

EUROPE IS TO HAVE ANOTHER KINGDOM

Vienna, Aug. 14.—If nothing happens to prevent it, Europe will have an additional king one year from today. Prince Nicholas of Montenegro, who today begins the fiftieth year of his reign, has announced that on the fittieth anniversary of his accession to the throne, which will be on Aug. 14, 1910, he will assume the title of King. No objection to this change of title was made by the other powers, as there was really no reason to object. Montenegro is a free and independent country, owing allesiance to no other nation. 
