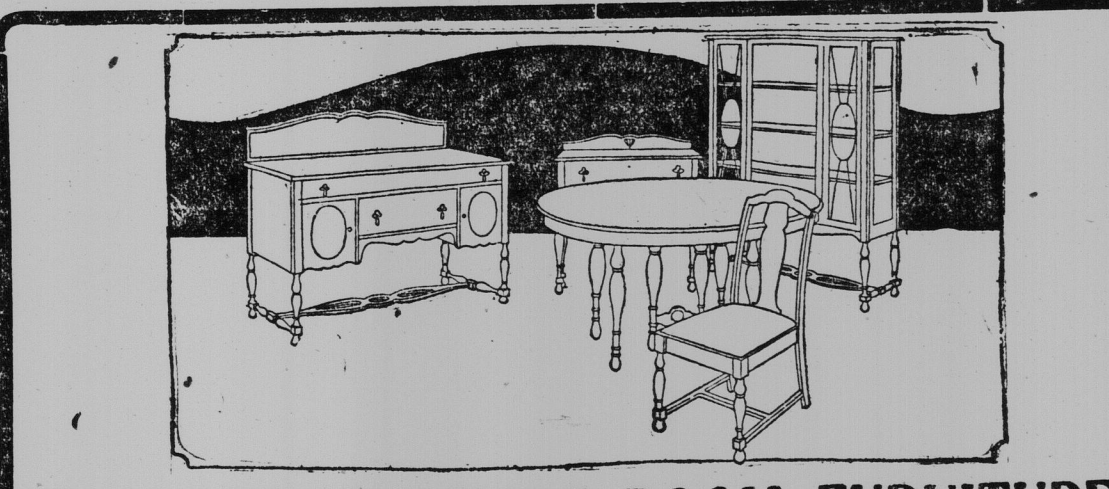

SOCIAL PROBLEMS

A member of the Associated Charities said at yesterday's meeting that he was told there were half a dozen stenographers for every position offered in this city. The matter came up in connection with a discussion of the question of work for women, when the statement was made that it was practically impossible to get competent girls for domestic work. It was pointed out that the social distinction made between girls who earn money in an office and those who earn it by housework, as well as the greater freedom enjoyed by the former, prompts the girl who must work to shun domestic service. There she is "a servant," but in no other she is able to look down, as so many others do, upon the "servant class." Society has made this distinction and society must unmake it. Even in the church, where if anywhere the doctrine of equality should prevail, the "servant girl" is labelled. The story is told of one girl's society in a church where a girl who worked in a home overheard one of her more fortunate sisters remark that she would not continue to attend because the place was full of "servant girls." In another case the lady of the house was asked by her maid who went to the same church as herself why it was that when there was a social event for girls of the Sunday school she never received an invitation. Why, indeed? When social standards are reconstructed so that character and intelligence will count, without reference to occupation, so long as it is honorable, the name "servant girl" will go into the discard and the problem of domestic help will be solved. An honest maid from a kitchen, plainly dressed, should be more acceptable in a church pew than a useless and frivolous person wearing diamonds, or one whose display is the fruit of sharp dealing in the market place. Christian ethics will solve the "servant" problem whenever professing Christian women make up their minds as a body to apply that method.

IN CARLETON COUNTY

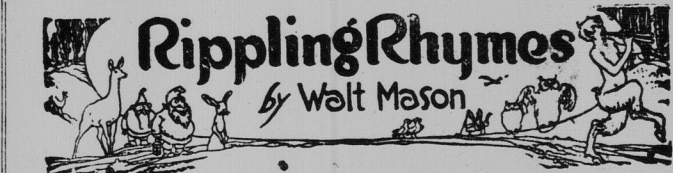
The "Unionist" convention was held in Woodstock last evening and selected a candidate. So far as the reports in the morning papers show, not a word was said by anybody about the Union party or the Union government. It was in reality a Conservative convention. SINN FEIN MET BUT NOT IN MANSION HOUSE

Later Guarded by 200 Police and 200 Soldiers—Convention Held at Midnight. Dublin, Oct. 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Sinn Fein convention was held at midnight Wednesday at some place at present unknown. Arthur Griffith, founder of the Sinn Fein organization, addressed 200 of the delegates. He said the Sinn Fein would not enter into a demand for a republic in Ireland and would hold no discussions with any English party. He added that Eamon De Valera, "president of the Irish Republic," who is now in the United States, was convinced that the Irish question would be a leading issue in the American presidential contest. It had been the intention of the Sinn Feiners to hold the convention in the Mansion House here, but the government issued orders to prohibit the assembling of the Sinn Fein, Irish Volunteers and Gaelic League. Nearly 2,000 delegates from all parts of the country came to Dublin for the meeting. The Mansion House was guarded by 200 police and 200 soldiers during the day, but these were withdrawn in the evening. The police were armed with revolvers, while the soldiers had full field equipment. A large force of soldiers were held in reserve at Trinity College and other places, but the day passed quietly.

RECENT DEATHS

The death of Mrs. Alexander McPhee occurred in Boston at the home of her daughter recently. She had many friends and relatives in Salisbury, N. B., who were shocked to hear of her sudden death. She leaves besides her aged husband, three sons and three daughters. The news of the death of Mrs. Anna M. Allyn, who was killed in a street car accident in Cleveland, Ohio, last Saturday, has been received by a cousin, Mrs. R. A. Abramson. She leaves two sons, two daughters, three sisters and a brother. She was a daughter of the late George Wightman, who resided in this city several years ago.

Dominion Happenings of Other Days

THE EARLY MONTREAL. The City of Montreal, now the greatest in Canada, and its port the second on the continent, began in an endeavor to aid the sick and the aged. A French gentleman, M. Olier, was ambitious to found in the new world a mission where the sick might find relief, the Supplians, a theological seminary and the colony of the Island of Montreal from a member of the Company of One Hundred Associates and organized the Society of Notre Dame de Montreal and adopted the name Ville Marie de Montreal as that by which the colony would be known. The great Maisonneuve was made its first governor. He arrived in the late fall of 1641 and prepared the site for the town and had it formally dedicated, the next year enclosing it with a palisade and mounting guns for defence. Within the enclosure were housed the eighteen persons forming the new colony.

THREATENED COAL STRIKE. (New York Evening Post). The prospect of a strike by 40,000 miners of the bituminous fields on Nov. 1 looms up more menacingly than ever since the operators' rejection of the miners' terms at Philadelphia on Friday. The hope that a settlement may yet be reached in fact has a fall fortnight will elapse before it will be necessary for heads of the United Mine Workers to get out strike orders. Several possible mediators exist—the government and the National Coal Association are suggested. Negotiations thus far have left miners and operators far apart. The former call for a 60 per cent increase in wages, much more weighty heavy overtime pay, and general abolition of the double shift. They present figures showing that in 1918 Illinois and Indiana mine workers averaged about \$1,425 and Pennsylvania and Ohio workers about \$1,175. Operators contend that the present wage agreement must be continued till next April unless the president meanwhile proclaims the war ended, and assert that wages are so good that miners should be fully satisfied. They speak of men averaging \$10 and \$12 a day. On their face, the miners' terms seem unreasonable, but there have been indications that they would accept compromise; reports have also been heard—and denied—that the operators would grant a 25 per cent increase. A miners' strike would be such a calamity that no effort should be spared to obtain an agreement.

### ROBBING THE ROOSTS.

People residing along Rockland road and the upper section of Fort Howe have been annoyed during the last week by hen thieves. A few nights ago one man lost nearly 100 choice birds, and other people were subject to smaller losses. An endeavor is being made to apprehend the culprits.

### BEING WELCOMED.

A recent arrival in the city from overseas is Capt. Robert Macaulay, son of the late R. R. Macaulay. He has been on the other side since 1916 and has seen much service, having been with the 27th Infantry Battalion for some time in France. Captain Macaulay, who enlisted in northern Ontario, where he was living at the time, is being welcomed by many friends about St. John.

### STANDARD CAUGHT AGAIN.

Frederick Mall; Hon. E. A. Smith, minister of lands and mines is having a laugh at the expense of some Conservative newspapers which have cackled over the great Tory victory in Sbediac, the minister's own parish, in the recent municipal elections in Westmorland. Councilor William Murray, whose election was hailed as a great Conservative triumph, is a Liberal and so declared himself in no mistaken fashion during the campaign.

### WELL KNOWN HERE.

Friends in St. John will be interested in a despatch from Quebec reporting that Major Henri Chasse, D. S. O., M. C., of the 22nd French-Canadian Battalion, has been promoted to be lieutenant colonel and given command of a machine gun battalion to be formed there soon. Another former 22nd, Major John Roy, M. C., has been appointed second in command. Both are well known in New Brunswick, having been in France with their battalions which was one of the units of the 5th Infantry Brigade to which the 20th belonged.

## TITUS IN JAIL

William Titus, who saved his way into the Bangor jail last week, released Alice Scott and fled with her in an automobile and who was captured three hours later, was arraigned in Bangor on the charge of assisting a prisoner to escape. Titus was locked up in default of bail. The woman is back in jail.

Mrs. Scott, who is thirty-four years old, says that she is a widow and has one child, a girl aged fourteen. The two were arrested by Federal immigration authorities at Calais, the charge being evading the head tax.

Titus balked of the case, but appeared wild and hysterical and declared that his only idea was to get the woman out of jail as he was the cause of her being there. Once out he said they would return to Canada.

## FORMER TEACHER LEAVES LARGE ESTATE; HER WILL

Exeter, N. H., Oct. 17.—The will of Miss Jennette A. Moulton of Hampton Falls, a Boston High School teacher, who died suddenly last Wednesday, gives to Miss Louise Clark of 98 Chestnut street, Boston, her most intimate friend and closest associate during her teaching in Greater Boston, the homestead farm at Hampton Falls, with all livestock, farming implements, and house furnishings, not otherwise disposed of, and also the sum of \$20,000.

Miss Clark is also given \$1,000 in trust, the income to benefit an aunt of the testatrix, Miss Nan A. Stearns of Boston. At the aunt's death the principal goes to Miss Clark.

Other bequests are \$1,000 to Mrs. Grace Pollard of Minneapolis in trust for Albert A. Pollard, a cousin, with reversion to herself at his death; \$2,000 to Miss Sarah M. Smith of Exeter, a cousin; \$1,000 each to two friends, Miss Adeline A. Ballou of Melrose and Miss Grace A. Reed of 95 Mt. Vernon street, Boston; \$1,000 to Mrs. George B. Rogers of Exeter, now dead; \$100 each to Misses Grace O. and Agnes K. Knight of Hampton Falls; \$100 to Mrs. Francis A. Bragg of Foxboro, Mass.; \$1,000 to William M. Boal of Rensselaer, W. Va., a recent student at Phillips Exeter, and \$200 to Mrs. Sarah N. Batchelder of Hampton Falls.

In memory of her late mother, Mrs. Emily S. Moulton, the testatrix gives \$500 to the New England Grenfell Association.

The residue will be equally shared by seven cousins, Miss Sarah U. Smith and Justin E. Moulton of Exeter, Howard F. Moulton of Hampton Falls, Mrs. Cora A. Whittier, Mrs. Mabel E. Lane and Miss Mary Stearns of Paris, Me., and Albert A. Pollard of Minneapolis, the last in trust.

The will was executed May 12, 1918, and named as executor George B. Rogers, a Phillips Latin instructor.

## WAS FOUR YEARS A PRISONER OF GERMANS

### Hugh McAlpine Here Today and Heartily Greeted—Was Captured at Langemark

Taken prisoner at the Battle of Langemark in the early stages of the war, soon after the arrival of the first Canadian division in France, Hugh McAlpine will return to St. John today after a lengthy stay in a German prison camp. He will be the guest of his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Howe, 149 Elliott row, for a little while before going back to Edmonton, Alta., where he was residing at the time of his enlistment with the first contingent.

Mr. McAlpine was released after the armistice and again set foot on English soil after more than four years under the control of the foe. He returned to early September in England and coming back to Canada had the misfortune to catch influenza aboard ship. For the last three weeks he was in hospital in Montreal. His friends here will be pleased to know that he is well once again and will give him a hearty welcome on his arrival.

## PRISONER REFUSES TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS

### New Action in Drama of Robbery on Intercolonial Train

Quebec, Oct. 17.—A new actor in the drama of the Harlake train robbery appeared at court proceedings yesterday afternoon in the person of Albina Castonguay, a former employe of the Grand Trunk railway, who was arrested some time ago on the charge of stealing from the company, found guilty, and sentenced to four months imprisonment.

Castonguay was serving his term at the time of the train robbery, but was brought to give evidence in the case of J. B. T. Proteau. Although threatened with punishment for contempt of court he refused to answer all questions put to him by the crown.

It is said that the crown prosecutors had received information that Proteau, in his association with other prisoners in the jail, was a captain of men. It is also said that Castonguay sent for his lawyer and communicated to him the information he received, thus leading to the recovery of \$60,000 of the \$71,000 missing.

The court was adjourned until Saturday. The main reason for adjournment, it is understood, is to allow Judge Langely to decide as to the punishment that he will impose upon the prisoners, who have refused to answer questions. These are Teppings, Levasseur, Proteau and Castonguay.

## STATE W.C.T.U. HEAD EXCORIATES WOMEN WHO U.E. TOBACCO

Organization Not Conducting Campaign for Constitutional Ban on Smoking, Says Mrs. Boole

Binghamton, N. Y., Oct. 17.—Official denial that the Women's Christian Temperance Union was conducting a campaign for a constitutional amendment against the use of tobacco was contained in an address by Mrs. Ella T. Boole, president of the State organization of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, in convention here.

"It has been asserted that the Women's Christian Temperance Union would now begin a campaign for another amendment to the constitution to prohibit tobacco and that we then would proceed to prohibit tea and coffee," she said. "No action has been taken by the National Women's Christian Temperance Union or by the New York State Woman's Christian Temperance Union to enter upon such a campaign."

She said her organization had been conducting an "educational campaign against things that are harmful to children." Such has been our work against tobacco," she added, "because nicotine is harmful to youth."

"Mrs. Boole scored women who smoked. 'We deplore the increase in smoking among women,' she said. 'We look on it as an attempt to ape a form of feminism which would show that a woman has a right to do anything a man could do. The tobacco habit in women does not increase her beauty, charm, loveliness or efficiency, and the habit should be discouraged and condemned.'

### Y. W. P. A. WORK

At a meeting of the Young Women's Patriotic Association, with Miss A. Brock, the president, in the chair, in the G. W. V. A. rooms last night, Mrs. H. Lawrence addressed the members regarding the post war immigration of women for household service in the dominion. It was decided to help the Navy League campaign in every way possible and to that end \$55 was voted. The following committee was appointed to look after the caution arrangements in the Seaman's Mission, which is to be opened next week: Miss Upham, convener; the Misses Harbours, Gokton, Melick, Hatch and Willett. Other business was transacted at the meeting.

## MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

## BRITAIN MUST PRODUCE MORE

Impetive Need, Says Premier in Sheffield Speech

National Debt Nearly Eight Billion Pounds, Wages Doubled, Hours of Work Fewer and Standard of Living Higher

London, Oct. 17.—In a speech last night in Sheffield, Premier Lloyd George urged the imperative need of greater productivity on the part of the nation. He said that the national debt was nearly eight billion pounds. Wages had doubled, the hours of work were curtailed and the standard of living was higher than ever, but that that standard could not be preserved by a concourse of tribunals or the decisions of labor conferences. He called upon the British people to see that the peace was a real peace.

"It is not the British habit," he said, "to nag, harry, insult and trample a bleeding foe. So long as Germany conforms to the conditions we have laid down, we must give her a clear chance to produce a decent, peaceable and honorable existence; this in the interests not merely of Germany, but of Great Britain and the whole world."

He dilated on the need for a good understanding between capital and labor, but said in this matter the government could do but little. He lamented as an unpleasant fact that Great Britain had not yet approached the American standard in utilizing machinery in the task of production.

Referring to President Wilson, he said: "His illness is a serious blow to the peace of the world and the cause of humanity."

The premier concluded:—"The war is over. I wish I could say that all wars were over. But I am hopeful."

## TO CONSIDER PLANS FOR HOME FOR FEEBLE-MINDED

At the meeting of the Associated Charities held yesterday it was decided that at the annual meeting next month the matter of founding a provincial home for the feeble-minded would be discussed. William Young, the treasurer, reported that the society was in a

slightly better position financially than last year. Miss Grace Robertson, secretary, said that there would be a larger demand for charity, many families not being able to lay in supplies for the winter. The prospect for labor was not very good in cases where the heads of families were not sufficiently strong to take up longshore work. The domestic help problem was discussed and the view was expressed that something must be done to elevate the social status of the maid so that young girls might be more willing to go into service.

## BRITISH MERCHANT VESSELS

LOST IN WAR 7,759,090 TONS; LIVES 14,237

London, Oct. 17.—British merchant vessels lost through enemy action during the war totalled 7,759,090 gross tons. This was officially announced yesterday. Submarine action was responsible for the loss of 6,588,090 tons of this. The loss of 14,237 lives was involved in these sinkings.

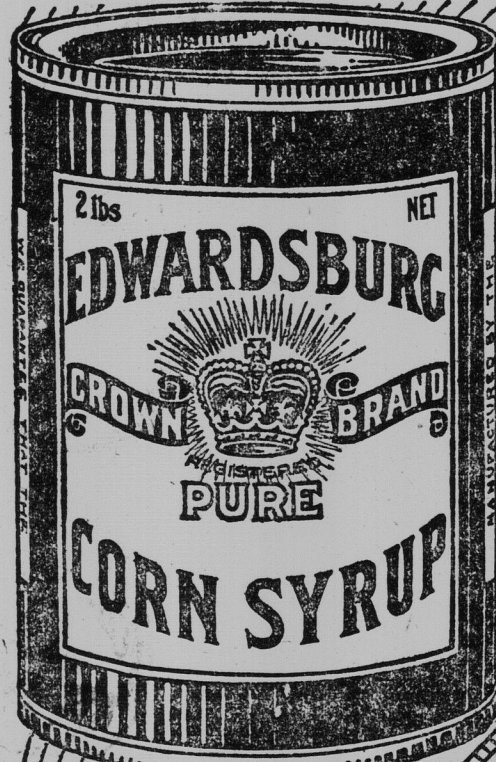

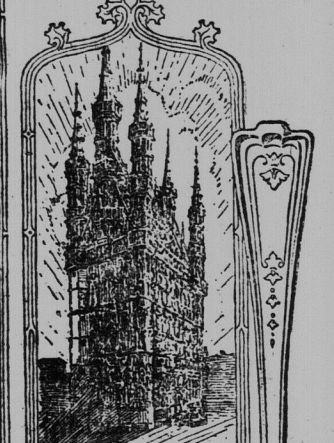

## FIGHTING FOR THE WEALTH OF MILLIONAIRE

Son Asserts Fourth Wife Used Undue Influence—Tells New Bedford Court of Alleged Badger Game

New Bedford, Oct. 17.—Hearings have been begun before Judge Alger in the Probate Court in the contested will case involving the property of David A. Snell, famous horseman and millionaire cracker manufacturer.

Mr. Snell, who is still remembered in racing circles as the owner of Lady Snell and the famous stallion Jupiter, cut off his son, William G. Snell, with only a small sum.

The latter is contesting the will upon the grounds of undue influence upon the part of the testator's fourth wife and also the alleged falling mentality of the testator, who was more than eighty-five years of age when he made the will in 1916.

He was married four times. The present or fourth Mrs. Snell had been his housekeeper prior to their marriage.

The principal witness was the contestant, William G. Snell, who testified to assisting his father in litigation brought by the husband of a woman who came from Boston to enter the employ of Mr. Snell as cook.

She Was Too Good to Cook. The witness said his father decided the woman was too good to be a cook and told her to come into the front part of the house as housekeeper.

Later the witness read in a newspaper story that the woman's husband, accompanied by detectives, had broken into the house and found them together. The husband started a suit for alienation of his wife's affections.

When I read the story," the witness said, "I hurried back to New Bedford and went to my father's house. He opened the door to the sitting room and I saw him there with the woman in his lap. I showed him the paper and he laughed and said, 'Quite a joke, Will, ain't it? It took me two days and a half to convince him that it was a badger game.'

One day he called and was talking to his father in Mrs. Hamilton's presence.

"All my father could converse about," the witness said, "was horses and the bakery business, and after three or four minutes Mrs. Hamilton got up and stamping her foot, said: 'All I can hear is horse and bakery. I get so sick and tired of hearing it.' Then she went to her room and slammed the door."

Mr. Snell also testified to helping his father by collecting evidence at a time when his third wife was suing him for separate maintenance. "She asked for \$20,000," he said, "but did not press the suit. She accepted what he said he would give her. I think he was in his 70's then, though he claimed to be sixty-two when he married her. She was twenty-two years old."

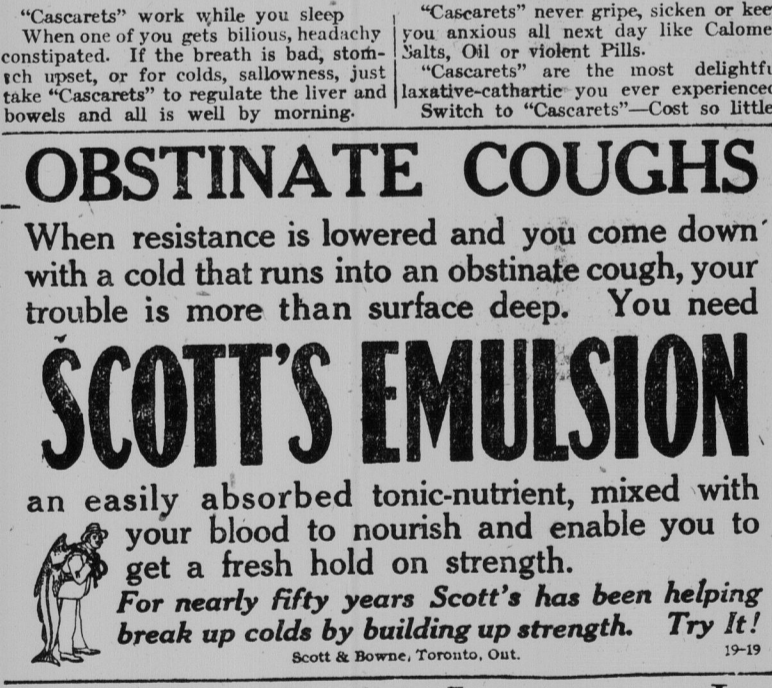

that curved Mrs. Pankhurst's lips seemed to underline the phrase with sinister meaning—seems to be quite prevalent here. Men and women during the war were awakened as never before to an interest in labor conditions and received many false ideas. They fell victims to the Bolshevik propaganda which is very active here. They were reached through their best side—their sympathy with the workers—and so drawn into serious mistakes.

"I have spent my life with the masses; I know and love them." There was a slight reminiscent pause, perhaps the public speaker's instinctive pause as he launches a statement that he knows he can defend from any hostile challenge, but no such interruption occurred, for the listener felt the sincerity of the pronouncement had there been no well-known data to support it. "But because they work with their hands I do not think they are much different from other people—I do not think they are less capable of governing at present than classes because of their lack of experience, of education, of training."

"I believe in noblesse oblige, in the fact that the leisure classes, the so-called upper classes—I do not for myself uphold any class distinctions," she interposed earnestly, "but that is the recognized term—owe it to the world to lead and direct the course of affairs. I feel that they must defend, yes, defend, the democratic system established here and in most civilized countries."

"I was trying the other day at a tea," she continued, "to distinguish between democracy and Bolshevism. Roughly speaking, democracy is where every section of the people has a fair and reasonable share in the government through representative institutions, which, of course, implies elections, while Bolshevism is the domination of the majority by a section of a section—class domination. The Bolsheviks themselves do not claim to represent the working class as a whole, but only those members who agree with their doctrines, and they admit that they mean to force their minority rule on the rest."

And then as though in answer to an unspoken question, she said: "I am here myself to voice the feeling of the enfranchised women of England that it is incumbent on us all to defend Christian civilization. People look at this or that existing evil, and in criticizing it condemn our civilization. Yet such evils, grave as they are, are not the fault of civilization, but of our imperfect realization of the principles on which civilization is based. The principles themselves are all right."

"I am starting on a lecture tour," Mrs. Pankhurst concluded, "beginning in the South. I am going to lecture to men and women, but principally women, on the duties of citizenship and tell them that the mission of woman today is to save civilization in this crisis. I shall ask them not to permit the destruction of our sys-

tem, whatever its faults may be, until a quiet, modestly gowned English woman to suggest them. ## SINGING COAL MAN

Brother of Rosa Pozzillo Prefers \$2,000 to \$50,000 a Year

Meriden, Conn., Oct. 17.—Gifted with what experts declared to be a \$50,000 a year voice, Anthony P. Pozzillo, Jr., a brother of Rosa Pozzillo, leading soprano of the Metropolitan Opera House, prefers to remain a humble coal man, rather than taking up a musical career. His sister earns \$110,000 a year with her voice. Tony, as everybody knows him, makes about \$40 a week when business is good.

With a ton of coal Tony will frequently deliver an aria from one of the famous operas that "Baby Rosa," his gifted sister, sings. Tony has such a marvellous voice that the people of Meriden have frequently been known, after he has made deliveries at their homes, to invite him into the house to sing for them. Other coal men in Meriden admit that Tony easily could monopolize the fuel business of the town if he would advertise "A song with every ton of coal."

## NEW YORK BUDGET FOR NEXT YEAR IS HIGH

Total \$316,521,427 to be Collected From The Taxpayers

New York, Oct. 17.—All records are broken and all expectations exceeded in the temporary city budget for next year which the finance and budget committee of the Board of Estimate has made public. It reaches the astounding total of \$316,521,427.80, an increase of \$68,405,992.72.

While Controller Craig contends that it is useless now to guess at the probable tax rate next year, the figures indicate that even if the Hyman-Craig administration slashes the tentative budget mercilessly the tax rate cannot be kept much below the \$8-on-\$100 mark, with the possibility of it going as high as \$9.25. At the lower figure the increase in the rate would be approximately sixty-four cents.

Mayor Hyman was quick to denounce the size of the budget, saying it must be cut or he would not sign it, and contending that mandatory legislation and governmental extravagance, including federal extravagance, were responsible for placing a tremendous burden on the taxpayers.

It is said, however, that as a member of the committee the mayor voted for every item that appears in the tentative budget. The largest single increase shown is that of the Board of Education, \$41,899,898. As the estimate was received late the committee incorporated the whole estimate in the tentative budget. The next highest increase is that of the police department, \$4,691,487, of which \$3,757,884 is for personal services.

In the fire department the proposed increase is \$2,470,383, of which \$2,246,910 is for increase in the personal service costs. The increase in the street cleaning department is \$2,305,112, of which \$1,991,688 is for personal services, otherwise increased pay.

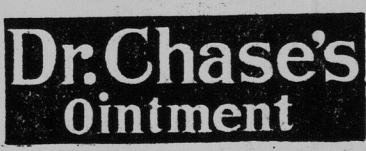

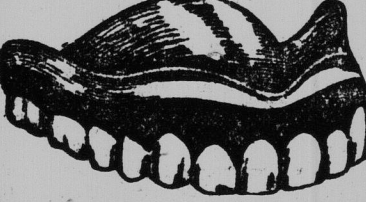

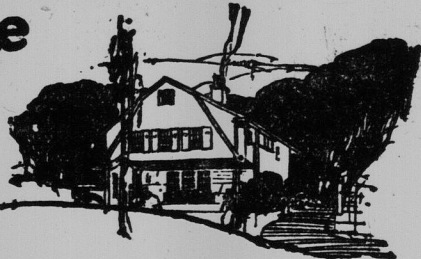
