The budget speech of Premier Tweedie gives a clear statement of the financial operations of the province for the year ending October 31st, 1900, as well as the estimated revenue and expenditure for the current year. The income of the province last year amounted to \$758,988.66, and the expenditure to \$794,476.85, leaving a deficit in the year's operations of \$35,488.19. At first sight this would be regarded as showing either some unfortunate falling away of the anticipated revenue or else some extravagance in the administration of the public affairs. As a matter of fact the result was occasioned by neither the one or the other. The deficit of last year is caused solely by the extra expenditures due from several unforseen causes, which are fortunately not apt to

drise in the years to come. For example, the smallpox epidemic which, it will be remembered, assumed threatening proportions, particularly in the counties of Restigouche and Gloucester, necessitated a special and unexpected expenditure of \$23,480.96 last year. Mr. J. D. Hazen's bridge investigation was in itself a costly fishing excursion, calling for special expenditure of \$10,484. The special contribution of \$5,000 to the patriotic fund was another unusual expenditure with which neither the supporters or opponents of the Tweedic administration will find fault. These three items far more than account for the shortage in last year accounts, and need only be stated to convince reasonable people that there is no ground for apprehension as to the future

financial condition of the province. It would have been a simple matter for the provincial secretary last year to have shown a surplus. He might have repudiated the responsibility of providing the money which was used for humanity sake in preventing the spread of the loathsome disease of smallpox. DR. TALMAGE'S CHARACTERIZATION OF THE PROPHET EZEKIEL

GOOD AND EVIL IN INKSTAND.

The Mission of the Writer's Inkhern-Power to Express Affection, or Conlence, or Advice-Writing to the

Washington, March 17 .- In a new way and from a peculiar text Dr. Talmage discourses of good influences brought to bear for the world's improvement. The text is Lackiel ix, 2, "And one man among them was clothed with linen, with a writter's inkhorn by his side."

The poem from which my text is taken is epic, lyric, dramatic, weird and overpowering. It is more than Homeric or Dantesque. No one ever had such divine dreams as Ezekiel. In a vision this prophet had seen wrathful angels, destroying angels, each with a sword, but in my text he sees a merciful angel with an ink-horn. The receptacle for the ink in olden time was made out of the horn of a cow or a ram or a roebuck, as now it is made out of metal or glass, and therefore was called an inkhorn,

and therefore was called an inkhorn, as now we say inkstand. We have all spoken of the power of the sword, of the power of wealth, of the power of office, of the power of social influence, but to-day I speak of the power for good or evil in the inkstand. It is upon your tables, holding a black or blue or red liquid. It is a fortress, an armory, a gateway. fortress, an armory, a gateway, a ransom or a demolition. "You mistake," says some one; "it is the pen that has the power." No, my friend. What is the influence of a dry pen? Pass it up and down a sheet of paper, and it leaves no mark. 


