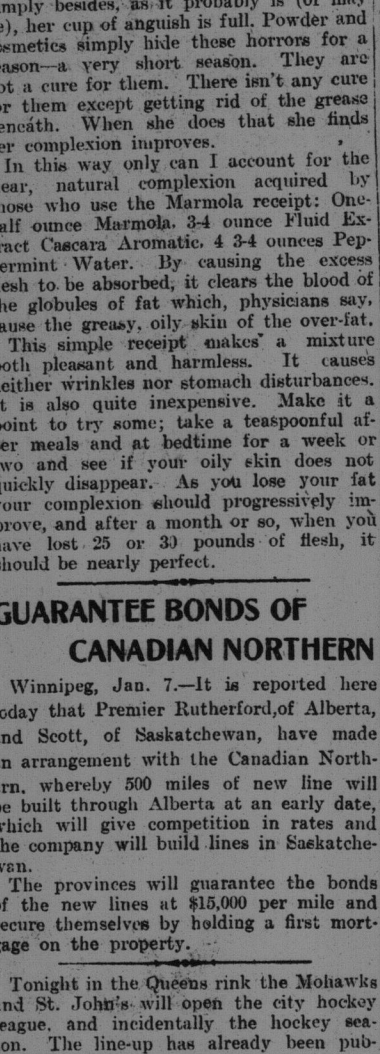
FURS WILL ADVANCE

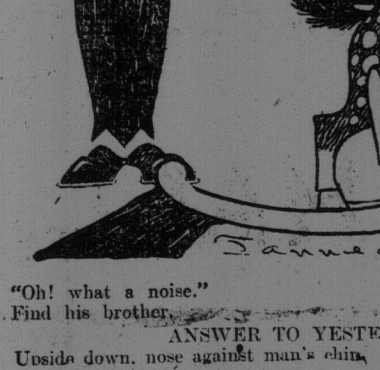

P. E. ISLAND WOMAN GETS A LARGE SUM TO SETTLE BREACH OF PROMISE CASE

Boston, Jan. 7.—The \$100,000 breach of promise suit in which Humphrey O'Sullivan, the millionaire politician and rubber king, of Boston and Lowell, was the defendant, has been settled out of court.

In exchange for the large sum paid to Mrs. Lee, all the exhibits in the case were turned over to Mr. O'Sullivan's attorneys.

These letters showed the writer to be a most ardent worker. Plans for the future were made in many of them.

The facts came out when on a motion made in the suit the declaration filed by Mrs. Lee was produced in court, together with a number of affidavits, which were sealed by order of the court.

Mrs. Lee, who brought the suit, is a divorced woman, of middle age. She is a dashing brunette. Her maiden name was Gardner, and she was born in Prince Edward Island.

The suit has created a great deal of interest in Lowell, O'Sullivan's home town, where he is a leading figure in church, business and social circles.

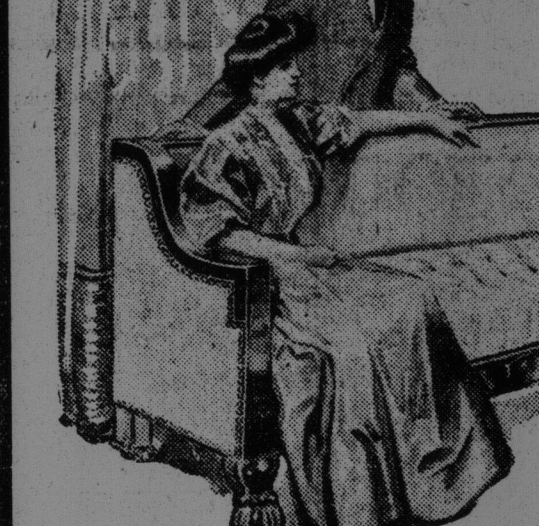
