The Department of Labour's index number stood at 185.5 for March compared with 185.4 in February and 134.8 in March, 1912. These numbers are percentages of the average price leaded 1800-01272 commodities during the decade 1800-01899. A considerable decline in coke was offset by advances in furniture and earthenware. Important increases also coccurred in animals and meats, boots and shoes, iron and steel bars, picks, crowbars, etc., gasoline and coal oil, and lumber. #### HEALTH BOARD MEETS.

At the request of this Board I proceeded to New York to interview Dr. Friedmann, and take note of the results of his serum upon patients thus treated.

After some difficulty, and through the offices of his American associate, Dr. Sturm, I at length met Dr. Freidmann at his hotel. The doctor was a man of nervous and impetuous manner, and speaks English but poorly, and always has an interpreter present. In reply to my question as to whether he could come to Hallfax, he replied that his many engagements in the United States made that impossible. I next asked him, when his serum would be on the market, and his reply was, within six or eight weeks.

He stated that his serum contained actual living tubercle bacilli of non-toxic, non-virulent character, and might be used practically without danger. I found it somewhat difficult to converse with him on account of his deficient knowledge of English, and hence some of his answers to my questions were of uncertain import.

Through the courtesy of Dr. John Brennan, President of the Board of Commissioners of Belview Hospital, I was permitted to interview and examine the many cases under treatment in that hospital, that sured forms, some of them having been under treatment for almost two months. After careful observation and study of the cases, I have to confess that definite evidences of improvement were not easily perceptible, although almost every patient visited stated they were much better. My conclusion is, therefore, that sufficient time has not yet elapsed to give a definite pronuncement upon the efficacy of the new treatment upon the efficacy of the new treatment and that a period of some

time has not yet clapsed to give a definite pronouncement upon the efficacy of the pronouncement upon the efficacy of the soly fair that a period of some months should be permitted for the operation of the test before any final pronouncement can be made. I may here add that the newspaper reports which have gone abroad concerning the alleged unfair treatment meted out to Dr. Freidmann by the profession of New York are without foundation. He has been given every opportunity to test his cure, but the medical laws of the State would not allow him to practice as a registered practitioner, and I may also state that the profession of New York are not very sanguine as to the outcome of the treatment.

The report was ordered to be filed. Commissioner Wooten brought up the question of an erysipelas patient being refused admittance into the Infectious Diseases Hospital. It was shown that the patient was afterwards admitted. The members of the Board did not see why any person suffering from any infectious disease should not be admitted without delay to the hospital. In consequence a resolution was adopted providing that a certificate from any physician, to the effect that his patient is suffering from any infectious disease, shall be sufficient to admit the same to the hospital, without first obstaining the City Medical Officer's permit.

The Board also decided that a ward be The Board also decided that a ward be

prepared for crysipelas patients.

At the present time there are nine patients in the Infectious Diseases Hos-Patients in the Infectious Diseases Hospital.

Inspector Hayden reported on the condition of two houses on Bloomfield St., which have no drainage to the sewer, and the occupants have to throw waste water in the yard. The Inspector reported that "one place is in a miserable condition, and the other is even worse." The worer will be summoned to the next meeting.

The Board's inspector reported that there were only two barber shops in the city that had not complied with the Board's regulations in respect to having running water. They will be notified to appear before the Board at its next meeting.

Ald, Hines called attention to the overloading of ash and garbage carts, causing some of the contents to be distributed all over the streets. The Board of Works' attention will be called to the same.

Inspectors Burke and Hayden reported having visited the incineration plant on a couple of occasions, but could not detect the least odor, although they approached it when the smoke was being wafted in their direction. The surroundings have been cleaned up. On one occasion they went inside when the pit was filled up and steaming. There was a very bad odor. The furnace fires were in a bad condition, and only one man was in charge of the furnace. The report will be sent to the Works department.

For although the Feniagis, like the suffragettes, were actuated by political motives, the former, unlike the latter, were no respecters of human life, and caused bombs to explode indiscriminately.

The first great outrage was a terrific explosion which occurred on March 15th, 1883, at the Local Government Board Offices in Whitehall. In the House of Commons, where the sound of the explosion was of a most alarming nature, the report was accompanied by a shaking of the whole building, and caused the most lively anxiety among the members. It was at first supposed that the explosion was caused by gas, but on examination the serious damage suffered by the Local Government Board Offices, as well as by many adjoining buildings, soon satisfied the authorities that it must have been caused by dynamite or explosive of a similar nature.

Indeed, the late Sir Howard Vincent, who was at that time head of the Criminal Investigation Department, said that undoubtedly a considerable quantity of nitro-glycerine had been deposited inside the baiustrade of the Local Government Board Offices and ignited by a time tuse. Ultimately four of the conspirators were arrested and sentenced to penal servitude for life. According to Sir Howard Vincent, they had come from the United States in February of the same year, and, after visiting Glasgow, established a nitro-glycerine factory in a house in Jedsame street, Birmingham, from whence the explosive was conveyed to London in india-rubber bags, the conspirators acting under the direction of Thomas Gallagher, an American medical man, who was one of four conspirators sent to prison.

In the same year some startling outrages took place in Glasgow, when various members of what was known as the Secret Ribbon Society, which had for its object the subversion by violence of the Government in Ireviolence of the Government in Archand, and the land, attempted to destroy, by means of dynamite, public buildings and works in that city. They attempted, among other things, to blow up a gasometer and destroy the canal bridge at Possil Park. Altogether the men were arrested: five were senbridge at Foshi I are then men were arrested; five were sentenced to penal servitude for life, the remaining five receiving sentences of seven years each.

First Man To Use Gas. First Man To Use Gas.

In 1792 a manufacturer of Redruth in Cornwall named Murdoch made gas to light his home and factory. Pall Mall in London, 1807, was the first street to be lighted by gas.

Gas is obtained from coal, which is heated in large retorts; the heavy gas drawn off passes by a pipe, called the hydraulic main, through a number of curved pipes called condensers, in urved pipes called condensers, i The gas passes to purifiers over alaked lime, which takes up sulphureted hydrogen and carbonic acid; it is then ded downward to the gas holder, arge tank having its base resting on water, and from which the gas is diswater, and from which the gas is dis-tributed to the consumers. Certain by-products are obtained in the course of manufacture which are more valuable than the gas itself; these include coke, ammonia, aniline, phenol or carbolic acid, naphthalene dyes, various artificial drugs and basic perfumes.

Now that the British nation is lamenting the loss of one of her greatest-warriors of modern times, it is interesting to meet with people who accompanied Lord Wolseley on the Red River expedition, which made his name a never-to-be-forgotten one to the Canadian people.

Such an one is Alexander Ritchie, of North Toronto. Mr. Ritchie, moreover, as far as he is aware, enjoyed. the unique distinction of being the youngest member of the volunteers who took part in repelling the Fenian Raid in 1866.

Mr. Ritchie was born at Kingston in 1850, and at the age of 1s he joined the volunteers. When the Fenian Raid took place in 1866, Mr. Ritchie, then only 16 years old, was sent with his regiment to Cornwall, where it was stationed till the trouble blew over.
