



Mr. Worthington was pressed to name the big financiers who he said were behind the project, but he refused to do of Wales to Canada is likely to be the purchase of real estate for the prince in the dominion, which is contemplated by the king. There is considerable money awaiting, investment for the Prince of Wales, representing the accumulated funds saved from the Duchy of Lancaster. This is being administered in trust for the prince until he shall be twenty-one.

The purchase of real estate in Canada for the prince is a form of investment that has been under consideration by the king for some time. A plan proposed everal years ago, which had the apployal of the late King Edward, was to buy an estate in Norfolk, adjoining the Sandringham property, but this ideh has been abandoned. The purchase of land in the dominion is regarded as a far better investment.

If this plan is carried out, the prince will almost certainly visit Canada this year or early next. Meanwhile, however, arrangements may have to be made for the prince to visit at least two European courts, in connection with matrimonnial arrangements, but much secrecy is being preserved in this matter.

Queen Mary's desire is that before the prince goes on any tour to the colonies the question of whom he is to marry shall be finally decided; but in this the prince may not fall so readily into line with his parents' desire. It is known that for the present he has no wish to be engaged.

The cen tral board, through its personal repre sentatives on the other side, is constantl advised of the condition of the differen markets, and it is thus possible to take advantage of the best markets and avoid shipping to those which are over-stocked. The profits on the sales, in-stead of going into the pockets of speculators, are distributed among the growers.
