Paris, Nov. 4—The first British con-tingent arrived on Friday at Guevgueli in the Serbian theatre, according to a Havas despatch filed on Saturday at Saloniki but delayed. The British force will act as a separate unit, but in col-laboration with the French troops. Guevgueli is just across the Greek bor-der, forty miles northwest of Saloniki. General M. P. E. Sarrail, commander of the allies' expeditionary forces in Serbia, returned on Friday after a hasty inspection of the front from Guevgueli


