercers Reformatory; T. Mulvey, assistant provincial secretary; Dr. C. A. Fisher, deputy registrar; R. Christie, inspector of asylums; Dr. Smith, inspector of prisons; J. Noxon, inspector of prisons; E. Saunders, provincial department; J. W. Gordon, provincial department; E. A. MacLaurin, inspector of criminal justice accounts; Dr. A. Hodgson, provincial department; Dr. D. Clark, Toronto Asylum; Dr. G. A. McCullum, London Asylum; Dr. J. T. Gilmore, warden, central prison; Dr. P. H. Spohn, Penitentiary; R. Mathison, deaf and dumb institute; H. P. Gardner, Ontario institution for the blind; and E. C. Myers, private secretary to Mr. Stratton.

After the dinner Mr. Stratton's hospitality was reciprocated and his personal popularity testified to in a substantial way by the presentation of a massive oak chest of silver plate containing 112 pieces. This magnificent gift was conveyed to Mr. and Mrs. Stratton in appropriate terms by Dr. Daniel Clark. The inscription engraved on a silver plate on the chest reads: "Presented to the Honorable J. R. Stratton, secretary and registrar of the Province of Ontario, by the superintendents of the public institutions and the deputies of the department as a token of their esteem, 8th November, 1904."

Mr. Stratton appeared much affected and replied feelingly. He was glad of the opportunity to meet the heads of the departments who had so ably and efficiently supported him in the administration of affairs. Whether his time with the government should be long or short he hoped their pleasant relations would be continued. The premier expressed his regret that Mr. Stratton's time should be so short. He would regret very much should he find it necessary to retire. He had come into the cabinet at great personal sacrifice, and had he not done so he might possibly to-day be one of the wealthiest men in the province. He was a valuable worker, not only satisfactory to the government, but of great service to the public.

10,000 TREES IN TORONTO TO SUPPER WOODSMAN'S AX

Park Commissioner Chambers Impervious to Sentiment—Cluny Ave. Residents Have a Protest Now.

WOODMAN, SPARE THAT TREE. That old familiar tree, Whose glory and renown Are spread o'er land and sea, And wouldst thou be cut down? Woodman, forbear thy stroke! Cut not its saprophytic tree; Or thou wilt have to rue it, Now towering to the skies! Forgive this foolish man, But that old oak stand.

"Sacrilege" and "wandalism," say the residents of Cluny-avenue and vicinity; the park commissioner, and since Friday, in spite of protests from all around, there have been men at work mercilessly uprooting, sawing and splitting trees which were, as one lady expressed it, "the glory and pride of the people."

More destruction is yet to come, and the feeling now is of the resignation of despair. There is also a feeling of bitterness. The trees which are being destroyed are along the boulevard on the south side of Cluny-avenue, fronting the old Ridout estate. This property was recently purchased by Cluny-avenue gardener, and on this man's recommendation, asked permission of the city to have the trees removed. The indignation came as a shock to the neighbors, and to sundry protests were made to the park commissioner and to the park commissioner, and to others, and it was no use. We are all heartbroken, they were beautiful old trees, and we feel that it is almost sacrilege to ruthlessly destroy them. We feel all have some right to consideration in a matter of this kind," was one statement.

Go to by the Thousand. Park Commissioner Chambers, when spoken to about the matter last night, not only argued in justification of the removal of the trees, but said that he could be prepared to witness the removal of from 800 to 10,000 trees from the city streets this winter. Mr. Mulock, he said, had employed Todd, a landscape gardener from Montreal, to make the boulevard in keeping with the rest. There were two or three hundred trees that had been cut down before. Those who objected did so from purely sentimental reasons.

Into consideration that we must make improvements one time or another," he said. "There is a great deal of sentiment about trees in Toronto. I went up there with Mr. Mulock and saw the trees and I had no doubt that they were beautiful old trees, and sometimes they nearly take a gun to me. I am just as great a lover of trees as any of the people in Rosedale, and perhaps more than some, but I do not see the use of the city's money in this. I'll tell you that there are going to be 3000-4000 probably 10,000-15,000 trees cut down this winter. Do not cry with him."

POSTMISTRESS SO CURIOUS SHE OPENS ALL LETTERS

Northfield Residents Having Mail Addressed Elsewhere—She Warned Man of Detectives Coming.

D. A. Weeger of the Village of Northfield, in Stormont County, came to Toronto yesterday and gave himself up to the police. He was given his liberty upon a substantial bail bond being furnished.

Weeger's coming to Toronto may develop and help to right an imposition under which the residents of Northfield have been suffering for some months. It has been a quiet topic of gossip amongst the villagers that their letters had been tampered with, in fact, that their correspondence had been opened and read before it reached them. Of course in a small village, where everyone knows everybody, no one likes to take the initiative in making a complaint. No outspoken complaint has been made, that is, not to the proper officials, but the villagers are now taking the precaution to have their mail sent to neighboring postoffices. No one thinks that these letters are opened from any criminal motive. It is simply a woman's curiosity, to know all her neighbors' business and private affairs. The postmistress is Mrs. Algure.

While it has been suspected and talked about in the village, this state of affairs might not have been made public for some time had not Weeger placed himself in such a position that the police were asked to take a hand. Weeger carried on business as an implement agent in Northfield. He ordered two bicycles from the Toronto Cycle and Motor Co. This company was not satisfied with the settlement made by Weeger. They wrote him to that effect. He replied in such terms that a charge of sending indecent literature through the mails was laid against him. Two summonses were served on him to appear in Toronto. He failed to appear here. A warrant was issued for his arrest.

Last week Detective Forrest was sent on business and as he had to visit Northfield, Inspector Stark handed him the Weeger warrant, thinking he might run across his man. He also sent an intimation to Northfield that one of his men would be down there. Much to Forrest's surprise he found upon reaching the village that his coming was generally known. As soon as he arrived, he was spotted by friends of Weeger, who immediately tipped off to him. The officer soon discovered this and with his usual ability "got next" to someone who told him that the postmistress had sent word to Weeger to stay away from the polling booth—it was election day—as the officer was there for him.

THE DUTY OF THE HOUR.

Public ownership is a live question to many people in Ontario. It is a live question for the people of the cities of Ontario, for the people of the towns of Ontario, and it will soon be a live question even for the farmers of Ontario. It is a live question for the people of the west: already the Conservatives of the west are moving to hold a convention next year to declare for public ownership.

Public ownership, therefore, is not to be sent to the rear, but is to be kept at the front more and more from this time forward. Public ownership ought to be the dominant question in this election now about to take place in the Province of Ontario. In Toronto it ought also to be the ruling question in the approaching municipal elections for mayor, aldermen and councilors, anyone who watches the cities in this province to-day will see an unsatisfactory condition of affairs. For instance, if you read the papers of yesterday you will find that the City of Hamilton is at loggerheads with the street railway company there. If you read the reports in the same papers you will see that the Mayor of Ottawa has presented a report to the council of that city advocating public ownership of all public utilities, including the street railway and the distribution of light and power. And if you read the papers of Toronto you will see what dissatisfaction prevails with the street railway service here, and that great dissatisfaction has long existed with the gas company and the electrical companies.

What does all this point to? It points to public ownership, and it points to public ownership being first realized in connection with our municipalities. As the provincial law now stands it is against public ownership. It was only by the hardest fight that the City of Toronto was even enabled to acquire power to buy some stock in the Consumers' Gas Company. The attorney-general of the province has been a corporation man and not a municipal man. He has done his best and used his party, his government and the legislature to build up these private corporations, to strengthen their franchises, to confirm agreements that were manifestly against public policy and the public interest, to pass unfair acts like the Commes measure and to establish a railway commission under the government that was against public interest and in the interest of the corporations. He is the head of the public franchise-holding ring in Hamilton and about Hamilton.

All this must be changed. The general law of the province must be at least so changed and modified as to facilitate public ownership wherever public

Rio Janeiro, Nov. 8.—A bill for an increase in the navy and which has been approved by the chamber of deputies, is pending in the senate, provides for several war vessels during 1905.
