PREMIER BOTHA HAS MISSED HIS GREATEST OPPORTUNITY

South Africa's Reconstructed Cabinet Shows Little Prospect of Cementing Two Great Races in Imperialistic Bond.

London, Dec. 27.—As feared, Botha has missed his grand opportunity, possibly his last one. The reconstructed cabinet, although Hertzog is eliminated, holds out far less prospect of the abolition of racial cleavages than has been hoped. Something has been gained by the proof that Natal will not stand for a rank 'anti-Imperial sentiment and by an open political rebuke administered to Hertzog.

Unhappily, Botha has not taken the further step of strengthening his cabinet by the introduction of men of firm Imperial ideas. The new minister, Watt, does not represent the Natal feeling, and has no great standing politically, moreover, Fischer and Sauter, both anti-British and anti-Imperial, still retain important positions, hence the uneasy feeling that the Hertzog incident is a tactical move rather than an indication of the emancipation of the ministry from the dopper influence.

Botha's position is difficult, but his method of meeting it is not indicative of strength. It is an Interesting question now, how far the Unionist party can attract the support of the British parties of Natal and the labor party which have hitherto given support to the government. Natal will probably lean towards the opposition but the labor party is more doubtful. The South African labor party is largely dominated by the Australian hostility to capitalists, end is, perhaps, inclined to sacrifice Imperial interests to the desire to thwart the magnates.



It was the wild the door of the present Government. It was the wild and reckless administration of the affairs of the Province prior to 1908 that is responsible for the present debt Not only were the old Government lavish in their expendi ture on things that might properly be charged to capital account, but upwards of a million dollars was added to the permanent debt during their last ten years for ex-penditures that should have been paid, and would have been paid by an honest Government out of current rev-

When Mr. Blair came into power in 1883 the perman ent debt was \$936,000, the interest charge on which was \$73,310. For that year the Government of New Brunswick received from Ottawa \$35,672 interest on the amoun deposited with the Dominion Government, so that the net interest charge was only \$37,630. When Mr. Robinson retired from power in 1908 the debt of the Province had been increased by \$3,942,834, and his predecessors in office had withdrawn from the deposit at Ottawa \$183,150, which was paying 5 per cent. interest under the agreement made at the time of Confederation. The financial ondition of the Province was, therefore, just \$5,125,284 worse, after it had been under the rule of the old Government twenty-five years. The interest charge on the permanent debt at the close of the Robinson Administra-tion was \$210,320, and this did not include, as the statement made by the present Government does, the interest paid for temporary as well as permanent loans.

The state ment made by the Telegraph that the present Government have made no provision for a sinking fund for the purpose of extinguishing the debt is false. Had the felegraph made even a casual examination of the consolidated revenue account as it appeared in the Royal Gazette, and also in its own columns, the item "Sinking funds \$25,580.25" would have been easily discovered.

For the last three years temporary loans amounting in all to \$29.832.53 were made on account of the St. John River Valley Railway to pay the cost of the survey. These have been appearing in the permanent debt ac-count, but as this amount has been repaid by the St. John and Quebec Railway Company, it has disappeared from

It will be seen that of the total additions to the per manent debt more than half are for the cost of perman ent bridges. Just at the close of the session of 1907 knowing that an election was due in a few months, th struction of no less than forty-one permanent bridges in all sections of the Province, and with the aid of their ma jority in the House, crowded the measure through, there by imposing an expenditure of upwards of two millions of the people. It was explained at the time that it was not the intention to make this whole expenditure in one year, but to spread it over a term of years; but as the bridge proposed to be constructed were all named in the act, the Legislature was committed to build them all, although was made for an expenditure of only \$350,000

The present Government cannot be held responsible for the high expenditure entailed by this act, although some of the money was spent under their direction. They were merely the instrument in carrying out the in-structions of the Legislature. They have added a few bridges to the list made out by the old Government, but

the total cost of these structures is less than \$200,000. In the construction work done since the present Adnistration came into power many bridges have been as permanent bridges and charged up to capital account as was the former practice whenever the repairs to per manent bridges were made a charge on capital account.

It would certainly be a wild stretch of the imagination to make the present Administration responsible for the bonds issued on account of the N. B. Coal and Railway enterprise. If the Government, when in Opposition, fought any measure brought down by the old Administration it was the N. B. Coal and Railway proposition. It was denounced by every member of the Opposition and made clear to the public through their speeches in and out of the House of Assembly, that the credit of the Province was being exploited in the hope that a few individuals would be greatly enriched thereby. It was the most disgraceful thing of the kind ever attempted in this Province and the people are now compelled to face a debt increased on this account by over a million dollars. Here is a straight addition of \$40,000 annually to the interest account on one transaction. What has the Telegraph and its friends to say about the honesty of this outrageous act? The men who were most interested in it, and who would have benefitted financially had the proposition been a success, are very close to the Telegraph. Perhaps this accounts for its silence.

The subsidy to the International Railway is another item regarding which the old Government must take the entire responsibility. With half a million deducted from the debt statement for permanent bridges contracted for by the old Government added to the expenditures on account of the N. B. Coal and Railway and the International Railway, it will be seen that the present Government have by their own legislation only added about \$200,000 to the permanent debt, which means an increase of \$5,000 to the annual interest charge. Place this against the increase of \$357,795.94 in the revenue during the ame period and the present Government cannot be accused either of maladministration of the Province.

Contrast also the attion of the present Administration to make the present Administration responsible for the bonds issued on account of the N. B. Coal and Railway

in placing \$78,653.48 received from the sale of Crown Lands in a special reserve or sinking fund, with that of the old Government when they received from the Dominion the vast sum of \$280,692.18. When in 1901 they received this amount the consolidated revenue account was in debt \$97,198.21. Had this been a truthful statement of the financial condition of the Province Premier Tweedie would still have had \$200,000 to put aside as a nest egg. But unfortunately for the people the financial condition was so bad that every dollar of this money, and bond issues of \$200,000, were necessary to square accounts.

The Telegraph talks glibly of a paper balance. If the balance were, only a paper balance how could Mr. Flemming have done what he has? He would have been compelled, like Mr.Tweedie, to have used the money to

compelled, like Mr.Tweedie, to have used the money to pay the bills of the Province. But the bills are paid and \$78,000 is invested for the benefit of the Province. And this, bear in mind, after a much larger expenditure for public works, education and agriculture than was ever dreamed of by the former Administration.

"Thanks to a large territorial revenue and to in-creased returns from other sources, over which the Gov creased returns from other sources, over which the Government had no control, the income for the year ending October 31, 1912, was \$1,417,722," says the Telegraph. It is pleasing to have the Telegraph admit that the Government did have control of the territorial revenue. For the year 1907 the last full year of the old Government, the territorial revenue was \$321,000, and it has always been admitted by the supporters of the old regime that it was a good year—the best they ever had. This year the territorial revenue is smaller by \$6,000 than in 1911, yet was \$220,000 more than the best year the old Government \$220,000 more than the best year the old Government ever experienced. It was a lean year in the lumber business. Markets across the water were not satisfactory and freights were high. Consequently the operators here shortened their cut and the Government collections here shortened their cut and the dovernment confections for stumpage were \$28,000 less than in 1911. Yet the total (erritorial revenue only suffered \$6,000. Had 1912 been as good a year for the lumbermen as the previous year the territorial revenue would have exceeded \$500,000. As it is there is every indication that under the wise adninistration of the present Government the Crown Lands will yield double the income obtained in 1907 and will equal the Dominion subsidy.

Discussing the capital expenditures of the Govern-Discussing the capital expenditures of the Government the Telegraph goes on to say: "The Government shows a capital expenditure of \$197,123, of which it is asserted that \$178,623 was spent on permanent bridges. How permanent some of these bridges are is a matter to be determined hereafter; but it a well-established fact that this Government has been in the habit of charging to permanent bridges much money that should be set down as ordinary expenditure.

The Telegraph has evidently not given very close attention to the question and should have read the act of 1907, which distinctly sets out the class of bridges which are to be classed as permanent and for which debentures structures with wooden super-structures; or they shall be of masonry sub-structures with steel super-structures; or of covered wooden super-structures with wooden su This is clear enough for anybody and as the bridges called permanent are certified by the Provincial Engineer there is not much opportunity for the Government to do as the Telegraph suggests.

It is well to record impartial opinions on the naval question, which are free from any bias and which regard it from an independent point of view. In the last issue of the Montreal Chronicle, an old established journal devoted to banking, insurance and finance, a leading article under the caption "Imperial Defence," ably comments on the situation.

The Chronicle unreservedly condemns Sir Wilfrid Laurier's proposals as "baby fleets," ineffective and useless, and makes the point, which is understand that the Canadian papers. is undoubtedly true, that the Canadian people are over-whelmingly in favor of doing "something real" for the

The article, which is worth quoting, is as follows: "The main objection to the naval policy of the osition at Ottawa is that it isn't a naval policy at all. Nobody who has paid the slightest attention to the conditions which present themselves in modern naval warfare, can see any 'practical connection between the establishment of a baby fleet on the

between the establishment of a baby fleet on the Pacific Coast and another on the Atlantic Coast for the defence of Canada or of the Empire.

"Any great naval war of the future will be decided when the battle fleets of the fighting powers meet. If a foreign fleet beats the British Navy in the North Sea or the Mediterranean the fate of Canada or of the Empire will not be affected in the slightest degree by the fact that there is an undermanned tin-pot navy off British Columbia, and another off Nova gree by the fact that there is an undermanned the of navy of British Columbia, and another of Nova Scotia. To the victor will belong every inch of the British Empire that it is thought wise to take.

'Industrial conditions in Canada are such that we cannot find enough men to recruit the present 'Can-

adian Navy' or the permanent military corps. This does not mean that Canadians cannot be depended upon in time of emergency to do a great deal for the defence of the Flag, but it does mean that we must cut our coat according to our cloth. We can have a nation in arms and a nation of marksmen, always ready for defensive purposes, but we cannot get trained man o' war's men 'Like trousers ready-made

"The proposed twin navies would have no more effect on the next war than a ferry boat, and no more moral effect upon the nations than the present debate will have upon the electors. The sentiment of the people of Canada is overwhelmingly in favor of doing something real for the defence of the Empire. does not need stimulating and will not be weakened by floods of oratory."

Under the Laurier regime the Canadian people were denied the opportunity to do "something real," as the Chronicle states, for Imperial Defence. The proposals now put forward by the Opposition are merely an enlarged edition of the old and discredited Laurier naval policy. The principle which governed that policy was reliterated by their Leader only the other day. "When England is at war," he said, "we are at war; but it does not follow that because we are at war we are in the conflict." Mr. Borden will in due course submit a permanent naval policy to the people, but in the meantime "something real" can be accomplished by placing three Canadian battleships, as Mr. Borden has stated, "at the disposal of His Majesty the King for the common defence of the Empire."
