

SCHOOL TEACHERS IN SESSION.

Interesting Meetings Held Goods and Prices. Yesterday—Large At-

tendance,

The afternoon session opened with a people, which was a very interesting and pleasing feature of the programme.

A paper was then read on Primary Reading by Miss Lily A. Belyea. She illustrated the principles set forth in her paper with a class of 18 small children. In opening Miss Belyea stated there were various methods of teachthere were various methods of teach ing the first steps in reading, all of which, however, were old. Of these she strongly preferred the word method. Following out the principles of this method she first made the pupils of this method she first made the pupils.

Next she wrote sentences on the board, including the words learned along with new ones. This, she claimed, was the natural method. The teacher should have two aims; first, to make the child get the thought; sec-

ond, to express it.

The second stage of primary reading—from the printed book—aimed, first, to make the pupil familiar with the words; second, to give them the writer's thought, and third, to express the

Miss Belyea strongly advocated the children, while still in the primary grades, to memorize small gems of poetry. In her own school she spent five minutes each day in this work. Miss Belyea then gave a lesson to her class, illustrating her methods. The next paper, read by Miss Ella McAlary, took up Reading in the Advanced Grades. The idea here was, first, to get a sketch of the author, and then to catch his thought from the se-lection read. Vocal expression flowed from the pupil's getting a proper grasp of the thought and feeling. Miss Mc-Alary advocated repeated drill in pronouncing of words commonly mispronounced, with the correction of errors. To illustrate her principles, Miss Mc-Alary took up with her class the lesson on Panthers in the Fourth Reader, written by Chas, G. D. Roberts. The pupils were asked to read only a senwritten by Chas, G. D. Roberts. The pupils were asked to read only a sentence at a time in going over the lesson for the first time, and all mistakes were carefully noted and corrected.

Inspector W. S. Carter acted as chairman. He announced at the opening that the chief superintendent, Dr. Inch, who had expected to be present, was detained at home on account of illness. Also Mrs. Dr. Crocket, who was to sing, had been prevented by sickness from attending.

He extended a cordial welcome to the teachers from Charlotte county, and expressed the hope that their united meeting would tend to their mutual benefit. Referring to the old Grammar School of St. John, the picture of which had been drawn on the blackboard, His Worship recalled some emusing incidents connected with this institution. He then went on to speak of the responsibilities assumed by a teacher of the public school. The teacher's profession was a worthy one, and he always looked upon this class of people with a great degree of respect. In his mind the Teacher's Institute was a work useful organization. stitute was a very useful organization.

The next speaker was Dr. Stetson, superintendent of the Maine schools. Dr. Stetson, in opening, said: "We have a kindred ancestry, and we are to have an affiliated future." He said to have an affiliated future." He said there were four great institutions in connection with the training of the child, viz., the home, the church, the community, and the school. If the home, the church, and the community did not do its work, there was something left undone, the doing of which was beyond the teacher's power. Taking up the history of schools, he said first there came the tutor, then the first there came the tutor, then the educator, then the common teacher. In his mind by far the greatest of these was the common school teacher. The school mistress was discovering the fact that there was much nonthe fact that there was much non-sense in the so-called child study of today, and was learning that the pow-ers of the mind were to be trained at the time of their greatest activity. She was learning that the child up till 8 years of age was all eyes and ears. From that age on he begins to reason and to compare.

We would discover one of these days that we had six classes of children to deal with. Two of these classes should never be found in the school. One

class was those who were grossly vicious, and the other those who were mentally incapable. Of the other four, one was the bookish children, who liked to read and think, and enjoyed the beauties of literature. Then there was the child to whom the book was a was the child to whom the book was a nightmare. He was more concerned about everything out doors than in the school house. One of these days we would get over the foolish notion of endeavoring to store books in child-

The physical boy, he pointed out, had a place in our schools, and he should find there the thing he needed. should find there the thing he needed. If he didn't, we would find him on the highways learning something that would be of use to him.

The third class of pupils was a class of which Europeans said we were unable to boast. These were the poets and pointers.




