Some districts have never before enjoyed the advantages of schools, and the children were growing up without education, except such as they got at home. I was surprised to find that no clearing had been made at the Forks, as the land there is of a superior quality and possesses many attractions for the settler. It was explained to me, however, by the fact that most of the land there has been granted and is now held for speculation.

One drawback to the more rapid improvement of the faming interests of this section may be traced to the fact that most of the farmers do something in lumbering. If farmers could make up their minds to farm and leave lumbering solely to lumbermen they would soon find their farms and circumstances improved. The season devoted to the lumber interest is most valuable for farming purposes, and the latter interest is since to suffer. The farmer here has no difficulty in disposing of his produce at remunerative prices. His cats, hay, pork and horse stock find a ready sale to the lumbermen while his beef, sheep, potatoes and butter are taken rom his doors at market rates by drovers and others.

Farming on the Tobique may have its drawbacks, and so it has everywhere, but for young men who wish to hew out for themselves homes with a promise of a sure reward I know no place in the Provinces that offers superior advantages.
