The text of the statement reads:

"We captured last night the village of Villeret, southeast of Hargicourt and progressed northwest of Lens. Full particulars of the booty we took at Levin and in the Souchez River are unavailable but the fact is established that our cap ares were exceedingly large, including a long range six inch naval gun, many thousand rounds of ammunition of all calibre up to eight inch, some trench mortars and great quantities of bombs and grenades of all kinds. In addition, truckloads of new tools, many lengths of tram lines with trucks complete and two large engineer dumps have fallen intact into our possession.

"The attack at Monchy Le Preux on the 14th was pressed by the enemy with great determination. The third Bavarian division, which was brought down to resist our offensive during the battle of Loos in 1915 and later on took part in the fighting near High Wood during the Somme hattle in 1916, was again hurried down to reinforce the divisions already in line. It was ordered to retake Monchy Le Preux at all costs. Its losses in this fruitless attack were exceptionally heavy, as has been the case with all the Bavarian troops throughout the whole recent operations. Of the prisoners taken by us since the 9th more than one-third are Bavarians."

MORE BRITISH GAINS.

London, April 16-The British captured last night the village of Vellerst, southeast of Hargicourt, according to an official statement issued by the British war office. They also made progress northwest of Lens.

Large captures of guns and war material were made by the British at Lievin and on the Souches River in the Lens region. The cannon taken include a six inch naval gun of long range. Truckloads of new tools, many thousands of rounds of munitions and quantities of bombs, grenades and engineering equipment also were captured.

FRENCH INTO SECOND LINE

Paris, April 16-The French penetrated the German second line last night One of Largest Carriers of Bulk country. at several points in Alsace. The war office reports that great numbers of German dead were found in the trenches, which had been torn up by the French shell fire.

Prisoners and booty were brought back by the French. Further gains were made by French troops south of the Oise. There was heavy artillery firing during the night in Alsace, Lorraine, the Champagne, in the region of Soissons and Rheims and south of the Oise. Between Soissons and Rheims the shell fire was particularly severe.

Allies Continue Their Irresistible Advance

British Headquarters in France, via London, April 15-Fighting like men with their backs to the wall, the Germans are making desperate resistance to the British advance, especially along the Hindenburg line from Queant to St. Quentin. This line has been broken between Queant and Arras, consequently the Germans are attempting to hold from Queant southward.

In the meantime Lens was being approached late today from three directions. The civilian population was evacuated by the Germans on Friday. No person was allowed more than thirty pounds of baggage. With the departure of the civilians the Germans seized these months rations gathered at Lens by the American relief commission. Fire's continued to glow in Lens today, while far away to the south fires were seen within St. Quentin, towards which the British and French are converging.

Realizing that the important town of Queant, the switch point of the Hindenburg line was threatened by the close proximity of the British ,the Germans early today launched an attack from there over a six mile front. While suffering immediate reverses everywhere else they managed, by the concentration of artillery, to recapture Lagnicourt, opposite Queant, which was taken from them several weeks ago.

Their victory at this point was shortlived, however, for the British immed iately counter-attacked and re-took Lagnicourt, with more than two hundred prisoners, and catching the retreating Germans under an intensive field gun fire, cut them to bits. Thus ended the first real "defensive offensive" the Germans have attempted since the battle of Arras began.

Paris, April 15-There has been heavy artillery fighting on the Macedonian front between the Vardar and Presba Lake, says today's official war office statement reporting on operations in this war area. In the only infantry operations announced local attacks on the Entente lines west of Monastir and in Albania, the hostile forces failed to make any impression.

A new offensive is also reported from the Belgian front where King Albert's forces pushed forward into Dixmude to find the German defences abandoned.
