RUSSIANS SAY KUROKI IS DEAD

He Was Killed Over a Month

Said to Have Been Fatally Wounded By a Shell at the Battle of

Shakhe. MOSCOW, Nov. 12. - Nemirovich Danchenko, the well known Russia

war correspondent of the Associated Press, telegraphing from Mukden under today's date, says the reports of the death of General Kuroki are confirmed. According to his version the splinter of a shell struck General Kuroki, tearing out a portion of his breast and abdomen. He died Oct. 4 at Liao Yang and his body was sent to Japan. A rumor is persistently circulated that a kinsman of the Mikado Sias-Kuroki, but the actual commander of the army has been entrusted to General Nodsu, who is reviewing operations.
